VICAR'S LETTER

Robert has passed the keyboard over to me this month and it is a great privilege to write this letter to you.

One of the best things about living in Sudbrooke is that we have such a beautiful little village church to share. An earlier church, built of red brick, was in use until 1860. Then, because that needed so much repair, it was demolished and our present stone church was built on the site from £2,000 left for the purpose in the will of Richard Ellison. It was completed in 1862. There are records however, which go back to 1271 and name the Rector of Sudbrooke, at that time, as Robert Galle – so we can assume that there was a medieval church here – real history in our midst.

Next month, during the second weekend in October (8th – 10th), several church festivals combine in our village. It is the weekend when we celebrate our Harvest Festival – a time to give thanks to God for all His gifts to us - especially our food. It is the weekend of our Patronal Festival when we remember our patron saint St. Edward the Confessor after whom our church is named and it is the weekend of our Flower Festival.

Your church will rarely have looked or smelled so lovely. It will be full of flowers and children's displays. There will be refreshments – drinks and cup cakes, adults' and children's prize quizzes, a cake stall and items on sale such as tea towels, picture postcards, packs of notelets, pens and pencils – all bearing the "Sudbrooke" name and perfect as souvenirs or, dare I say it, stocking fillers for Christmas. Information posters will guide you on a short journey around the church telling you about the history, about the lovely building, about St. Edward, about Christian festivals and about worship. (Perfect for school children of all ages as a number of the R.E. Attainment Targets will be addressed in the display.)

A journey to a holy place is sometimes called a "pilgrimage". Early pilgrims used to buy badges, such as cockle shells, on every pilgrimage which they stitched onto their hats thus showing to all the pilgrimages they had made. You won't be able to buy a shell when you visit your village church but you will be given a warm welcome and go away with a smile. It would be lovely to see you whether you pop in for a quick look, stay for a chat and a drink or join in one of the services.

NOTES OF THE MEETING OF SUDBROOKE PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON THURSDAY 3RD JUNE 2010 IN THE VILLAGE HALL, SUDBROOKE

20 PARISHIONERS ITEMS - There were none.

21 POLICE MATTERS – There were none to bring to the attention of members.

22 DISTRICT COUNCILLORS REPORT

DC Curtis had had a report that the area around the Park Gates was in need of a sweep. The Clerk would ask WLDC Street Team to organise this.

23 NOTES OF MEETING HELD ON 1ST MAY 2010 – These were signed as a correct record.

24 REPORTS ON MATTERS OUTSTANDING

- **a) Parish Plan Advisory Group** The next meeting of the Group will be held on 6th July.
- **b) Sports/Fun Day** It had been pointed out that an advertisement placed in the June issue of Sudbrooke News by the Parish Plan Group for the Sports/Fun Day did not state that the Sports Day event was being run on behalf of the Parish Council by the Parish Plan Group. It was emphasised that as this was a stipulation of the Parish Council's insurers this must be adhered to.

Councillor Martin Dickie agreed to assist with the Risk Assessment to be carried out on the day of the event and Councillor Stuart Curtis offered his help in the running of the event.

- c) Village Sign The closing date for suggestions is 15th June 2010.
- **d) Wood Carving update** The Chairman suspended Standing Orders to allow Mrs Helen Link to speak on behalf of the Wood Carving Group.

Mrs Link reported that progress on the carvings was a little slow at present. Villagers from Scothern and Langworth had been invited to join the Group.

- **e)** Land for allotments Cllr Stuart Curtis reported that a site meeting had been held at the suggested land in Scothern but there was no access to the area other than by crossing a neighbouring plot. An approach had been made to the landowner of that particular plot asking if he would consider leasing that area of land for allotments in order for access but this had been refused.
- **f)** Erosion of beck bank, West Drive A report had been made to the Witham Third Internal Drainage Board about the leaning trees and a reply was awaited.

