VICAR'S LETTER

The recent General Synod debating the proposed Anglican Covenant to bring more cohesion within the worldwide Anglican Communion ("we need to identify the fundamentals that we share in common and to state the common basis") raises the underlying question of 'Does it matter what Christians believe?' Heresy is treated more lightly today than in the ages when heretics were burnt at the stake, but, no matter how strange people's beliefs, are they still properly entitled to count themselves as members of the Church?

At the beginning of the Church, Christians could be of any race, either sex, any class, from anywhere, and of any age. The only distinguishing feature was what they believed. Irenaeus, a third-generation Christian, who had known Justin Martyr who in turn had known the Apostle John, was determined to preserve and pass on the teachings handed down to him. Of heretics, with variant teachings, he wrote:- "it is as if someone, when a beautiful image of a king has been made by a skilful artist out of precious jewels, should then take this likeness of the man all to pieces, then rearrange the gems, fitting them together to make them into the form of a dog or fox, and even then but poorly executed: and should then maintain that this was the beautiful image of the king that the skilful artist constructed, pointing to the jewels." Heresies frequently follow the 'spirit of the age' and (to take Irenaeus'

imagery) in some ages 'doggies' or 'foxes' become more popular than those of the true 'King'.

For instance, Christians believe Jesus Christ to be both God and man. Only as a consequence of the same person being both God and man can the reconciliation of God and fallen mankind be accomplished. If Jesus were not God, the reconciliation would be insufficient. If Jesus were not a man, mankind would not be involved in that reconciliation. The extraordinary claim of Christianity is that Almighty God assumes human form: Jesus Christ, has the nature of God and the nature of mankind. He suffers as a man, yet remains the ruler of the universe. Just as it is true to say "God was born in Bethlehem" - "Emmanuel" - (since it was a person who was born), so it is true to say "God died on the cross" (since that same person died and rose again).

An excellent contribution to current debates is "Heresies and How to Avoid Them", edited by Ben Quash and Michael Ward, and published in paperback by SPCK in 2007 - available from their shop in Sincil Street, Lincoln.

Welcome to this edition of the Sudbrooke News. We have been enjoying a relatively quiet few weeks in Sudbrooke with no major crimes to mention.

PC Mark Lassmans has again gone to Gainsborough as Acting Sergeant in the Crime Investigation Unit, which is Gainsborough's gain and our loss. Indications are that Mark will be gone for three to four months, and I'm sure that we all wish him well.

PC Kieran Diamond will be taking his place for that time, commencing towards the end of August. PC Diamond is an experienced officer who currently works out of Welton Police station.

A prosecution is pending and a local young person will be attending court over the matter of the damage to vehicles in Holme Drive, Greenway and West Drive.

Recently we had a spate of garage break-ins on Manor Drive. Quite a few of the garages were entered and in one case items were stolen. We are pleased to say that a person was arrested and some of the items recovered from his freezer! A timely reminder to keep your garages and

sheds locked, although in this case some of the locks were broken to get into the garages.

Another matter to mention is 'National Identity Cards' being used by under 18s to purchase alcohol and cigarettes. These cards are laminated plastic, pink in colour, with a Union Jack in the top right hand corner. They are unofficial, and have no legal status. The only accepted forms of ID currently are:

- Photocard Driving Licence
- Passport
- Any card with the official PASS hologram and logo (Portman/Citizen Card)

Only these forms of identity should be accepted in public houses and off-licences.

I have again been asked by several residents to mention dogs and their doggy-mess! When walking your dog, please ensure that your dog does not deposit its parcels on someone's lawn or driveway. This seems to be happening on a regular basis in some areas, and it's not nice for the house owner have to clear up this mess - or in some cases have it trodden into the house on the feet of their children who haven't noticed it. Please be considerate to other people, and put

your doggy deposits in the proper bins or take it home and dispose of it properly. On my walks around the villages, parks and lanes I have seen deposits in bags hanging from the hedges! Why bother to put in a bag and then not dispose of it properly? Throwing it into the hedgerows when you think no one is looking is an offence punishable by an £80 Fixed Penalty Notice or worse, as well as damaging to the environment. This is as much anti-social behaviour as other kinds I mentioned earlier, but is perhaps more surprising, as it's committed by adults who should know

I would like to remind you that we run an email scheme where we can tell you what is happening in your area - we can for example send out warnings quickly about crime in the area so you can take precautions if necessary. If you would like to join the email scheme, all we need is your name, email address and the fact that you are from Sudbrooke

NETTLEHAM MEDICAL PRACTICE NEWS

Doctors

We would like to inform our patients as from the 02.08.07 we will have two doctors training with us. They will be **Dr Olufemi Ogunremi** (Femi for short!), he is our new G.P Registrar who will replace Dr Omnia Hefni and **Dr Sarah Barden** a post-graduate registered doctor in her 2nd year of foundation training.

We are delighted that **Dr Omnia Hefni** will be staying on at the surgery covering some sessions for Dr McParland who is on maternity leave until January 2008.

