VICAR'S LETTER

Two months of the year already gone and Ash Wednesday (25th February) already past. Now we are on the road to Easter (12th April). The Season of Lent is a time for reflection and self-examination on that road.

There are two lists of our attitudes that are helpful in this process – to compare them against: "The Seven Deadly Sins" and "The Seven Contrary Virtues":-

Seven Deadly Sins	Seven Contrary Virtues
1. Pride (vanity)	1. Humility
2. Envy	2. Kindness
3. Gluttony	3. Abstinence
4. Lust	4. Chastity
5. Anger (wrath)	5. Patience
6. Greed (avarice, covetousness)	6. Liberality
7. Sloth	7. Diligence

From these, for instance, we see the origin of the phrase "patience is a virtue". The 'Virtues' are derived from the poem "Psychomachia" ("Battle for the Soul") by Prudentius, around 410 AD. They are the antidotes for the corresponding Seven Deadly Sins. If we reflect honestly upon them, how do we score? What changes in our attitudes do we need to make?

Of the three great Christian gifts spoken of by the Apostle Paul, the most neglected is surely "Hope". We hear much in the Church of Faith and Love, but Hope seems to be the poor relation - seldom getting much of a mention. Hope that is not in the sense of wishful thinking, nor in the sense of hoping against hope. St. Paul was writing of the Hope God gives us in a confidence in the future based upon the present experience of his love. We do not know the precise details of what that future holds for us, but we have the assurance that God is at work in our lives, and that one day his purpose will be fulfilled.

For those worried and concerned about the future in the present economic climate, the words of the Psalmist (Psalm 62:5-6) are worth remembering:

"My soul waits quietly for God; my confidence comes from him. He, and he alone, is my rock, my deliverance and my stronghold; nothing will shake me."

NETTLEHAM MEDICAL PRACTICE NEWS

Pharmacy White Paper

As you may be aware the Government last year produced a White Paper regarding pharmaceutical services in the future. One of the suggestions in the White Paper was that doctor dispensing would disappear and all prescriptions in the future would be dispensed by a pharmacy. The consultation period has now closed and the Government have already made a decision that there will be no change to doctor dispensing. This is fantastic news for the Practice and safe guards our dispensing status for the foreseeable future. The Practice would like to thank patients who wrote to their local MP and to the Department of Health in support of the continuation of doctor dispensing. Without the support of patients throughout the country, the outcome could have been very different.

New Surgery Equipment

At the end of last year, the Practice were successful in a bid to the PCT for the purchase of new medical equipment. Over the next few months the equipment will be installed at both Practice sites. The new equipment includes:

Surgery PODS – these are touch screen health questionnaires and blood pressure machines which enable patients to undertake a blood pressure check at their convenience without an appointment. All results from these self performed tests are then and recorded in your computerised medical notes. ECG Machine – these machines are integrated with our clinical system and will enable most patients requiring an ECG to have it performed at the Practice avoiding sometimes the need to go to hospital.

Spirometer - Both Practices will now

have a spirometer which will be used for patient with COPD or respiratory problems.

Pulse Oximeters – All GPs will have one they are used to measure a patient's oxygen saturation and their pulse. Audiometer – these machines are used to perform hearing tests on patients. This will enable patients to have these tests performed at the Practice rather than being referred to hospital. Patient Automated Check-In System We now have a patient automated check in system at the Cherry Willingham branch surgery, similar to the one at Nettleham.

Finally some of the consulting rooms at Nettleham will have hydraulic examination couches which are much easier for patients with mobility problems to use.

June Training Date

The training date in June has been change to Tuesday 9 June and therefore the surgery will be closed from 1.00 pm – 4.00 pm on this day.

Missed Appointments

Patients who do not attend their appointments, or who cancel too late for us to offer the appointment to someone else, cause us significant amounts of time wasted each month, and affect the availability of appointments for everyone else.

For example:-

December 2008 Appointments with Doctors missed: 36 = six hours of appointment time lost

December 2008 Appointments with Nurses missed: 53 = almost 9 hours of appointment time lost.

Welcome to this month's Edition of Police News. The first thing I need to tell you about is a number of house burglaries that have taken place in nearby villages during February. The offenders are getting into the houses through a downstairs window and carrving out a search of the kitchen area. The occupants are usually in the house at the time, and are asleep upstairs. The offenders tend to steal items, which include bankcards, vehicle details, statements, etc. They leave the house through the side doors, which generally have the keys left in them. They make their escape by stealing the occupants car, and drive off. We have had incidents in Nettleham, Scothern and Langworth. My advice to you would be to make sure all your doors and windows are locked at night, that your bankcards, handbags, wallets, mobile phones, car keys, etc, are put away and not easily found, i.e. not put in kitchen drawers, and house keys are not left in doors. Also, don't put things on view to tempt people into your house. A good way of checking is to stand outside your windows and look in. Whatever you can see, a burglar can see too, and if keys, handbags, etc are in view it may just tempt an offender to break in. Investigations are continuing into all the offences, but in the meantime if you see

or hear anything suspicious then please contact Lincolnshire Police as soon as possible on either 01522 882222, or 999 if you feel its an emergency.

