A note for your diary....Sunday September 12, 2pm onwards..... Sudbrooke Village Sports and Fun Day. Please see page 32 for further details.



VICAR'S LETTER

The Vicarage, Langworth

We seem to live in an age when people are very unsettled – ill at ease with themselves and with those around them: dis-eased as one might put it. People wrestle with "inner-demons" and this results, for example, in anger, aggression, anti-social and violent behaviour, and excessive drinking.

As the holiday season approaches it offers an opportunity to relax, stand back from our lives lived "under pressure", and take time out to examine ourselves. As the Psalmist wrote:-

"Be Still and know that I am God" (Psalm 46:10)
"My soul, wait thou only upon God; for my expectation is from Him."

(Psalm 62:5)

We are all afraid of losing control. A 'control freak' is someone who is obsessively reluctant to share power or responsibility with others. This egocentric behaviour is a form of pride. But there's a darker and deeper fear which haunts almost everyone. There are, within each one of us, desires and psychological forces which we're afraid might take us over. For some people it's drink ('After a couple of glasses I'm not responsible for my behaviour'), for others there are different desires, lurking in the background to take over if one gives them half a chance. There are those who go berserk if anyone prevents them having their own way ('throwing their toys out of the pram', as we say) or have a filthy temper, who are absolute demons when they're angry. All these temptations or losses of control can eventually be resisted, but it can be a struggle. There lurks the deep fear, which we may even be afraid to admit to ourselves, that one day the fatal flaw within may become irresistible – and then we're lost.

There is a solution to being manipulated by our own dark psychological forces, but first we have to admit that we have problem, and then face up to it. We need to face the dark side of our own personality, and some of the deep, sometimes very powerful, temptations this presents. But there's a solution, for the power of Jesus is greater than any other power. Once we faced up to our own, personal, inner-demons, and cried out to Jesus for help, we've beaten them. They're totally powerless. There's no longer any need to be afraid that one day we'll lose control. Keep close to Jesus, and he'll deal with that. Pray regularly, and Jesus will give you the will-power to say "No" to temptation. In the words of the old Hymn:

"And if I tempted am to sin, And outward things are strong, Do thou, O Lord, keep watch within. And save my soul from wrong."

"Not in the clamour of the crowded street, Not in the shouts and plaudits of the throng But in ourselves, are triumph and defeat."

......words which rest well alongside John Milton's observation in "Paradise Lost" that :-

"The mind is its own place, and in itself Can make a heaven of hell, or a hell of heaven."

If you have the opportunity to get some time off during the next couple of months, even if not going away, may the Lord bless that that time to you in refreshing and renewing ways.

1 PARISHIONERS ITEMS

Councillor Martin Dickie thanked the Parish Council for the use of the Kurling Kit for the charity event at the Yarborough Leisure Centre, Lincoln on Sunday 25th April organised by the four Rotary Clubs of Lincoln, and District 1270 of which there were 350 participants.

A resident had drawn attention, through Sudbrooke News, that the street nameplate for Green Way has incorrect at Holme Drive. The Clerk would notify WLDC Street team of this and also request that Green Way be added to the St Edward's Drive street nameplate.

There had been an incident of quad bikers in the woods and a copy of the letter from Somerville Properties giving authority to the Police to act in the owner's absence had again been copied to the Police.

A report had been made by a resident that trees adjacent to the footpath that runs from the bridge on West Drive towards the new metal bridge appear to be likely to fall onto the footpath if the beck bank erodes further. This would be reported to the Witham Third Internal Drainage Board.





I was inside Lincoln Cathedral the other day and heard the (Last orders?) Bell that signified the Cathedral was closing and it was time for visitors to leave. It was donated to the Cathedral in January 1953 by Mr Robert Godfrey who lived at The Lodge of Sudbrooke Holme and had purchased it and the Lodge when Sudbrooke Holme was demolished and the contents auctioned off in 1924. He had formerly been Clerk of Works at The Cathedral. He died in March 1953. I can't help wondering how many other bits and pieces may be seen around here. If anyone knows of any perhaps they would write in and let us all know.

Dear Editor

In response to the enquiry by Mr and Mrs Creasey in the June edition, I may be able to shed some light on the Millennium Stone and how it found its way to its place in the heart of Sudbrooke. I believe it was unearthed in the grounds of our home at 6 Wragby Road, (next door but one to the Cherry Tree Cafe).

