#### ■ 32 BURIAL SPACE/NEW CEMETERY - UPDATE

▶ The Chairman outlined progress to date in that a meeting had been held with Revd Canon Penny Green and the Archdeacon to which the Archdeacon had approved the site suitable for a cemetery.

It was felt that soil analysis should take place on the site in order to assess the drainage. Councillor Bob Waller to investigate through WLDC Planning Department.

The Clerk was instructed to obtain prices from solicitors for the conveyancing of the land.

It was suggested that a design concept of the area could be put together by the Church as a start towards plans being drawn up or to detailed plans being put together.

#### **33 HIGHWAY ISSUES**

A) To consider action on suggestion by resident on proposed road signage when diversions are in place for the A158 at Scothern Lane and Lodge Lane, Nettleham: A resident had suggested a possible solution to discourage diverted drivers attempting to use Nettleham Lane as a shorter diversion route with a view to keeping traffic moving and minimising damage and danger.

This being that his company provide two folding road signs, six road cones and some sandbags to be stored at the home of a willing resident both at the Sudbrooke end and the Nettleham end, and as soon as such a diversion is set up then the residents could be contacted and the entry lane at both points have the signage put across.

This was considered by the Parish Council and whilst it was felt the idea could work if the suggestion were to be referred to LCC Highways, it would not be an option for them to use as it would be handing over power to put out road signage to unauthorised personnel (residents).

That the Clerk be instructed to write to the resident thanking him for the suggestion, but outlining the above comments unanimously Resolved.

▶ B) To consider response from LCC Chief Executive, Leader of Lincolnshire County Council and Edward Leigh MP in response to Chairman's letter relating to pavements in Sudbrooke - Sir Edward Leigh had offered to walk around the village with members of the Parish Council and it was hoped that a meeting could be arranged.

#### ■ 35 STUART CURTIS SPORTS FIELD

A) Report by Councillor Bhikhu Mistry on site meeting and consideration of quotation for works required for improving surface, supply and fixing of gate - Cllr Mistry had met the Contracts Manager at Glendale Countryside to ascertain how improvement to the surface of the field could be best achieved.

It was suggested that the moles required eradicating; heavy roll as soon as possible; supply and apply three ton of topsoil to fill rabbit damage and areas that have been undermined by the moles; weekly grass cutting between May and July – all of which would improve the surface. The cost of this would be £650.00.

That the above works be carried out unanimously Resolved.

It was also recommended that the entrance to the car park be improved, together with a gate sited across the entrance to the car park to prevent unauthorised entry. Two prices for gates had been had been obtained by the Clerk. That a gate not be fitted, but that the entrance area be improved with a layer of road planings (prices to be sought), proposed by Councillor Peter Heath, seconded by Councillor Andy Cottam and Resolved.

▶ B) Report by Councillor Ian Russell on works required to the northern boundary hedge - Cllr Russell had met the Contracts Manager of Glendale Countryside when it was suggested that the northern boundary hedge be flailed back in late summer once the nesting season had finished at a cost of £245.00.

It was proposed by Cllr Ian Russell that this work be considered again in the autumn unanimously Resolved.

■ 36 VILLAGE HALL PLAYING FIELD -REPORT BY CLLR IAN RUSSELL ON SITE MEETING AND CONSIDERATION OF

#### QUOTATION FOR WORKS REQUIRED TO TREES

Decouncillor Russell had met the Contracts Manager of Glendale Countryside in order to discuss work required to trees on the northern boundary of the village hall which had low branches causing the grass cutting difficulty.

One dead cherry tree required removal, coppice of trees adjacent to the play area need lifting, epicormics growth and dead wood removing at a cost of £395.00. That this price be accepted unanimously Resolved.

Mr Stuart Hewson had been asked and agreed to advise on the CCTV at the Village Hall. All members welcomed this. Mr Hewson would meet Councillor Bhikhu Mistry and the Village Hall representative to explain the system. It was agreed that a further quotation for cameras be sought.

Concerns about the traffic using West Drive were raised and it was explained that BOSS had located their site office close to this road so that their vehicles could be monitored and any issues addressed. It had been stressed that farm vehicles could not be monitored.

The timing of the opening of the pub was apparently the most asked question by residents. No date for completion currently.

It was hoped that the development could be included on the Sudbrooke village map and Ben Martin had agreed to reproduce this for the parish. It was also agreed that the developers provide a base and install the new seat, provided by the Parish Council, on Main Drive.

## PAIN MAESTRO IS BACK ON

THERE is no doubt that the coronavirus has brought pain to many over the past 15 months or so, but one Sudbrooke business thrives on pain, it's modus operandi is to relieve its sufferers from aches and strains, although even they have had their ups and downs throughout this current pandemic era.

Back To Health Osteopathy, based on Manor Drive, are a muscle and joint specialist, run by fully qualified exponent Steve Dewey, who has a masters degree in osteopathic medicine and his remit is to 'maximise pain relief and increase mobility'.

