It is good to have a reading programme of Christian books, but where does one find them (particularly after the closure of SPCK in Lincoln) ?

The good news locally is that former SPCK employees have set up Unicorn Tree Books at 35-40 Central Market, Sincil Street Lincoln – Tel. 01522 – 525557.

Their e-mail address is <u>unicorntreebooks@aol.com</u>

and have a website at www.lincolncentralmarket.co.uk.

I would urge you to support this new venture.

Another good source is The Christian Book Club at 3 & 4 The Drove, West Wilts Trading Estate, Westbury Wiltshire BA13 4JE – Tel. 08453 679676 or 01373 823451 who carry a large stock and publish a catalogue. Unlike some 'book clubs' there is no requirement to buy a book a month : you simply order what you want at "club price" which is lower than the recommended published price.

Two excellent reference books at a reasonable price sold by the club are :

(1) "Jesus – the Complete Guide" edited by Leslie Houlden - \pounds 17-50 (a saving of \pounds 17-50). With numerous contributors, it distils 2000 years of thinking about Jesus into one volume of nearly 200 A-Z encyclopaedia-style entries covering 922 pages. (2) "Christianity – the Complete Guide" edited by John Bowden - £20-00 (a saving of £30). Again it is set out in A-Z form over 1364 pages that include 240 photographs (40 in colour),335 major articles from 182 contributors,166 'boxes' of factual information, a time chart, and a Who's Who giving short biographies of over 400 major people in Christian history.

Whether for 'dipping-in', checking facts or for more profound study these two volumes are an excellent resource that will help believers to expand and deepen their Christian knowledge.

As I write, I have just taken over the "Oversight" of Scothern Parish following the departure of the recent vicar. This is just what it says – i.e. "oversight" rather than becoming priest-in-charge or vicar. However, as things evolve, it may mean that we can consider doing some things jointly with the parishes within our Benefice. Those with long memories may recall that until 1978 the parishes of Scothern and Sudbrooke were linked together.

Post-Easter, the Home Group on Monday evenings is back in action – and don't forget the monthly Prayer Hour. These are open to anyone to join in and dates and venues are listed in the Church Diary.

NOTES OF THE MEETING OF SUDBROOKE PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON THURSDAY 6TH MARCH 2008 IN THE VILLAGE HALL, SUDBROOKE

PRESENT: Councillors M Dickie (Chairman), S Curtis, Miss R Dobbs, P Rignall, M Halliday, D Ordish, I Russell Mrs C Myers (Clerk), Mrs B Solly (Treasurer), 2 members of the public

Disappointment was expressed that there was no attendance again at the Parish Council meeting of County Councillor Roger Hiscox.

138 PARISHIONERS ITEMS

It was reported that there was increased dog fouling in the village and the Dog Warden from West Lindsey District Council would be asked to carry out daytime patrols as well as those in the hours of darkness. Cllr Ordish requested that an update be requested from the County Council about the dropped kerbs near to the shop.

139 RESIGNATION OF COUNCILLOR ROGER ADAMS

The Chairman reported on the resignation from the Parish Council of Roger Adams. Mr Adams had been a member for 8 years and the work for the parish which he undertook whilst on the Parish Council was acknowledged with grateful thanks. The vacancy will be not be filled until the election of the Parish Council in May. **<u>140</u> POLICE MATTERS** – There was nothing to report.

141 DISTRICT COUNCILLORS REPORT

DC S Curtis reported that paper could now be put in the blue recycling bins.

Further reports of noises emanating from Petronas site were reported and the Clerk was asked to write to the company regarding this.

142 NOTES OF MEETING HELD ON <u>7TH FEBRUARY 2008</u>

These were signed as a correct record of the meeting.

143 CORRESPONDENCE AND REPORTS

a)Parish Plan – Cllr Mike Halliday reported that a member of the Parish Plan Steering Group would attend the Nettleham Medical Practice Support Group Meeting on 4th April 2008. 2 sets of new age kurling equipment would be bought from the remainder of the Parish Plan grant, a contribution towards this would be made from the District Councillors grant.