25 HIGHWAY MATTERS

- **a)** Street nameplates Park Close update Councillor Stuart Curtis was arranging a site meeting regarding this item.
- b) Area around Holme Drive, ART update, Wragby Road Bus shelter, Pot hole repairs These matters were all still outstanding and a meeting with the Principal Highways Officer had been requested. The PHO had been unable to attend this Parish Council meeting but it was suggested that he meet two Councillors and the Clerk to discuss the outstanding works.

A request had been made to the landowner of the sports field on Scothern Lane for an extension of the lease Lane beyond April 2011. However at the moment the land owners were mindful not to renew.

27 REQUEST FOR PROVISION OF A SKATEBOARD PARK

A petition of signatures for a request for a skateboard park had been given to Councillor Stuart Curtis. It was agreed to look into the possibility of costs and location for provision of ramps.

28 PROVISION OF BIN BAGS FOR RESIDENTS OF MAIN DRIVE/WEST DRIVE

It was reported that problems were constantly being encountered with residents having insufficient bags for the waste who were not on the normal wheelie bin collection service. Councillor Stuart Curtis offered to speak to the Waste Department and arrange for Councillor Mrs Lyn Etheridge to have a

Request for skateboard Park


Costings had been carried out which are in the region of £85,000. It may be possible to look into grant provision.

Bardney Parish Council had offered surplus allotments to surrounding villages. Bardney Parish Council had been thanked for the offer and notices would be put in notice boards in the village.



Programs on TV at the moment contain many references to the Second World War and those days are even recalled by interviews with well known people who were evacuees during the Blitz. It brought back my own memories. I even remember Vera Lynn. Who would have thought that she would be top of the pops after all these years .

Then I $\,$ recently watched a rerun on TV of the John Thaw film $\,$ "Goodnight Mr Tom"

This film brought back memories for me of the time in 1941 when I was just one of the hundreds of snotty nosed little kids that were sent out from bomb ravaged London into the countryside to save us from the bombing. The film was very realistic.

I recall standing with my Mickey Mouse gasmask in a cardboard box on string round my neck and a label with my name on it at Newark station in the freezing cold being inspected by huge ladies with hair in rollers and scarves who prodded the evacuees and inspected us for lice and spots before selecting one

or two that they had been told to accommodate. To children of 5 to 10 it was truly terrifying. We had just been removed from our mothers as they wept and waved goodbye in London. Now someone was prodding us and shouting at us .. "Do you wet the bed.? " They had funny accents. I was petrified and had a bad stutter brought on by the aggressive interrogation.

However, I was really lucky !!!. The lady who chose me took me to her home at a vicarage about 10 miles from Sudbrooke where her husband was the local vicar. They were both so loving and kind to me that I remained in contact with them long after I was returned at the end of the war right up to their deaths a few years ago. However they did terrible things to me such as making me have a bath once a week .

I don't think I had ever had a bath before then and I had to attend church twice each Sunday. I had never set foot inside a church before. But I had a very happy time and had many friends in the local children and got a great education at the village primary school. I liked it so much that in my retirement I bought a home in this area and moved up here.

I wonder if any of the readers of this magazine remember the evacuees? Did any of you take them into your homes or were any of you 'Best Friends 'with an evacuee. It would be nice if any of you would tell your memories. Were you an evacuee yourself? How was it for you .?

The Old Codger.....



I have been involved in playing cricket all of my life. From schoolboy to OAPI used to be a fairly successful fast bowler with a pretty good average and in my early days used to open the bowling for my side. Fred Trueman was my hero and I'd like to think I was a poor man's imitation of him. Like most fast bowlers I suffered from the usual crop of injuries and after a few years slowed down to medium pace and moved down the bowling

order but used far less energy and subsequently had fewer injuries. Then as time began to catch up on me I became a lot less agile and conserved my energy by bowling slow off breaks as a finger spinner with a considerable amount of success which made me wonder why on earth I had previously wasted all that aggression and energy hurling down balls at great speed when the same results could be achieved by guile, cunning and strategic field settings.

