■ 32 PARISHIONERS' ITEMS

- Enquiry received from resident asking if there are any plans for footpaths on Wragby Road to be upgraded. Clerk to make enquiries. Noted also that footpath very narrow due to ingress of grass. This would be reported on Fix My Street. Request received to consider lowering of
- speed through Sudbrooke to 40mph as this was now the speed in Greetwell and Langworth.

 Agreed to be an agenda item for next meeting of Parish Council.
- Report from resident that electric fence erected along FP 159, but no signs indicating that it is live. Members Resolved that this matter be referred to the Footpaths Officer, LCC
- ▶ A resident had suggested that it would enhance the village if a decorative sign be sited on the verge at the entrance to Sudbrooke -Agreed that this be an agenda item for the next meeting.
- A question was raised that the pub on The Parklands development does not appear to be going ahead. District Councillor Bob Waller advised that a change of use would have to be applied for the land before it could used for any other purpose.

■ 35 NOTES OF THE MEETING HELD ON 5 MAY 2022 TO BE APPROVED AND SIGNED AS MINUTES

▶ That the notes be signed as minutes unanimously Resolved.

■ 36 COUNTY COUNCILLOR AND DISTRICT COUNCILLOR REPORTS

- D CC Sue Rawlins had received a reply from the Senior Engineer LCC, re. the suggestion made of directional closures on Sudbrooke/Nettleham Lane. He stated that he appreciated that at certain times of day turning right out of any of the nearby junctions onto the A158 can be problematic, but also pointed out that experience has shown that directional closures unfortunately do not work especially in rural situations where they are inevitably ignored and unenforceable.
- DC Bob Waller reported as follows:
- Central Lincolnshire Local Plan Review –
 Comments had been received which were now being collated by Officers and a submission prepared for external examination.
- Concern continues with residents of Main Drive and the provision of a bollard by the Parklands Development. This is being investigated by the Enforcement Department of WLDC.
- An increase in fly tipping fines now £400, the latest being issued in Normanby-by-Spital.
- 99% of purple bins are now being emptied.

JULY WALK

▶ Eight walkers set off on a hot day for a seven-mile circular walk from the attractive village of Nocton.

We first passed the village cricket ground, before passing through the wooded Burton Plantation and Grotto Holt.

We then circled Nocton Wood heading for Wasps Nest (a group of old houses) and Car Dyke (a Roman excavation for field drainage and a water source for Lincoln).

At Wasps Nest there is a disused red phone box converted into an information centre with an homage to Frank Smith who was a local potato farmer who started the famous Smiths potato crisps business in the 1920s.

James Dyson, the vacuum cleaner man, owns much of the land in Nocton and has done a lot of conservation work in the area.

His latest project is to create a large reservoir to both attract wildlife and irrigate his land.

Our final stop was the ruins of Nocton Hall built in the 1530s and visited by Henry VIII and Catherine Howard in 1541.

An ancient tree which may date back to the royal visit, stands (albeit supported) in the former grounds of the hall.

I understand tours of the hall ruins and ghost walks are available. The hall was used as a hospital for American airmen during the last war.

AUGUST WALK

Nine walkers enjoyed a local ramble of seven miles in glorious sunshine through Sudbrooke Park to Reasby and across to Pickerings Meadow nature reserve.

We stopped at Scothern Nurseries restaurant for a late lunch before returning to Sudbrooke.

As an example of the severity of the recent drought, one of the large fields (see picture below) we crossed should have produced a large crop of peas.

Clearly the crop started well to achieve a height of about 18 inches, with lots of pods all

of which completely dried out including the stalks to an unusable state.

What a travesty for the farmer who missed out on his crop and nitrogen for his soil.

o, what was it like being actively involved in what was one of the biggest events in the UK this year for young people?

Ben spent a week under canvas there as part of 1st Nettleham (4th Lincoln) Scout Group and here he tells us what he got up to during a hectic eight days...

This event lasted a week and had scouts and guides coming from across the UK. As well as the UK, there were even international visitors, with scouts coming from Canada, the USA, Netherlands, Jersey, and Ireland.

We were part of Carnival Fest subcamp – one of seven subcamps for Poacher 2022 – and there were a vast majority of activities happening, such as scuba diving, clay pigeon shooting, tomahawk throwing, a zipline, and an abundance of inflatables.

For those who have travelled further afield, there were trips to Lincoln Cathedral and Lincoln Castle.

