By the time you read this, I guess Easter Day (4th April) will be past. Looking ahead in the Church Diary there are a number of events to note in your own Diaries (or, in this day and age, Organisers !).

April is the month of Annual Parochial Church Meetings, and Sudbrooke's will be held in St. Edward's Church on Thursday 29 April at 7.30 p.m.

In May, the Bishop of Grimsby will be leading a pre-Pentecost Week of events in the Deanery. Evening Times and Titles of his Talks remain to be advised but the programme will be held at the following venues :-

Monday 17 May	Welton, Dunholme and Scothern Benefice
Tuesday 18 May	Springline Benefice
Wednesday 19 May	Nettleham
Thursday 20 May	South Lawres Benefice (Cherry Willingham)
Friday 21 May	Owmbly Group

There will be no event on Saturday 22 May, but the week will end on Sunday 23 May (Pentecost) with an ecumenical Pentecost Praise Service at St. Hugh's Langworth. Thought is being given as to whether this might be held as an open-air service (weather permitting !). A more "refined" programme as to exact church venues will be published in due course.

The following Sunday (30 May) the Deanery will be gathering for a service in Lincoln Cathedral at 9.30 a.m. There will be no 9.00 service at St. Edward's Sudbrooke on that morning as it is hoped that as many people as possible will attend the Cathedral Service.

At the Family Service on June 13, the Scouts will be primarily involved in the service (as last year).

Come the Autumn, there will be the Flower Festival (October 8-10) and volunteers to help with a number of assisting roles are still welcome. If you can help, Eleanor Clarke or Lyn Curtis will be pleased to hear from you. They can explain to you what is involved.

Jesus' first and last words on the Cross were addressed to his Heavenly Father :-

"Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do" (Luke 23:34)

"Father, into your hands commend my Spirit" (Luke 23:46)

These words are echoed for our own journey through life as expressed in the words of the Hymn "Immortal Love" by J.G. Whittier :-

"Through him the first fond prayers are said
our lips of childhood frame;

The last low whispers of our dead
are burdened with his name”

NOTES OF THE MEETING OF SADBROOKE PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON THURSDAY 4TH FEBRUARY 2010 IN THE VILLAGE HALL, SADBROOKE

139 PARISHIONERS ITEMS

Several potholes reported in the village, although it was noted that the County Council Highways Department are endeavouring to fill pot holes as quickly as possible following the severe weather.

Councillor Stuart Curtis reported that the notice board near to the Park Gates was in poor condition. It was agreed that this be removed.

It was noted that there was an increase in vandalism in the Village.

140 DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

Councillor Miss Rose Dobbs declared an interest in agenda items 8a and 9b.

141 COUNTY COUNCILLORS REPORT

CC Mrs Sue Rawlins explained that she had been unable to attend Sudbrooke's Parish Council meetings due to other commitments.

CC Mrs Rawlins gave an extensive report and explained the likely future cuts in the Highways Budget.

Lighting – Bus Shelter, Wragby Road – CC Mrs Rawlins stated that she was arranging a meeting with a representative from the Highways Department with a view to improving the lighting at the bus stop.

142 DISTRICT COUNCILLORS REPORT

District Councillor Stuart Curtis gave details about the Lincoln Villages Area Forum to be held on 16th March at Dunholme Village Hall commencing at 7.00pm.

DC Curtis reported that he had passed recent concerns about buildings at Harris Commercials on Sudbrooke Road to Scothern Parish Council as it was within Scothern Parish.

143 NOTES OF MEETING HELD ON 7TH JANUARY 2010

These were signed as a correct record.

144 REPORTS ON MATTERS OUTSTANDING

- a) Parish Plan Advisory Group** – It was reported that a recent meeting had had to be cancelled but it was hoped that this would shortly be re-convened.
- b) Street nameplates – Park Close** - This item was still being worked on.
- c) Allotments – update** – Councillor S Curtis stated that he had nothing further to report on this as negotiations to have reached a stalemate. No further landowners were prepared to negotiate any land for use as allotments. The matter would be left in abeyance.
- d) Wood carving** – Helen Link had sent a report which stated that the group had recommenced carving following the Christmas break but it was expected that progress would be slow until the better weather.

