

VICAR'S LETTER

With the departure of Rev. Stuart Darlison, the Lawres Deanery plan for the future has begun to swing slowly into action. Technically, the Benefice of Welton, Dunholme and Scothern is in inter-regnum and the Church Warden and the PCC have responsibility for the running of the Parish – in conjunction with the Rural Dean and Archdeacon

The Deanery plan is:

- (1) In the Short Term: Instead of appointing a new incumbent to the Benefice, a House for Duty or Part Time post will be established for Welton and Dunholme. I have taken on "oversight" of Scothern.
- (2) In the Longer Term :- I will not be replaced and Welton will come under an incumbent living at Hackthorn (who will also have the Owmby and Springline groups of churches), while Dunholme will be the responsibility of the incumbent at Nettleham. Scothern, as well as the Barlings Benefice of Parishes (St.Edward Sudbrooke, St,Edward Barlings, St.Hugh Langworth, and St.John the Baptist Stainton by Langworth), will come under the incumbent of the South Lawres Group based in Cherry Willingham.
- "Oversight" is a term and practice becoming more widely used in modern times – albeit no one has provided a neat encompassing definition. The vision, as I try and evolve it with the adjoining parish, includes aspects such as:-

- (1) Acting, to borrow a term used of Royal Navy Chaplains, as "Friend and Adviser to all on Board."
- (2) Exercising an "episcopal" role. The New Testament Greek word 'episkopos' is often translated as 'bishop', but, when we break it dow, its components are 'skopos' meaning "watcher" and "epi" meaning "over". Hence, "someone who watches over" an 'oversight' role
- (3) Helping with co-ordination.
- (4) Helping-out where needed and practicable.

As I write, the last two Sundays have been Pentecost and Trinity Sunday – the Festivals of the falling of the Holy Spirit (effectively the Church's birth) and the praising and contemplating of God as three persons in one unity. Any simplistic explanation or definition of the Trinity always runs the risk of being technically heretical to some degree, but some I have found helpful are:-

- (1) Irenaus in the 3rd Century as to the functions of the Three Persons:-
- a. "the Spirit prepares man for the Son of God; the Son leads man to the Father; the Father gives man immortality ... The Spirit works, the Son fulfils his ministry, the Father approves."
- b. "the Spirit supplies knowledge of the truth and has made known the ways of the Father and the Son towards man."

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VICAR'S LETTER Cont'd.....

- c. "the Father decides and commands; the Son carries out the Father's plan; the Spirit supports and hastens the process."
- 2. Prudentius in the 4th Century, by way of a definition of God as Three persons in One: "God is three Supremes, threefold in person, one living power" (for the classicists among you: "Est tria summa Deus,trinum specimen,vigor unus."

At the recent Archdeacon's Visitation in Corringham, the service included a prayer that I thought people might find helpful to use in this post-Pentecost time:-

"God of power, May the boldness of your Spirit transform us. May the gentleness of your Spirit lead us.

May the gifts of your Spirit equip us, to serve and worship you, Now and always. Amen."

On a lighter note, all writers and editors are conscious of the ability of 'bloopers' (mal-chosen phraseology) to creep into contributions in magazines, and a couple I noticed recently were:-

- (1) "Ten new choir robes are currently needed, due to the addition of several new members and to the deterioration of some of the older ones."
- (2) "This afternoon there will be a service in the south and north ends of the church. Children will be baptized at both ends."

157 PARISHIONERS ITEMS

A request had been received from a parishioner for the dog bin, currently sited on the corner of Church Lane, to be moved away from the junction in order to provide better visibility at the junction. A request would be made to the District Council for it to be moved.

Vandalism had occurred to the railings on the stream on Scothern Lane. The Highways Department had been notified.

158 POLICE MATTERS

PC M Lassmans reported that the last month had been relatively quiet regarding crime in Sudbrooke with only 2 reported matters. PC Lassmans reported that it appeared that the most crime in the village occurred on a Tuesday evening/Wednesday morning.

