VICAR'S LETTER

The Flower Festival was a great success and much enjoyed by those who visited the displays. Many thanks are due to all those who worked so hard on the event – and to the visitors too.

As we survey the economic situation of the Country, and as Christmas approaches, I was moved and challenged by some words written by the late Mother Theresa of Calcutta who died in 1997. She reminded us that Jesus said: "Whenever you did this for one of the least important of these my brothers, you did it for ME ... Whenever you refused to help one of these least important ones, you refused to help ME" (Matthew 25:40,45).

Inspired by this, she wrote :-

"When I was homeless, you opened your doors, when I was naked, you clothed Me, when I was hungry, you fed Me, when I was tired, you helped Me find rest, when I was anxious, you calmed My fears, when I was little, you taught Me to read, when I was lonely, you gave Me your love, when I was in prison, you came to My cell, when I was sick, you cared for My needs, in a strange country, you made Me at home, seeking a job, you found Me employment. hurt in battle you bound up My wounds, searching for kindness, you held out your hand, when I was Black, or Chinese, or White, mocked and insulted, you carried My cross, when I was old, you bothered to smile, when I was restless, you listened and cared, you saw Me covered with spittle and blood, you knew My features, though grimy with sweat, when I was laughed at, you stood by My side, when I was happy, you shared My joy."

A recent Sunday New Testament reading was about the story of the widow and the unjust judge. The parable reminds us of the importance of persistence and regularity in prayer. St Luke explains what the parable's about in the introduction - "Jesus told them a parable about their need to pray always and not to lose heart." There's the old saying that we should "keep short accounts with God" – i.e. have frequent discussions with Him. If we hardly ever talk to God, there's not much of a relationship between us. It is so much better to keep up a daily conversation with him. It's the relationship that matters. An

NETTLEHAM MEDICAL PRACTICE -PRESCRIPTION ORDERS + THE 48 HOUR TURNAROUND

In recent weeks a growing number of people have requested repeat or other prescription medication to be ready the same day or the following morning. While we endeavour to meet the needs of people in emergency situations we do request that this be the

exception rather than the rule. The 48 hour turn-around takes into account the full process of issuing prescriptions correctly, which often involves checking medication records or even email contact with the relevant GP, and also enough time for the prescription (which will be one of several hundred) to be signed by the GP in between surgeries, home visits and the many other tasks of today's General Practitioner. We have established that for this process to work efficiently and safely, we require the full 48 hours.

Your consideration of this would be very much appreciated.

44 PARISHIONERS ITEMS

Concern was expressed about quad biking in woods, along with the amount of litter, smashed bottles and camping equipment left by unauthorised campers.

A resident had brought to the attention of a member the condition of a tree on the grass verge at the junction of Sibthorpe Drive/Courtfield Close which required attention.

A large sign had been vandalised at the Village Hall, brought to the attention of members by the Playground Inspector and the Clerk was asked to arrange replacement.

45 DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

Councillor Miss Rose Dobbs declared a personal interest in item 9a of the agenda - Street nameplates – Park Close.

46 POLICE MATTERS

PC Thompson was congratulated on her permanent appointment as Community Beat Manager for the Nettleham neighbourhood policing team.

PC Thompson gave a report on recent incidents in Sudbrooke which totalled 31. It was noted that Sudbrooke Woods were being given main priority for attention at the present time due to the high number of reported incidents occurring in the woods.

47 COUNTY COUNCILLORS REPORT

CC Mrs S Rawlins stated that she was currently working on figures in preparation for the County Council's 2011 budget. Mrs Rawlins also explained the review by the Local Government Boundary Commission.

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48 DISTRICT COUNCILLORS REPORT

District Councillor Stuart Curtis declared an interest in Item 10 on the agenda – Electoral Review of West Lindsey, but explained the situation to members.

DC Curtis further explained that there would be a re-classification of garden land in that it would not be automatic that planning permission would be granted for it to be developed upon.