Cllr Halliday hoped to approach those residents who had indicated that they would be interested in forming clubs such as Walking.

b) Litter Pick – A litter Pick around the Village was arranged for Saturday 19th April, meeting at the Village Hall

at 9.30am. £20 expenditure was agreed for production of posters.

Mrs Sheila Offord kindly offered to organise tea/coffee and was thanked by the Chairman.

c) Litter bins – It was noted that more litter bins were required around the village and the Clerk would make enquiries regarding this.

d) Bus shelter lighting – There was nothing further to report regarding this matter.

e) Bus route – PC Coaches had stated that they were not able to extend the route through the village and the Clerk had made further enquiries with the Transport Department of the County Council. A reply was awaited.

f) Cycleway – Sudbrooke –

Nettleham – Nothing further to report at present.

g) Tidying of area of shrubs near to

Millennium stone – The general feeling amongst members of the Parish Council was that the area required some tidying. A site meeting would be held with Cllrs Ian Russell, Mike Halliday and Martin Dickie being present when a specification would be drawn up.

Quotations would be sought and in view of the time of the year/onset of the nesting season the Clerk and Chairman were given authorisation to delegate the work at a cost not exceeding $\pounds 500$.

144 SPORTSFIELD COMMITTEE REPORT

a)Tennis Net – Approval for the purchase of a tennis net was given to the Treasurer at a cost of approximately £90.00. The District Councillor's grant would make a substantial contribution towards this.

b) Floodlights – Cllr S Curtis still in the process of obtaining prices for the repair of the floodlights.

c) Play equipment re-surfacing -

Enquiries had been made with RoSPA who had stated that bark chippings and grass matting could be used as a base for the play equipment. Quotations would be obtained.

<u>Martin Dickie -</u> Welcome to the Sudbrooke Annual Parish meeting on Thursday 3rd April 2008

'Looking over the last 12 months of Agenda's things seem to be going along at a steady pace, nothing contentious has happened to upset the workings of the Parish Council .YET !! The Christmas tree event was a bit of a damp skid but hopefully it will be better this year. We have worked along side and supported the Parish Plan whose committee have done sterling work. We still await the Solicitors to sort out the land in front of the shop so we can after 3 years get the dropped kerbs installed We continually try to keep up with the running and maintenance of all the

equipment and land under the ownership of the Council We have enjoyed working with our present, newest member Paul, but we are seeing three Councillors leave us at the end of this Council year so we look forward to welcoming three new ones with their new and fresh ideas. It will be sad to say farewell to Derek, Mike and Roger as they have done a tremendous amount of work for the benefit of the Parish. It has been a privilege and an honour to work with each and every one of them and I would like to thank them on behalf of the Council.

Thanks also to Nick Truscott for his sterling work as Editor of the Sudbrooke News, long may he remain in post, and to every one involved in getting the Magazine to every house. My thanks also to Chris the Clerk and Bridget our Treasurer, for their hard work, but mainly for putting up with us. And a final thank you for everyone's support during the year.

<u>Clerks Report –</u>

<u>Mrs Chris Myers -</u> Another busy year for a keen and active Parish Council. Meetings of the Parish Council have been held monthly throughout the year. I and the Treasurer, Bridget Solly, work closely together to ensure smooth running of the administration and finances of the Council and attend courses organised by the Lincolnshire Association of Local Councils which are always informative and useful. I have also attended Seminars on Funding and obtaining grants.

<u>County Councillors Report –</u>

<u>County Councillor Hiscox -</u> stated his dissatisfaction at the high cost of Council tax bills in the County. He also apologised for his non-attendance at Parish Council meetings due to illness.

District Councillors Report -

Stuart Curtis – It has been a relatively quiet year compared with previous years when we have had to contend with the proposals by Star Energy for underground gas storage. There has been no further proposals so far and let us hope it remains that way.

During the last year I have sat on the Development Committee which deals with all planning applications and also on the Development Plan Sub-Committee responsible for the local development framework up to the year 2026 which replaces the local plan.

Having helped to achieve a Village

shop I am now fully supporting the Parish Council in trying to provide permanent sports field for the village and will press the District Council to provide maximum grants towards such facilities.