145 HIGHWAY MATTERS

- a) Speed limit, Scothern Lane** – Confirmation had been received that the LCC's speed limit policy to Scothern Lane, Sudbrooke as far as the entrance to the playing field had now been applied.
- b) Road Markings, St Edward's Drive** – The Clerk was asked to check that the road markings would be carried out on St Edward's Drive when the weather improved.
- c) Bus Shelter repairs** – It was noted that some panels had been removed and the Clerk would enquire whether this was carried out by LCC.

146 NORTHFIELD PARK – SHRUB MAINTENANCE

Following discussion it was agreed that the northern hedge and all shrubs should be trimmed once a year in March. The Clerk was instructed to obtain a price from the grounds maintenance contractors.

A working party was organised to plant hedging plants in that area on 21st February 2010.

Children and adults of all ages are most welcome. The more volunteers we get, the quicker the job is done. Past litter picks have taken one hour or so but any time you can give would be helpful.

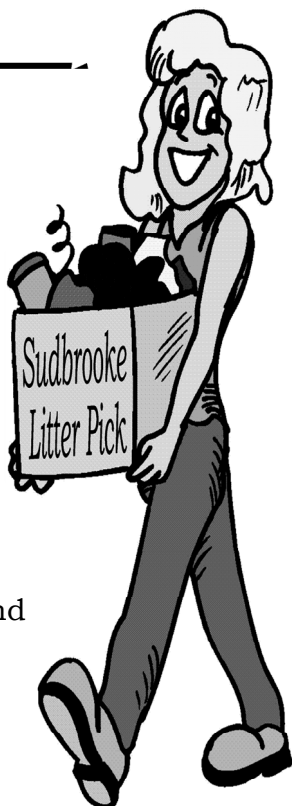
Litter will only be collected from open spaces and communal areas. Would all householders please clean up the area outside their own property as this makes such a difference to the appearance of the village.

A few months back one of your readers asked if anyone in the village knew the origins of the man made ponds in the woods. No one replied so I assume that like me, no one knew how or why they came to be there . By chance I have come across the answer in a pamphlet entitled "Footpath walks around Sudbrooke " dated February 1998 issued by Sudbrooke Parish Council Conservation Committee and Lincolnshire County Council. Supported by The Parish Paths Partnership and Countryside Commission Initiative .

This is a wonderful booklet which gives details of footpaths around the village and all the varied and wonderful things that can be seen whilst walking the paths . There are masses of things to look out for. From historical items to birds, wild animals ,trees and plants. It really is one of the most concise and fascinating booklets of it's size that I have ever had the pleasure to read. Just crammed full of facts about our village and stuff we didn't know about our village history. In view of the fact it was issued in 1998 some of the footpath details need to be updated. Is it possible that a re-issue could be made by The Parish Council and made available to the public?. So many of the residents of the village nowadays have never seen or heard of many of the facts included in itplease some Parish Councillor !!take up this very worthwhile cause .

The answer to the ponds question, by the way, is that they were created by extracting gravel which was then taken to form the runways at Scampton and Dunholme Airfields. Nowadays they serve a useful purpose as surface water drainage ponds for the village. They once were home to one of the largest colony of toads in Lincolnshire and many of us can remember the road signs that used to be in the village near the site of the village shop that warned of swarms of migrating toads crossing the road each spring Where have all the toads gone now ?

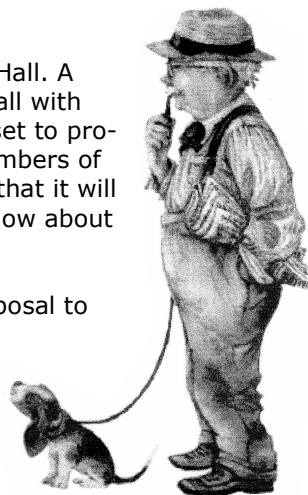
A date of April 1988 has now been fixed for the start of building the new Junior School at Scothern for children from Sudbrooke and the surrounding area. Until it opens children from this village will continue to attend the 150 year old school in Scothern founded with a grant by Mr Richard Ellison of Sudbrooke Holme. This generous grant has served both villages well but is now far too small for the ever increasing population of the two villages. Plans to erect the new school in the village of Sudbrooke have finally been rejected .

