## **NOTES OF THE MEETING OF SUDBROOKE PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON THURSDAY 5<sup>TH</sup> JUNE 2008 IN THE VILLAGE HALL, SUDBROOKE**

### **17 SIGNATURE OF DECLARATION OF ACCEPTANCE OF OFFICE OF VICE CHAIRMAN**

The elected Vice Chairman, Councillor Miss R Dobbs, had forwarded her signed Declaration of Acceptance of Office form to the Clerk.

### **18 CO-OPTION OF COUNCILLOR**

Two persons had applied to be co-opted onto the Parish Council to fill the one remaining vacancy. A closed ballot was taken by the Chairman resulting in the co-option of Mr Nick James. The Declaration of Acceptance of Office was signed.

### **19 PARISHIONERS ITEMS**

A report was made of ruts in the road/verge near to Richmond Farm, Sudbrooke Lane, caused by contractors vehicles. The Clerk was asked to report this to Highways and request that the area be re-instated.  
**Grass cutting** – There had been

several reports of grass not being cut; the Clerk had taken the matter up with the contractors.

**Hedge – Church Lane** – This is now overhanging the footway. The Chairman agreed to speak to the contractor cutting the landowners hedges to request that this also be cut back.

**20 POLICE MATTERS** – Problems had been occurring at the Village Hall with vehicles racing around the car park, the litter bin being set alight and damage to a notice.

### **21 ADDRESS BY MR COLIN CARTER, FINANCIAL SERVICES MANAGER, WEST LINDSEY DISTRICT COUNCIL**

Mr Carter gave a brief talk on financial matters relating to parish and District Councils, including grant aid, Council tax and Precepts.

Mr Carter was thanked by the Chairman for his attendance.

### **22 COUNTY COUNCILLORS REPORT**

The Clerk was instructed to write to the County Councillor enquiring why a footpath was being constructed from Middle Rasen to West Rasen and its cost.

### **23 DISTRICT COUNCILLORS REPORT**

District Councillor Stuart Curtis reported that a new Street Force Warden, Sarah Laverty, had been appointed for the Sudbrooke area. Sarah would be responsible for

addressing matters such as fly tipping, dog fouling, nuisance and abandoned vehicles, litter, graffiti, noise nuisance.

DC Curtis invited members to attend the West Lindsey Area Forum on 30<sup>th</sup> June 2008.

### **24 NOTES OF MEETING HELD ON 8<sup>TH</sup> MAY 2008**

These were signed as a correct record.

### **25 REPORTS OF MATTERS OUTSTANDING**

#### **Parish Plan and Action Plan update**

Mr Mike Halliday had sent in a report which was read by the Chairman. It referred to the first year's report of the Parish Plan Group's achievements as detailed in the June issue of Sudbrooke News. Members acknowledged the achievements of the Group and agreed that the object of the Group were being met.

Mr Halliday also stated that a little progress had been made with the Highways Department. The Highways Department wished to have a site meeting concerning the traffic light request for Wragby Road.

The next meeting of the Parish Plan Group will be 15<sup>th</sup> July, held in the Village Hall from 7.30pm.

**Highway Matters** - Cllr Bernard Bartram reported on the Street Cleansing Seminar attended by himself, Cllr Paul Rignall and the Clerk at Market Rasen on 28<sup>th</sup> May 2008. The Seminar had outlined ideas of the Street Cleansing

Department in that they intended to clean villages when they required cleaning rather than on a regular basis which was not always necessary.

Cllr Bartram also outlined a suggestion of a new dog bin in that bio-degradable bags were provided in a separate holder at the side of the bin for use by dog walkers. It was hoped that a trial could be carried out in Sudbrooke on such a bin which it was agreed would be situated in the Northfield Park play area.

**Grass cutting** – The grass had required cutting around the Park Gates area and the footpath by the side of the drain on Elm Drive. Members agreed that it should be cut on a regular basis and the Chairman, Cllr Bernard Bartram and the Clerk would arrange a meeting with Mr P Wright from Serviceteam to discuss the requirements further.

**Sports Day** – This would be held on 7<sup>th</sup> September 2008 – 2.30pm – 4.30pm. Volunteers were required for assistance at the event.

### **26 SPORTSFIELD COMMITTEE REPORT**

#### **Quotation for repair of flood lights –**

Cllr Curtis had sought quotations from companies but it was proving to be quite costly.

