This had not previously been discussed, but members felt that the Sports Day to be held in June could be a community event of celebration.

A resident addressed the meeting re. planning application 146151 and access on Main Drive.

The Parish Council fully supported the residents of Main Drive in the erection of a bollard to prevent unauthorised vehicular access and that the application was an agenda item for later in the meeting.

▶ A) Application 146080 – Blue Pines 73 Wragby Road – Planning application for extensions and alterations to existing dwelling, including replacement garage, gym attached via a glazed link, and new entrance gates – resubmission of 144607 – No objections to this proposal by the Parish Council.

B) Application 146151 – Hybrid application comprising of Outline planning application with access to be considered to erect up to 130 dwellings and new building to replace the former Sudbrooke Holme to provide up to 25 apartments for retirement living.

Erect restaurant-public house. Extension and widening of West Drive and Holme Drive to serve the development, hard and soft landscaping, demolition of poultry sheds.

Change of use of land to provide area of open space inc. provision of new footpaths and sustainable drainage infrastructure.

Change of use of land to provide new community allotment facilities being variation of 133284 granted on appeal 21 June 2016 – deter vehicle access – Land adjacent Sudbrooke Park, off West Drive. This was discussed in detail and the following comments agreed to be made to the Planning Department WLDC: 'Sudbrooke Parish Council discussed this application in detail at its meeting on 2 February 2023 and strongly objects to the deviation of the erection of a bollard to metal estate



fencing to prevent vehicular access via Main Drive. It supports the residents of Main Drive in that a bollard should be sited and that Main Drive should not be used as a public road, through the historic, listed original Park Gates on Wragby Road.

'The full planning conditions for the Parklands Development was granted with a bollard control on Main Drive, (Condition 13) near to the entrance to the allotments on Main Drive, and this should be enforced.

'Sudbrooke Parish Council Resolved unanimously that a request be made for the application to be put to the full Planning Committee for a decision to be made.

'For further information – Main Drive has never been adopted or maintained by Lincolnshire County Council Highways due to it being a private road for the residents of Main Drive to access their homes only by a Rights of Way. This is written into the deeds of those properties on Main Drive. It is also insufficient width for a road/ highway. Maintenance of Main Drive has always been funded by the residents.

'When FP160 was added, Main Drive was a footway for the public with an occasional vehicle. Vehicular access cannot be continued to be gained via this route by residents of the Parklands, delivery drivers and to future customers of the proposed pub/restaurant.'

EASTER COMES AROUND SO FAST

Can you believe it is April already!? The clocks have sprung forward, there are signs of new life all around and in this month, we again reach the pinnacle of the Church year. Easter Sunday, when we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus. The resurrection of Jesus, for many, is

difficult to believe.

After all, it's not rational, it doesn't fit into the way things normally work - but this was a moment when God broke into the world. Jesus was more than just a man, but in a real sense. God squeezed into human form.... and that is the joy and hope of our Easter celebration, that God came, that God broke death, and that Christ is risen!

The very first witness to the risen Jesus was a woman called Mary, you might have thought he would appear to the authorities, the religious leaders, or rulers, but instead he appears in a garden, to a woman (woman in those times so often considered insignificant) and without a fanfare or special effects he simply calls her name.

Mary runs to tell the disciples, I imagine they found it hard to believe, and yet the light in her eyes, and the hope she now exuded meant they dared to believe. If women and men had not been witnesses to the resurrection and the risen Jesus, we

would never have known the good news that Christ is risen, that Jesus is alive and that the promises of God had been fulfilled. Those first followers of Jesus literally staked their lives on what they had witnessed and on something they passionately believed to be true.

They experienced the lifechanging reality of encountering Jesus. A reality that has transformed the lives of millions of people since that time.

The Easter story is one of suffering and death for Jesus, a man of peace and love and because Jesus trod that road to the cross, he understands suffering, Hope tells he walks besides us. Each Easter we remember that Jesus, despite his suffering and death rose from the dead to new life. Ultimately the Easter story ends with triumph that love and hope prevails, that good conquers evil.