After 25 years in the practice **Dr Peter Atkins** has decided to retire from medicine altogether in January 2008. He comments "I have thoroughly enjoyed my time in the practice and it has been a privilege to serve the people of these villages. I will miss patients, staff and colleagues but have decided to devote my time to the Church involvements I have both in this area and more widely".

Dr Sydney Bell, following his retirement from the Practice partnership in September 2003 has been doing surgeries on a sessional basis for us, but has now decided to finish completely in December this year.

Flu Vaccinations Programme

We hope to commence our flu campaign at the end of September. This year we shall be running our flu clinics on several Saturday mornings at both Nettleham and Cherry Willingham surgeries, following the success of our Saturday sessions last year. Vaccination is available for patients who fit one of the criteria listed below:

Aged 65 or over
Have Chronic Heart Disease
Have Chronic Respiratory Disease
(including Asthma when taking an
inhaled steroid inhaler)
Have Chronic Liver Disease
Have Chronic Renal Disease
Have Diabetes
Have Suppressed Immune Systems
Carer

Please contact either surgery at the beginning of September to book an appointment in one of the flu clinics.

Appointment Access

Just a reminder that we have introduced some new ways of accessing a GP.

You can now book **telephone consultations**. A GP will ring you back at the given time for a five minute appointment. This is useful for times when you have a problem where the GP doesn't need to see you face to face or examine you. e.g. renewing sick notes or general advice.

We are also making available some **72** hour access appointments, so if your problem is not urgent there are more appointments available within a few days.

In May we introduced **Doctor Triage** for a trial period on certain days of the week. As from 13.08.07 we will be introducing this system each morning, Monday to Friday.

we will be introducing this system each morning, Monday to Friday. This is where the doctor is informed of all calls requesting to see a GP except requests for appointments for the nurse practitioner or where the GP has asked a patient to come back for a follow up appointment. The Doctor will then ring the patient back and either deal with their problem over the telephone, or give a face-to-face appointment. All patients are dealt with on the day.

We are continuing to look at new ways of making sure that our patients can access the best type of appointment for their health problems at a time that is convenient for them and we appreciate your constructive feedback.

Premises

We have been very aware over the last year or two that our premises at both Nettleham & Cherry Willingham have become increasingly cramped. The prospect of a big rise in population over the next 10 years from building in Greetwell Quarry means that the strain will only increase.

We are therefore beginning to explore the possibility of a complete rebuild within the practice area. We would stress this is at a <u>very early</u> stage, with lots of hurdles to jump, but we do want to ensure the facilities we offer are fit for the next 20 years.

Dear Editor

I am pleased that we now have a debate on the issue of cycle tracks, etc., but I do not consider that any of the correspondents, so far, have made a substantial case for either the new one alongside the A158 or the proposed one between Sudbrooke and Nettleham. I am not, of course, against cycle tracks *per se*, but only against their undoubtedly expensive construction where they are unnecessary or where their usage is likely to be insufficient to justify the cost – both of which factors I consider apply to the ones in question.

I note that Mr. Morrison enjoys the new track, and has actually met others using it; but virtually every time I drive past it - several times a week - it has been entirely empty, and I remain unconvinced that my guess of no more than half a dozen regular users is a serious underestimate. At the Parish Plan Open Day, I spoke to the Council official who had authorised the construction; no survey had been made of the number of potential users, but he considered that its most important benefit was to enable Sudbrooke pupils to cycle safely to Cherry Willingham School. Can anyone say how many now actually use it? I agree with Mr. Morrison that the previous track was poorly - if at all! - maintained, but was it really so bad that, faced with the choice of using it or risking life and limb by using the main A158 carriageway, he had to choose the latter and clearly more dangerous option, requiring him to "obsessively" check his life assurance policy each time before setting out? (I assume

that was a joke).

As for Mr. Balsdon, I do feel that he exaggerates somewhat in claiming that walking or cycling along the Sudbrooke/Nettleham lane can be very difficult and dangerous; such terms would be more applicable to crossing a tightrope over the Niagara Falls than to a stroll along a littlefrequented country lane, single-track for just 1400 yards and with some ten places where the road has been widened enough to allow cars to pass each other. For anyone fit enough to run, cycle or walk a couple of miles there should be no difficulty whatsoever in getting out of the way of any vehicle, even one driven by the occasional lunatic; just the minor inconvenience of getting on to the verge, which is no higher than the normal kerb. In fact, the carriageway is 10ft. wide, i.e., 4ft. wider than most cars, so that standing still as close as possible to the verge will allow any but the most reckless driver to pass safely. There is one proviso, of course; they should remain reasonably alert - and any cyclists or joggers who choose to exercise with a Walkman or other device pounding 'music' into their ears should realise that they are putting themselves at risk since they will be unable to hear any vehicle approaching from behind. The only real danger is to young, and inadequately supervised, children. It really ought not to be that difficult to get a seven-year old child off his cycle and on to the verge, or at least stop and stay still close to the verge, and the fact that he nearly fell into the path of a car, not just once, but several times, would seem to suggest a lack of appropriate training.