**Tennis Club – Constitution** – This had been circulated to all Councillors and was agreed subject to the addition of the following:-

'The Parish Council will be entitled to appoint a representative to the Committee'.

### **Tennis Club – Request for donation towards starting up of the Club –**

The Parish Council agreed to assist with funds for a Winder Handle, One piece adjuster strap and dog clip hook for net centre and a garden storage chest for accommodating the equipment at a cost not exceeding £100.00.

### **28 COUNCILLOR TRAINING EVENING – 9<sup>th</sup> JULY, 2008**

Councillors Lynn Etheridge, Bernard Bartram and Nick James agreed to attend this training evening organised by Lincolnshire Association of Local Councils, at a cost of £5.00 per person.

### **29 RISK ASSESSMENT REVIEW**

This was deferred until the July meeting of the Parish Council.

### **30 PLANNING**

Application – 122059 – 71 Wragby Road – Brick wall with brick pillars – no objections

Application – 2 Maple Drive – 122103 – Garage conversion – No objections subject to neighbours not objecting.

Appeal – 75 Wragby Road – Alterations to existing property.

### **31 FINANCE**

**a) Approval of Accounts 2007/8 –** These had been checked by the Internal Auditor.

**b) Completion of Annual Audit Return** – Resolved that this was an

accurate record of the accounts and signed accordingly.

### **32 CHAIRMAN COMMENTS**

The Chairman had been approached by Mrs Helen Link, a resident of the village, who wanted to set up a Wood Carving Group to enable carvings to be made to be displayed around the village, particularly in the vicinity of the Millennium Stone. Mrs Link had prepared a costing of materials.

Members discussed this and agreed that this project would be unique for the village and agreed to the sum of £600 being met from parish funds.

### **33 CORRESPONDENCE**

Free trees for parishes – to be passed to Cllr I Russell for perusal.

Notice from Lincs Police Authority that they were appointing 3 independent members to the Authority and inviting nominations.

Code of Conduct – Training event – 20<sup>th</sup> September 2008, Guildhall, Gainsborough. It was also noted that changes being implemented by the Standards Board for England will see all complaints in respect of alleged breaches against Code of Conduct assessed and determined at local level.

# ***PARISH COUNCIL REPORT***

## **REPORT OF PARISH COUNCIL MEETING – 3<sup>RD</sup> JULY 2008**

Comments were made about the poor acoustics in the Village Hall with members of the public finding it difficult to hear what Councillors were saying. It was agreed that the meetings be held in the Bramham Lounge for a trial period of three months commencing with the **next meeting on 4<sup>th</sup> September 2008**.

## **ADDRESS BY MRS HELEN LINK ON WOOD CARVING GROUP**

Helen Link explained that she had participated in several village wood carving groups and the aim of the Wood Carving Community Project in Sudbrooke would be to carve, over a period of 6 sessions, some interesting marker posts depicting wildlife which could be sited in the vicinity of the Millennium Stone. There would be no charge to residents taking part and it was hoped that the sessions could be held close to the Village Hall commencing in October 2008. A display/exhibition of what could be achieved would be on show at the Sports Day on 7<sup>th</sup> September.

The Parish Council agreed an initial funding of £600 for the project.

## **TREES ON GRASS VERGE – HOLME DRIVE –**

It was brought to the attention of the Parish Council that the trees in this vicinity were in need of cutting back. A request would be made to the Highways Department for them to arrange to do this.

## **PARISH PLAN**

Cllr Miss R Dobbs reported that a meeting had been held with the Principal Highways Officer who had informed those present that facts did not support the request for traffic lights at the junction of Wragby Road/ Scothern Lane, ie delay times in crossing the A158, fatality records, pedestrian use etc. There was no budgetary provision for a cycle path between Nettleham and Sudbrooke (this would cost in the region of £400,000).

# Sudbrooke Street Cleansing Review

At a recent street cleansing workshop attended by Councillor Paul Rignall, myself and the Clerk to the Parish Council; West Lindsey District Council advised they intended to change the way they delivered their services relating to cleanliness of parishes.

It was agreed they need to be more flexible and responsive, one way was to introduce a network of "Parish Champions" who could feed back information to their neighbourhood wardens regarding problems residents believe require attention. Full training in what is involved and the best way to make the new proposals work, will be given by WLDC.

