A prayer for calming us down in the midst of difficulties or crisis is the one known as the Serenity Prayer:

"God grant us the serenity to accept the things we cannot change, courage to change the things we can, and wisdom to know the difference."

The prayer has been popularized through the work of Alcoholics Anonymous. Where it came from is still a mystery. Alcoholics Anonymous picked it up from a 1942 obituary in a New York newspaper. Protestant theologian Reinhold Niebuhr (1892-1971) later revealed he had written it as the ending of a sermon. After his death a similar prayer was found in the writings of Theodor Wilhelm, a German university professor who published using the name of the 18Cth Pietist Friedrich Oetinger (1702-1782). A similar prayer came to light appearing to be derived from a 14Cth source called the General's Prayer.

Quite a lot has been written recently about surveys of people's knowledge of the Bible when compared to previous generations. For instance, can you remember the 10 Plagues of Egypt – or the order they came in ? As a 'refresher':-

- 1. Water of the Nile turned to blood (Exod. 7:20)
- 2. Frogs covering the land (Exod. 8:6)
- 3. Gnats covering the land and its creatures (Exod. 8:17)
- 4. Flies ruining the land (Exod. 8:24)
- 5. A plague destroying cattle and other animals (Exod. 9:6)
- 6. Boils or sores on people and animals (Exod. 9:10)

- 7. Hailstorm (Exod. 9:23)
- 8. Locusts destroying all plants (Exod. 10:13-15)
- 9. Darkness for three days (Exod. 10:22)
- 10. Death of the firstborn of people and cattle (Exod. 12:29)

Quite a collection! Yet, important because they lead up to the Exodus led by Moses which ended with the Jewish People occupying "the promised land": eventually, after a lengthy journey through the desert!

Then there are numerous "Numerical" questions for a Quiz. Take the number 7, for example. It appears a lot of times, e.g. groups of 7 of "this" or "that": indeed the total of such groups of 7's is 107. Do you know what they are and where they may be found?

The Bible is part of our English Heritage. Many common phrases in daily use are drawn from it, e.g. :-"My brother's keeper" "An eye for an eye" "The apple of his eye" "Rod of iron" "Writing on the wall" "Straight and narrow" "Wolf in sheep's clothing" "The blind leading the blind" "Physician, heal yourself" "Eat, drink, and be merry" "The root of all evil" Our language used to be filled with apt quotations from the Bible and Shakespeare. It was a natural part of our heritage. It would be sad to see this pass away - through ignorance or laziness. It is already somewhat disconcerting to find that Americans know their Bibles and the works of Shakespeare better than many, many people in this country.

Dear Editor

I am just retiring from the RAF and my demob station is RAF Scampton.

I saw Mr Yeoman's letter in the August edition of the Sudbrooke News and in response, I can offer the following information concerning his enquiry:

On Tuesday, October 14, 1975, an Avro Vulcan B MK.2 XM645 of IX Squadron, RAF Waddington, crashed during landing at Malta's RAF Luqa airbase. Just before hitting the runway, the Vulcan's port wing sank dangerously, making contact with the ground. As a result the main wheel undercarriage on that side was torn off and fell onto the runway. During landing, the port (left) undercarriage collapsed forcing the crew to overshoot to do another circuit for an emergency landing on foamed runway. The aircraft slid on its belly for some time, damaging the undersurfaces, although the pilot managed to put all four Olympus engines into full throttle to force his crippled mount back into the air. Air Traffic Control warned the pilot about the damage. and that his aircraft was on fire; he replied that he would do a circuit and attempt a belly-landing on the same runway after it had been covered in foam. On the inbound track of the circuit pattern, the aircraft suddenly exploded, breaking into two main sections and a smaller third part which floated down into Zabbar, trailing a thick pall of smoke. Over Poala village, two para-

chutes were seen, and a few seconds later XM645 turned into a fireball. The pilot and navigator, the only two crew members provided with an ejector seat, where thrown out with the force of the explosion and managed to escape by parachute; the other five members of the crew were killed.

The four airmen killed in the accident, Sqn Ldr Beeden, age 38; Flt Lt Lambert, age 42; Flt Lt Pulman, age 34 and Sgt Atkins, age 31, were buried at Nettleham; Chief Technician Barrow was the fifth airman who died but is not buried at Nettleham.

This information was provided by Mr Mervyn Hallam, the Curator of the Dambusters Museum at RAF Scampton. Receiving my request for information, he contacted a colleague, Mr Hodgson who provided the link to the website.

This seems an opportune moment to remind readers that the RAF Scampton Dambusters Museum is open for all to visit, by arrangement only, through Mr Mervyn Hallam on 01522 683856/731462 or Mr Roger Crisp on 01522 500738.

