

1 ■ PARISHIONERS ITEMS

• Comments received on the danger of the junction of Scothern Lane and Wragby Road; parishioner commented the situation appears to be getting worse. This has been brought to the attention of the district councillor recently, but no action is being considered at the moment due to lack of Police involvement.

B) Grass encroachment/upgrading of path to cycleway, Wragby Road - very positive meeting took place with

Highways officer, clerk, Chair and member of the parish. It was agreed the path would be cleared and would be added to the work list. This is likely to happen in the new financial year.

C) Speeding in village:

i. To consider requesting the LRSP to assess the estate roads in the village in order that 30mph signs could be sited item deferred till next meeting ii To consider purchase of replacement 40mph speed signs for Scothern Lane - item deferred till next meeting iii To consider quotation for speed indicator device - Councillors discussed purchasing a Speed Indicator Device for the village which could be moved to different locations.

The quotation received by the clerk has been included in this year's precept. However, before any final decision is made, it has been agreed that the PC will seek the views of the parishioners

D) Section 106 Agreement, Church Lane - update from County and District Councillors - It was understood that payment for the footpath from the Church around Two Corners had been made to the County Council, however the continuation of the footpath to the parish boundary was the responsibility of the developer of Poachers Lane. Nothing further to report.

That the Parish Council contact the developer of Poachers Lane requesting that the footway be constructed unanimously Resolved.

- E) Request for pedestrian crossing on the A158 - reply from CC Sue Rawlins - This was still being pursued.
- F) To consider cost of basketball nets and whether this could be a request for funding from the IGas Community Fund - councillors felt that more research was needed; an additional quotation and seek advice from other PCs.

The event was thoroughly enjoyed by all who attended. The 'free' mulled wine and mince pies went down well. Many parishioners donated money (for next year's event) and many raffle tickets were sold. £294.64 was raised. Lots of very positive comments were received from members of the public attending the event.

IT'S A FOND FAREWELL FROM PENNY...

▶ Every time I write a 'first of the new year' blog its usually about new starts and new beginnings. This one is no different mostly because for me the beginning of 2024 will indeed signal a new beginning with retirement from parish ministry.

I arrived to these parishes in September 2010, Green by name and nature! I didn't have too much of a clue about what I was doing in semi-rural parishes, but somehow, I stumbled through and discovered what lovely communities these are, what great schools there are and how, when people work together and use their gifts, they can make a difference. Inevitably I have got some things wrong but that's life!

People keep asking me what I am going to do in retirement and the answer is that at the moment, I don't know, but it will involve watching more cricket, a holiday or two and doing some things that I have always wanted to do, but never had time to!

I won't be moving out of the Vicarage until a little later in the year but at some point, I will be doing a major 'downsize'! I will take some wonderful memories with me, mostly of people. It's been 13 years of great fun and faith. I have loved working with our churches, as a

School Governor, with my ecumenical friends. Yes, there have been some really difficult moments Parish ministry is, for me, where the rubber hits the road as you meet people at crisis points in their lives, but you also meet them in joyful times as well – it's been lovely to

marry couples and then baptise their children; it's been amazing to baptise the children of people that I used to teach at LCHS; it's been great to watch people grow in faith; it's fantastic to have seen people respond to families and individuals who have found themselves in dire straits – the FiSH Fund started well before the Government thought of supplying food vouchers to families in need – last summer we spent £4,700 on vouchers.

The actual leaving is going to be emotional, but I I know that it will also provide some fun and laughter. I am reminded of the words of Jesus when the woman came to him to anoint his feet with perfumed oil. There was a roomful of people looking disapprovingly and he said to them: 'she did what she could'. I hope that I too have done what I can. I have so many thankyous to say because faith and community is a shared thing and none of us can do it alone. So, thank you to all of you for receiving me into your community. It's been a blast!







DRAFT MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF SUDBROOKE PC HELD ON THURSDAY 11 JANUARY IN THE VILLAGE HALL

PRESENT: Councillors Peter Heath (Chairman), Mrs Tracey Bowman (Vice Chair), Simon Crampton, Sandra Clayton, Bhikhu Mistry, Dave Scott, Mrs Pauline Loven (from 7.55pm), Mrs Bridget Solly (Treasurer), one resident

1 ■ PARISHIONERS ITEMS

▶ A resident of Park Close was in attendance and expressed the problems he had faced during the recent heavy rainfall in the flooding of his garden from the adjacent beck. The Clerk had sourced him aqua sacs and put him in touch with the Witham Third Internal Drainage Board and District Councillor Baptiste Velan.

It was understood that DC Velan had communicated with the resident with advice and contacts.

The resident stated that other nearby properties had experienced similar problems and effluent from manholes and in this respect it was suggested that he contact Anglian Water.

The Clerk was asked to contact DC Velan again to ensure that further support was given to the residents.

- ▶ A report had been received from a resident that ingress of grass required cutting back from the gutters in the pulling out lane on Wragby Road. It was suggested that this be reported on Fix My Street.
- A report had been received from a resident about the poor surface of West Drive and the footway on the approach to the woods. It was noted that the road is still in the ownership of the developer and is their responsibility for defects until such time as it is adopted by Lincolnshire County Council.

Individuals could contact the developers direct.