159 ADDRESS BY MR CRAIG SPENCE, LINDUM HERITAGE

Mr Spence informed the meeting of the a) Parish Plan - Councillor Mike

proposed Archaeology Festival to be held in Sudbrooke on 19th July 2008 which would be held in conjunction with the excavation/dig in the field below the sportsfield on Scothern Lane. Mr Spence sated that there would be site tours of the Dig. demonstrations, children's activities and that there would be no charge to the public.

The Parish Council welcomed this event and thanked Mr Spence for attending.

169 CHAIRMANS COMMENTS

The Chairman commented that he had attended a Public Meeting at Fiskerton to discuss the increase in council tax but had been disappointed that only 30 persons had been in attendance.

170 CORRESPONDENCE

Letter from resident concerned about the cost of the new footbridge crossing the stream on West Drive. The comments of the Footpaths Section of the County Council had been sought and the reply had been as follows:

The surface of all rights of way are the responsibility of the local authority. Bridges crossing a public footpath are the responsibility of the County Council. A Public Footpath can only be moved by a legal process and will remain on the Definitive Map. People cannot be made to walk where there is not a legal right of way.

The new West Drive bridge was paid for through the Capital Bridge Scheme and was required to be a sturdy structure due to the previous wooden structure being vandalised on many occasions. This bridge is considered by the County Council as a long term investment and by the nature of its construction should last many years.'

Copy of a letter from Scothern Parish Council with a suggestion that a First Responders Group be started in Scothern/Sudbrooke. Following discussion when it transpired that the Ladies Club had investigated this possibility some time ago and had raised funds, finally donating the monies direct to LIVES, it was agreed to suggest to Scothern PC that it may be possible for any volunteers from either Scothern, Sudbrooke or Langworth to join with Nettleham LIVES group.

Further information can be obtained from the Parish Clerk, Mrs Chris Myers on 823802 or the Chairman Martin Dickie on 754342.

The Chairman reported with regret the death of Charles Ireland, former District and County Councillor for Sudbrooke.

Tennis Club – A good interest has been shown in starting up the Tennis Club.

Re-surfacing under/around the play equipment, Village Hall site – A further quotation had been obtained and the Clerk would now look into seeking grants for the work.

Litter Pick – A wonderful response to the recent litter pick both in regards to volunteers and rubbish picked up. A special thank you was made to Mrs Sheila Offord who had provided refreshments to the volunteers.

Date of next meeting – Thursday 5th June 2008 – 7.30pm – Village Hall.

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THIRTEEN EXCUSES FOR NOT JOINING THE PARISH COUNCIL

1. "I'm too young."

If you are eighteen* (the age limit dropped from 21 to 18 with effect from 2nd May 2007) you are old enough (and see point 5 below.)

- 2. "What's the point of just joining a talking shop, they don't do anything." Have you ever been to a meeting? Basing your judgement on watching 'The Vicar of Dibley' is definitely not valid.
- 3. "I haven't got any planning applications in at the moment."

 Putting in for planning has got nothing to do with sitting on the council, whatever may have happened years ago. In fact, if your own application is discussed by the council, you must leave the room.
- 4. "I'm too busy, and couldn't commit to attending every single meeting".

 Meetings are rarely more frequent than one evening a month, and missing the occasional one is acceptable. Most meetings only take a couple of hours.
- 5. "I'm concentrating on finding a job or furthering my career."

 Being a local councillor is a definite plus point to add to a CV it shows you can make decisions, work in a team, are community minded and proactive.

 Prospective employers will be impressed.
- 6. "I haven't lived here very long and don't know the area well."

 If you have lived or worked in the parish for a year, you are eligible. Your views as an 'incomer' should be welcomed, as you will probably see things more objectively.
- 7. "I'm worried that I won't get many votes, and look silly." Even if you are not voted on this time, you may well be approached if a vacancy occurs in the future and have to opportunity to be co-opted to the council.
- 8. "Our parish council is full of old fogeys." Join up and change it then.
- 9. "I'd look a fool because I won't know what's going on."