Once again rumours are rife over the future of the Red Arrows. We have therefore launched a campaign to make sure that not only do the Red's survive but they remain in West Lindsey. If the Red's were to leave Scampton the effect on the local community would be devastating.

The District Council has set a Council Tax of \pounds 1,461.21 for Band D property. This is an increase of 2.9% by the District Council 3.5% by the County Council and 78.9% by the Lincolnshire Police Authority.

Conservation Committee Report -

Ian Russell – Throughout the year the Committee has advised on Conservation matters within the Parish. However this has been a relatively quiet year compared to recent years.

Spring Clean – Members have supported litter clearance in the village although this is no longer organised by the Committee.

Trees and Shrubs – Members advised on proposed works to protected trees at various locations in the village. Trees and shrubs on community land were inspected including those planted at Northfield Park in spring 2007.

A further 25 trees were planted to the west of Northfield Park by volunteers.

Trees were provided free of charge by Lincolnshire County Council and included 2 Oak, 5 field Maple, 5 wild cherry and 5 rowan.

Village Plan – The Committee has supported promotion of the Parish Action Plan and will continue to seek ways to implement actions of conservation interest.

Footpaths – No work has taken place on actual footpaths but following a spate of vandalism, the timber footbridge over the stream in the Park has been replaced with a steel structure.

<u>Sports field Committee –</u> <u>Stuart Curtis</u>

The Multi-Purpose Sports Area has now been re-surfaced and is ready to use. It is hoped that a Tennis Club can be formed ready to play this season and make full use of the area.

Local Organisations Reports

<u>Village Hall Management</u> <u>Committee –</u> Rose Dobbs, Chairman

The past year has seen much change – we have had a new Chairman, a new Treasurer, a new Secretary, a new Bar Manager, and a Co-opted Fund Raising Member, all critical members of any team. The Committee are the unsung heroes of our village – trustees and representatives who willingly give their time, meeting every six weeks, with a lot more work in between, to assist in the management of the village hall. There is now much stability and spirit among the committee.

Stuart Curtis was one of the Founder Members of the Village Hall and has been a Trustee since its inception. Stuart realised his dream of a village

hall for Sudbrooke and has been a member of this Committee since that time. Stuart was committed to the village hall many years before that, since 1972 to be precise – 38 years ago when ideas were being pulled together and the village hall committee was reformed and registered as a charity.

We now have sound financial management. Hugh Thomson, a former Bank Manager, came on board as our Treasurer much less than a year ago and has brought much professionalism to the Committee – before taking on the role he spent weeks, hour upon hour investigating and reconstructing the finances, and since, taking the time to explain the accounts at every committee meeting producing a professional set of management accounts.

Paul Rignall came in as Bar Manager again on a volunteer basis not all that long ago and has done a sterling job. We have good bar management and good returns. Indeed at the New Year's Eve event the organisation was second to none and the promoters of that event are now planning a Summer Ball at the Village Hall.

We have a new Secretary, Ann Yeend and in picking up the gauntlet she took the job to heart and has done a remarkable job in very many ways.

We are indeed indebted to our representatives on the Committee – representatives from the Parish Council, the Gardening Club, the Brownies, the Seniors Coffee Club, the Pre School Group, Mah-Jong, Mums and Toddlers and the Sudbrooke Ladies Club.

Not directly part of this Committee yet very function is the Parish Plan Advisory Group under the chairmanship of Mike Halliday. This group took on the daunting task of producing an Action Plan based on parishioners' views part of which was based on activities for Village Hall use. In the next few months, ideas will become reality and we welcome cooperating with the group on their needs relative to the use of this hall.

As I said earlier there is now much stability and spirit among the Management Committee and I thank that Committee sincerely for their superb support during the year.

Ladies Club –

<u>Gill Rignall</u> - The Ladies' Club meets on the third Thursday of most months except August. We go out for a meal in July and have a Christmas party in December. When we meet in the Village Hall we have a speaker and there is a wide variety of topics.

Membership is currently about 35 members. Guests, male and female, are welcome to attend our meetings and are asked to contribute £2.

