B) Speed indicators in village: Cllr Dave Scott had received a reply from Lincs Road Safety Partnership indicating that the evidence from the result of a survey carried out on Manor Drive indicated low evidence for justifying the purchase of a speed indicator device for that area. BRACKENHURST VISIT

On Sunday 18 September, eight members of the Sudbrooke Garden Club ventured into darkest Nottinghamshire for a visit to Brackenhurst, near Southwell.

Brackenhurst is a 500-acre estate complete with an imposing country house; not quite a stately home. It is now part of Nottingham Trent University. There are public footpaths and the campus is open to the public, including a cafe. The campus has newly built student accommodation, university facilities, library, lecture rooms, laboratory, a fine equine complex and greenhouses suitable for teaching horticultural and agricultural subjects.

The group were interested in looking around the gardens, which to be fair have seen better days, but do still have some faded loveliness.

We started off in the walled garden. Many of the walls are covered in espaliered fruit trees, pears, cherries and apples, together with peaches and apricots in a peach case. Peach cases are specialised small lean-to glasshouses. They are against a wall and were used for growing peaches nectarines and the like in the days before air transport. Some of the walls also have climbing plants including wisteria, campsis radicans, virginia creeper and climbing roses. The walled garden is now used for part of the university out-reach programme for young adults with learning difficulties and for school visits.

We then went through the wildlife garden, (neglected), but lovely in spring, with naturalised snow drops and daffodils and currently resplendent with cyclamen just coming into flower.

Next we went into the sunken Italian garden, which is paved with york stone. The bedding plants were still putting on a show, but were past their best. It has and had some lovely features, in particular low stone walls and two water features. There is a seating area and a converted restored and repurposed orangery, now used as a cafe where we had a lovely morning coffee break. The group then walked past the house, which has recently undergone a lot of restoration and this is still ongoing.

GENERAL

After the summer recess, the full committee cycle is now back to normal and some Covid restrictions have been relaxed at the Guildhall, but many of the staff are still working from home.

Home working for some has proved to be a practical, efficient and cost effective way of moving forward.

Last week I attended Full Council, Overview and Scrutiny, Planning and Environment and Sustainability Meetings.

With the new prime minister making major changes to personnel in her cabinet



and policies, it will be interesting to see how the changes impact on local councils. I expect some of the policies that were being made within planning may change. Hopefully, the Central Lincolnshire Local Plan will not be affected, but I think we may see some change of direction with the National Planning Policy Framework-time will tell.

FUNDING

I do not have the full details yet, but an announcement was made at the last council meeting that two streams of funding would soon be available.

One of which was for Rural Projects and Developments. I am not sure of the eligibility or criteria, but will monitor this

to see if Scothern or Sudbrooke can apply. WLDC has signed up to the Community Wealth Fund proposal where £900m of dormant stocks and shares could be released to help the 225 most left behind areas across the country.

If successful it should benefit not only certain areas of Gainsborough itself but, by extension the whole of West Lindsev. COMMUNITY

Again I will monitor this and keep the PC informed as the process develops.

During the last few weeks I have used some of my initiative funding to support the sports/ fun day and the Pre School in Sudbrooke, as well as money for new community benches in Scothern.

WLDC COMMITMENT TO **EXPLORE OPPORTUNITIES AT RAF SCAMPTON**

• On the same week that a closure parade was held at RAF Scampton to celebrate the rich history of the base, West Lindsey District Council has reaffirmed its

commitment to the community.

The Red Arrows will be moving from their site in West Lindsev to a new home at RAF Waddington later this year as preparations are under way to close the RAF base.

The Council's expression of

interest remains subject to a number of conditions. Work continues with the Defence Infrastructure

Organisation on behalf of the Ministry of Defence and the Council hopes to make a final decision in relation to the acquisition and appointment of partner by the end of the vear.

As previously reported, the closure of RAF Scampton was announced by the Ministry of Defence in 2018 as part of cost cutting measures.

Since this time officers at the Council have worked closely with the community. the Ministry of Defence, the RAF and potential investors to understand opportunities for the future of the site. We should learn from mistakes made with other base closures and ensure that the full potential of future use and history are fulfilled.

SIBTHORPE DRIVE...

SIBTHORPE DRIVE

Sibthorpe Drive in the village is named after Coningsby Charles Sibthorpe (sometimes spelled as Sibthorp), who bought Sudbrooke Holme in 1877.

He had acquired a first share in the house from last week's hero Richard Ellison's wife's sister Mrs Martin, before buying the second half from her other sister, Mrs Humphrey Waldo Sibthorp.

Born in 1846, by 1873 Coningsby owned 6,460 acres in Lincolnshire, with a rental value of over £7,000 per annum.

Coningsby carried out a lot of improvments on the Holme and surrounding areas, especially in the large gardens. He also built the bridge that spans Nettleham Brook, on the southern end of West Drive. One of the central piers has a date plaque which reads 'CCS 1907', CCS being his initials.

New lodges, cottages, gates and other works were undertaken until the grounds became known as one of the most elaborate settings for a country house in the county.

Coningsby's wife Mary died in 1902 and for the next few years, he spent most of his time at Dower House in Canwick, although 12 servants were still living in Sudbrooke Holme (with 11 at Canwick).

By 1919, though, Coningsby realised owning both houses was beyond him and reluctantly he offered the house and its estate up for sale, by auction.

The auction at the Lincoln Corn Exchange took place on Thursday 2 October 1919 and included in the sale were several farms 'with most superior houses', two gentlemen's smaller residences, small holdings and accommodation land, consisting of 1,938 acres.

The estate sold for £50,000, but the house was withdrawn at \pounds 15,000.

Ernest Terah Hooley, the millionaire financier and fraudster purchased the house sometime before 1926; it was announced on 10 January 1926 that Lincoln Corporation had an option to purchase from Hooley. The option lapsed on 5 February 1926, before the house was demolished two years later.

Coningsby died in 1932, leaving £93,500 in his will.

REPORT OF PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON THURS 1 SEPTEMBER

▶ Some good news - The Climbing tower on the village hall play area has been refurbished with a welcome grant towards the work of £1,000 from the IGas Community Fund.

While carrying out the work, Ed Morton of EKM Ltd inadvertently left his iPad on the play area. This was picked up by a resident and following a report on social media the same day of the find, Councillor

Mistry and the Clerk made further enquiries and the iPad was returned to Ed.

In gratitude to the iPad being recovered Ed has not charged the Parish Council for the play equipment inspections for August which has resulted in a saving to the parish of £100.00.

Sadly there have been instances of graffiti on some of the play

equipment in Northfield Park and on the signage in the Stuart Curtis field. A resident kindly spent some time cleaning the sign in the Stuart Curtis field and Councillor Peter Heath has been out removing it from the slide in Northfield Park and will try to remove it from other items of equipment.

Burial Space/new cemetery - A possible location has been identified on the village hall field. This will require further enquiries, lifting of the covenant on the field and the sale of a small area of land. If this land can be used it will ensure that this does not incur an additional loan to purchase land.

Contractor parking and building materials on public footways – There have been complaints recently about builders materials and contractor parking blocking the public footpath on Holme Drive causing pedestrians to walk on the road. This has been referred to our County



Councillor and the Enforcement team at Lincolnshire County Council.

However, with many residents in the village carrying out home improvements the Parish Council does ask that thought is given to footway users when having materials delivered and employing contractors.


