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THE SUDBROOKE NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN REVIEW CONSULTATION

Notice is hereby given that Sudbrooke Parish Council is formally consulting on the draft amendments to the Sudbrooke Neighbourhood Plan and its associated documents.

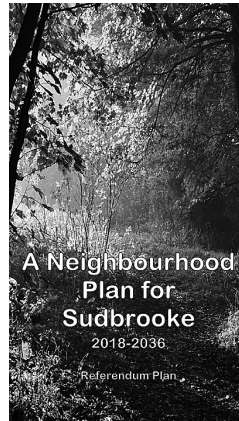
The Neighbourhood Plan has been subject to a review over the past few months so that it is up to date with the recently adopted review of the Central Lincolnshire Local Plan.

The Local Plan has altered policies around housing development and the environment, so the review of the Neighbourhood Plan is only focussing on updating on these policies.

Once completed, the Neighbourhood Plan review will replace the existing Neighbourhood Plan for Sudbrooke and will be used to help determine future planning applications in the area by the Parish Council and West Lindsey District Council (WLDC). It is likely another referendum will need to be held with the community later next year.

It is really important that we receive your comments on these draft amendments so that the Parish Council can make sure it accurately reflects the communities' views.

The consultation period starts on the November 15, 2023 and closes on the January 3, 2024.

DRAFT MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF SUDBROOKE PC HELD ON THURSDAY 5 OCTOBER IN THE VILLAGE HALL

PRESENT: Councillors Peter Heath (Chairman), Tracey Bowman (Vice Chair), Sandra Clayton, Paul Fido, Bhikhu Mistry, Dave Scott, Pauline Loven (8.15pm), Clerk Christine Myers, Treasurer Bridget Solly, plus three parishioners

1 ■ PARISHIONERS ITEMS

► A resident had commented on the area around the Park Gates having a generally untidy appearance. Members hoped that a tidy up of the area could take place, following reduction in the canopy of the Holm Oak trees.

2 ■ TO RECEIVE APOLOGIES AND REASONS GIVEN

► Councillor Simon Crampton, County Councillor Mrs Sue Rawlins and District Councillor Baptiste Velan. Reasons given accepted, unanimously Resolved.

3 ■ TO RECEIVE DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST ON ANY ITEM ON THE AGENDA

► There were no declarations made.

4 ■ NOTES OF THE MEETING HELD ON 7 SEPTEMBER 2023 TO BE APPROVED AND SIGNED AS MINS

► That the notes be signed as minutes unanimously Resolved.

5 ■ COUNTY COUNCILLORS AND DISTRICT COUNCILLOR REPORTS

► Cc Mrs Sue Rawlins had given updates

of items on the agenda, to be reported at that time in the meeting. She further mentioned that LCC had looked into the possibility of signage for the Post Office, the reply being:

'The outcome is that LCC would be willing to provide back-to-back signs at the junction of Scothern Lane with Holme Drive (where there is currently an illegal advertising sign – which would have to be removed along with any similar examples).

'As the Post Office acts as a holding place for undelivered parcels in the local area, and therefore customers receive a notice through the letter box to say the parcel is at Sudbrooke Post Office (no directions provided), a sign at the junction of Holme Lane is justified.

'However, signing would not be permitted from the A158 or from Scothern, on the premise that if anyone is genuinely looking for Sudbrooke Post Office they will follow signs into Sudbrooke first (signed from the A158).

'Black and white direction signs attached to the existing lighting column, with legend Shop & PO, could, therefore, be provided and erected at the expense of the applicant.'

The Clerk would therefore refer this to the Shop owner to pursue.

► DC Baptiste Velan report received as follows:

'Planning application for the construction and operation of a Battery Energy Storage System (BESS) including sub-stations, inverters,

transformer stations, cabling, fencing, internal service track and landscaping.'

'The surrounding landscape is predominantly arable, the small residential areas of Reepham to the south and Sudbrooke to the north, to the east of the site is a small industrial area. Additionally, there is a sewage treatment plant adjacent to the Site.

'Proposals within the survey boundary are for a BESS and access track. A cable will be installed from the highway, through the arable field and under the wet ditch via directional drilling. The cable will run approximately four metres beneath the ditch.'

Cllr Velan also requested confirmation in connection with the S106 Agreement that there were three constructed properties on the site.

He also confirmed that he had approved £200 grant application towards the Christmas Tree Switch on event.

► D) Reply to Chairman's letter from Marc Jones, Police and Crime Commissioner – It was noted that the letter sent to the PCC by the Chairman was now being treated as a complaint to the Lincolnshire Police, which was not its original intention.