DC Curtis asked that the Clerk obtain details from Lincolnshire County Council Highways Department why only half of the footway on Courtfield had been resurfaced.

49 NOTES OF MEETING HELD ON 1ST JULY 2010

These were signed as a correct record.

50 REPORTS ON MATTERS OUTSTANDING

a) Parish Plan Advisory Group – Mr Mike Halliday had sent a report in that a meeting is arranged for 14th September 2010 to decide if it is appropriate to dissolve the group as it is felt that all of the requirements in the Parish Plan action plan have been dealt with and unless new requirements emerge the work of the group is completed.

Members of the Parish Council agreed with the above.

- **b) Sports/Fun Day** Final preparations were in hand for the event to be held on 12^{th} September 2010. Unfortunately no sponsorship had been received but it was agreed that the £250 be paid to Mr Halliday in advance of the event.
- **c) Village Sign** Mr Halliday reported that work is currently ongoing to cost the different styles of signs and requested that the item be placed on the agenda for the November meeting of the Parish Council when it was hoped to make a presentation to the Parish Council.
- **d) Wood Carving** The Chairman suspended standing orders in order for Mrs Helen Link to comment on the Group's activities to date. Mrs Link stated that progress was being made on the carving of the seats.

Helen requested authorisation for the purchase of wood preservative to coat the carved posts, near to the millennium stone, at a maximum cost of £50. This was approved.

e) Skateboard Park request - Councillor Stuart Curtis had spoken to par-

ents with a view to a group of them raising funds for a proposed skateboard park.

51 HIGHWAY MATTERS

- a) Street nameplates, Park Close nothing to report.
- **b) Highways Meeting** Councillors Bernard Bartram, Martin Dickie and the Clerk had met with the Principal Highways Officer on 20th July to discuss the outstanding matters requiring attention in the village. Some items had since been dealt with but many were still being carried out. County Councillor Mrs Sue Rawlins asked for copies of correspondence in order that she may pursue them.
- c) Proposed extension of 40mph speed limit, Scothern Lane The Highways Department had asked the Parish Council for comments on the extension to the speed limit even though it was the instigation of the Parish Council. The Clerk was instructed to ask them to proceed with it.
- **d)** Arrangements for proposed Litter Pick This was arranged for 23rd October.
- **e) Drainage on Scothern Lane** A letter had been received from the Flood Prevention Officer, WLDC, he having been advised by a resident that the parish may be considering filling in the section of the watercourse fronting the millennium stone. The Clerk was instructed to reply stating that this had never been considered by the Parish Council and that any problems relating to the infilling of dykes along Scothern Lane had been inspected in late 2008 and noted at the January 2009 Parish Council meeting as follows:
- **'Dykes –** Witham Third District Internal Drainage Board had stated that they had inspected Scothern Lane and did not consider that there were any drainage problems in the vicinity due to the infilling of dykes.'
- **f)** Overhanging trees around bus shelter A quotation had been obtained in the sum of £75 for the cutting back of trees overhanging the bus shelter and verge on Scothern Lane. The main concern of members and the Principal Highways Officer being the dark area created around the bus shelter. The Chairman agreed to write to the resident, advising him of the quotation and requesting that the trees be cut back as a matter of safety for users of the bus shelter.

52 ELECTORAL REVIEW OF WEST LINDSEY

Correspondence had been circulated to members regarding the Local Government Boundary Commission's Review of West Lindsey and the request for com-

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ments. Members felt that if a review was to be made the village of Sudbrooke would best be served by a Ward Councillor for Sudbrooke, Langworth and Scothern, as the three villages are closely linked in many ways.

53 CHRISTMAS TREE EVENT

This event is to be held on 5^{th} December 2010 combining the switching on of the lighting of the millennium stone.

A meeting for those involved would be held on 27th September.

