VICAR'S LETTER

As I write this there are 18 days left on the count-down to the Patronal Flower Festival at St Edward's Church - and hopefully this issue of the magazine will be in your hands before the 'kick-off' at 2 p.m. on Friday 8th October. On the Sunday, there is a Songs of Praise at 6 p.m. led by the Bishop of Lincoln. Eleanor Clarke wrote last month about the full programme and I hope you may find time to come and join us for some of the events.

For the new 'term' there are some changes to the Home Group arrangements. The time has moved to 10.30 on a Tuesday morning (no more battling with cold and dark winter evenings!) and will be integrated with the Prayer Hour programme. Prayer Hour (with coffee after) will meet on the first Tuesday of a month, and still alternate between Sudbrooke and Barlings, while the Home Group will meet on the other Tuesdays of a month. The new programme is set out in the Church Diary.

Other changes are :-

- 1. The Bishop of Lincoln is retiring in January 2011. The Bishop of Grimsby will be the senior man in the Diocese during the inter-regnum period. The process of consultation about the appointment of a new Diocesan Bishop has begun and you may see adverts in the press inviting you to contribute your views about the qualities that you think are desirable in the new appointee.
- 2. The new Priest-in-Charge of the South Lawres Group, the Reverend Penny Green, based at Cherry Willingham, is now in post. This appointment is of particular interest to us as, in the Deanery Plan, when I depart my post will not be replaced and the Benefice will be integrated with the South Lawres Group.

Our national politics are in a new interesting and important situation with a coalition government. St Paul wrote in his first letter to Timothy that "I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for ... for kings and all who are in high positions." St Paul seems to be saying that we should not just criticise our politicians, both local and national, but pray for them – for example that they make wise decisions, for the country, have the strength to resist opportunities for corruption, and are tolerant of views they disagree with. Sometimes it is hard to remember "who is who" in the political field and one practical aid for praying for those elected to run our affairs is to cut out of the newspaper pictures of government ministers, and our local parliamentary and council representatives and keep them in front of you when you pray. It is so much easier to pray for someone with a face before you.

VICAR'S LETTER Cont'd.....

The recent visit of the Pope reminds us that we should also pray for the Church. I quite liked an old prayer of Archbishop William Laud (1573-1645) for this purpose (in which the word "Catholic" is used in its old traditional sense of "Universal" i.e. includes the whole church in all its "denominations") :-

"Gracious Father,

I humbly beseech thee for thy holy Catholic Church.

Fill it with all truth; in all truth with all peace.

Where it is corrupt, purge it; Where it is in error, direct it; where it is superstitious, rectify it; where anything is amiss, reform it; where it is right, strengthen and confirm it; where it is in want, furnish it; where it is divided and rent asunder, make up the breaches of it, O thou Holy One of Israel."

33 PARISHIONERS ITEMS

It was reported that the cabling for the lighting of the Millennium stone had now been sited.

A complaint had been received from a parishioner about damage to a grave in the churchyard. The Clerk was asked to bring this to the attention of the grass cutting contractors in the event that it may have been caused by their machinery.

34 POLICE MATTERS

It was noted that there had been several break-ins to properties in Nettleham and residents should be extra vigilant.

PC Donnah Thompson would shortly be leaving the Nettleham Police Office and PC Dave Morgan would be taking up the position. The Clerk was asked to send a letter of thanks to PC Thompson.

CC Sue Rawlins reported that grants to the County Council had been cut substantially.

The Statement of Community Involvement (agenda item 10a) was outlined by CC Rawlins.

CC Rawlins also explained the Preferred Minerals and Waste Strategies (Agenda item 10b) which was not relevant to Sudbrooke.

- a) Parish Plan The meeting scheduled for 6th July had been cancelled.
- **b) Sports/Fun Day** Mike Halliday had sent a report which stated that duties had been assigned to volunteers. The Risk Assessment would be completed in early September with a final review on the Sports Day. To date no sponsorship had been forthcoming.
- **c) Village Sign** It was reported that the only design proposals for the village sign had been submitted from the wood carving group and it was hoped to provide costings for the October meeting of the Parish Council.
- d) Wood Carving update Nothing to report.
- **e) Erosion of beck bank** There had been a tree fall into the beck due to the erosion of the bank. The Witham Third Drainage Board had been advised and had removed the obstruction.
- **f) Request for Skateboard Park** Following the request for a skateboard park costings had been carried out which were in the region of £85,000.

