Well, we've had a Cold New Year – perhaps "Happy" is too strong a word for it! But there have been the Christmas presents to enjoy. In my case, there were a number of little books with lots of interesting information in them – so my "Trivial Pursuit" knowledge will be improved. Subjects covered included Cats, Cricket, and The Strange Laws of Laws of Old England (many of which are still current).

For instance, did you enjoy your mince pies? Well you wouldn't if you had lived in the mid-17th Century when we had no King and Oliver Cromwell's Commonwealth was running the Country. Mince pies (along with a lot of other customs and religious observances – including Yule logs and decorating the home with holly and ivy) were banned as the ingredients were claimed to be pagan in origin!

Queen Elizabeth I passed a law that aimed to ban any woman leading a man into marriage through the use of false hair, make-up, false hips, high-heeled shoes or other such devices. Such a woman was to be punished with penalties as those applied to witchcraft. I wonder what she would have made of the modern TV advertising that assails us in connection with the pursuit of the 'body beautiful'!

86 PARISHIONERS ITEMS

Poor lighting at the bus shelter on Wragby Road was commented on, the bus drivers reportedly not being able to see a person waiting. County Councillor Mrs Sue Rawlins agreed to take the matter up with the Highways Department with a view to improving the situation.

It was reported that the gate to the play area at the rear of the village hall was not shutting correctly. The Clerk would ask the Playground Inspector if he could repair it.

87 DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

Councillor Miss R Dobbs declared a personal interest in Item 8c on the agenda, being a resident of Park Close.

88 POLICE MATTERS

PC Dave Morgan had sent information regarding the Simple SID devices (Speed Indicator Devices) for members to consider whether the Parish Council would like to contribute a share of the cost.

Following discussion members considered that a device showing the speed that vehicles were travelling would be more effective. It was agreed not to contribute towards a shared cost in a SID at the present time.

89 COUNTY COUNCILLORS REPORT

CC S Rawlins reported that the County Council were currently investigating the traffic problems/issues in Lincoln.

She also stated that West Lindsey District Council had been asked to contribute £250,000 towards design costs of the proposed eastern bypass.

90 DISTRICT COUNCILLORS REPORT

DC Stuart Curtis informed the meeting of the following:-

- That he had received reports of increased dog fouling down Scothern Lane.
- WLDC were expecting to receive a major planning application at Nettleham to be submitted by Lincoln Rugby Club.
- That there would be an alteration to Section 106 agreements in that funds could now be diverted to schooling, affordable housing and other community uses, not just open spaces/play areas.
- That he was in receipt of two new TPO's in the village one for several trees in Church Lane and another at 12 Scothern Lane.
 These would be circulated to members by the Clerk.

75b) Add – The field next to the Scothern School was reportedly on the market for sale and Cllr Stuart Curtis was asked to organise a site meeting with the owners representative, the Clerk, Cllr P Rignall, Scothern Parish Council representatives and himself.'

92 REPORTS ON MATTERS OUT-STANDING

a) Parish Plan – Mike Halliday and members of the Parish Plan Group had met the Highways Manager for a more detailed look at the requirement of a footway/cycleway which was considered achievable at a cost and the Highways Manager had undertook to provide an engineer to complete a survey in order to establish a more accurate cost figure.

Members were considering the options available with regard to improved access to Sudbrooke Park. Next meeting of the Parish Plan Group is 24th October 2009.

Cllr Rose Dobbs reported that there were issues which required clarifying between Councillors and the Parish Plan Group and in this respect the first item on the agenda at the Parish Plan meeting would be for such a discussion. Parish Councillors were all urged to attend the meeting on 24th November.

- b) Allotments update A site meeting had been held with the agent for the landowner, Sudbrooke and Scothern Parish Council representatives. A suggested area was to the side of the field nearer to Sudbrooke than the School. Further communication was awaited from the landowner's agent.
- c) Wood Carving Posts The Chair Person suspended Standing Orders for this item to allow Mrs Helen Link to speak. The Caps had now been fitted to the posts and the plaque was ready to be mounted which would complete the project around the Millennium stone.