 You will be eased in gently; there is help, advice and more formal training available. The clerk is the officer to the council, and he or she is the one who will explain the rules.
- 10. "I'll have to sign that code of conduct thing that the press keep on about."

 The code of conduct is nowhere near as onerous as made out in the press and is there to protect you ie. the code stops situations like the planning one above.

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THIRTEEN EXCUSES FOR NOT JOINING THE PARISH COUNCIL

- 11. "I'll have to let everyone know all about my business and personal affairs." The declaration of interest asks you to declare business interests within the parish area, to guard against bias when parish issues are debated. As for personal affairs, get real, everyone knows about those already!
- 12. "I'm too lazy, and not interested in my community." An excellent reason for not joining.
- 13. "I prefer to let others do the work, and then criticize from the sidelines afterwards".

Also a valid reason for not joining, but do bear in mind, that expounding your views in the pub, rather than the council chamber, will not change a thing in your parish and if you can't be bothered, does that mean it's fair game to criticize those who do make the effort?

NEW OPENING HOURS

Over the last few months each library within Lincolnshire Library Service has had its opening hours reviewed. As a result, opening times have been organised to deliver a more even spread of services.

Opening times have been designed around groups of local libraries. Nettleham Library is grouped with Lincoln Central, Welton, Cherry Willingham and Ermine libraries that together offer a complementary range of hours across morning, afternoon and evening. Overall, the changes give users 2.5 hours more access across this group of libraries than previously.

As a result of the opening hours review, as of the 1st May Nettleham Library's opening hours have changed to:

Tuesday 10.00- 1pm Wednesday 2 - 7pm Friday 2 - 7pm Sat 10.00 - 1pm

Our service will be complemented by visits to the village from the mobile library service. At time of writing, details of the mobile van visits (dates, times and stops) are not known, but we will advertise this information as soon as possible.

SUDBROOKE PARISH PLAN

An update of the Parish Plan Actions for end of year 2007-2008

It is now just over a year since the issues which were raised by Parishioners were included in the 'Sudbrooke Parish Plan'. A public meeting was held on 20th April 2007 when all issues identified were prioritised by attendees.

A Parish Plan Group was then formed to ensure the actions outlined in the Action Plan were implemented.

Thirteen Priorities were identified and then assessed as needing short, medium or long term actions. The remaining 'other issues' were included in the 'Non-prioritised' section of the plan.

Summary of actions taken to date for the top 13 priorities

- Majority of residents do not want housing development: this has been referred to the Local Development Plan
- Issues with the quality and sufficiency of our police services: The Lincolnshire Police Authority has provided assurance to residents that Sudbrooke will continue to be patrolled on a regular basis. Contacts have been provided for any policing problems.
- Busy time traffic lights needed at the junction of Scothern Lane with Wragby Road: we continue to liaise with the County Council regarding the policies around the criteria used for assessing entitlement.
- A permanent doctors surgery is needed in Sudbrooke: we have been in

- communication with Nettleham Medical Practice and it is very unlikely that we will get a doctors surgery in Sudbrooke. However to ensure that we are able to influence the way the Practice runs we need a Parishioner to attend the 'Patient Support Group' meeting which is held bi-monthly, if you are interested please contact Mike Halliday on 754686.
- A prescription pick-up point is required in Sudbrooke: this has been explored and is currently not a viable option for the village, however people who are 'housebound' are able to have their prescriptions delivered.
- Increase bus services over longer hours: we have communicated with PC coaches and are awaiting their response
- Introduce a footpath/cycleway between Sudbrooke and Nettleham on Sudbrooke Lane: The County Council are not currently able to fund this work. Other solutions are being investigated.
- Provide recreational facilities for teenagers: we have held an open evening which was not well attended by teenagers. We have purchased two sets of 'New Age Kurls' which are available to people using the village hall and a tennis club is very soon to be up and running. Monthly country walks have started.
- Provide an outdoor sheltered meeting place for teenagers: despite articles in the Parish Magazine and an open evening, we have not had any further interest from teenagers in this proposal, the priority has therefore been dropped.
- More use required of the village

hall and bar for social gatherings: the village hall is run by a new committee and is occupied most evenings for various events. We are in the process of piloting a 'keep fit class' to assess the commitment of people.

