

VICAR'S LETTER

November 8th is Remembrance Sunday this year and wreaths will be laid at the three services listed in the Church Diary – perhaps especially poignant given the continuing deaths reported from Afghanistan.

Some of you will remember the Revd. Kenneth Jardin who was incumbent here from the late 1970's through to the mid-1980's. I am sorry to say that he died on the 6th October.

A new season of HC4U the Communion Club at Ellison Boulters School for years 5 and 6 begins on Thursday 12th November – leading to a Certificate of Admission to Holy Communion presented by the Bishop of Grimsby in July 2010.

We know that Moslems have a pattern of prayer during the day. So do Christians – if they care to use it. It is based on the ancient Daily Office developed by monks in monasteries and refined by St. Benedict (480-550 AD). The original pattern comprises:-

Matins - In the middle of the night or before retiring.

Lauds - After Matins or in

- Around 6 a.m.

the early morning Prime (first hour)

Terce (third hour) - Around 9 a.m.
Sext (sixth hour) - Around 12 Noon
None (ninth hour) - Around 3 p.m.

Vespers - Before Dark Compline - Before retiring.

The pattern can be adapted to suit a person's daily schedules, if the full programme seems tough to keep on a regu-

lar basis. The important practice is to find a regular pattern of times to 'pause and pray'. Books to help are still published (with content for each short time) such as "The Divine Hours" (Pocket Edition) by Phyllis Tickle (2007 from Oxford University Press). This small pocket edition contains material for each day of a week divided into 'modern' language terminology and recommended brackets of times of :- Midnight / Night Watch / Dawn / Morning Office / Midday Office / Vespers / Compline. It is possible to pick three times and start with them, and then see if more are possible depending on circumstances - a regular pattern of Pausing and Praying is the aim.

Some people are often puzzled why some prayers in services are called "Collects". There is one for each Sunday of the year and for other days (e.g. Saints days) and purposes (e.g. the Collect for Purity). They are so named simply because the prayer "collects" the thoughts of the worshippers into one statement at appropriate points in the service. They are not just random prayers, but have a specific structure.

A rather nice, perhaps unfortunately phrased, notice I spotted in a church magazine was: "Ladies, don't forget the rummage sale. It is a good opportunity to get rid of those things not worth keeping around the house. Bring your Husbands."


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PARISH COUNCIL MINUTES

NOTES OF THE MEETING OF SUDBROOOKE PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON THURSDAY 3RD SEPTEMBER 2009 IN THE VILLAGE HALL, SUDBROOKE

PRESENT: Councillors Miss R Dobbs (Chair Person), N James, M Dickie, B Bartram, P Rignall, Mrs L Etheridge, S Curtis, County Councillor Mrs S Rawlins, PC D Morgan, Mrs C Myers (Clerk), Mrs B Solly (Treasurer), 3 members of the public

APOLOGIES: Councillor I Russell

Councillor Miss R Dobbs welcomed to the meeting County Councillor Sue Rawlins and PC Dave Morgan.

52 PARISHIONERS ITEMS

A report had been received about the poor condition of the footpath along Scothern Lane from St Edward's Drive and past the Millennium stone. This had been reported to the Highways Department for their attention by the Clerk.

Reports of pot holes around the double bends on Scothern Lane were reported. These would be referred to the Highways Department for in-filling.

53 POLICE MATTERS

PC Dave Morgan stated that he was following up enquiries about the breaking of a window at the Village Hall and he was hopeful that the culprit would be paying for the damage.

54 COUNTY COUNCILLORS REPORT

CC Mrs Sue Rawlins stated that she

was hoping to continue with the Welton Area Cluster Meetings commenced by her predecessor, the next meeting being 19th September 2009 at Welton Village Hall.

CC Mrs Rawlins had pursued the completion of the lighting in the area of the bus shelter on Wragby Road on behalf of the Parish Council but noted that it was only a light to the bus shelter and not a footway light which had been installed and this did not particularly help the bus drivers to see persons waiting at the bus stop. CC Mrs Rawlins would investigate the matter further.

55 DISTRICT COUNCILLORS REPORT

DC Curtis stated that the triple bin collection was due to commence during the next two weeks.