Mrs Link stated that there was much enthusiasm from carvers who were currently working on seven seats.

The Chair Person thanked Mrs Link for her continued efforts with the wood carving project.

- d) Christmas Tree Event The Clerk and Treasurer reported on the arrangements for the Christmas Tree Event. Additional help was offered from Councillors Stuart Curtis, Nick James, Lyn Etheridge, Paul Rignall and Rose Dobbs.
- e) Report on attendance at training events The Chair Person, Miss Rose Dobbs and the Clerk had attended a training seminar at Guildhall, Gainsborough on 'Roles and Responsibilities of the District Council'. Cllr Paul Rignall had attended a course for Councillors at Louth explaining policies and procedures. Both courses were reported as being extremely informative. The Chair Person would be attending the Lincolnshire Association of Local Councils AGM on 7th November 2009.

93 HIGHWAY MATTERS

- A) Suggestion that 40mph sign be moved before the playing field entrance instead of after It was agreed that this may assist in reducing the speed of traffic on the approach to the entrance to the sportsfield/village hall and the Clerk was asked to enquire with Highways whether it would be possible to move the signs.
- B) Suggestion of a 'Concealed Entrance' sign instead of a 'Children's Playground' sign Scothern Lane Following discussion it was agreed that the current 'Children's Playground' sign remain.
- C) Street nameplates, Park Close It was brought to the attention of the Council that the numbering in Park Close was causing some confusion to visitors to the area/delivery drivers and that an endorsement be made on the signs indicating the numbers. The Clerk was asked to contact WLDC Street Team regarding this.

D) Shrub trimming – near to Millennium Stone – Although the shrub trimming near to the Millennium stone appeared to be severe and there had been mixed reactions from residents and Parish Councillors, comments were made that there were many saplings still growing which, with additional light, will grow considerably next spring.



102 PARISHIONERS ITEMS

A resident of St Edward's Drive sought permission to remove two dead trees in the verge outside his property. There were no objections to this request.

103 DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

Councillor Miss R Dobbs declared an interest in items 9C and 11 of the agenda.

104 POLICE REPORTS – Nothing to report.

105 COUNTY COUNCILLORS REPORT

- No report submitted.

106 DISTRICT COUNCILLORS REPORT

DC Stuart Curtis reported that the triple bin collection was now working successfully but that there would be spot checks on the contents of bins in the near future. Those persons who had paid for green bins for 2009 were entitled to refunds and would shortly receive theirs.

DC Curtis stated that he had attended a public meeting at Nettleham where discussion had taken place about the proposed facilities of Lincoln Rugby Club at Lodge Lane, Nettleham. Opinion on the scheme had been divided with the main concern being the increase in traffic and its exit onto the A158.

107 NOTES OF MEETINGS HELD ON 1ST OCTOBER 2009 AND 5TH NOVEMBER 2009

The notes of the above meetings were signed as correct records.

108 REPORTS ON MATTERS OUTSTANDING

- a) Parish Plan Advisory Group update The Parish Council met recently with the Parish Plan Group and hoped to meet jointly at least once a year.
- **b) Allotments** Councillor Stuart Curtis reported that there was no progress to report to date but negotiations were continuing with the agent for the landowner.
- **c) Wood Carving Posts** The plaque had now been fixed to the one of the posts. It was reported that work was progressing on the stumps to eventually form seats.
- d) Christmas Tree event update Cllr Martin Dickie reported that it had been a successful event clearing approximately £150. Disappointment was expressed that the request for assistance in Sudbrooke News had produced a zero response. The Clerk reported that Scothern Nurseries had kindly donated a raffle prize and that she would write a letter of thanks.

A note would be placed in the magazine thanking all those responsible for the erection of the tree/electrical work and fixing of lights to the tree.

e) Report on Street Cleansing
Seminar attended by Cllr Bernard
Bartram and the Clerk – This had been
held at Glentham Village Hall on 11th
November. An interesting talk had been
given by a representative of 'Tidy
Britain'. It was felt that such events
should be represented by the Parish
Council in order to continue the already
good working relationship between the
Parish Council and the Street Cleansing
Team.