The original request had been made by residents via District Councillor Stuart Curtis and it was agreed that contact be made with the petition organiser to see if they would be willing to form a working party to investigate funding opportunities.

- **g) Use of sports field by new football team** Notification had been received that this was not now required y the new team.
- **h)** Area near to Millennium stone Councillor Bernard Bartram brought it to the Parish Council's attention that the recently cleared area near to the Millennium stone was becoming overgrown with nettles. It was agreed that this required trimming and the Clerk was given authority to obtain a price from the grass cutting contractors and instruct them to carry out the work.
- i) Street nameplate Green Way A replacement sign had been ordered by WLDC Street team.

Sudbrooke Woods – Reports were made of quad biking in the woods, along with the amount of litter, smashed bottles and camping equipment left by unauthorised campers. The Police are undertaking additional patrols in the woods and giving this area main priority for attention.

Police matters - PC Thompson was congratulated on her permanent appointment as Community Beat Manager for the Nettleham Neighbourhood Policing team. PC Thompson stated that 31 incidents occurring in Sudbrooke had been reported during the last two months.

Highways Meeting – Two Councillors and the Clerk had met with the Principal Highways Officer on 20th July to discuss the matters requiring attention in the village, some of them outstanding since the beginning of the year. Since the meeting some items had since been dealt with but many were still to be carried out.

Overhanging trees around bus shelter on Wragby Road –The main concern of members and the Principal Highways Officer was the dark area created around the bus shelter as a matter of safety for users of the bus shelter. It was hoped that these would be cut back.

Village Litter pick – Arranged for 23rd October.

Watercourse fronting the millennium stone - A letter had been received from the Flood Prevention Officer, WLDC, he having been advised by a resident that the parish may be considering filling in the section of the watercourse fronting the millennium stone. Dear Old Codger

In your piece about Pubs Closing some time ago you failed to mention the coming of the Breathalyser. This really was the start of the decline in the pub trade .

At weekends like many people I know, I loved to go for a ride in the car to visit little villages in the country and call in at the local village Pub. It was great to sample the local brew, enjoy the different atmosphere of each village and it's local and on fine days sit in the Pub Garden and watch the world go by over a pint. When my children were young they loved the ride into the countryside. I remember one Pub, not far from here, that had a large garden beside it with lawns and flowers and a children's play area with a Wendy house and swings and a slide. Very similar to our Bottle and Glass. But the greatest attraction to this pub was the Wishing Well which stood in the centre of the large lawn. It was with great amusement and shrieks of laughter from everyone sitting in the garden that you would see small children, and often their parents, creep furtively, silently and stealthily towards the well and look over it's 3 foot high wall and peer down, only to burst into roars of laughter. This was followed by these children and their parents who couldn't wait to race back, sit down and watch the next victims do exactly the same thing .

A sign over the well read "Please approach quietly and slowly to avoid scaring the water otter". When you looked down the well four feet below you on a chain you saw....."an old iron kettle "There was a collection box for the local hospice on the floor beside the kettle and was always overflowing with coins from amused patrons.

Then came the Breathalyser which made us all aware of the dangers of drink driving and like most other folks my weekend drives out to country pubs finished .

The rural pub trade which had often depended on passing trade rapidly declined and many locals closed down and went out of business. This was a major factor in the current loss of hundreds of these establishments which were so much a part of rural village life loved by so many of us, now sadly, gone forever!!

Weather forecasters now talk of autumn having arrived, and before long will be predicting winter. It would be good to see an Indian summer stretching through the rest of September and October At this time of the year park and garden staff will be clearing away Summer bedding, preparing for winter bedding and bulb planting.

Sports fields will be changing from summer to winter games, and staff will be renovating bowling greens and cricket wickets.

In my own garden, I have started renovating the front lawn, which suffered a bad leather jacket attack earlier in the year. The lawn has been scarified to remove thatch and break up the surface to make a seed bed. The seed has been sown followed by top dressing, at the time of writing, it is raining, so with the job half done, it will have to be completed later. However the rain will encourage the seed already sown to germinate.