When the foundations were excavated for the garage to our house, adjacent to the main road, the stone was unearthed. Because of its size and weight, Mr Charlie Massey used his heavy lifting equipment to help the builder move it to the lane at the side of the cafe, where it was sited for a number of years, before it was donated by his family to the village.

One day when I was walking my dogs down the lane I encountered a gentleman, taking photographs of the stone. He looked very knowledgeable, and in conversation he informed me that the stone was indeed a glacial erratic. It made its way, over 300,000 years ago, in one of the great ice-sheets, possibly from the North Yorkshire moors area, or from the coastal region now beneath the North Sea. He pointed out the polished surfaces and deep scratch-marks formed during its long glacial journey. There is a similar glacial erratic in a garden in Langworth.

The gentleman I met was indeed an expert, he was Mr John Aram of the Lincolnshire Wildlife Trust Office based in Horncastle, and he had set up a boulder committee to do a survey into glacial erratics and sites of significant geological

Bowel Cancer Screening Programme

The NHS Bowel Caner Screening programme for people aged between 60 and 69 was launched by NHS Lincolnshire at the end of December 2009. This means that within the next two years everyone in the county in this age bracket will be invited to undergo bowel cancer screening.

Those people that wish to take part will be sent an easy-to-use testing kit directly to their homes which they then post back to a laboratory for testing. Anyone who has an abnormal test result will be given an appointment to see a specialist nurse in the endoscopy units at one of the local hospitals to discuss further tests.

Polite Reminder about West Drive and Scout Land

Over the last year it has been noticed that the Scouts land is being entered by non –Scouts.

We would like to politely point out that this land is fenced off and marked as private and there is NO public footpath / bridleway / right of access over any over our land for ANYONE.

Likewise West Drive running at the side of our site is a FOOTPATH, and the public has access to it **only** on foot. Vehicular access is only for land-owners that have legal access over it. It is NOT open for use by quad bikes and motor-bikes, please ensure your children are aware of this.

We used to have a relaxed attitude to walkers and local residents on our land however, with the sad times we live in now, it is increasingly important that we ensure that protection of the young people in our care, and the Scout Association has to take this stance.

To this end we must request that NO person enter our land for any purposes unless they are with a recognised youth organisation that have booked in with the Scout Association and will ensure that any adults they have with them hold the appropriate CRB checks and certificates.

As our users use the site on an ad hoc basis we cannot allow the public enter the site if no one can be seen on site, as we have groups that use the woods, and cannot be seen on the main camp site.

This sounds very negative, and we are very sorry that we have to take this position, but we are sure that you will fully understand the implications for our young members if we allow non authorised access. Equally this measure is of course to protect the 'public' (i.e. non-Scouters) from putting themselves in potentially compromising positions.

Scouting *does* want to embrace the residents of the parish and villages, but we would ask that anyone wishing to be involved does so through any of the scout groups, primarily Scothern but also Welton, Wragby, Cherry Willingham & Reepham and Fiskerton Scout Groups, who would be extremely pleased to see them.

Dear Editor

Whilst reading through some old magazines recently I came across an article which may interest other residents and readers of our magazine. I have always thought I lived in a village but it appears that I (like almost everyone else I know) have been mistaken. Our Village is really a Hamlet. The distinction is defined in an Act of Parliament dated 1405 which decreed that every Village and Town in England should erect and maintain a pillory or set of stocks. Any place too poor or too small to be able to afford stocks shall not be entitled to call itself a village but should be regarded as a Hamlet. (So that's us put in our place hasn't it). The Act states "That no village shall be considered to be complete, or worthy of the title of "Village" without a set of stocks which are so essential to due order and government are they deemed to be "A set of stocks confers a status on small communities".

Stocks and pillories were used to punish a wide range of minor offences from drunkenness, lewd behaviour, rowdiness, prostitution, begging and not attending church. Market stallholders and shopkeepers selling unfit or overpriced or poor quality goods or short-changing were also included in possible occupants. Publicans who watered down ale and poachers were also in the list. Butchers who sold rotten or rancid meat would be placed in the stocks with the offending item tied around their neck thus making the punishment fit the crime. Fortune tellers and false mediums were also likely culprits.

In 1500 a young priest was placed in village stocks for being found drunk at a village fete in Lincolnshire. That drunk went on to become CARDINAL WOLSEY. There are records of parents being placed in stocks for the procurement of their children as harlots and prostitutes. Amongst other notable persons who were known to have been placed in stocks was the author Daniel Defoe for publishing seditious material. In his work "The shortest way with dissenters ". In Sheffield on 12th February 1790 there is a record of 9 men being found drinking ale in a public house at the time of a church service next door being confined in the stocks for 6 hours.