Manor House, Scothern Lane – 125979 - demolition of single storey extension and replace with two storey extension with glass link – Comments sent to WLDC 'Although the design and materials have been changed to the previous application it is still considered that the extension will be out of character with adjoining/surrounding properties.'

2 Courtfield Close – 126112 – single storey extension – no objections.

Land to rear of 15 Manor Drive – 027675 – fell one beech tree – 'Some members have no objections whilst there are comments that a site visit should be carried out by a representative of WLDC to consider the balance between safety and tree benefits. It is noted that the key issue is safety whilst ownership / responsibility is a further issue. From reports and the photos it may seem that removing some of the trunks and crowning may be an option.'

Business premises including inns; farmstead; village shop $\,$ - $\,$ 13/15 $\,$ - Business premises etc well kept.

Marks for community effort - 14/15 - Clearly a strong community effort.

Total marks 107/120



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Central Lincolnshire Core Strategy

The Central Lincolnshire Joint Strategic Planning Committee has been created to prepare the Development Plan on behalf of the three Central Lincolnshire Authorities of Lincoln City, North Kesteven District and West Lindsey District (in partnership with Lincolnshire County Council).

The Core Strategy is the first of the Development Plan documents (which together comprise the Local Development Framework) for Central Lincolnshire that will help to shape the area over the next 15 to 20 years. The Core Strategy will seek to identify the key strategic issues facing Central Lincolnshire and prepare planning policies. It will consider questions such as how we intend to set the level of growth for the area, access to services and how we intend to manage climate change. Once the Core Strategy is adopted its policies will replace the existing Local Plan policies.

The Issues and Options report has been produced for public consultation setting out an overall vision and explaining the key issues and choices it faces.

This formal consultation is to begin on 25 October 2010 and will last for six weeks. In order to engage you in this process I will be pleased to answer any questions over the telephone or at the next Parish Council meeting to be held on Thursday 4 November 2010.

Dear Residents

Can I also remind people to be mindful of the law in relation to <u>Fireworks</u> as we approach November 5th and <u>Bonfire Night</u>.

It is an offence to:

- Possess adult fireworks (all fireworks except party poppers and sparklers)
 in a public place by anyone under the age of 18
- Possess category 4 fireworks (professional display fireworks) by anyone other than a fireworks professional
- It is illegal to supply adult fireworks to those under 18

Curfew on the use of adult fireworks between 11pm to 7am Except:

- Bonfire night 12midnight to 7am
- New Years Eve 1am to 7am
- Chinese New Year 1am to 7am
- Diwali night 1am to 7am

Fireworks can be used between 7am and 11pm but you could also commit offences if you were to use them in such a manner as to cause a nuisance. It is an offence to throw or set off fireworks in any highway, street, thoroughfare or public space.

If a person without lawful authority or excuse discharges any firearm or firework within 50 feet of the centre of a highway which consists of or comprises a carriageway.

It is an offence to throw a firework in the street, thoroughfare or public place.

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Police forces can deal with this offence with a Penalty Notice for Disorder (£80) or through the courts (a fine not exceeding £5000). However, Penalty Notices for Disorder can only be given to persons over 16 years old.

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Hello and welcome to my garden.

The season is quickly changing, and with the clocks going back one hour, it seems that winter has arrived, too soon, I feel.

The wall baskets along the front of the house have been cleared of summer bedding, the compost renewed, and planted with winter flowering pansies, showing off their smiling faces.

In the back garden, the pergola has finally been finished, and coated with a deep green stain ,to match the shed, and the new fence. The green house has been cleared of any remaining summer plants and lined with bubble wrap to provide thermal insulation, so no heating will be required until it is extremely cold, to protect any over wintering plants.

The polytunnel will need clearing of spent tomato and cucumber plants, which both cropped well, and the space will be used for winter shelter of some of the pot plants that have spent the summer on the gravel bed.