But the onset of Covid saw his business, like many others, struggle to operate as they not only had to be given the green light to carry on operating, but also had to adapt to numerous new procedures, which will be in place for years to come.

Formerly of Norfolk, where up until recently he ran another clinic, Steve and his family moved to Sudbrooke just a few years ago and he is now virtually solely based in the village.

"Prior to Covid I was working in Norwich, I

had my own practice there in a very popular gym in an established clinic," Steve explains.

"I have had to knock most of that on the head, so I am really focused on Lincoln now. I used to head there for two days a week - it's a horrible slow road, lots of singlecarriage roads and farm vehicles holding you up.

"I go back once every three weeks and that's to see some ongoing patients - I treat some people there with conditions like multiple sclerosis and things like that.

Because they can't leave their homes, I haven't had the heart to tell them I'm not going to see them any more, because if I don't



then no-one will." He has adapted his home to be the epicentre of his business, as he

continues: "I now have a clinic built on to the side of the house - I see most of my patients there now. I have people come from as far away as Grimsby, although they don't tend to come as far as that now, that was more prior to Covid.

"Nowadays, Metheringham is about as far as it gets. People do

travel reasonable distances today, though."

So how did the devastating effects of

Covid-19 hinder his business?

"It was extremely tough, particularly when the first lockdown came last March/April time," he says. "Quite frankly, it felt like the world was going to come to an end, and we

were so unprepared for everything in terms of what to do and how to react. And for a period of time we were waiting for our governing body, the Osteopathic Council to give us guidance as to how to proceed.

"That took a bit of time to work out what to do, so I had to close for about five to six weeks. Luckily, as we are registered as allied healthcare professionals, we were told we were allowed to continue treating, but with use of full

worrying time, but before too long it started to get busier with new patient enquiries, who had a different outlook. I lost a lot of patients,

but then gained quite a few new ones.

"I think it has balanced itself out, although I am probably busier now than I was prior to Covid. Over the past few

protective gear, and as long as we adhered to that we could continue treating."

Naturally, he saw a decline in patients when the pandemic first took hold, but through time, with the public coming terms with life again and starting to head out into the new world around us as the lockdown restrictions have eased, his business has picked up.

"I've been very fortunate in that I receive a lot of recommendations, which is extremely good for me - it accounts for around 90% of my patients," reveals Steve.

"But it has been a real mixed bag - let's say I was treating 20 patients prior to Covid, probably 50% of those patients didn't return once lockdown was eased, either they were shielding or had had family members who were shielding, or for personal reasons where they decided it was safer not to come in for treatment.

"In that short period, it was quite a

and months, things have really started to pick up. As most of my patients have come through recommendations, I will view that as some sort of success.

"Some of my patients are in their 70s, while I had a new patient who came to me who was 12. It's a real mix of ages and the ailments vary widely as well. I have patients who have had knee operations recently or shoulder surgery or have running injuries."

So the future is looking bright again for Back To Health Osteopathy, with Steve summing up: "At the moment things are looking really positive.

"From what was looking like being a very worrying time, now public confidence is growing and through recommendations and the use of PPE, and the fact we obviously we know a lot more about Covid now, people are much happier and are happy to see people like myself."





## A BURGEONING BOWLS SCENE



Think of a traditional British summer sporting pastime, and once you've got cricket and tennis out of the way, then bowls should figure highly in your thoughts.

The small of fresh-cut grass, the chink of bowl upon bowl (and sometimes the jack), the anguished cries of a near-miss and the appreciation of a shot well played, there is much to savour about one of the country's oldest and most-established sports (one that can be played from nine to 90), which continues to be one of the beating hearts of the Commonwealth Games programme (it's never been included in the Olympics).

Also, how many other sports can you name in which both men and women compete against each other on a regular basis and on a level playing field? There is much to like about bowls. And in nearby Nettleham, here is a club that is

positively thriving as others around and about are folding due to a lack of numbers (think Bardney and Skellingthorpe), exacerbated by the Covid-19 crisis, that has seen memberships plunge around the country, even at leading clubs.

With over 60 members on their books. which includes newcomers from Sudbrooke and Langworth, Nettleham are bucking the trend and chairman Derek Kilby thinks he knows why.

"We welcome everyone who wants to join - those who just want a roll-up every now and then, to those who want to play league matches," explained Derek, who has been in the chair for the past 20 years.

"We are a very friendly club, plus we have an excellent green, a fact commented on by several other clubs in the area."

Indeed, looking at Nettleham's pristine, luscious green grass - compared to other clubs in the areas, whose greens are



covered in brown and black patches, pays testament to the hard work done by greenkeeper Alan Dines (also one of the team captains) to keep it looking so good.

The club has been at its home, just off Sudbrooke Lane, since 1937, after previously playing on land that is now the Co-Op car park for two years

times to improve the green and the facilities and it is no surprise that they have developed a reputation for being one of the top clubs in the area.

They play in five different leagues - City of Lincoln (afternoon and evening), Lincoln & District, ASC Metals Triples and the Cliff League – and play against the likes of Sleaford, St Giles, Collingham, Heighington, Long Bennington and many more, while they also compete in numerous cup competitions throughout the season.