Once placed in the stocks, usually for periods of 2 to 6 hours, the culprits were subject to public scorn and abuse and pelted with rotten fruit, animal dung, offal, sticks and stones.

I wonder what offences you would consider worthy of a period in the stocks in these modern times. May I suggest littering and graffiti as well as permitting doggy mess and criminal damage. You may have your own thoughts. How about folks like me writing silly letters (I hope not !!)

The pleasure we got from seeing our offspring looking up at us and probably wondering why we were making those stupid chortling noises and pulling funny faces was one of the joys in pushing baby around. I just loved to see my lovely little cherubs gurgling and laughing and the bond between parents and child I am sure was forged

ever more strongly with every walk pushing the wheelchair. When folded up these push chairs were about the same compact size as a modern PC computer and weighed practically nothing. They were that small that they fitted easily into any car boot or under the stairs in those old fashioned buses. They were also very cheap to buy.

There is a saying that change is inevitable (except in a cash machine) but I think that the change to the modern day push chair is rather stupid. These days they have about a dozen or more large multi wheels. They weigh half a ton (or whatever that is in Mickey Mouse E.U. money). It's a wonder you don't need a HGV licence to push one .!!... More importantly, they mostly seem to be the wrong way round.!!

Baby now faces the front ... The mother can't even see her baby and baby can't see mother. The bonding is lost. No more interaction between mother and child. As I write this, we are coming up to Midsummer and enjoying the improved weather. In spite of continued efforts, the front lawn is still in a sorry state, due to leatherjackets causing considerable damage and birds feasting on the grass seed which I applied. Efforts to re-instate the lawn continue, but I may have to call in the cavalry! The wall baskets are doing well and apart from occasional deadheading need no attention thanks to the automatic watering system.

The greenhouse is now empty, as the remaining plants have been potted up into containers and placed on the gravel garden. These contain a mixture of the usual favourites, lobelia, verbena, begonias, impatiens etc. These should give a colourful display until autumn.

Everything is growing well in the vegetable garden and I have now planted some young cauliflowers and Brussels sprouts to grow on. Tomatoes and cucumbers are growing well in the polytunnel, and I have just cut our first cucumber. One of the aubergines has grown its first fruit, and pepper plants are in flower. The thornless blackberry bushes are just coming into flower, and we are hoping they will produce the usual good crop. The shrubbery area at the bottom of the garden, although overgrown and needing attention, has nevertheless produced lovely yellow flowers on the Cytisus battandieri, commonly known as a pineapple bush, or Moroccan broom. The blossom on this shrub smells like pineapple.

The herbaceous border has filled out, and is showing a lot of colour, although ground elder continues to be a problem which has to be dealt with. Unfortunately, the warmer weather encourages the weeds to thrive, and these compete with the plants - it can be difficult to keep up with the weeding.

The pergola, attached to the back of our bungalow was dismantled to allow for maintenance work, is now due to be re-erected, and the climbing plants will be encouraged to take over again. The Golden Hop has continued to grow rapidly despite the disturbance, but apart from one post has little support, so it will be a good thing to have the pergola back in place.

There is still plenty of work to be done in the garden, but with holiday time starting although the gardening will continue, the next report will be in the September issue. Farewell

I was born and raised in a family of travelling showmen (fairground people). I used to drive an old Guy lorry, this was a short wheel base 8 wheeler, which had a big Gardner engine mounted on the back and was used for powering the machines that we ran. Behind this I pulled a 40ft trailer which was loaded with the Waltzer, behind that was a 32ft showman's caravan and just for good measure we used to tag a "munch box" on the back, usually a hot dog or candy floss stall.

Like all Guy trucks mine had a very large brass cap on the radiator often with an Indian's head on it as mine did. My dad somehow got hold of a spare radiator cap that was flat. He drilled a hole in it and mounted a billy can on it. We used to put a couple of spoons of tea leaves in it, top up with water and screw it onto the radiator. The next job was to lift the bonnet, which was in the cab, and place on top of the manifold half a dozen or so slices of bacon all wrapped up in foil. We would pull over after driving down the road for an hour or so and get stuck into good old bacon butties and a mug of proper tea, steaming hot.

Memory lane eh!! The best road to travel!! Keep up the good work it is most enjoyable.