The second problem I have been made aware of is about parking issues on the streets around Juniper Drive, Scothern, when parents are collecting children from school. I am putting this in the Sudbrooke newsletter as many parents from Sudbrooke drive their children to the school, and collect them afterwards. I have received a number of calls about vehicles parking either on the footpath, blocking it, or vehicles parking on the narrow parts of the road, even on bends, which causes problems for vehicles to get through. Clearly, parking is a problem which is mainly caused by parents picking up, or dropping off, their children who go to the local primary school, but it doesn't excuse people from ignoring the laws laid down in the Road Traffic Act, or indeed the Highway Code. Everyone who has a licence should know by now that obstructing the pavement to a degree where pedestrians can't pass is an offence, as is blocking the road to the degree where vehicles cannot get through safely. All the offences I've just mentioned carry a £30 fine, which

we will issue if the situation doesn't improve. I appreciate that parking is an issue for the school and parents, but please give a thought to those who live in the area. Whilst sometimes you may not technically be parking illegally, you may be parking in such a manner as to cause great inconvenience and difficulty to the local residents, especially those who are elderly or disabled. Consider how you would feel if it was your house everyone was

parking outside every day, making it difficult for you to get out of your own driveway? Finally, please don't contact me and ask me to find you an alternative parking place, as you should be aware of the rules relating to parking and be in a position to find one that is legal.

Doing the Right Thing

When writing this piece, the budget debate in the County council was very recent news which will be very old news by the time you read it. But I think that there are a few points that it may still be worth making. The council decided to set the County Council element of the Council Tax at 1.75%. You will

know now what percentages the District Council, the Police and your Parish Council have set. Together, these will add up to what you need to pay. The County's increase will almost certainly be the lowest. But it had been proposed that this year's increase should have been set even lower. I did not support this latter proposal, because it would have been achieved by

not setting aside money which would later have had to be borrowed. The effect would have resulted in the tax-payer paying a higher total in council tax in the longer term. The best option was the lowest cost overall in my view. Such paradoxes are common when elected representatives wrestle with these matters and the true state of affairs is often lost to view in the ensuing public debate. What seems simple is often not as easy as it seems. The 'right' answer is often not the simplistic one.

This is often the case when a person or a group bring a problem to the attention of a councillor. Usually, it is not just a request to deal with the problem, but instead to implement a particular solution. Here is an example involving traffic.

Traffic is thought to travel too fast on a particular road, or parks badly or whatever. What is needed therefore, we are told, is a lower speed limit, parking restrictions or whatever regulation seems appropriate, or whatever. Do this and everyone will live happily forever after!

Sometimes, after much debate, the collective wish is granted and, in the cases cited, a traffic regulation order is made. Then, to everyone's disappointment, the problem is not solved. The new speed limit, or yellow line or whatever, seems to be ignored and the problem persists. There is then a new campaign for enforcement of the new regulation which, even when granted, may not solve the problem as intended.

A more intelligent approach is to start with defining and quantifying the problem.

What are the objective facts about the traffic?

Safety is often the stated intention of a request for a speed limit. Well if all cars stood still all the time, very few people would end up being hit by one, but it is hardly a practical solution to a serious problem. There has to be acceptance of a degree of risk in all things, it is setting the degree of that risk in a practical real life setting that is the challenge.


On the other hand, I can't ever recall a request for a speed limit to reduce the environmental impact of traffic. Yet the noise of a busy road is a really terrible imposition on the people who live near them. As car engines have become ever quieter, the ripping noise of tyres has become deafening and this sound has overtaken exhaust noise as the loudest disturbance of dense traffic. This noise is less if the cars are slower, but there are low noise road surfaces which can do far more help the problem.

So if it is really the noise that is the problem, there may be better ways to achieve a reduction. May be both are needed, but it may be that keeping the traffic to an existing speed limit by physical measures would produce the slower traffic without lowering the limit at all. It all depends on the circumstances.

These things aren't cheap, but they may be good solutions to a real problem that would represent the best way of resolving it. The lower speed limit may not, after all, be the best answer. Does a council do what campaigners ask to the letter, or does it try to genuinely help to resolve a local issue? It is seldom as simple as it appears to do the right thing. Pay less now but more tomorrow – what would you do?