A further job will be inspecting the borders, with a view to moving any plants in the wrong place, and thinning out over grown plants. It can happen that a plant at the front of the border will grow much taller than expected, and other perennial plants will grow into large clumps that need to be split. Our Michaelmas daisies are an example of a clump that need splitting.


A major job over the next few weeks, weather permitting, will be cutting back and clearing of some of the overgrown shrubbery plants and reinstating the bark path that goes through the back.

The Old Codger.....



Am I the only one who has noticed a change in priorities at football matches over the past years. Not that long ago, at The F.A. Cup Final held every year at that grand old venue Wembley Stadium with it's wonderful world wide recognised and unique twin towers (Shame they can save telephone boxes and pyramids and the odd derelict house but can't

manage to save such an iconic sight as those twin towers which meant so much to millions of people). One of the highlights of a visit to the Cup Final whether it was being actually there, if you were lucky enough to obtain a ticket or watching the match and it's build up on TV was the scene on that hallowed turf .

There was always a military band. Usually the massed band of the Brigade of Guards or the Royal Marines or the RAF. Always about 100 or so musicians immaculately turned out and resplendent in their uniforms and led by a mace whirling giant of a Drum Major who frequently would hurl his mace high in the air to the instant applause of the 75,000 packed crowd and the gasp of admiration as he caught it with a great flourish whilst on the march. The band would march up and down the pitch with numerous changes of formations and wonderful loud music which was always traditional and well known foot tapping favourites. It was wonderful entertainment for spectators and viewers on TV alike. It was the epitome of England. It was the English FA Cup Final at Wembley. It brought tears to the eyes and a lump to the throats of millions of ex-pats throughout the world. If you were there at Wembley you will never forget the chest swelling national pride you felt at the sight and sound. It will be an abiding memory forever.

At the end of the marching display the band would form up in front of the Royal Box where, later, medals would be presented to the winning and losing teams. This was below but in front those lovely twin towers. Then a platform would be ran out onto the pitch in front of the massed band and a white suited tall man would climb the stairs to the top and conduct the band and the crowd in the massed singing of national football anthems always ending with that beloved favourite "Abide with Me". Then followed the National Anthem with everyone singing at the tops of their voices, chests swelling in pride. With the sound of those massed voices and the loud band it was wonderful .!!

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Compare that with today's feeble attempt to recreate that atmosphere. Tinny blaring piped attempts at music, distorted by loudspeakers which seem to have been deliberately adjusted to be several beats out of sequence around the ground resulting in echoes and hisses and static so as to be barely recognisable. The players march onto the pitch with forlorn young children they have kidnapped somewhere held by the hand but otherwise ignored by players who probably would be unable to speak to them in English even if they wanted to. Hardly anyone sings the National Anthem which is usually led by one lone wannabee attempt of a pop star who is plainly miming to blaring distorted sounds.

Does that even begin to compare with what I have described above from the old days .? Not on your Nelly!! It is pitiful!! The organisers should hang their heads in shame and be forced to sit down in front of films of previous Cup Finals and made to watch how it ought to be done. Where is the National Pride? Where is the memory to carry forward and tell to your grandchildren of that wonderful build up and sense of occasion?... I'm telling you .. It ain't there .!!

Why not .? Is it because today's players receive so much money there is not enough left over to pay for a band I don't think so at the price of tickets nowadays. Even at club grounds things have changed. At Arsenal right up to the sixties at every home match The Metropolitan Police Band would march up and down the ground at half time and entertain the crowd with the highlight of The Drum Major as he passed the Clock End of the ground filled with home supporters hurling his mace 50 feet or so above him on the march and deftly catching it again to the roar and AAAhs of the crowd.. Did he ever drop it? .. Not ever that I know of .!