► E) Section 106 Agreement, Church Lane – update from CC Sue Rawlins – LCC were currently progressing the funding release.

DC Baptiste Velan's response was in his report minute 90 23/24.

► F) Request for pedestrian crossing on A158 – CC Sue Rawlins reported that this was currently under discussion with LCC.

► G) Drainage in Village Hall Car park – Councillor Tracey Bowman reported that this had been discussed at a Village Hall Committee meeting and an update from a drainage contractor was awaited.

► H) West Drive footway – Reply from Parklands Project Manager stated that there is no current timescale to deliver.

TEMPLE BRUER TOWER THE HIGHLIGHT OF LATEST HIKE

► Nine walkers set out on a six-mile circular from St John's Church near Wellingore to visit the Temple Bruer Knights Templar Preceptory Tower, right, and to enjoy the local countryside.

The weather was ideal for walking – dry and bright with a gentle breeze.

The Tower was open except for roof access and has undertaken some repairs.

The new replacement stonework contrasts starkly with the original weathered stonework.

Someone suggested the cost of the repairs probably exceeded the cost of the whole original building way back in the 13th century.

We passed through a number of large fields of sugar beet ready for harvesting.

The wet summer should ensure farmers have a good crop this year.

Our return journey took us through an amazing field path which had been carefully planted to provide an abundance of food for wildlife. A wide variety of berried trees and shrubs plus a few fruit trees.

A circular walk of approximately six miles from Ingham to the historic church of St Edith at Coates By Stow, right.

Walkers should meet at the village hall at 9.30am and are advised to wear a waterproof coat, wear suitable footwear and bring a drink and a snack.

Some of the field paths can be muddy. Everyone is welcome to join in the walks.

COMPETITION WINNERS ANNOUNCED AT CORAL'S

► On Tuesday 10 October, the Garden Club had an afternoon get-together at Coral's garden for the weigh-in of the sweet potato challenge and declare a winner of the Mr Potato Head trophy, plus a winner and trophy of the sunflower challenge.

We managed to pick a day with decent weather, well decent for October, it was reasonably warm and we got some sunshine as well.

Sweet potatoes are sub-tropical plants of the Morning Glory family and so pretty challenging to grow in the less than sub-tropical climate of the UK.

The competition was to grow a sweet potato from a slip in a container; my advice to members was to use the biggest container they had and put it in the most sheltered, warmest, sunniest place in the garden; if the member had use of a greenhouse they could grow them inside.

At the end of May, I supplied all the members with a sweet potato slip variety 'Beauregard' growing in a small pot.

We had no actual failures although Iris' plant was eaten by some pest while she was away on holiday.

John and myself rummaged through the containers turning out the tubers and Coral and Iris weighed them and compiled the statistics. Growing medium, fertiliser and watering was left

to members discretion, but advice was to use a good compost and keep them well watered and fed.

As might well be expected we had a broad spectrum of results; so very similar results to those we get from the usual potato challenge. We turned out and weighed 17 containers, Nicola did not send hers in because it was in flower and still had many buds on it and three other members were unable to attend.

The winner was Peter Gimson with 1,254g and runner-up Jayne Haley with 476g

The sunflower challenge was to grow the tallest sunflower in the village. All members were given a 'Russian Giant' sunflower seed at the beginning of the season. Similar to last year many members managed to grow a sunflower, but 'Russian Giants' they certainly were not, with many only growing to four or five feet.

The winner was Rupert Hadley with 285cms.