56 NOTES OF MEETING HELD ON 2ND **JULY 2009** – These were signed as a correct record.

57 REPORTS OF MATTERS OUTSTANDING

- a) **Highway matters** Agreement was made that this be an agenda item for each meeting.
- b) Parish Plan update /Allotments Over 20 expressions of interest in taking on an allotment had been received by the Parish Council. The Parish Council considered the matter and agreed that although the preliminary discussions had been commenced by the Parish Plan Group, due to the involvement of a lease/purchase of land/ finance it was now necessary that the Parish Council

continue the control of the item in order to move forward.

The Clerk was asked to liaise with Scothern Parish Council Clerk, WLDC and local landowners with a view to securing some land to share with Scothern Parish Council for allotment use.

c) Street lights – Church Lane – The County Council street lighting department had stated that replacement of the street lights around the church to the heritage type lamps would be in the region of £2000 per lamp and the cost would be required to be borne by the Parish Council. It was felt this was a preliminary enquiry and would not be pursued further at present.

58 SHRUB TRIMMING/ MAINTENANCE

- a) Northfield Park Cutting back had been required due to branches overhanging in the children's play area and retrospective approval was given for this work.
- b) Shrubbed area near to Millennium Stone and near to bridge on Scothern Lane Consideration was given for cutting back both areas, particularly to the darkness/safety aspect. Cllrs M Dickie and B Bartram agreed to prepare a specification in order that quotations could be sought.
- c) Village Hall thinning of trees to front It was considered that thinning was required to some of the trees fronting the Village Hall in order to provide more visibility to the Hall from Scothern Lane for security reasons. It was agreed that Cllr I Russell be consulted on this matter.
- d) Trees requiring replacement -

Northfield Park – It was noted some of the previously planted trees had not survived and approximately five replacements were required. Cllr Bernard Bartram would consult with Cllr Ian Russell regarding the species required.

59 WOOD CARVING PROJECT

- a) Suggestion of plaque to be placed near to wood carvings This matter was discussed and it was felt that a plaque placed on the ground may cause additional problems i.e. vandalism and problems for the grass cutting contractors. A possibility was that a plaque could be mounted in the Village Hall to state the history of the carvings. Councillors were asked to give this some thought for the next meeting.
- b) Crapping posts to afford weather protection The Chair Person suspended standing orders and invited Helen Link to participate in the discussions regarding this. Mrs Link had sought costs for the caps in the form of stainless steel with various prices varying from £10 to £34 each.

Cllr Paul Rignall agreed to investigate the possibility of him making some caps and he would liaise with Mrs Link.

60 PURCHASE OF SPRING FLOWERING BULBS

Resolved that expenditure be made of approximately £50 for snowdrops and crocus bulbs.

61 CHRISTMAS TREE EVENT

The event will be held on Sunday 29th November 2009.

PARISH COUNCIL MINUTES Cont'd

The Chair Person suspended Standing Orders in order to allow Mr Roger Adams to speak on this subject.

Mr Adams informed the meeting that some new bulbs and a transformer were required and at this point he was unable to give any indication of the cost. It was agreed that these were essential items and that they be purchased when available.

A preliminary meeting will be held for those organising the event on 12th October 2009.

It was agreed that the sum of £200 be advanced to Mrs C Wright and Mrs S Harvey for the provision of items/food for the event.

62 LITTER PICK

Arranged for Saturday 10th October 2009.

63 FLYPOSTING IN VILLAGE

It was brought to the attention of the Parish Council that posters/balloons are being fixed to lamp posts/trees around the village, obviously to advertise events or special occasions/birthdays/anniversaries. Whilst the Parish Council had no objections to this the Clerk was asked to insert a note in the Sudbrooke News requesting that residents who do put up these posters/balloons etc please remove them after the event.

64 SPORTSFIELD REPORT

Condition of hedge to front of sports field, Scothern Lane – Some removal of brambles had taken place by the grass cutting contractors to the front of the

sports field on Scothern Lane which had resulted in most of the hedge being pulled out. The Clerk was asked to contact the owner, Mr P Truelove, and seek his views on replacement.

65 SUDBROOKE NEWS - Change of Printer

A competitive price had been received from an alternative printer allowing for delivery direct to the Editors house. The printer had also guaranteed the price for a year for 10 issues. Following consultations during August the printing of the magazine had been carried out by the new printer and was very satisfactory.