Some grounds still cling onto tradition. I am pleased to say that The Imps still run onto the pitch to the roar of Merlin engines and The Dam Busters March even though some supporters have asked if this can be replaced with another pop tune. (Please don't let them do it .!). Anyone visiting Everton's ground cannot fail to be impressed by the Z cars theme as the teams leave the tunnel at the start of the match (What is that? Scream our younger readers!... Ask your Granddad about Z Cars!!). Leeds play "On Ilkley Moor Baa Tat" and a few others keep up tradition but not many. If you know of more, please E mail in and tell me.

Me .!!.. I still want to wallow in nostalgia and remember "The Good Old Days" and Cup Finals I have seen and attended and the sights and sounds of yesteryear. But there you go !!.....

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WELTON FAMILY HEALTH CENTRE

The 'flu campaign is well underway but if you are in the " at risk" group of patients and have not yet had a vaccination please make an appointment. We are obliged to write to all patients in these groups who do not attend for such vaccinations so, if you have decided against this, it would also be helpful if you could advise us so that we may amend our records accordingly.

We are delighted to announce that Dr Jenny Glennon will be joining us as part of the GP Registrar Scheme at the end of October to complete her GP training programme.

NHS Lincolnshire is working with groups of practices and ULHT (United Lincolnshire Hospitals Trust) to improve the planning and care of elderly patients in the area. Part of this process involves completing an annual assessment of each patient over the age of seventy five. Some patients may be asked to complete a self assessment form. The aim of the project is to ensure that those in need of support remain in their usual place of residence for as long as possible and have appropriate assistance to do so, and to prevent patients spending time in hospital when community care would be more beneficial. The information collected will assist practices to proactively manage those patients most at risk of hospitalisation or requiring additional input.

Dispensary staff would like to remind patients that if early requests for repeat prescriptions are made it would be helpful to advise us of the reason (e.g. holiday) when ordering.

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




The best performers on the night were Riseholme 'A' team. Many congratulations to them.

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BACKWARDS GLANCE AT SUDBROOKE NEWS

Issue No275 dated March 2001

The Parish Council had been asked to look into the possibility of providing a Boules pitch in the village. They had invited opinions and sought how much support there would have been for such a facility through previous editions of Subrooke News. They decided that there was not sufficient interest at that particular time to justify such a facility but agreed to look into it at a later date should such a need arise

The late Mrs Vera Murdoch, a much loved stalwart and active member of village life, wrote that in her opinion a Boules Pitch would be an under used "Dead Duck" as other than matches it would lie idle. She mentioned in her letter published in Sudbrooke News that the Tennis Court which she described as a cattle pen in appearance needed constant and regular maintenance because of the wooden structure. A Boules pitch would have been much the same. (Is there sufficient support these days to re-open the subject ?)

Mrs Murdoch, in her readers letter went on to describe earlier village lifeThe Cherry Tree Cafe had previously been a shop known as "Whalers" and as "Fir Tree Cottage" a general store which took over trade from one of the California Cottages where you could purchase newspapers etc. Bread ,Milk and Groceries as well as a Butcher, Greengrocer and a Grimsby fish van delivered to most of the houses in the village. The bread was baked in a bakery in Langworth. This continued up until about 1973.

Vera a former "Brown Owl ", drew attention to the formation of Sudbrooke Brownies in 1976 when meetings were held in parishioners houses in front rooms.....She recalled that the late Claude Bramham who had then just recently died had formed Sudbrooke News with 2 pages of typewritten and duplicated sheets. By October 1978 it had 4 pages. (How about our current editions now Vera ?....40 pages ...Claude would be so proud)

Always a regular contributor to this magazine and bursting with ideas she suggested in that edition that thought be given to forming clubs for "The Under 50s and Under 30s", or, in her words "those who lie about their age ".... (These still seem good ideas to me !!. After all ...you are only as old asYou know the rest of the words of that song !!. Who suggested Salsa and Dance classes recently ?) Reading her contributions over the years as I scan back through previous editions I can only say "Thank you Vera .. We miss you and all your letters and input to village life ".