As my bowling got slower my batting got better and I moved up the batting order from number 10 or 11 and with a much improved average I became a bit of a fixture at number 3 or 4 in the batting order. I stayed there for many years and my average was always in the high twenties over the season. The only thing that changed over time was the way in which these runs were scored. When I was young and fit the runs came in quick singles and in twos and threes with the occasional boundary.....As time caught up with me and I reached my fifties and early sixties a look at the score books will reveal that all of my runs were scored in either ones or foursNo more scampering for twos and threes and diving to avoid run outs. That was left to those fitter and younger than me.

Then after playing for over 50 years and whilst still with respectable averages for both bowling and batting but far more aches and pains and a few medical problems, I decided to stop playing and become an Umpire to keep myself involved in the game. I enrolled in the County Umpires course.

I never realised over all those years how much it takes to be a good fully qualified Umpire. The course ran for 3 winter months and was pretty intensive. The first thing that had to be studied were obviously the rules of the game and these are comprehensively contained in a four inch thick volume of WISDEN. Next you were shown several film clips of real life cricketing incidents in which an Umpires decision was neededEasy you might think! ...After orally making a decision in front of a class of about 20 fellow students you are shown the same clips slowed down and with the hindsight of Hawkeye technology. Oh dear!...Did I get that wrong ...? It certainly focuses the mind and makes you aware of just

how skilful the Umpires in first class cricket really are. No one in my class came out of that period with any great distinction but we all came out of it older and wiser and determined to consider all the facts more carefully.

When you are sitting in front of a TV at home it is so easy to criticise the Umpires who have to make split second decisions about things that happen in the blink of an eye. The man in the middle doesn't have the benefit of all the technology that those wise old men commenting on the game have at their disposal. It is just amazing how often the match umpires get it right and just goes to show how extremely good they are. Obviously they now and again make the wrong decision but that's the game of cricket. On the whole, given the old saying about swings and roundabouts they get it right far more times than not .

The thing drummed into students on my course was that in our class of cricket, up to minor County level, there is only one man in a position to make an accurate decision about most appeals and that is the Umpire. He is the only man behind the bowlers arm. The only man who is standing still in line with the stumps and able to see the turn or flight of the ball. Everyone else is leaping about, has an obscured view of the matter and very often is carried along on the sheer enthusiasm of his team mates in appealing. As an Umpire you have to make your own decision and be certain in your own mind about it. Not be influenced or intimidated however strident and vociferous players are in their appeals. Luckily for us, in our level of cricket there is seldom any dissension shown once a decision has been made . What's the use anyway? The decision is always going to stand. Players in our village league know only too well. You win some, you lose some. Now and again the decision goes against you, but mainly the decisions are correct.

We were read an excerpt from the biography of that famous Umpire Dicky Bird in which he describes how after giving a batsman "Out LBW" the player passed him on his way back to the pavilion and muttered "That were never out!"....Dickey Bird replied caustically-"Well, we will see what the papers say tomorrow morning "....The next day the Sports page recorded B ### LBW ...bowled F *****. There you areIt must be right.... It says so in the papers .

On my very first match as an Umpire I was in the pavilion at Nettleham paired with a very experienced old Umpire with many years of the job behind him. The Home side had won the toss and elected to field. The weather was dull and drizzling with rain but the forecast was that it would shortly brighten up and the rain would stop. Whilst we waited in the Pavilion those lovely ladies who were always present preparing tea, sandwiches and the like were hovering about and one came up to me and asked "Cup of tea Umpire?" I gratefully accepted. The Pavilion was very crowded. The bar was open. In those days Pubs closed in the afternoons on Sundays which resulted in a good crowd every home match who were able to enjoy a few pints in the Cricket Pavilion. Because it was raining most of the public and both teams were crowded inside and it was quite stuffy and warm. The nice lady came up to me again after several inspections of the weather showed that it was showing signs of the rain stopping and play would be likely to start again soon ... "Another cup of tea Umpire?" "Yes please "!...I said gratefully.