Wall baskets have finished their summer display, and will soon be cleared, ready for some winter plants.

In the back garden, work is continuing to reinstall the pergola, which goes for 42 ft across the back of the bungalow. The pergola was damaged in a storm last winter and was completely removed to allow new fascia and guttering to be fitted. Now with the pergola repaired and repainted it should soon be back to its former state.

There is still quite a lot of colour in the garden with michaelmas daisies, rudbeckia, sedum, schizostylis, (sometimes called Kaffir lily) and still a few white daisies, and roses.

The rockery is still showing quite a lot of colour, mainly a deep blue campanula.

The fruit border, with Victoria plum and a Cox's orange apple tree have fruited very well, along with the blackberries which still have fruit on them, but don't like the rain, so will soon be finished.

My job as the Ink Monitor was to fill the inkwells that were in the top right hand corner of each school desk. I also got to issue out the pens and pen nibs. None of your ball pens in those days and no one at that early age had a fountain pen. The ink was always Jet Black and in a large glass bottle. I never did master the art of pouring it into the ink wells without managing to get some of it all over my hands and shirt and the odd smudge on my face. No wonder no other child was eager to get the job. The result was that my work always had ink marks on it and I was always getting it in the neck from my Mum for giving her extra washingNo, not getting the ink in my neckOh ,never mind I know what I mean .!!

From then on I have always had a fascination with Pens. I received my first fountain pen at the age of eleven. It was a Parker and was my pride and joy. It was the Rolls Royce of pens....Nowadays you only have to fill in an application form for something on TV to get one for nothing but in those days it cost a small fortune. I treasured it and was the envy of most of my school friends. Some other well known makes of pens included Conway-Stewart and Swan, but there were many others.

All of them were filled with ink by unscrewing the body of the pen to reveal a small lever which, when depressed pushed against a small rubber sheath which was then released, causing it to suck up ink from a small jar labeled Quink or Stephens. Although there were many coloured inks on the market, schoolchildren were only allowed to use Black or Blue colours for schoolwork. Much later in life I came across green ink which was only used by highly ranked officials in the Civil Service and Armed Forces as a symbol of their status in life. I never rose to that enviable position.

Around this time ball pens were beginning to come on to the market but they were

banned in almost all schools as being an encouragement to slovenly and untidy writing. It was the fountain pen or the school standard issue pen and nib only. I wonder if I could have got away with using a quill pen from a goose or turkey which had to be sharpened with a razor blade. But I never had the courage to try it. Because the very first ball pens on the market were made by a firm called Biro, all ball pens were called Biro's for many years until another firm called Bic arrived on the market. After that they became just known as ball pens. When Biro introduced the ball pen they were very expensive but the arrival of Bic pens slashed prices dramatically, so much so that some banks give them away free now every time you go to the counter and you can buy cheap plastic ones for as little as a couple of pence each.

The old fashioned fountain pens are still being made and almost all important documents are still signed using such pens. No one would think of signing any historic manuscript with any of today's new fangled ball pens. Famously you can see the end of hostilities in various conflicts being signed by fountain pens and it would often be the case that several different fountain pens would be used to give important dignitaries the privilege of owning an historic memento. Auction houses sell fountain pens for vast sums of money as eager bidders snap them up for their collections. There is something wonderful about the feel of a fountain pen in your hand that no ball pen can compare. I have heard a rumor that our own village is privileged to have a very well known and esteemed maker of hand crafted fountain pens in our midst. I hope this article has got you rooting through your drawers and bureaus and that some of you unearth the odd one or two that may surprise you when you click into E Bay to find out their value.

On the subject of writing can I confide in you something that annoys me intensely. As a Grandfather.. Indeed a Great Grandfather, I have many children's birthdays to remember. I am in the habit of sending a birthday card with a £5 note in it to each one . Not a lot of money these days I admit but to an OAP it's not insignificant....I know it ought to be a ch eque or postal order but never mind .!! There is only one of my nineteen offspring who bothers to write to me or my wife to say thank you .