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PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Report of Parish Council meeting held on Thursday 1st October 2009
Present:- 5 Parish Councillors, the Clerk, Treasurer, PC Dave Morgan and 2 members of the public.

<u>Police Matters</u> - PC Dave Morgan reported that the person who had broken the window at the Village Hall had agreed to pay for the damage.

<u>Allotments</u> – Several local landowners had been approached with a view to obtaining land for allotments but were either unable or unwilling to release some land for allotments. Discussions would continue with WLDC and Scothern Parish Council with a view to finding some suitable land.

Shrub trimming - Approval was given of a quotation for the trimming and tidying of the shrubs and trees near to the Millennium stone and around the bridge at the junction of Holme Drive. Quotations will be sought for the thinning of the trees fronting the Village Hall in order to make clearer the visibility around Hall.

Bulbs – Crocus and snowdrop bulbs have been purchased for planting around the village for spring flowering. *Helpers required for planting please – contact Bernard Bartram on 754798.*

<u>Village Hall Security Lighting</u> – The Parish Council contributed £400 to the Village Hall Management Committee towards the security lighting recently installed.

<u>Christmas Tree Event</u> – This will be held on Sunday 29th November commencing at 3.45pm at the tree. If wet the event will be held at the Village Hall.



NETTLEHAM MEDICAL PRACTICE - PRESCRIPTION ORDERS + THE 48 HOUR TURNAROUND

In recent weeks a growing number of people have requested repeat or other prescription medication to be ready the same

day or the following morning. While we endeavour to meet the needs of people in emergency situations we do request that this be the exception rather than the rule. The 48 hour turn-around takes into account the full process of issuing prescriptions correctly, which often involves checking medication records or even email contact with the relevant GP, and also enough time for the prescription (which will be one of several hundred) to be signed by the GP in between surgeries, home visits and the many other tasks of today's General Practitioner. We have established that for this process to work efficiently and safely, we require the full 48 hours.

Your consideration of this would be very much appreciated.

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

At Scampton Village Churchyard, together with

numerous graves of allied airmen there are about ten or so graves of young German airmen...

By virtue of the fact that they are dated at three or four different times and several at

each time, it would appear as though they were the crews of bomber aircraft. The fact that they are buried there would make it seem obvious that they must have died, probably shot down, locally.

What I would like to know is what they were doing so close to this village? It is

annoying that I know more about enemy action in the last war in the rest of Europe, thanks to books and TV, than I know about what happened in my own backyard, so to speak.(or over it at least). Is there any local historian or resident who knows of air raids in this area? Was Lincoln bombed? Were the airfields nearby subject to raids? If so ,during the day or night? What if any was the damage caused to life or property? It is very likely that enemy planes actually flew over our village.

Another question I would like answered is, what happened if you were the owner of buildings or property that were demolished or damaged by enemy action during the war? .Was there any compensation paid by the government? Insurance companies include in their policies that they will not pay out for damage caused by enemy action during time of war. So

was the cost solely borne by the owner of the properties?

If anyone knows or can find out (I don't even know where to start looking) I am sure that it would be of interest to other readers of the Parish . If you can help, please e-mail or write to Sudbrooke News and share your knowledge of what is ,after all, our history and fast vanishing from memory. Anyone who has not visited the churchyard in Scampton village will find it very moving and I recommend a trip theretake a large handker-

chief!

This event does involve allot of preparation, from checking that the bulbs in the lights are all working on the tree, erecting the marquee, buying in the mulled wine and chopping the fruit to go in it, making mince pies (and they are home made on the morning), decorating cakes...... the list goes on – but it is fun and for the enjoyment of all the village so -

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With Bonfire night on the way I thought it would be an opportune time to mention again (and make no apologies that it is the same as last year) the legislation in relation to fireworks.

- The fireworks the Act makes it an offence to throw or set fire to a firework in the street and also makes it an offence to make a bonfire in the street to the obstruction, annoyance or danger of residents.
- Section 80 of the Explosives Act 1875 also makes it an offence to throw or cast a firework in a street or public place. The Highways Act of 1980 also covers the discharging of any firework within fifty feet of the centre of a highway.
- We now use the Firework Regulations 2004 Act. This prohibits any person under the age of 18 from simply possessing any firework in a public place except what the act calls a category 1 indoor fireworks such as party poppers or sparklers.