Issue No 109 dated November 1986

A successful theatre outing to London by Coach by 50 villagers to see the show OLIVER was organised by Mrs Ros Curbishley and left from the village at 2.30pm at a cost of £2.30.....(Never hear of anything similar these days ...How about it someone ?)

The Luncheon Club held its' first meeting at the Village Hall. A Licence to sell alcohol has been granted to the village hall with joint licensees Claude Bramham and Bruce Doggett all set to provide refreshment to villagers. First to partake were members of the Indoor Bowls Club and the Casino Club. It is hoped that it will attract many others as soon as the word gets around. How about thatOur very own Local !!

The first Mothers and Toddlers Club was held and a proposal to form a Tennis Club was made providing enough members could be found....(It was all happening this month...what a pat on the back for all the hard work The Village Hall committee have put in to get it up and off the ground.)

I would like to take this opportunity to ask all residents of Sudbrooke to consider what 3 issues effect them on a day to day basis in and around the village, preferably of a Police nature. If you can think of 3 then I would suggest that they are real issues that probably effect your quality of life and that of others. If the same issue is reported by several persons then it maybe that the Police can assist or deal with the issue or, if not, pass it on to the appropriate agency to progress. If you would like to contact us with this information then please contact myself or PcsO Jackie Parker. This can be done via email to us at nettleham.npt@lincs.pnn.police.uk or by contacting us by phone, details below. All we require is a name, contact number and up to 3 issues from you.

We currently run 5 Police Surgeries within our Policing Area, we have ones at Cherry Willingham, Langworth, Nettleham, Riseholme and Bardney. We are hoping that we can now commence one for the village of Sudbrooke in the near future. We have arranged with the owners of the New Cherry Tree Bistro on the A158 to hold the surgeries there. The first one is planned for Tuesday 20th April and the second for Tuesday 18th May (3rd Tuesday of each month), between 11am and 1pm. We welcome any persons to attend, to discuss local issues, report minor incidents or offer advice. Depending on the success of the surgeries we hope to continue them at Sudbrooke every 3rd Tuesday of the month.

I would also like to let people know of Lincolnshire Polices' new non emergency single contact number, if you are reporting a non urgent crime or incident then the new number to call is **0300 111 0300**. You can still contact myself or Pc Jackie Parker on our personal issue mobiles however I can not stress enough, DO NOT ring us direct if your call is of an urgent nature and equally if it is a new report where a police attendance is required promptly. We would hate for you to ring our mobiles and for example, leave a message only to discover 2 weeks later that we had been on holiday, when you wished to report a burglary in progress.

The Old Codger.....



I was wallowing in nostalgia the other evening watching films of old soccer stars of yesteryear which featured players such as Stanley Mathews ,Tom Finney, Nat Lofthouse, Tommy Lawton, Leslie Compton, Frank Swift, Tommy Docherty, Billy Wright etc.

Players and Managers were loyal and usually stayed with the same club for many years. Johnny Haynes played for Fulham for 20 years. Every club played with 5 forwards, 3 half backs and two full backs. Everyone thought strikers were miners seeking better wages. Teams didn't rely on one or two players to get the goals. Any one of the 5 forwards could blast them in. They had titles such as centre forward, inside left, or right and right or left wingers. It took a team from Moscow Dynamo and a set of Hungarian Internationals and a man named Puscas to change all that. Most teams played with home grown local talent. The fans loved that and still would if clubs didn't sell off players as soon as they got anywhere near star quality.

What a contrast with today's game. With the modern kit and equipment in present day use such as plastic swerve inducing balls, lightweight slipper type boots, round goal posts, plastic bendy corner flagpoles and state of the art paramedic first aid , stuff more suited and quite capable of dealing with a major rail crash.

How would today's stars have coped with hard leather boots weighing about five pounds each, which came up to and over the ankle? The studs were round layers of leather the size of a tanner (Sixpence) with half a dozen nails securing them to the hard leather sole. The toe caps were large and made of thick leather and quite capable of matching any steel capped present day workman's safety boot . Corner posts were normally made of metal ...try punching them to celebrate a goal !!