When my own children were young I used to insist that they sat down with pen and paper and wrote a letter of thanks for every birthday or Xmas card received whether they contained a gift or notThere was a communication skill to be learnt in doing this. They had to compose a letter, include in it some small bit of school news or family news and often a small drawing or suchlike and often a small school photo. They had to place it in an envelope, seal it, address it, stick a stamp on it and

then personally put it in a letter box. I think it was a valuable lesson to teach them that would stand them in good stead for the rest of their lives. Unfortunately this has not been carried forward to my grandchildren and I feel it is their loss and well as mine. Everyone likes to receive a letter as long as it's not a bill.!....It's not the same to get one of those text messages in some new fangled ,garbage type, misspelt, so called text speak, language that we Old Codgers can't understand....Not that many of them even bother to send one of those either, but I suppose the thought was there.

So if you are a parent of a young child ...Think on !!...We "Oldies" love to get a letter. Encourage your kiddies to write one. It's good for their education and life skills and at least it lets us know that our card has been delivered .But that's enough winging from this Old Codger.

If I had any decency I'd be dead now. Most of my friends are.... They're in heaven now and wondering where I am and starting to wonder if I have gone to the other place. There are far worse ways of dying than dying of old ageI don't mind dying ...I just don't want to be there when it happens....There are only two times in life when they pronounce you anything and that's to pronounce you "Man and Wife" or pronounce you "Dead"....Winston Churchill famously said ..."I am ready to meet my Maker ..Whether he is ready to meet me is another matter?."...Why haven't I done more in my life I keep asking myself when I read other peoples obituaries?....Is it because I have been too busy enjoying myself and having a good time?....Can't be that badCan it?We need Old Friends to help us grow old and New Friends to help us stay young....Thank you all for being my friends...Be lucky in Love and Life ..!!

As the lifespan of the parish plan extends until 2017,


it is possible to reconstitute the parish plan group at any time should this become necessary.

WELTON FAMILY HEALTH CENTRE

It doesn't seem like twelve months since we were in the throes of the 'flu campaign last year and here we are again!

We are offering two Saturday morning clinics – 2nd and 9th October which patients may book into and in addition vaccines will also be offered opportunistically to those patients who fall into the relevant " at risk " categories, including pregnant ladies. Other clinics will be scheduled during the months of October and November as needed. As in previous years we are unable to offer vaccination on the NHS for anyone outside the recognised groups although the vaccine may be available on a private basis from our neighbouring practices. Under NHS regulations we are unable to offer these vaccines on a private basis to our own registered patients. If you are unsure whether you fall into the appropriate category please enquire.

It would be appreciated if patients could remember to ring or call in for the results of tests after 10.30am and ideally in an afternoon to allow the medical staff time to review and pass comment.

We have been advised by a patient of a worrying telephone call received recently from someone purportedly from this surgery. Fortunately the person concerned did not offer any answers to the questions posed by the caller and ended the call. However we would like to remind patients that if they are in any doubt about the authenticity of a call allegedly from any of the surgery staff, they should always ring back on a known telephone number to check and if there is any doubt report it to the Practice.

We have had a spate of cheques been given for payment in recent weeks which have subsequently "bounced" when presented to the bank and we would like to remind patients that we will now require a suitable cheque guarantee card with all payments settled by cheque. We also ask for payment for all private vaccinations before administering and for medicals, reports etc. at the time of the examination or receiving the report unless prior arrangements have been agreed. We too are a business and have to pay for such vaccines when ordered, whether used or not. In line with commercial pharmacies, prescriptions must also be paid for at the time of collection, we do not offer credit facilities.

Whilst we are happy to offer private services for medicals, writing letters of support, completion of insurance forms etc. we would respectfully remind patients that our priority is always our NHS workload and whilst appreciating patients' needs, every effort will be made to assist patients with private requests, on occasions workload demands may mean that delays occur. Please give any such requests to our reception staff and not directly to the doctors in surgery, so that they may be logged and appropriately processed.

Finally 52 patients failed to attend booked appointments in August and we are

Next meeting Monday, 11th October at village hall from 7-30pm. Guest speaker is Stephan Lovell. Everyone is welcome to attend.