Once again I find myself in total agreement with Mr. Mountford; what he says about the necessity of providing adequate information in order to enable voters to make a valid decision on the 'traffic lights' question applies equally to the 'cycle track' question. I rather doubt that 258 residents would have voted for this had they been made aware that the cost would be in the region of half a million pounds!

On the subject of unnecessary expenditure, I note that the Parish Council wish to erect some 'reminder' speed limit signs. I think it extremely naïve to expect these to have any effect; the motorists, and especially motorcyclists, who repeatedly treat Scothern Lane as a racetrack are perfectly well aware of the limit . . . and also well aware that their chances of being caught and adequately

punished are so remote as to be virtually non-existent. The only solution is to catch and punish them – so instead of erecting useless signs which only add to the visual clutter afflicting too many of our roads perhaps the Council could bend their minds as to how this might be achieved.

Although Mr Gaisford is unlikely to be impressed I am pleased to report a further extension to the cycling network. Now you can go further west, riding to Kirkstead Bridge.

It is therefore possible to ride from behind Great Northern Terrace to the Bridge, about 20 miles on completely car free roads. Lottery funding has been provided in response to the green house effect, and the growth of obesity in the population. Other developments like the promotion of cycling to school is occurring elsewhere. If each of us replaced just one car journey a week with a trip by foot, bike or public transport the result would be a 10% reduction in car traffic.

Dear Editor

I am replying to Mr. Mountford's letter in the magazine last month.

I repeat that none of the issues contained in the Parish Plan were invented by the Parish Council and to say otherwise is a slight on the work and integrity of the Steering Group members who developed the Parish Plan. It would, however, be an extraordinary state of affairs if some of the issues identified by parishioners were not on the Parish Council's radar. The issue of access to Wragby Road has not arisen during my time as a Parish Councillor.

The 'busy times' identified by most parishioners were weekday mornings from around 7-30 to 9-30 i.e. the work and school run, and mornings and

early evenings during the peak holiday summer months. The obvious benefit is safe and assured access to Wragby Road.

The other information required by Mr. Mountford should be provided by the Highways and Traffic Department if our application is approved. We are still awaiting a reply from Highways and Traffic about the entitlement criteria they use and what evidence is needed from the parish.

Mr. Mountford's comments about 'majorities' are rather foolish. Suffice to say the Parish Plan was developed from the views of parishioners who willingly participated in the process and who completed questionnaires.

Nettleham Woodland Trust

In 2006 a group of residents got together to form a community group, Nettleham Woodland Trust. important and we can work with a plot that is in a corner of a field, is a narrow strip of land at the side of a field, in short we will consider anything.

We are willing to lease, buy or work in partnership with a landowner. Furthermore we are prepared to pay above the market value and are willing to pay all of the landowner's legal fees. If you are a landowner or know of any landowners in the vicinity of Nettleham please give me a call and be part of creating a woodland that will be an asset for the area.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S CORNER

Carbon Concerns

One of the doubtful privileges of being a councillor is that you become the recipient of more information than you can digest. On such source of information is 'PublicNet Briefing' and there are often snippets that are quite illuminating. The Headline that caught my eye was:-

'Environment Holds on to Fourth Place in League Table of Concerns.'

Whilst man made climate change is not likely to cause a mass extinction of the human species, it might well, over a couple of centuries or so, cause a very large percentage population reduction, which I would have thought was something quite important. However a Department of the Environment Department survey shows that top of public concerns is crime. Health is now less of a worry than it was and less people are dissatisfied with Social Services and with Education.

Elected representatives need to pay attention to these surveys because they tell us what electors want us to concentrate on. But we have, in turn, a responsibility to point out what should worry people, as distinct from what does worry them.

Only one third of those surveyed thought that scientists will find a solution to global warming, but by contrast, a quarter don't believe that their behaviour or everyday lifestyle contributes to climate change. There is a mundane issue local issue related to this matter of climate change. My wife and I have been

lucky, or perhaps we thought well in advance when we bought our homes, and never needed to drive our children to school. We either lived close enough to walk or our children caught the bus to William Farr. If I go back to my own childhood, my mother escorted us to our primary school which was a mile away. We didn't stay to lunch so she returned to collect us when we finished morning lessons, fed us and then took us back. She then collected us each afternoon. This was four round trips or a daily total of eight miles. She was never overweight and remained very fit into old age. Of course, she didn't have a paid job to worry about and so could arrange her life so as to do this until I was nine (when I was considered old enough to do the trip on my own).

Life is very different now and time and job pressures make it difficult for today's parents to do the same. But that school run car use is not good news for our carbon footprint, the lack of exercise is not good for parents or children and not least, all those cars make life difficult for those people who do live close to a school.

One last thought – safety. Children may well be at least as much at risk of injury riding in a car as they are walking to school. Most car accidents occur within a few miles of home and more accidents in Lincolnshire involve serious injury than in the country generally.

Just thinking out loud really.