On that subject, you never saw more than a pat on the back or head or perhaps a hand-clap if one of your team scored. It was after all, what was expected of him. Compare today's mass hysteria with teammates leaping all over each other and often ending with an untidy heap on the ground crushing the breath out of the goal scorer. If anything would put someone off scoring that would certainly make me think twice. With today's multi million pound players I would certainly put a stop to that if I were a manager. The dangers of injury to my team's players is obvious to me. How is it not obvious to these managers ?

I remember being at a Sheffield Wednesday match at Hillsborough when that giant of a man and English International, Derek Dooley score a goal and in doing so skidded along the turf causing blood to flow. A week later he was admitted to hospital. The injury turned gangrenous and he lost a leg. How about that as a lesson to those over exuberant players who deliberately slide around in celebration? Dooley later had a long and successful career as Manager of Sheffield Wednesday, but his short lived career as one of the most successful centre forward goal scorers of his day, was abruptly ended.

After all, these are the same players who at the faintest touch anywhere on their body collapse and spectacularly fall and roll about on the ground seeking a free kick or penalty. They would recover much sooner if the club physio arrived at the scene with a metal bucket and sponge with ice cold water with blood and spittle in it from treating a previous player and slapped him in the face with the sponge. Believe me, it used to work wonders with me !!.... Anything but that sponge !!

Shin pads were bigger in those days, and they needed to be ! At schoolboy level we made do with folded newspaper or paper backed books. The balls were made of thick leather sections sewed together and had a heavy rubber inflated inner which was kept inside by heavy leather stitching. When wet they weighed several pounds and heading a ball after having been played on a wet muddy pitch was like being hit on the head with a coal hammer. If you were unlucky and caught the lace of the ball you could easily cut your eye open and look like Henry Cooper on a bad day .

It was a much more physical game in those days. The keeper did not claim the ball and then prance around with it in his hands unopposed as they do today. The rules in those days were that it was perfectly legal to shoulder charge each other off the ball and that included the keeper who would often be shoulder charged over the goal line and a goal awarded ...If he got the ball he got rid ...Quick !! No time wasting then !!

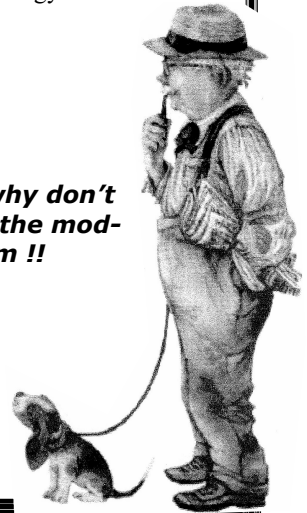
In jumping for a ball in the crowded penalty area it was not at all uncommon to receive a punch in the head which would have done credit to Bruce Woodcock or even worse a jolt in your marriage prospects which left you goggle eyed . The referees were a bit more short sighted in those days and incidents such as the famous later pictures of Vinnie Jones and Paul Gascoigne were commonplace. There were no camera shots then. Players did not exaggerate injuries like they do today. There was one famous incident just after the war when a goalkeeper, Bert Trautman, a former German Prisoner of War, who I think was playing in a Cup Final match, played half the game with a broken neck . Remember !!....there were no reserves allowed ...if a man went off injured you played with a man short .

If you ever see film shots of the crowds in those days you will notice almost everyone is wearing flat caps ...even the goalkeepers wore flat peaked caps. No fancy Yankee Nancy things with holes at the back then. Many of the fans held wooden rattles, often painted in team colours. These had been left over after the war when they were used as air raid warnings in the event of a gas attack ...many carried large hand bells, again a relic of the war. In addition the crowds were often double the size of even the largest of today's crowds and the noise of the crowd at even an average club game easily matched today's Hampden Roar. The size of the crowd was obviously related to the entry prices which were normally in the region of about a £1. Almost all standing . Club scarves were normally knitted by your Wives and Mums. Budget News from West Lindsey District Council

West Lindsey District Council has set the level of Council Tax increase for the forthcoming year below half of one percent at the rate of 0.48%. This is likely to be the lowest level of Council Tax increase in the County and among the lowest increases in the Country.