The neighbourhood warden for the Sudbrooke area is Sarah Laverty and at the July Parish Council meeting I was appointed the "champion" for the parish of Sudbrooke. The work associated with street cleansing includes street sweeping, litter picking, dog bins, fly tipping, grass cutting, any minor road repairs and hedge / tree cutting where safety is an issue. The current schedule for street sweeping has been abandoned and West Lindsey have agreed to sweep areas that require attention on a more regular basis whereas those areas requiring less attention would be swept less often.

In addition to my walks around the village I would ask the residents of Sudbrooke to advise me of any issues relating to the above they feel needs attention; **I CANNOT GUARANTEE ALL ISSUES WILL BE ACTIONED QUICKLY** but I can pass them direct to Sarah, or via the Parish Council where appropriate, which should speed up the process.

I believe this is an opportunity to work more closely with West Lindsey District Council and the County Council which should really improve the appearance of our village **BUT I DO NEED YOUR HELP!**

Welcome to this month's Edition of Police News. I'd like to start this month's edition by sending out a reminder about the use of mini motorcycles, gopeds, etc, on public roads and in public areas. These areas also include public footpaths, etc. There has been a lot of media attention recently about this issue, and I think it is an important one that needs raising again, and people need to be aware of. In a nutshell if you take any motorised scooter, whether it is a mini motorcycle, a goped, or anything similar, onto a public road or into a public area then it falls into the same category as a normal moped or motorbike. That means you will need a license to ride it, you will need to have insurance for it and an MOT if required. You will also be required to wear a safety helmet, and have the vehicle taxed. It also comes under the same requirements as a normal moped or motorbike in relation to lights, etc. It must have proper working lights, front and rear, as well as fully working brakes, legal tyres, etc. They would also come under the Road Traffic Act, and therefore anyone found contravening the requirements can be prosecuted, as a moped or motorcycle rider would. You also run the risk of having the vehicle seized

and having to pay a hefty fine to get it back, or having it crushed!! The only place you can ride these vehicles in on private land, and with the permission of the landowner.

This month (August) sees the start of a new drive by officers at Nettleham police station to crack down on people who park cars that completely obstruct the footpaths. Many do it with the best of intentions by trying to keep the roads clear, but in doing so make it impossible for pedestrians to pass. For the more minor offences we will warn and advise motorists that their actions are illegal and request that vehicles are moved. For the more blatant offences, where drivers park cars knowing they completely block the footpath, there will be no warnings and £30 Fixed Penalty Ticket will be issued. We will of course try to be sympathetic to the needs of the community and businesses alike, and not take a zero tolerance approach, but there seems to be a noticeable increase in the number of offences being committed, which cannot be allowed to continue. This will continue for the foreseeable future.

Following a recent Neighbourhood Panel meeting Sudbrooke has been

added to the list of priorities for officers at Nettleham police Station. The concern centres on youths who are attending the village hall and Sudbrooke Park in cars and either trying to do wheel spins, handbrake turns, etc, which is damaging the surface, or are parking up and drinking alcohol. We are increasing patrols in the area for next two months to try and identify those responsible and to take whatever actions we feel are necessary. There have also been a number of reported problems at the Scout Camp too, with

youths entering the site without permission, and causing damage. This too has been added to our list of areas to monitor. We already have six names from a previous incident at the camp, and would ask that if you are aware of anyone attending the locations mentioned previously who shouldn't be to get in touch with us here at the Nettleham Neighbourhood Policing Team.

There will be a non profit making charge for the proposed transport scheme, to cover driver's costs.

