## **NOTES OF THE MEETING OF SUDBROOKE PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON THURSDAY 5<sup>TH</sup> JULY 2007 IN THE VILLAGE HALL, SUDBROOKE.**

### **33 PARISHIONERS ITEMS**

Reports were made by parishioners of many shrubs overhanging the footway which required cutting back. The Clerk was asked to write an article for Sudbrooke News requesting residents to cut back where necessary.

It was brought to the attention of the meeting that unauthorised metal detecting had taken place on the Sudbrooke 'Dig' currently being excavated in the field owned by Owen Day adjacent to the Sportsfield.

Accounts 2005/6 – A parishioner raised her objections to the additional cost of £193 on the parish incurred due to a resident raising queries to the Auditor about the accounts.

A resident reported that the dyke on Scothern Lane had been in-filled by some residents. The Highways Department would be asked to check that this had been carried out correctly.

Concern was expressed about the flooding of 40 Scothern Lane caused by the overflowing stream. It was agreed that the Drainage Board be asked to build up the bank in order to hold back the flow of water.

The Chairman stated that he had written to WLDC asking for costings of the WLDC marquee which had been sited at the Lincolnshire Show.

### **34 POLICE MATTERS**

PCSO Jackie Parker reported as follows:-

- There had been damage to 4 vehicles in the village and a prosecution was pending
- There had been 12 attempted break-ins to garages in Holme Drive – A person had been arrested for these offences.

Save for the above amendment the notes were signed as a correct record of the meeting.

### **36 REPORTS ON MATTERS OUTSTANDING**

**a) Parish Plan and Action Plan – update** - Councillor Mike Halliday reported that the Parish Plan Group had met on 19<sup>th</sup> June 2007 and approved the Group Constitution. Officers appointed were:

Copies of the Constitution were circulated to Council members who were invited to express their contentment at the next meeting.

A brief review of prioritised issues was made including the requirement for a permanent doctors surgery and prescription pick-up point. Group members Vicki Wells and Gill Preston were taking this forward along with enquiries about a new practice site. Mrs Myers to inform the practise manager accordingly.

Cllr. Halliday said the final accounts of the Steering Group had been prepared showing surplus funds of £311 plus advance hire of village hall £50. These amounts would be carried forward to the new Parish Plan Group.

**b) Sports day** – It is hoped to hold the Sports Day on 9<sup>th</sup> September 2007 between 2pm and 4pm. Cllr Mike Halliday had requested helpers through Sudbrooke News, giving 15<sup>th</sup> July as the deadline.

**c) Nettleham Medical Practice** - The Parish Council unanimously agreed that representatives from the Action Group pursue this and Vicky Wells and Gill Preston would arrange a meeting with the manager of the Medical Practice in order to discuss the need of what the Practice would like from the village. Once a framework was found they would report back to the Parish Plan Group and a discussion and consultation

would take place.

**d) Trees, Manor Drive** – The Highways Department had confirmed that they would be inspecting the trees and carrying out works as necessary.

**a) Area of land at end of Beresford Drive** – A letter from a parishioner highlighted this untidy area of ground. The Clerk was given authority to arrange the cutting back of the area at a cost not exceeding £100.

The Chairman was asked who was responsible for the removal of debris from the side of the stream which had been taken from the stream by the Drainage Board. The Clerk would make enquiries regarding this.

## **IT'S WHAT WE DO!**

A village hall is a valuable asset, and Sudbrooke Village Hall is no exception.

A lot of Sudbrooke residents worked hard to raise funds to provide this facility and the Village Hall Committee is there to make sure the hall remains an asset. Two long serving, hard working members of the committee recently retired, these posts had to be filled and were advertised.

The Committee meets about every six weeks to hear the Treasurer's report, take decisions on financing the hall, arranging maintenance, including repairs and replacements.