And there were many trips to Hykeham, for water activities, such as



paddleboarding, kayaking, and the Aqua Park, just to name a

Some of my favourites were driving school, a free, 30-minute driving lesson for scouts of any age; sailing and power-turns – two-man, two-wheel drive buggies which can perform tricks such as wheelies and drifts.

In-between activities, there were large craft tents, in which you could create all sorts of things, most notably, a leatherwork stand

the Canadian Scout Troops, and glass engraving.

In the evenings, once activities had all finished, you were free to walk about the huge site, meet up with other scouts to swap badges and make new friends, and to go to the fairground, which was

extremely popular all week. There were also live performances at the opening and


closing ceremonies, from top performers like Max and Harvey, Angels and Bandits, Nathan Sykes and

■ ASIAN HORNET SPOTTED?


Dear Editor.

■ LET LOVE CONQUER FEAR

D'Do not be afraid' - words that echo through the Bible. They are used by God to individuals and to whole people groups, Jesus uses them to individuals and to his friends and followers. I don't know about you, but when I hear the words 'You don't need to worry, but...' or 'Don't be afraid', I suddenly begin to wonder what there is to worry about or be afraid of... and start worrying. I guess it's part of the human condition. I also think when we look around at the world at the moment, there is much anxiety and much uncertainty - in a way that maybe there hasn't been for a good while.

What as Christians do we do with that uncertainty - how do we take that command of Jesus to 'not be afraid', because nowhere in the Bible does it tell us that being a follower of Christ means that we are immune to the difficulties of life. The key to that is in Jesus words in Luke's gospel: 'Do not be afraid: it is the Father's good pleasure to give you the Kingdom'. What is the Kingdom? Well the Kingdom is not about the future - it is about now, and the key to that Kingdom is love. You are loved, by a God who goes by such familiar names as Father and Mother. You are loved by Jesus who calls you a friend. You are loved by the One who made everything and promises a

Kingdom of justice and love. You are loved and therefore you can let the fear roll away and let loose your fingers from the things to which you cling and live a non-possessive life.

For, we are at our best when we live non-possessive lives. We become more welcoming and hospitable. We forgive more freely. We're more generous with our time, money, and resources. We love more extravagantly. We see more clearly our deep interconnection with and need of others. A non-possessive life deepens our conversations and intimacy. We handle conflict and differences in better and more productive ways. We open our hearts and minds to other people and new possibilities. We're more creative and less judgmental of ourselves and others.

Isn't that a picture of Jesus - a non-possessive life - Kingdom life. The one who gave His life on a cross, the one who sought to serve, the one whose love broke death, the one whose invitation was to all, no matter who they were or are; the one who went to the outcasts, the one who set people free, who prayed, who forgave, who challenged those who believed they possessed God, the one who journeyed with people, the one who offered conversation and encounter. That was and is Kingdom - for that is love.

WHAT'S IN A NAME?

ELLISON CLOSE



Situated in the heart of the village, across the road from the Kokoo Hair Salon, Ellison Close was named after the Ellison family, who were prominent members of Sudbrooke in the 18th and 19th centuries.

The now lost Sudbrooke Holme was built by Richard Ellison in 1780 and later enlarged by his son, also called Richard.

Richard the elder (his father was also called Richard), was a banker born in 1721, and later married Esther Walker (in 1746), who was the grandaughter of wealthy ship owner Captain John Walker, of Whitby, who once had a young Captain Cook as his apprentice. They bought the Sudbrooke Holme estate in

1759, eventually building a large country house there.

Before being involved in that, though, he had bought a 999-year lease on the Fossdyke Navigation in 1741 and was the man responsible for turning the canal's fortunes around.

He also opened Lincoln's first bank in 1775, with Abel Smith and John Brown, which after a couple of mergers, eventually became the NatWest.

He died in 1792, while Esther lived until 1813 – they are both buried at Scothern Church.

Four years later, his eldest son Richard (born 1754) became the Lincoln MP, serving for the next 16 years, before going on to become Wootton Bassett's MP between 1813 and 1820. In 1793 he had become the High Sheriff of Lincolnshire.

He lived for a period of time at Sudbrooke Holme and made some alterations and spent large amounts of money in furnishing the interiors, while he also served in the Armed Forces.

He was married twice, first to Hannah Cookson, and then to Jane Maxwell, with he whom he had three children and surprise, surprise, one of his sons was called Richard. He died in Westminster in 1827, aged 74, and is also buried at Scothern.

Those cricket fans out there may remember another Richard Ellison, who earned 11 caps for England between 1984 and 1986 – he is the great-great-great grandson of the former MP.

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


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