- This act also allows Officers to issue fixed penalty tickets for offences such as Throwing Fireworks.
- For this offence the Police can now issue an £80 Fixed Penalty Ticket, which has to be paid with 21 days. Failure to pay would mean a summons and ultimately a court case.

Just remember that fireworks themselves can be dangerous and cause annoyance and fear to many of our residents and pets. No one wants to stop people enjoying fireworks in safety in their back garden, but use them sensibly.

I would also like to give timely reminder also, not to let your youngsters go out of your house with eggs and flour or the shops to sell these products to the youths in the village with Mischievous night not to far away. Also be aware of where your child/children are going and with whom they are going around with.

Now the dark nights are drawing in can I remind parents to make sure that their children have lights for their bikes and that they wear either something reflective or something bright to make sure that they can be seen in the dark. I regularly drive around in the evenings and early mornings to see paperboys/girls zig zagging across the road delivering papers. The lamplight is simply just not enough to make sure your child is seen. Adults please also remember that you need to be seen too!

If there are any schools or clubs which would like to borrow reflective vests for the children to wear if they are out and about on an organised activity we have 50 children's vests and 6 adult ones here at Nettleham Station. You can telephone us on 07944 776 801 and if no one else has booked them for that time, you are welcome to borrow them at no cost.

Please remember when reporting a crime please report them directly to Lincolnshire Police on 01522 882222 where your crime will be recorded by a dedicated call-taker.

Population is 68 residents ...Main crops are wheat ,barley and oats ...Area of 1000 acres ...Children of the parish attend Scothern school funded by the will of Richard Ellison Esq... Lord of the Manor is C.C.Sibthorpe Esq.. who is also the principle landowner...The village has a Norman Style Church with one bell...The church register dates from the year 1700 ...The living is a rectory and an annual sum of £182...The church was rebuilt in 1862 as a memorial to the late Richard Ellison who bequeathed the sum of £2000 for that purpose ...Transport to Lincoln is provided by horse carrier on Tuesdays and Fridays.

Am I reading correctly ...Population 68 residentsMy, how we have grown !!!! ...It would be interesting to know what it is in 2009 ...Anybody know?

Editors note: The last electoral roll lists 1420 persons entitled to vote but no record of population is available.

Issue No 97 dated November 1985

This months edition announced that after many months of lobbying by our parish council a bus service would be provided at a charge of 10 pence a day from Sudbrooke direct to Welton.



Roger Hiscox 1940 -2009

Roger Hiscox had a long and distinguished career at the BBC before he became better know as a County and District councillor. He joined the BBC in Birmingham in 1958 by persuading the Appointments Department to modify its recruiting age criteria which was then set at 20; his perseverance was being demonstrated at an early stage.


He worked on radio outside broadcasting in Birmingham until he moved to Lincoln in 1979 to work on the launch of Radio Lincolnshire in 1980. With his outside broadcast experience he was a key figure in setting up the station which had the largest editorial area in the country. His passion for broadcasting together with his diplomatic and negotiating skills in often trying circumstances played a major role in the success launch and development of our local station.

In the 1980's Roger followed his wife, Lesley, into active politics when she contested and won a seat on the West Lindsey District Council. He himself later fought both the Welton Division and the Ward on a number of occasions and whilst he lost more elections than he won he remained a doughty fighter right up to the end. He served on the County Council from 1993 to 1997 and again from 2005 to 2009 and on the District Council from 2004 to 2008. He was seen as an effective leader of the Liberal Democrats at the County Council and was much respected by the leaders of the controlling Conservatives.

His speaking method could be dry and he eschewed the theatrical approach which is seen as a disadvantage by those impressed more by style than substance. However he was articulate and was always anxious to ensure that his audience was clearly informed on issues. He had the useful knack of being able to empathise with his opponents' viewpoints while not necessarily sympathising with their position. He was a conscientious councillor who always worked hard and was always anxious to keep them up to date; his regular column for the Sudbrooke News was therefore an agreeable monthly task.

He was in poor health for some time but despite this he fought his last election in June of this year to the surprise, admiration and concern of his many friends on all sides of the political spectrum.

He died peacefully at his home in Hackthorn on 9th October 2009. He is survived by his wife, Lesley, and a son and a daughter.