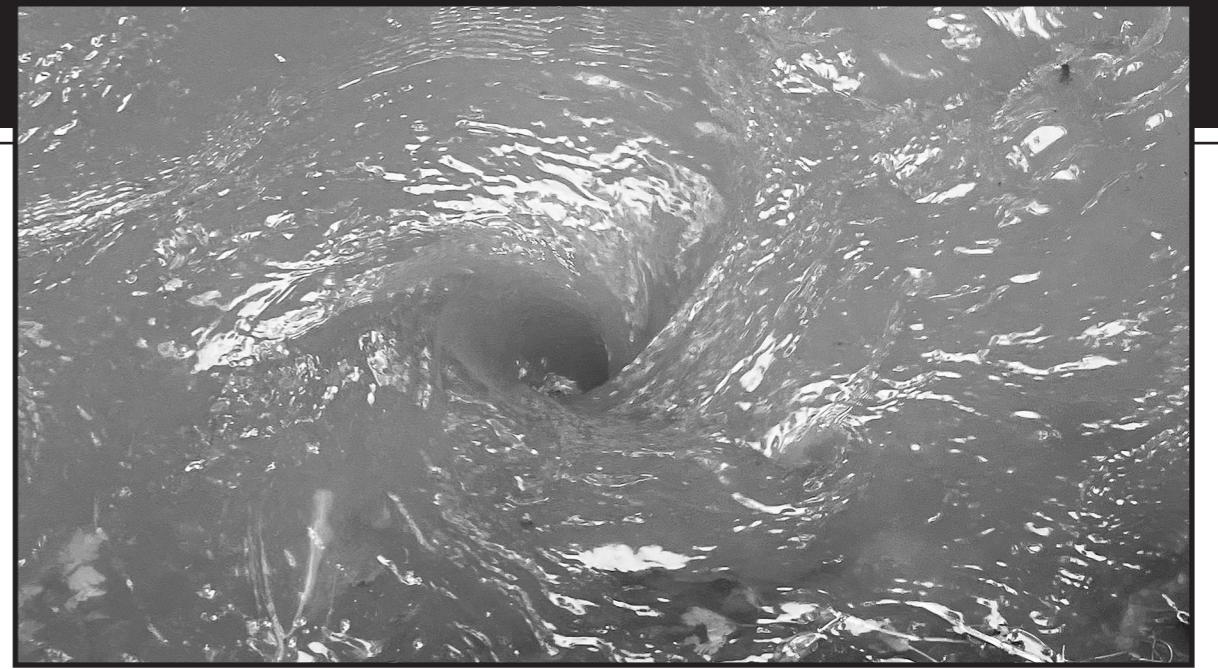
SUDBROOKE FLOODING

NOVEMBER, THE MONTH OF REMEMBERING

► November has always felt like the remembering month, hasn't it?

Not only is the weather colder and the nights darker, but it's a time (amidst the darkness) for flashes of light, be that fireworks, remembrance candles or fairy lights.

We begin the month by celebrating All Saints and then have our All-Souls' Memorial service at Fiskerton. Then, of course, there are our Acts of Remembrance around Armistice Day.

Remembering is such a bittersweet thing, isn't it? When we remember, it is often with the joy of a cherished time being brought back to our minds, but with the sadness that that time is now past – that it can only be revisited in our memories.

The memories themselves bring a smile to our faces, but they often come tied up with a ribbon of grief because some of the people at the heart of that memory have died.

It is not always easy to do so, but it is important that we know it's ok to hold that joy and pain together – to find moments of light and laughter in the darkness - because both the joy and the pain come from the same source: love.

We may find ourselves grieving other things too. We might be struggling with all sorts of other losses at the moment – loss of a relationship, perhaps, or of our working life. It might be the loss of who we 'used to be' before

age, injury or chronic illness changed things. It would be very easy here for me to simply acknowledge the importance of faith in this – to remind you that God is with us in all of it - yet I know that our faith can be really knocked when we experience such loss and so I don't do so lightly.

But, for me – while I might shout at God; whilst I might demand he acts NOW to heal the world; whilst I might question why – I am in absolutely no doubt that I will find him there with me, holding me.

He is there when it feels darkest and because he is there, there is light. Maybe just a flicker at first. But even a flicker of light makes a huge difference to our darkest time, doesn't it?

The light doesn't deny our grief, rather it illuminates it and helps us to find new ways to be, new ways to live with and despite our loss, new ways to find the balance between joy and pain.

It is no accident, I think, that our season of remembering moves into our Advent season of waiting for the light – and ultimately the explosion of the light into the world at Christmas, the light that is Jesus. My prayer is that you will trust that his light is there for you, today and always.

The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it (John 1:5).

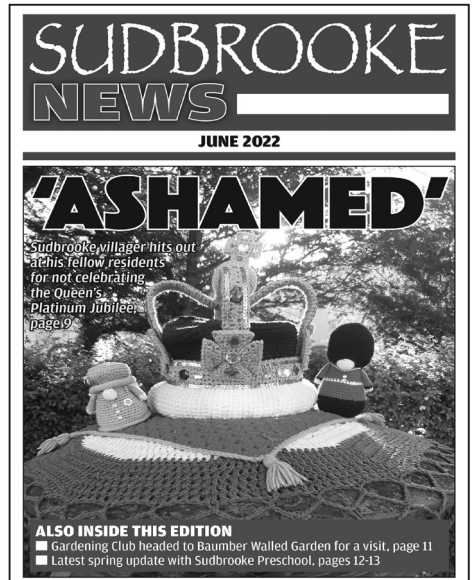
