ROAD CLOSURES

Highway drainage works are to be carried out in Scothern, meaning that the village will be closed off to through traffic from April 19, for a period of 22 weeks.

The following roads will be affected: Sudbrooke Road (Between Main Street and Juniper Drive)

Church Street (Between Sudbrooke Road and a point 140m West)

■ Sudbrooke Lane (Between 425m and 1,000m East of Larch Avenue, Nettleham)

There will be diversion routes via the A46 Dunholme, A46 Welton, A15, the A158 and Scothern Lane.

Existing footpaths will be closed for safety purposes, with temporary pedestrian access provided.



MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF SUDBROOKE PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON THURSDAY 3 FEBRUARY 2021 IN THE VILLAGE HALL, SUDBROOKE **PRESENT**

172 PARISHIONERS' ITEMS

Two residents brought their plans for the Council to look at ahead of planning application being submitted.

 Councillor Simon Crampton pointed out that the way the developers have cut the trees down in the woods, there may be lots of vegetation in the pond requiring hazard signs in the area.
 Cllr Heath reported that a resident had requested a safety barrier be put around the pond in the woods. The developers have stated that they will not be putting a barrier round as they do not think it is a hazard. Cllr Heath to draft a letter to Anglian Water requesting advice as the Council believe that a barrier and safety measures should be put in place.

■ 176 COUNTY COUNCILLOR AND DISTRICT COUNCILLOR REPORTS

 CC Mrs Sue Rawlins - no report received.
 CC District Councillor Bob Waller stated: S106 agreements - Three in village outstanding:

1) Poacher's Lane - Truelove Development -Provide footpath on Sudbrooke/Nettleham Lane: Time has not expired on this S106. Planning obligation can be re-negotiated between CC and Trueloves. No application has been received by West Lindsey from the developer.

2) Sudbrooke House - five executive houses. Footpath - to link from church to Truelove's footpath. Obligation triggered when first two houses are occupied - April. £15k now, £15k in April to be given to CC. PC needs to write to LCC at end of April - Richard Renwick - to ask for timetable of the construction - mention both. Second part of S106 - 12 car parking spaces for the church - final layer of tarmac not gone down and still some raised manholes making it a danger to cars - 12-14 weeks until it will be handed over to Church.

3) Parklands - controlled access to Main Drive - requested on-site meeting with the developer, Parish Council, DC Bob Waller, resident and planning officer / WLDC before further correspondence will be entered into between the planning officer and the developer.

■ 177 REPORTS ON MATTERS OUTSTANDING

▶ A) Burial space/new cemetery – update from ClIr Peter Heath – possible use of the multipurpose sports area and part of the field at the Village Hall. Rev. Penny Green thinks it is ideal – space to enlarge car park, 200 square meters roughly. ClIr Heath stated that the Environment Agency offer an advisory service and would give advice to the PC as to whether the area is suitable or not.

Councillors stated that the Stuart Curtis field is too close to the beck leading to a high water table. Cllr Heath to complete the form for the Environment Agency. There is a cost to get OS map of the area £17.00. Cllr Scott suggested digging a trial pit in the area, it was agreed that the PC would need to employ someone after hearing back from the Environment Agency. Cllr Heath to write to Environment Agency – unanimously resolved. Sub-committee formed – Cllrs Scott, Heath and Crampton.

▶ B) Speed indicators West/Holme Drive – update from Cllr Scott – response from Road Safety Partnership: Trial on Manor Drive was void due to data being corrupted so need to put it on again – will get us another box/boxes as soon as they can.

▶ C) Proposed closure of Nettleham Lane by LCC - email from a resident from Sir Edward Leigh, having written to Lincolnshire Highways, reply received January 20 stating that in its present form Nettleham Lane closure will not be pursued. However, the Parish Council had received no communication from Lincolnshire County Council confirming that this.

D) Footpath from Elm Drive to woods - to consider repair of the path churned up by machinery and the cost - cost deemed too high to put a proper footpath in. Cllr Fido to speak to the contractors to see if they will level off the path - agreed unanimously. If contractors won't do this then agreed unanimously to get three quotes for the work to be carried out.


A very useful plant which you can use to make your own fertiliser. Just over the hedge was the River Bain winding its way through Horncastle. There

MORE PARKING ISSUES

Dear Editor,

In the March edition, Tony Dinning spoke out regarding the ignorant motorists in the village. I see cars parked on the pavements leaving no room for pedestrians, whether walking, pushing prams or using wheelchairs but no one, it seems, is allowed to complain, albeit new laws are about to give councils the authority to prosecute offenders, but will it happen?

Cars are parked facing oncoming traffic, whether at night or in daylight, this is contrary to the Highway Code.

The latest stunt - and I have witnessed it twice in recent days - is for vehicles turning right into Elm Drive from Holme Drive, using the offside lane so that the lazy driver can step out on to the recently installed dropped kerb adjacent to the shops, thereby blocking the path for those pedestrians that it was installed for. JOY TO THE WORLD

Over the season of Lent we are doing a sermon series on the theme of 'Joy' - this will run into an online Easter Holiday Club for children and families on the same theme looking at the events of Holy Week and ending with the Joy of Easter Day.

For Lent, the theme of joy may seem rather counter-intuitive - we traditionally see this time as austere, we might give something up. we might make particular sacrifices. The idea is that as preparation for Easter we lay aside some of the things that distract us and focus on God. But I want to contend that the purpose of focussing on God is that when we eventually come to Easter we more fully experience and appreciate the joy of the season... and what is Joy? CS Lewis, in his book Surprised by Joy described it as 'a deep longing that is questing for its proper object'. And when the longing finds its object, it produces an intense ecstatic happiness that is expressed sometimes in laughter and sometimes in tears.

We can't just produce joy, we can't conjure it up - it comes from a deep longing in us. In the Book of Galatians, Paul describes joy as a fruit of the Spirit - a joy that bubbles up in us and flows out of us because of the work of the

Spirit in us. Our first look at joy was the theme of 'Finding Jov in Freedom'. We chose that theme not knowing how significant that might become in the light of world events.

There are of course, different lavers of freedom - but what does it mean to be free? Ask that to the people of Ukraine they will tell you it would be the opportunity to live in their own land, without fear; the opportunity to vote to be governed by who they choose: the ability to protest and speak out without fear of being shot. That would be freedom for many millions across our world who live in the midst of oppression and who don't have the freedom you and I currently share. BUT, let's not be complacent - you and I might share that kind of physical freedom in our country, but we may not. There are some whose freedoms are curtailed by abusive relationships, domestic violence, addiction, poverty. Many in our own country who do not have the choices that some have, many of whom face prejudice.

So there is joy in physical freedom and I suggest if Ukraine ever break free from the horrors they are living (and dying) through, there will be an outpouring of joy on the streets. Their deepest longing will have met its object and there will be a release of joy.