Sudbrooke Seniors -

Sheila Offord – The Sudbrooke Seniors meet regularly and the number of members is increasing.

<u>Gardening Club –</u>

<u>Mike Halliday</u> – There have been 9 meetings throughout the year including the Spring and Autumn shows with speakers at the March and October meetings. Other meetings

during the year have been held at members homes. Membership continues to be maintained but there is concern about the age profile of members, young people do not seem to be joining the club but this is due perhaps to smaller paved gardens being favoured in some developments. Any person wishing to join the Club is welcome.

<u> Parish Plan Group –</u>

<u>Mike Halliday</u> – The launch of the plan took place in April 2007 and was attended by 269 residents who prioritised 13 of the total 35 actions for early attention.

The Parish Plan is a 10 year plan but will continually evolve as circumstances change. The formal constitution was written and adopted, Officers appointed except for the Vice Chair which is still open. There are 11 permanent Parish Plan Group members who have met regularly.

A meeting was held last October for the suggestion of new Clubs/ activities/groups – this was well attended and plans are now in place to organise Walking, Tennis, New Age Kurling, Yoga and Keep Fit. More help is needed though to progress these activities.

A litter pick is planned for 19th April next.

A good close working relationship with the Parish Council has been achieved throughout the establishment of the Parish Plan.

<u>Parishioners items</u> – There were none.

The meeting closed at 7.40pm.

Welcome to this month's Edition of Police News. At a recent meeting of the areas Neighbourhood Panel two new priorities have been decided on for the next three months.

Thankfully, none of them are in Sudbrooke, which still remains one of the lowest crime areas in the division.

The two new priorities are as follows,

- 1) Anti Social Behaviour in Bardney, particularly around the bowling club area,
- 2) Speeding along Croft Lane, Cherry Willingham near to the Community School.

Despite none of the priorities being in Sudbrooke we will still continue to patrol and monitor all areas of the village, and recognise that there has been anti social behaviour in the past. At present the incidents of anti social behaviour has reduced, however we will continue to monitor the areas in an effort to prevent them from increasing during the warmer months. These will continue to be monitored and the appropriate action taken where necessary.

Some of you may have noticed that the email address at the top of this article has changed. This is a group email that both Jackie and I have access to. Before, we only had our own email addresses that only we could access. This caused problems when either of us was away for any length of time, as Jackie didn't have access to my emails, and visa versa. 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
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SUDBROOKE GARDENING CLUB

beautiful orchid)


Christopher Warwick-junior class 30. Best in Show winner was Christopher Warwick who impressed the judge with his intricate daffodil arrangement.

Nettleham Medical Practice.

At a meeting of the Patient Support Group on 4th April, the Practice Manager confirmed that all the Practice Partners were aware of Sudbrooke's residents needs and concerns as identified in the Parish Plan. Although a decision had not been taken on the proposed new site, it was apparent that provision of a separate surgery in Sudbrooke was not planned.

The Practice Manager has undertaken to provide clarification of the criteria used for the term 'housebound' in order to qualify for the prescription delivery service.

As this is still awaited I suggest that anyone who considers they are housebound should apply for the service.

Other important Practice news: Appointments- pre-bookable appointments up to 4 weeks in advance can be requested with the doctor of choice. Slots allocated are from 0830 until 1130am. Telephones-during the busy early morning period, extra lines together with operators are now in use. Opening hours- Nettleham extended opening hours are Thursday evening 1830 until 2115pm and Saturday morning 0900 until 1200am. These sessions are for pre bookable appointments and not for emergency cases.

The new Practice website is now fully functional and our thanks go to the PDA for supporting this venture. Please note that the email facility should not be used to request us to make / cancel appointments however – it is for general enquiries only.

Reminder from our Dispensary – please ensure that you allow 48hours processing time for repeat prescriptions in addition to the time the chemist needs to prepare the prescription (if this is requested) – again we are having increasing numbers of patients expecting their repeat prescriptions to be ready before these time limits.