The Museum is now located inside Hangar 1 on the airfield and if you're lucky on the day of your visit, you might even see the Red Arrows.

Who dares wins !! ...as COLUMBO said when he INVENTED America.....There I gojust like everyone else I am letting TV influence my thoughts and my conversation. It is truly amazing how TV has become such an important part of all our lives ...We all watch it, we all discuss it and we all are influenced by it in what we spend our money on. The way we vote ...what we eat and drink and how we spend our leisure time .

Just think back to just after the last warHardly anyone owned a TV....the wireless was king ...!!....(My grandchildren keep telling me off for not calling it radio). Can any other Old Codgers of my age recall having to walk to the nearest place to supply what was called an accumulator and get our own one charged up and then lug it back home again to provide power for the family wireless. The thing was half the size of today's car battery and seemed to weigh a ton to a small childRemember...Few folks owned a car in those daysNettleham was the nearest stockist and top up point ... The whole family would gather round the one wireless in our home set in pride of place in the living room and Mum or Dad would tune into either The Home or Light programmesNo multiple choice thenIt was years later that we were able to receive Radio Luxemburg and even later to receive the Pirate radio stations .

Itma ..Vera Lynn ..Housewives choice ... Workers playtime ...Gracie Fields Wilfred Pickles ..The Glums ...Educating Archie ...The Navy Lark ...Forces Favourites and of course The Goon show ...and Dick Barton ...Also during the war years ..Lord Haw Hawwere heard by just as large an audience as any of today's soaps on TV...Catch phrases of the day were greeted by hilarious laughter both by studio audiences and listenerseven though they were the same each week....Who can forgetCan you hear me mother ? !!!...Can I do you now Sir? !!...The Day war broke out !! and many similar and equally stupid remarks .

The sports coverage was great especially the boxing commentaries by Raymond Glendenning of fights by Bruce Woodcock ...Randolf Turpin,...Don Cockell and Freddie Mills etc ...In those days they were usually fighting for a

world title and as there was only one world title it really meant somethingNowadays with about five Mickey Mouse tiles at each weight it has devalued the very name World title.

At 5pm every Saturday ...half of the nation was glued to the radio for the soccer results ...to check the football pools looking for those magical 8 drawsThe news reader had that magical inflection in his voice that indicated either a home win ,a draw or an away win that was an art in itself .

Thanks for all your letters and E mails with questions about the village and local area . The Headhitter has promised to print as many as he can as time and space permits so keep sending them in.....If it interests you it will interest plenty of others so don't delayput pen to paper or finger to computer now.

My especial thanks go to the readers who sent in the replies about the RAF graves in Nettleham and included web sites that give the full story of the tragic loss of life that occurred when a Vulcan bomber from RAF Waddington crashed in Malta killing the crew members who lived locally. Such a terrible loss of life that is all the more relevant with the news almost daily of our current casualties being sustained in current conflicts. We should all be so proud of our servicemen and women and a visit to these graves to pay our respects is the least we can do to honour them. Our thoughts as always go



Hello to everyone from the Nettleham area Neighbourhood Policing Team. I am PC 440 David Morgan, and have replaced Mark Lassmans as the Community Beat Manager for the area

This is my first report and due to editorial deadlines is being written before I actually start my new role. Hopefully by the time you are reading this I will have been around for a few weeks.

Firstly I would like to thank Mark Lassmans for doing all the hard work over the years that he was here. He really has made it easy for me to step into his shoes! He will be missed and I hope I can do just as good a job. Also I should thank my new deputy PCSO Jackie Parker, who has had to hold the fort at Nettleham on her own for the past couple of months.

A bit about me, I joined Lincolnshire Police in 1995 and have worked in response and community beat roles in Lincoln, North Hykeham, and the Market Rasen sector, and also a short spell in Lincoln as acting sergeant. I had to get past 2 other excellent candidates for this role, and now have to live up to all the things I said I would do in the

job interview!

Obviously some are bigger than others, but they are all equally important to the people that live there.

Recently there was an incident in Sudbrooke Woods where a male exposed

himself to 2 young girls. This appears to be an isolated incident, but it does serve as a reminder for parents everywhere to check where your children play and make sure you are happy with the areas they go to. There have also been problems around the Lincoln area with distraction burglaries, where the thief claims to be from the water board, or checking the gas etc. Please be vigilant and never be afraid to challenge an official for their identity cards. If in doubt contact the organisation they claim to be from, and if you are suspicious contact the Police. Also, following problems with youths on motorbikes in several villages, local officers have seized 2 motorbikes.

I would like to take this opportunity to publicize the Lincolnshire Police website. There is a section for neighbourhood policing with links to the Nettleham policing area. 