The Easter story tells us that hope is stronger than despair, that love is stronger than hate, that peace is stronger than war and that life is stronger than death.

This Easter I pray that this will be true for each of us, for our communities and for a world that longs for hope, love, peace, and life.

He is risen indeed. Alleluia!

INTREPID WALKERS GET THEIR FILL IN FILLINGHAM

• Thirteen walkers set off on a lovely morning for a seven-mile circular walk from Fillingham village.

The ground conditions were very good.

We made our way from Fillingham village hall towards Stow, before crossing some very large fields to Glentham village.

From Glentham we walked south passing the oil pumping station and Fir tree plantations before arriving at the large lake in Fillingham.

From the lake there is a good view of Fillingham Castle perched high on Lincoln ridge.

Not many birds were resident on the

lake in contrast to summertime when it is packed with geese, swans and ducks.

A feature of this walk is the amazing long views across the Lincolnshire countryside.

• Next walk is Saturday 1 April. A circular walk of approximately six miles in the Bardney area including some abbey sites.

Walkers should meet at the village hall at 9.30am and are advised to wear a waterproof coat, wear suitable footwear and bring a drink and a snack. May walk.

In view of the King's coronation we are deferring the walk by one week to Saturday 13 May.

SPEEDING ON SCOTHERN LANE

▶ Following a resident's concern the Lincolnshire Road Safety Partnership would be asked to undertake a speed survey along Scothern Lane.

SPEEDING ON WEST DRIVE

• A resident had also raised concern about traffic on West Drive exceeding the 5mph sign displayed. It had been pointed out that West Drive was still a Public Footpath and that the 5mph sign had been displayed by the Parklands developers for the guidance of the contractors' traffic.

It was hoped that parishioners and delivery drivers would observe this, but it was not a legal requirement.

VILLAGE GRIT BINS

All Grit bins in the village have been inspected by the County Council and whilst the grit in them may appear hard it is usable if knocked about with a spade.

POLICE MATTERS

An Inspector for Communities has been appointed, with local villages he is responsible for being: Sudbrooke, Scothern, Nettleham, Bardney, Greetwell, Reepham, Langworth and Fiskerton.

Crime figures for January and February for Sudbrooke were two occasions of harassment and one malicious communications.

SPORTS EVENT

This will now be a Coronation Event for the Village to be held on Sunday 7 May between 12 midday and 4pm – a Working Group has been formed to arrange the event.


If you want to let your dog off its lead, find a field somewhere away from the public!



HISTORY ON OUR DOORSTEP

Stainfield is one of those 'blink and you'll miss it' villages in the Lincolnshire Limewoods, around 13 miles from Sudbrooke, between Wragby and Bardney.

You would never know it now as you pass through the rural setting, but over 500 years ago there in the village was the only nunnery of the Benedictine order in



the whole county, Stainfield Priory. Now just a grass field adjacent to St

Andrew Church, with a few lumps and bumps here and there, the nunnery was founded in 1154 by Henry or William Percy (the details from back then are a bit scratchy), in the reign of Henry II.

At its height, until its demise in 1536, there would have been around 20 nuns at the priory, although records suggest that they lived in virtual poverty for most of the time.

That said, though, the priory always seemed to be in good order, with the Bishop Alnwick finding a 'well loved' place on a visit in 1440, when there were 18 nuns present at the time. There were three housholds in the monastery, one belonging to the prioress, another to the cellaress, and another to the lay sisters.

But by 1519, things were not so good, with Bishop Atwater highlighting the health of the place, how loud it was, while complaining about the nuns not being very punctual and not singing in the choir. Seems like their dedication to the 'cause' was being questioned.

Then in 1536 came the Act of Suppression, although they were given a licence to continue until Henry VIII changed his made and ordered its dissolution. Those nuns present received some form of redundnancy packages, while prioress Elizabeth Bursby was pensioned off, with the priory eventually falling into ruin.