We last met on 4 September; a brief outline of items on the agenda:

- Vacant positions on the committee have been advertised. The applicants were discussed, proposed and appointed.
- A fund raising manager was interviewed, and appointed.
- Following the above, a resolution was agreed to change the name to the Sudbrooke Village Hall Management Committee and arrange new trustees.
- It was agreed that the blinds be fitted, a committee member would

arrange time to be there

- The refurbishing of the gutters was complete on the south side. As no builder approached had offered to quote on the job the refurbishment of the north side would continue in the same way. Thanks to the committee member for taking this on.
- Repairs to internal switches and locks had been carried out and the further vandalism in the toilets dealt with.
- Proposed a log be put in place for anyone using the hall to note items broken, missing, or incidents needing attention and reviewed weekly by a handyman on hours.
- Reports from club and group representatives.
- September bookings reported and bar requirements confirmed.
- Date of next meeting.

Dear Editor

I had the pleasure of my mother coming to visit me the other night and she kindly lent me her old copies of the Sudbrooke News, as it is nice to hear the news and developments of the village where I grew up.

I have had a special interest in the development of the Parish Plan, as I was one of the original volunteers who started working on the plan, until I moved out of the village due to work commitments. When I at last saw the final copy of the Parish Plan I was pleased to see that other residents of the village agreed that a cycle path between Sudbrooke and Nettleham was essential.

I would like to share my opinions, as someone who was once a younger member of the village, in response to Michael Gaisford's lack of support for the cycle track.

As a young child I remember cycling between Sudbrooke and Nettleham to visit friends, go to the 'News and Booze' corner shop to buy sweets etc. I can always remember the number of times over the years I had to stop, or

get off my bike for fear of being run over by inconsiderate motorists who didn't slow down. I can recall one incident when I was about 9 or 10 years old when I was cycling past the church heading toward Nettleham around the first sharp bend, when a car came around the corner so quickly he managed to hit my friend's handle bars and he fell off his bike. A few years later I was nannying for a family in Sudbrooke and I remember having to stop every time a car came past as I had a young toddler on the back of the bike. I was aware even then that residents had been trying to access funding and planning permission to build a cycle path.

In August this year the theme of National Play Day was 'Our Streets Too' - part of Play England's National Campaign to raise awareness for children playing on the streets and that they should be safe in doing so (especially in a rural area!). Currently the Government has released a consultation called 'Staying Safe', the aim of which is to see how people can work together to protect our children. The Sudbrooke Parish Plan supports the residents' views, which includes not just parents'/carers' views on their

child's safety while on the roads, but also the fact that younger residents want to play safely in their area too, which includes cycling to other villages. This is backed up by Lincolnshire County Council's Play Strategy 'Making Play Matter in Lincolnshire', which states 'Ensuring that play provision and other play opportunities are safe'.

Why should the play opportunities of Sudbrooke's younger residents be restricted, due to more traffic on the road, when the option of a cycle track could be built, especially when there are strategic plans that support the

case and when people have expressed the opinion that they would like one?

If there was a cycle path between Sudbrooke and Nettleham parents/ carers would feel safer letting their children cycle on their own and children and young people would feel safer when cycling to meet or play with their friends.

Dear Editor

Since you have used your Editor's privilege to append a somewhat critical Note to my letter in the September issue, I trust you will now give me the opportunity to reply.

I am not certain what point it is that you think you are missing: there were two main points in my letter, firstly, that in my opinion the Sudbrooke/ Nettleham lane is perfectly safe as it is

– provided, of course, that it is used with the same care and attention that is required on any public highway. My second point was that the problem of car drivers, and especially motorcyclists, using Scothern Lane like a racetrack would not be solved by erecting additional speed limit signs, but required the offenders to be caught and effectively punished. (Having taken the matter up myself with the police on several occasions, with no results, I felt that the views of

the Parish Council might carry more weight than mine.)