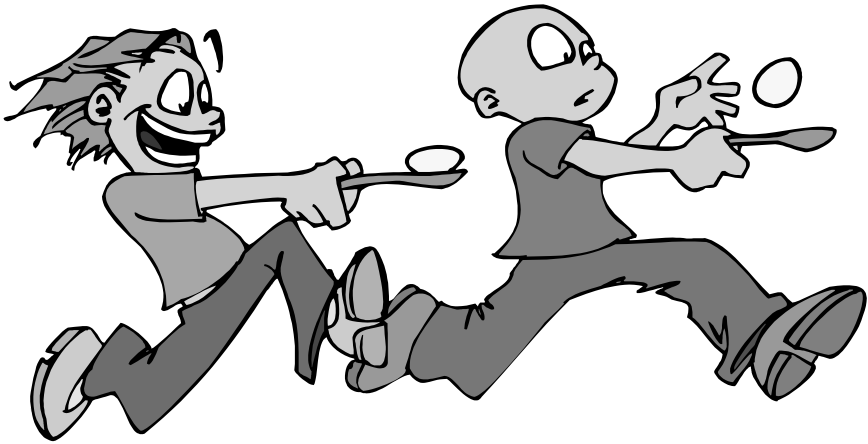

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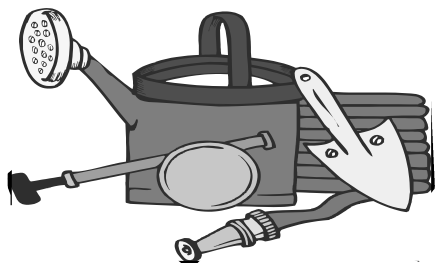
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## **SUDBROOKE GARDENING CLUB**

Reminder re: Open Access Xray times at Lincoln Hospital for patients to attend following a GP referral – Monday – Friday 8am – 9am and Mon, Tues, Wed and Friday 1 – 5pm.

In order to prevent a wasted journey or delays, patients who prefer to attend Lincoln Hospital blood clinics should first give their forms to receptionist for checking before leaving to ensure that all relevant information is recorded.

Reminder that Baby Clinics are now being held on a Monday afternoon be-

tween 1-3pm at the new SureStart building in the grounds of Williams Farr School. The clinics previously held at Welton Village Hall on a Thursday have now ceased. If parents are unable to attend at this time alternative arrangements can be made by contacting our Health Visiting Team direct on 01673 860543.

A record number of DNAs this month – 61 patients failed to cancel their booked appointments and we had notification of 8 non attenders at the hospital. This is particularly frustrating when we have complaints about lack of appointment availability or not being able to book easily. Recent statistics show our reception staff had 843 telephone calls on one day recently (Monday 7<sup>th</sup> July) which gives some indication of the volume of work we deal with. ## **SUDBROOKE PARISH PLAN**

The Parish Plan Group met on 15<sup>th</sup> July and matters covered included:

### **Traffic lights junction Wragby Rd and Scothern Lane.**

A site meeting took place on 30<sup>th</sup> June attended by Alan Brown (Area Highways Manager), Elle Baker Senior (Highways Officer), Martin Dickie, Derek Ordish and Mike Halliday. Mr. Brown explained that although the new policies had not yet been published, it was clear that the junction did not meet the entitlement criteria of waiting times, incident occurrences and pedestrian use. Whilst sympathetic to residents concerns, Mr Brown said the County Council would oppose installation of traffic lights even if the parish were to purchase them. Reluctantly we agreed to withdraw our request.

### **Sudbrooke Lane footpath and cycleway.**

This requirement is on the County Council's list of works but there is little prospect of funding given that only £175K has been provided for the whole of Lincolnshire. Sustrans (Paths for People) has provided advice on alternative funding methods which will be pursued.

**Nettleham Medical Practice.** Group members were keen to progress the request for a surgery in the village and wished to approach the Practice again. The Practice Manager had recently provided a definition of the word "housebound" for those people entitled to medicine delivery, "Those who due to their disabilities, either physical or psychological, are unable to leave their own home unaided.

A patient is not housebound if he or

she is able to leave their home environment with minimal assistance. For example unassisted/assisted visits to the doctor, dentist, hairdresser, supermarket, bingo or pub."

If you feel you have special circumstances you are asked to telephone the Practice on 751717 and ask to speak to Aileen Oldham or Mally Daubney.

Volunteers are needed please for the Patient Support Group-please contact Mike Halliday on 754686.

### **Increased access to Sudbrooke Park.**

Members agreed a draft letter to the principal landowner Somerville Park Ltd but thought other major landowners should be similarly contacted.

### **New clubs and activity groups:**

Walking- 3 walks so far, fairly well supported and thoroughly enjoyed by the walkers.

Tennis- disappointing lack of participation despite the enthusiasm of the Club Chairman and Secretary. New Age Curling- equipment available to organised groups in the village. It is also hoped to run a family event in the village hall soon.

Yoga and Keep Fit- sessions to start in the village hall in September. People who have expressed an interest will be contacted before the start date.

**The condition of footpaths** and adequacy of street lighting was under review by Group members.

**The remaining actions** from the action plan were considered.