Late night opening started 1st April '08 and we are now open Monday, Tuesday Wednesday evenings until 8pm for prebooked appointments with a doctor. Dispensary hours remain at 8.30 – 6.30pm Monday to Friday, TARGET – training afternoon for doctors and staff is always the third Tuesday afternoon each month and we are closed (including dispensary) from 12.30pm – 5pm. TARGET falls on Tuesday 20th May '08.

The Practice operates a loan system for wheelchairs supported by funding from the Patient & Doctor Association and is always a well used and appreciated service. However in recent months several wheelchairs have been returned in a very poor state, even beyond repair in one case, and we are reluctantly having to request a deposit on each occasion which will be refunded in full if the chair is returned undamaged plus a small charge for the overall loan period to help with servicing costs. Following a rocket from Mr. C. at half -time little appeared to have changed and it came as no surprise when Our Lady of Lincoln equalised just two minutes into the second half. And then the seeds of doubt began to sprout leaves! But cometh the hour, cometh the man – and that man came in the form of Scothern's influential skipper Lewis H. He quickly

It was clear from the first minute that Scothern were sufficiently pumped up for this one as they tore into St. Hugh's who looked thoroughly unprepared for such an onslaught. Indeed it took just four minutes for The Royal Blues to open the scoring, striker Louis K finishing off a smart run and cross from Thomas C. Then only three minutes later William S put Ellison Boulters two to the good before Louis K made it 3-0 on the ten-minute mark and the game was effectively over. Rarely will one see a side as capable as St. Hugh's completely finished off inside only ten minutes but Scothern really wanted this one and it was showing! Scothern had further chances as they continued to dominate the first half and St. Hugh's were confined to just one snap shot which flew narrowly wide just before the break. The second half told a slightly different story as St. Hugh's came out with the determination to show some of the form that they have showed this season (only having lost one before their visit to Sudbrooke Road). And St. Hugh's were dreadfully unlucky not to pull one back early in the second half when a ferocious shot crashed against the underside of the crossbar and bounced out to safety. But as so often happens in what can be a cruel game, Scothern broke with frightening pace and flair and William S scored his second and Ellison Boulters' fourth with an awesome powerdrive across the goalkeeper into the bottom right-hand corner of the net. COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S CORNER

LIBOR Service

LIBOR sounds a bit like a Latin verb, but if you keep abreast of the news you will know that's not its claim to fame. It is actually an acronym for the London Inter Bank Official lending Rate. It is in the news because of the effect of the USA (not the continent of North America be it noted) so called sub prime mortgage crisis.


It is currently fashionable to decry the British institutions' lack of foresight in this incipient international financial catastrophe, but little is read in the British media of the USA's institutions' responsibility for rating the so called 'financial instruments' based on these loans as triple A. This is the highest rating possible. Of course, we expect our bank directors to understand the financial markets so well that they were not fooled by this rating. It would appear they did not live up to this expectation. I am not an expert, but what appears to me to be little more than a pyramid selling scam should not have been given that rating and the responsibility for that appears to rest the other side if the Atlantic.

If by now you are wondering what on earth this has to do with your councillor, you may be surprised to learn that LIBOR has an influence on a council's funding. The connection is that your so called higher tier councils end up with money 'on deposit' to balance out receiving your money and spending it on providing services. This money is invested, often just overnight. Councils often have large sums invested and benefit from this inter bank system. Councillors on Audit Committees attempt to learn about such things on your behalf and thus have known about LIBOR for many years. A high rate is good for a council, (we get more interest) even if it is not good for the liquidity of the financial sector as a whole, which in turn is bad for the whole economy.

It is necessary to acquire and deal with all sorts of information as a councillor and finance is one of them. As I have said, I am not an expert. But I do have a view on the present state of the financial world and it is fairly pessimistic. Councils like everyone else should prepare for turbulent times ahead. But we may be more a part of the solution than of the problem. We must be alert to the opportunities as well as the threats. Buying property with a mortgage may be more expensive, but if builders are short of work as a consequence, the competition for orders will make the cost of building less expensive for those who already have the cash in the bank. This could be an opportunity to build a bargain for a council who have already set aside the funds for a project.