The Council is further underlining its commitment to reducing its carbon footprint by making an investment of £200,000 in order to reduce the Council's carbon emissions by 25% by 2014.

Flooding is now one of the major environmental challenges and the District Council is to invest £165,000 in flood defence schemes in West Lindsey.

The new Market Rasen Swimming Pool has been given the go ahead, with full cross party support, which will serve the whole District.

GARDENING NEWS



Hello, and once again, welcome to Garden News. The weather has been dry and bitterly cold, lets hope that by the time you read this, the weather will have improved. At the moment the sun is shining and it is much warmer- has Spring arrived ?

In the vegetable garden, between the greenhouse and polytunnel, I have made four raised beds measuring 4ft by 8ft, with a walkway between each one. This enables me to do all the work from the paths. During the winter the beds were given a dressing of lime, once this had been washed in I applied farmyard manure and forked it in. All is now ready for planting .

Earlier this year I told of planting onion sets in modular trays in the greenhouse, the onions were transferred to a cold frame once they were growing, to harden them off. Now the weather is improving the time seems ready to plant them out in one of the beds. This will be followed by the first sowing which will be of parsnips.

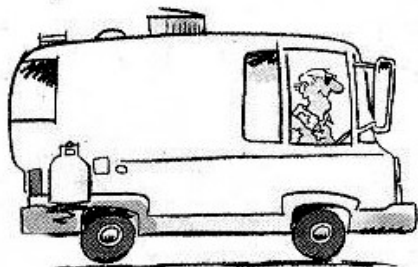
With the improved weather and having a good look at the garden, we can see how hard this winter has been, shrubs and plants are definitely much later coming to life. Winter jasmine which should have flowered in January is still not looking very lively. The area showing the greatest signs of life is the rockery. The renovation which took place last summer, has proved very worthwhile. The stars at the moment are the little irises, just 4" tall both the yellow *Iris reticulata dannfordiae* and the purple "Pixie" are blooming well, backed up by snowdrops (still blooming) and crocus, this area promises well for the future . The reason why these plants are doing well is because they are Alpine plants, well suited to the weather conditions this winter.



Farewell for now, lets hope the sun keeps shining.

Editor.....I have reproduced the original letter below and added Reverend Buckler's notes to the letter overleaf.....

Old Codger

*In answer to The Old Codger asking for information about wartime action over Sudbrooke, you may like to know that at dawn on Monday 10th February 1941 a Hampden Bomber (** 1 **) of 49 Squadron based at Scampton was seen to be chased and shot down by a German ME110 over Grange Farm Sudbrooke as it returned to base after a bombing raid over Hamburg. It crashed on the north side of Sudbrooke Lake near The Grange after hitting a tree and bursting into flames. It was witnessed by Mr and Mrs Charlesworth and their daughter Doris. The Hampden was on fire as it was coming down. Two crew members bailed out. One was the pilot. Both were treated by the Charlesworth family for bullet wounds and broken bones and lived. Two other crew members were found dead in the wreckage of the burnt out plane. A frequent, almost daily sight in the early hours was of planes returning from bombing raids. Many of them could clearly be seen with damage and there were many crashes in the surrounding area by RAF planes that couldn't make it home, but as far as I know this is the only time one actually crashed on our village.*

Ps.....Bomber Command despatched 222 A/C to industrial Hannover. 49 Squadron had 12 A/C airborne and 2 were shot down. The pilot of the ME110 Intruder was Lt. Leopold Fellerer of 11/NJGZ and this incident is designated in 49 Squadrons' history as crashed.

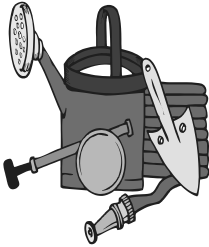

Alan Brown (Lincs County Council Highways Manager) had reported that following site meetings between his staff and Sustrans (the main funding body), the requirement was no longer achievable. The main issue was that the Sustrans require the footpath/cycleway to have a minimum width of 2.5 metres whereas the County Council say that only 1.5 metres is achievable.