109 HIGHWAY MATTERS

- a) Movement of speed limit sign,
 Scothern Lane A reply from the
 Highways Department of the County
 Council had stated that the legal
 process would have to be followed to
 extend the speed limit and the site does
 not meet the criteria as set out in the
 LCC's policy. Members felt that the
 speed limit sign would be more
 beneficial before the playing field rather
 than after it and asked the Clerk to
 request a copy of the LCC policy relating
 to this situation.
- b) Footway repairs, Scothern Lane A letter had been received from a resident of Scothern Lane pointing out the poor condition of the footway outside her property. Although a request for footway repairs had already been made to the Highways Department the Clerk had copied the letter to them. A reply had been received stating that they would endeavour to bring this forward in their programme of works.

- c) Bulb planting Councillor Bernard Bartram reported that crocus and snowdrop bulbs had been planted at the front of the Village Hall, the corner of Holme Drive, on Beech Tree Corner and at the corner of West Drive and Main Drive.
- e) Park Close Street nameplates Councillor Miss Rose Dobbs reported further on this matter in that numbers of properties need defining on the street nameplates. Cllr Miss Dobbs would check which numbers required to be on the nameplates so that the District Council could be requested to add these to the nameplates.
- f) Area Response Team update It was understood that the Area Response Team should have visited the village during November to undertake works but this appeared not to have happened. The Clerk would investigate further.

110 TREE CUTTING TO FRONT OF VILLAGE HALL

Cllr I Russell had viewed the trees suggested for felling and suggested that an oak tree could be saved, therefore leaving 5 trees for felling. This was agreed by the majority of members with the abstention of Councillor Bernard Bartram.

Quotations received from three companies were as follows:

A) £100 B) £180 plus £150 for the grinding of stumps C) £180 plus £100 for the grinding of stumps

The Clerk was instructed to enquire whether company (A) would include the

removal of the waste within this cost and if so to instruct them to carry out the work.

111 OTHER TREE MATTERS

Dear Editor

I regularly read your letters page and every so often feel strongly enough to think about writing to you. However, recent events have made me so furious that I have at last done the deed. It is in connection with the increasingly inconsiderate and yobbish behaviour I am observing in this village.

On Trick or Treat night, for example, I put up with the frequent disruption to our evening and, entering into the spirit of the occasion, gave out sweets to those who came to our door. Imagine my disgust next morning when I saw wrapping paper decorating my drive, front lawn and hedges. There's gratitude for you! I regularly have to take cans out of our hedges where they have been wedged, and recently, my dog narrowly missed having his paw cut open by a broken bottle left on the path. I totally agree with Mr Heath's letter regarding The Slob family possibly being alive and well and living in Sudbrooke, but don't forget their kids!

Such patterns of behaviour are indeed irritating, but in the recent cold spell, I have noticed much more insidious actions taking place. We regularly have snowballs thrown at our house; not at the door, which could absorb the impact, but at our large front window. If this broke, not only would we suffer from the cold; we would incur a great deal of inconvenience and expense to have it replaced. This is just wanton vandalism, as is the creation of slides on a footpath used by the elderly, when there is plenty of space available.

More serious still, at a time when the main roads through Sudbrooke were treacherously difficult to negotiate due to snow and ice, I was driving past a group of youths on the day the schools were closed. One looked straight at me, then, deliberately, took aim and fired a snowball straight at my windscreen, where it exploded, blinding me for a moment. I drove on, turned, and came back to remonstrate with the offenders, but of course, when they saw me, they ran off like the cowards they undoubtedly are. Such actions could cause a very serious accident indeed.

Of course, there are delightful children in Sudbrooke, whom I meet regularly when walking my dog. These young people are friendly and courteous and a pleasure to encounter. However, I feel they are increasingly being outnumbered by these callow, callous youths, who seem to delight in annoying or intimidating others. I hope that parents reading this will reinforce the dangers of wanton litter and snowball throwing, and that, if any of the snowballers happen to read this, they will feel some sense of shame.