As to whether the 'racetrack' comment applies equally to the Sudbrooke/ Nettleham lane, the answer is I simply do not know: in all the twenty-odd years I have been using this lane I have never yet witnessed any example of excessive speed or dangerous driving . . . which is not, of course, to say that it does not exist. Nor, to the best of my knowledge, have there been any accidents on this stretch of road, though some of your readers may well be better informed, and if so I hope they will contribute to this debate. In any case, I do not believe that a cycle track is the solution – any more than it would be for the Scothern Lane problem.

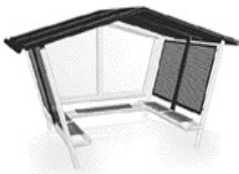
I think we would do well to avoid emotionally-loaded questions such as 'what is the value of a child's life?' And why a child: do not the lives of

the rest of us have a value too? But since you have asked the question, perhaps you can answer it: where would **you** draw the line on expenditure on something which **might** - not **would** – save a child's life? Should you be unable to answer that, except by suggesting that half a million pounds is a fair price to pay on the off-chance that it **might** save a life, I would suggest that the same amount, or indeed much less, spent on catching and disqualifying the dangerous drivers would be far more likely to save lives.

Finally, the tenor of your Note seems to suggest that those who do not support the cycle track proposal are willing to risk a child's life rather than spend half a million pounds on a cycle track. If that is your view, you are of course entitled to it, but it is illogical, unjustified, and untenable.

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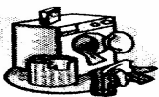

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# **COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S CORNER**

## **Assemblies and Floods**

The phrase 'the eternal Hills' was once taken as a literal description of a landscape feature. Today, we understand that not just hills but continents are constantly changing. The local government landscape is not any more fixed than the geographical one and so it won't be a surprise that it too is also changing. However, the changes don't generally make it into the press. Readers of this column may recall that I have made mention of the Regional Assembly. Most people have never heard of it and so won't miss its absence. It is going non the less. But it is being replaced with changed membership and changed responsibilities. Government have appointed a minister for the East Midlands and Gillian Merron will liaise with this new regional grouping. However the details of all of this are still being worked out.

The indirect influence of individual councillors, both county and district will change with this regional change. The priorities for government spending, and maybe even the amounts of spending in the region, will be influenced by the new group. Who does the influencing and from which council will change and with it the input from your councillors. I will try to keep News readers abreast of developments.

Mention of county and district brings me to an area of joint activity, learning from the recent flooding events and liaising and with other agencies. There were many instances of highways being flooded and these are all being checked out. Many times it

appeared to the uninitiated that this was due to blocked highway drains. Investigation shows that this was not so in most cases. It was not the drains themselves that were at fault but the system into which they fed. So much so that in quite a few cases, water was flowing back out of the drains from somewhere higher up. The unfortunate fact is that in the vast bulk of these cases, the county council, as highway authority, is not responsible for the drainage into which their road drains flow.

It is also apparent that the objectives of the different public authorities are not the same and this affects the way they approach flooding events. Internal Drainage Boards are primarily concerned with the drainage of agricultural land. They want to get the water away as quickly as possible. The Environmental Agency has a much more complex set of responsibilities for water and environment quality as well as flood alleviation. But many drainage schemes use Anglian Water's sewerage system to carry away storm water, and these systems can become overloaded with exception rainfall. This can and sometimes does mean that the backflow from road drains can contain raw sewerage. Of course in extreme cases the household foul drains are forced backwards and sewerage flows into the house from the toilet bowl. So called riparian owners (that is the people who own land either side of a water course) can affect the overall drainage of an area by the way that they do, and do not, maintain the watercourse itself. Most roadside ditches (dykes) are not a part of the highway itself but in fact belong to the

landowner who fronts the road. If the land owner has no agricultural need to maintain a particular channel, it will more than likely be neglected. This disparate drainage responsibility has no overall co-ordination. This is a

national, not a local issue, and needs influence at government level. Which is where I started!