- Increase access to Sudbrooke Park and improve as an amenity area: Permission from the landowner is being sought.
- Campaign against litter and rubbish dumping needed:we continue to have local support for regular 'litter picks'.
- The landscape and wildlife in the Parish are very important to us and should be safeguarded and protected: the Sudbrooke Conservation Committee will provide guidance. Object to gas storage proposals: formal objections have been made; the Parish Council maintain a watching brief.

Non prioritised actions

We reviewed these issues at our meeting held on April 21st 2008 and are taking several actions including a

survey of street lighting and pavements. Several other actions have been taken which have resulted in benefits for everyone living in Sudbrooke.

It is proposed to post the full action plans, which are updated at every meeting, onto a Parish Plan website. More information in the next issue of Sudbrooke News.



COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S CORNER

What's Past, the Present and the Future

The recent election for West Lindsey probably deserves brief comment. The ongoing issue of the police' 80% increase was a part of the election debate. We still await the government's response to this, which

is now thought to be likely to be in June. The campaign is over, but it may just be worth restating that neither I, nor my party group, supported the magnitude of the rise in the police element of the council tax demands. West Lindsey is obliged to collect the tax on behalf of the other precepting authorities and the only

vote is over council officer's plans and figures to do this. Such a vote carries no comment, let alone endorsement, of the other authorities' actions.

Moving to wider issues, The East Midlands remains the only English Region not to have agreed alternative arrangements for liaising with the Government Office for the East Midlands (GOEM) after the demise of the Regional Assembly. There are Unitary Councils, County Councils as well as District Councils in the Region and there is a gulf between them over this issue. Lincolnshire, by contrast, has as good or better relations between its County and District Councils as anywhere and it is very frustrating that problems elsewhere are letting down the whole region in the eyes of the government. You may take some small comfort in the fact that Lincolnshire is better than its neighbours in at least one respect.

We are also now doing comparatively well as a county in our recycling efforts overall. However, we are still playing catch up in our residual waste disposal arrangements compared to most areas nearby, but the situation is improving. A combined heat and power, energy from waste plant will be a crucial element in the strategy to improve our performance, but it is likely to be a controversial issue. It is of course, perfectly reasonable to be opposed to such a development, but if the objection is on the grounds of the emissions, logic and consistency should mean a similar objection to any other thermal energy plant. The emissions from the proposed new facility will be less polluting than that from exiting power stations (or local

barbeques for that matter!). The fuel is waste that it is not practical to recycle and that would otherwise go into landfill. The ash produced can eventually be incorporated into building products which would reuse virtually all of the material collected, but this is subject to the economics of doing it in practice. It is hoped that the electricity and heat can be used by businesses nearby the new plant. All in all, quite an exciting development.

Is learning about all this as your representative, I have been getting more information on some science from my school days. I used to think that there were just three states of matter, gases, liquids and solids. In fact there is a fourth state when, at very high temperatures, chemical compounds and molecules no longer exist. At such temperatures, only individual atoms of the elements are possible. A waste treatment system operating at these temperatures would be pollution free and small scale plants do exist. However, industrial scale units are probably more then one decade away and what we plan is currently the only practical technology available.

Of course, at the temperatures of the big bang at the creation of the universe, atoms degenerate and we are in the realms of quarks, particle physics and lots more energy than matter. This could perhaps be considered to be a fifth state of matter! But if we try to treat waste in this way, we might find we didn't have a human race or even a planet, so I think I will call a halt at this point.

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
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