The club also run several internal tournaments, from singles to triples, while pre-Covid they had a busy social calendar, which involved putting on bowling events to raise money for several charities, while there is also a bar in the clubhouse, which sadly has been out of action for longer than some of

previous. They have received grants in recent the members care to mention. In a normal year, the club would run an open day to attract new members, but because of all the restrictions and the uncertainties, they decided against running one this season, not that it mattered.

> "We have actually seen the biggest increase in new members this year than for quite some time - new people move into the village, discover us and want to join and get involved," continued Derek in his southern twang.

#### **■ LATEST UPDATE**

As I write this I am still getting over the excitement of England beating Germany in the Euros. I appreciate some of you will not be as interested (especially long-suffering wives), but I am sure many a debate took place before the match regarding the team selection and formation. However, a good management team with mixed resources and a strong game plan proved success.

At WLDC we have just confirmed the appointment of the leader and deputy as well as adjusting the political balance of all committees and confirming several officer appointments. I think we now have a good management team, resources and plan to move the district to an even stronger position.

With regards the Covid pandemic, it is clear the variants will continue to be an issue, but it is expected that we will see the link between infections and hospitalisations continue to fall as the vaccine rollout continues and as all over 18-year-olds receive at least one jab. We wait to see if the remaining regulations are lifted on July 19.

The latest data in the district shows that we cannot be too complacent.

#### Key headlines for the week are:

- 35 new confirmed cases, which is an increase of 13.3% on the previous week. The infection rate for the District currently stands at 35.5 per 100,000 and the gap between this and the national infection rate (38.8 per 100,000) has narrowed over the past seven days.
  - The rising infection rate is being driven by

- an increase in cases in the 19-24 age group. For all other age groups, infection rates are relatively stable or falling. Nationally, infections are highest and growing in the 4-24 age cohort. Rates are also rising, but more slowly, in 25-59 -year-olds.
- I am pleased to report there are currently no Covid patients in hospital in Lincolnshire and there have been no Covid-related deaths in West Lindsey during the past week.
- There have been no new outbreaks in the community, however, the three new outbreaks reported last week are ongoing. One of these is in a medical setting, one is in an educational setting and one in a care home setting.
- Due to an NHS internal IT error, updated vaccination figures are not currently available.
- Latest data from this week suggests there are early signs that the rate of increase in new infections is beginning to slow down. With the vaccine now available to all over-18s, and a very high uptake amongst 18-24 year olds so far, this trend should continue over the next four weeks though it is still too early to say how high the peak of the third wave will be.

presents, particularly around Climate Change and are eager to hear views from the community and stakeholders in relation to those proposals and others.

The consultation document will be published on the Central Lincolnshire Local Plan website www.n-kesteven.gov.uk/central-lincolnshire.

As with all consultations it is important that as many people engage with the process as possible and it is hoped that we can encourage residents and Parish Council's across the district to provide comments on the consultation documents too.

The government has announced a "Levelling up Fund". I am sure many residents would have read about this in the press. WLDC have

submitted a very comprehensive bid for £17m. Competition for the funding will be challenging as the Council is just one of many local authorities bidding for a share of £4.8 billion fund, announced earlier this year.

However, this hasn't stopped the Council as it realises the cash aimed at funding projects such as high street regeneration and boosting cultural assets is an opportunity not to be missed.

Our local MP has been working with the Council to ensure that the bid aligns with regional recovery priorities and the Governments national strategic plans.

If the bid is successful, then I will give further details.

gardens whenever the weather is fine. Whilst you are pottering around, keep plants looking good by regularly dead-heading bedding plants and repeat flowering perennials and you will be rewarded by a longer display of blooms.

During dry periods remember to water containers and new plants (using grey water if

possible) and hoe off weeds which always seem to thrive whatever the conditions. Clear algae, blanket weed and debris from ponds, and keep them topped up.

Now is the time to give lawns a quickacting summer feed (but don't feed wildflower patches or meadows). Further advice on this month's gardening jobs can be found online at rhs.org.uk/July.

Keep harvesting your fruit and vegetables and if you have a surfeit of produce we're sure members of your family, friends and neighbours will benefit from your generosity.

#### ■ GARDENING TASKS FOR AUGUST

August is the month for harvesting and enjoying your labours and there are some tasks which will help keep your plot healthy and productive.

Continue deadheading plants such as dahlias, roses and summer annuals. Tidy up the wisteria by summer pruning the whippy green

shoots of the current year's growth to five or six leaves - this will encourage flower buds to form. Using rainwater keep camelias, azaleas and rhododendrons well-watered, particularly those in pots, as they require moisture now to produce flower buds for next year. If your water butt is empty this is an ideal time to give it a

thorough clean.

Turn your compost heap to mix contents and add air, which is necessary for the composting process - the heap should be slightly moist. If it is not covered by a lid, place a layer of old carpet or cardboard on top to help retain heat and moisture and prevent weed seed from blowing in.

Spare a thought for birds and small animals by leaving a few seed