Then the rain stopped and out we all went onto the field of play ...After the nice warm Pavilion it was quite chilly and cold with a strong breeze. After a few overs I began to feel an urgent need to spend a penny and it became very uncomfortable. I spoke to my fellow Umpire and asked him what I should do as it was obvious that I couldn't hang on much longer before a visit to the toilet. He very helpfully with a sneer told me "Thou should have gone before thou came out young man ." There's me a 60 year old being called "Young man!" ...Very helpful.!! He pointed to the 40 or so spectators seated watching the game and said "Well you can't stop the game just so you can toddle off and have a pee. Can we? In my day when we all wore those long white coats I always used to carry a funnel and a milk bottle but with these short coat we have to wear nowadays we can't do that can we?".

He then called over the Captain of the home side and had a quiet word with him and play continued briefly with the Captain speaking to his bowler. All of a sudden the fast bowler suddenly fell to the floor grasping his leg. The team Physio came racing onto the field and began treating him for cramp. A word from my fellow Umpire and off I raced for a visit to the gents. More or less as I arrived back on the field the bowler miraculously recovered and play was able to continue but not before the Club Captain sidled up to me, winked and said "I think that's going to cost you 12 pints in the bar Umpire. Don't you?" It did ... and I have never forgotten it. I never again drank before a match.

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Holiday time was spent in the Shropshire-Welsh border not far from Powis Castle an imposing National Trust property, with wonderful views over the Welsh countryside. The castle was very interesting, showing the collections of furniture, paintings, sculptures collected by the Herbert family. Many treasures from India are displayed in the Clive Museum.

However the biggest attraction for me was the gardens and grounds surrounding the castle. The castle stands high on a hill and the garden consists of terraces with herbaceous borders ,going from a great height, with stone steps and winding paths leading down to a flatter area with rose gardens and mixed borders.

The gardens are beautifully kept, and a large lawn area showed the family coat of arms, which had somehow been sculptured into the grass.

I came home to my more modest garden to find the weeds gaining on us, and some serious work needed to catch up.

In the front garden it is pleasing to see how well the Salix tree has responded to the drastic surgery early in the year. It is now looking bushy and healthy again.

The wall baskets are flourishing ,but will need some dead- heading.

The most troublesome weed is the Mares tail. After two weeks break, it is taking over again-more hard work to deal with it.

The greenhouse is now in need of a general clear out and wash down ready to reline it with bubble wrap, in readiness for the winter. Bubble wrap is a good insulating material which will keep the heat in, and saves using a heater until it is really cold.

The vegetable garden is now supplying beetroot, carrots and onions, and the brussel sprouts and cauliflowers are now growing well following a good rain fall. We are pleased to announce that our first GP Registrar, Dr Muhammad Adnan is now in the Practice and will be here until April 2011 and then again after completing a further hospital rotation. Dr Adnan is a fully qualified doctor who is learning the General Practice side of medicine. He will be sitting in on some consultations or seeing individual patients during the next few months under the mentorship of Dr Andrew Barber and Dr Nicola Porter.

The Practice is taking part in a recently piloted scheme to enhance the care of our elderly patients, particularly those over seventy five years of age. This involves evaluating each individual patient and ensuring that appropriate services are offered and available where needed. As part of this project, we are also looking at alternatives to hospital admission in certain circumstances and are working with Lincolnshire PCT and United Lincolnshire Hospitals Trust to this end. Some patients may receive a letter from the Practice to do a self-evaluation and we would greatly appreciate assistance with this.

Could we please remind patients that all telephone calls to and from the surgery are recorded to protect both parties. It is with regret that we find ourselves quite regularly having to listen to recorded calls as a result of staff receiving verbal abuse over the 'phone. Anyone guilty of this may receive a warning letter from the Practice and action will be taken to remove patients from our list if warranted. If there is cause for complaint or dissatisfaction with any aspect of our services we ask patients to speak or write to the manager so that it can be properly investigated, not swear or upset staff who are only carrying out their duties.

In July we noted 61 patients had booked appointments with us which were not kept or advised us cancel. In addition we were notified of 21 non-attendees at hospital appointments. 