I ask that my name and address be withheld to avoid further missiles being targeted at ourselves or our property.

SUDBROOKE PARISH PLAN



The Parish Plan Group met on 24th November last with the Parish Council to clarify roles and responsibilities. In future at least one joint meeting

each year will be held to consider actions and progress. Improved communications should ensure no actions are overlooked or work duplicated. Other matters covered by the group included:

Footpath/cycleway in Sudbrooke Lane.

The Highways Manager Alan Brown wrote to the group on 14th December: '.......However, I would confirm that there are currently significant concerns that a scheme may not be viable and until this concern is clarified I have not asked for further detailed estimates to be undertaken.

Again, I apologise for the delay and will keep you informed of the outcome of our investigations.'

It is not clear to us what the viability issues are. Is it that the County Council cannot meet the minimum requirements of potential funding bodies in terms of the width of the footpath/cycleway or is the requirement unachievable for other reasons?

Access to Sudbrooke Park.

Group members agreed that a letter (copy attached on next page) be sent to 4 landowners potentially involved with the proposed footpath.

So far 2 of the landowners have responded and both have refused permission to cross their land.

Sports Day.

Members agreed to support a sports day in 2010 and suggested a joint venture with a summer fete might attract more people.

Building Project

The practice are delighted to announce that we have recently received planning permission for two new consulting rooms to be used by our GP Trainees and an extension to our waiting room. Building work is due to commence on Monday 14 December 2009 and will last for approximately 12 weeks. Whilst the contractors are on site at the practice, there will be some disruption particularly in the car park, so we apologise now for the inconvenience and would request that patients find alternative ways of coming to the practice if at all possible during this time.

Also, as the builders will be here working whilst we are open as normal, I would request that all patients are especially careful to obey all health and safety notices.

We apologise for the disruption and inconvenience that the building work will cause and would very much appreciate your patience and understanding during this time.

Swine Flu Vaccination Programme

We have now vaccinated approximately 1000 patients in the highest three priority groups. In the next few weeks we shall be starting to write to patients in the fourth priority group inviting them to attend for a vaccination. This group

are those who are aged 65 and over and who suffer from a chronic disease. Supply of the vaccine has thus far been sporadic, but everyone who is eligible will receive an invite from us over the coming weeks as vaccine becomes available.

Surgery PODs

The surgery PODs are now fully operational in both practices. They can be used for numerous purposes with the main two at the moment being for new patients to use to provide the practice with their current health status and also for patients requiring a blood pressure check. Next time that you request a blood pressure check, the receptionist will direct you to the POD, where you can take your own blood pressure without an appointment. The receptionists all know how to use them and would be happy to show you if you have any problems. If you have any difficulties in using the POD with the receptionist's help, an appointment can be made for a blood pressure check with the Healthcare Assistant.

The information gathered by the POD is sent to a GP, so they can see that you have had your blood pressure checked and will contact you directly if there are any problems.

Old Codger

In answer to The Codger asking for information about wartime action over Sudbrooke you may like to know that at dawn on Monday 10th February 1941 a Hampton Bomber of 49 Squadron based at Scampton was seen to be chased and shot down by a German ME110 over Grange Farm Sudbrooke as it returned to base after a bombing raid over Hamburg .It crashed on the north side of Sudbrooke Lake near The Grange after hitting a tree and bursting into flames.. It was witnessed by Mr and Mrs Charlesworth and their daughter Doris .The Hampton was on fire as it was coming down .Two crew members

bailed out. One was the pilot .Both were treated by the Charlesworth family for bullet wounds and broken bones and lived .Two other crew members were found dead in the wreckage of the burnt out plane. A frequent, almost daily sight in the early hours was of planes returning from bombing raids .Many of them could clearly be seen with damage and there were many crashes in the surrounding area by RAF planes that couldn't make it home .But as far as I know this is the only time one actually crashed on our village .


I can answer all questions raised in paragraph 3 but too long to do so here. I
