## VICAR'S LETTER

### *The Vicarage, Langworth*

In this season of Advent we prepare for the celebration of Christmas – a time when the joy of a new hope for the world is remembered in the birth of Jesus Christ. Given the current conditions in the economy in our country, sadly, this year, given the uncertainties of what lies ahead, it may also be a time of concern and worry for many folk. Yet, Christmas is always a sign of a new beginnings and I hope many of you will be able to join in the services in the benefice over the period – the list is in the Church Diary (including the Carol Services).

Whatever one's situation, or worries, it is always good to pray, and the services are an opportunity to do this.

Recently, it has been good to see, and be involved with, initiatives that bring together christians of different churches and fellowships in our Deanery. It is perhaps the next stage in exploring the 'Federation Model' concept that has been evolving in the Deanery over the past few years. Apart from the parishes in the Deanery, we must always remember that there are other churches exercising similar ministries and working alongside us to the same ends. When we remember 'our neighbours in Christ', we can recall part of Jesus' High Priestly Prayer (John 17: 20-21) :- "that they may all be one, just as you, Father, are in me, and I in you, that they also may be in us, so that the world may believe that you have sent me."

Some years ago, the World Council of

Churches published the "Lund Principle" that "We should do only separately what Conscience forbids us to do together". There is also the cautionary tale related by David du Plessis :-

"There came a day when God challenged me to go to my brethren in other churches.

'But, they are dead !' – I said.

'Yes : but I never sent any disciples to bury the dead. I sent them to raise the dead.'

'But - they're enemies !'

God said : 'I have given you an invincible weapon against your enemies : Love your enemies.'

I said : 'How can I love people who do things of which I cannot approve ?'

God said : 'Forgive them. Forgive them.'

I said : 'Lord, I can't forgive them.

How can I justify their teachings, their actions, their deeds ?'

He said : 'I never gave you any authority to justify anybody. I only gave christians authority to forgive everybody.'"

St. Paul wrote (Philippians 2:2) "Make my joy complete by being of the same mind, having the same love, being in full accord and of one mind", and the Psalmist declared (Psalm 133:1) "Behold how good and pleasant it is when brothers dwell in unity".

We are to a very great extent, as far as the Church is concerned, prisoners of history. In many ways we are also prisoners of certain theological presuppositions that have gradually been accepted without sufficient consideration. We are prisoners of history in that somehow what **has**

happened seems gradually to have become what **should** happen.

Christmas is a good time for all christians to remember how much we hold in common in our faith, rather than what has caused historical man-made divisions, and that the future

does not have to be dominated by history. It is a time for new beginnings – for individuals and institutions.

# **PARISH COUNCIL MINUTES**

## **NOTES OF THE MEETING OF SUSBROOKE PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON THURSDAY, 2<sup>ND</sup> OCTOBER 2008 IN THE VILLAGE HALL, SUSBROOKE**

**PRESENT:** Councillors M Dickie (Chairman), N James, Miss R Dobbs, S Curtis, Mrs L Etheridge, Mrs C Myers (Clerk), Mrs B Solly (Treasurer), PC M Lassmans, 4 members of the public  
**APOLOGIES:** Councillors B Bartram, P Rignall, I Russell, County Councillor R Hiscox

### **69 PARISHIONERS ITEMS**

Councillor Stuart Curtis stated that he had been asked by the bereaved family of a young man from the village if a seat could be placed on the playing field in his memory. Members of the Parish Council expressed their condolences to the family and agreed to this request in principle. It would be discussed further at a future meeting of the Parish Council.

Reports had been made of a strong smell in the village which it was understood emanated from manure being spread on fields. It was pointed out that a report must be made at the time to the Environmental Department of the District Council so that they may investigate.

### **70 POLICE MATTERS**

PC Mark Lassmans reported on house break-ins in the village and an attempted break-in at the Village Hall.

It was noted that a letter of support from the Parish Council had been sent

to PC Lassmans in his endeavour to obtain an additional patrol vehicle for the Nettleham Police Office.

### **71 COUNTY COUNCILLORS REPORT**

County Councillor R Hiscox had sent a written report which was read out and an invitation to the Chairman inviting him to attend a local Parish/District/County Council liaison meeting for the Welton Rural division. The Chairman agreed to attend if he was available on the date of the meeting.

### **72 DISTRICT COUNCILLORS REPORT**

DC Stuart Curtis reported on the following:-

- That the Local Councillor Initiative Fund was available for local organisations who should contact him for consideration for funding.
- That there had been two breaches of planning in the village which were currently being investigated by the Planning Department.
- That it was hoped that green wheelie bins would be free from next April. Councillor Curtis was asked if all residents of the Parish would be able to have a green bin or just those who ask, and whether it was possible for residents who had green bins to have free compost, or purchase at *reduced rates, similar to the Great Northern Terrace waste site.*
- West Lindsey District Council

were encouraging residents to go paper free for billing and the District Council would then plant trees. The question was asked as to would the trees be planted in the village where people went paperless.

### **73 NOTES OF MEETING HELD ON 4<sup>TH</sup> SEPTEMBER 2008**

These were signed as a correct record.

### **74 REPORTS ON MATTERS OUTSTANDING**

**a) Highway matters – Overhanging trees – St Edward’s Drive** – The overhanging trees at the junction of St Edward’s Drive/Wragby Road had been reported to the County Council.

**b) Litter Pick** – Arranged for 9.30am, 15<sup>th</sup> November, meeting at the Village Hall. Mr Mike Halliday and Cllr Bernard Bartram to organise.

**c) Sports Day – Review** – The Sports Day held on 7<sup>th</sup> September had been a success with approximately 50 children attending.

**d) Wood Carving Community Project** – Helen Link reported that she would commence the project on 5<sup>th</sup> October and to date there had been good interest shown. Helen agreed to keep the Parish Council updated on the project.

**e) Bulb planting** – Daffodils and tulips had been purchased for planting around the signs at the entrances to the village. Councillor Bernard Bartram would co-ordinate the planting and volunteers were

required.

**f) First Aid Course** – A local resident had agreed to run a First Aid Course on 2<sup>nd</sup> November 2008 for Councillors up to a maximum of 16 persons at a cost of £5 per head to cover administration costs. It was agreed that this would be most useful for members as many functions required a First Aider in attendance. Any spare places be offered to other local organisations.

### **75 SPORTSFIELD REPORT**

**a) Multi-Purpose Sports Area** – The surface problems on the MPSA had been checked by the contractor and reported as there being no faults. It was suggested by the contractor that the Parish Council may want to take advantage of annual maintenance of the surface, which included eradication of moss, at a cost of £380. It was agreed that this maintenance be considered for the 2009/10 Precept.

**b) Re-surfacing of Play equipment on Village Hall Site** – The Clerk reported that this is due to commence on 13<sup>th</sup> October 2008.

**c) Repair of baseboard on play equipment at Northfield Park site** – One quotation had been received to date and the Clerk was seeking a further price. The Clerk was given authority to instruct the company supplying the lesser costing to carry out the work.

**d) Playground Inspection Report** – A copy of the annual report was given to each Councillor for perusal.

Councillor Russell was to be asked if he would check on the trees and shrubs around the play area as to what work was required to them and report his findings at the next meeting.

## **PARISH COUNCIL REPORT**

### **Report of Parish Council meeting held on 6th November 2008**

**Overhanging trees** , Church Lane/ Scothern Lane junction – Reports were made of problems on this corner with branches from overhanging trees hitting vehicles, this matter would be reported to the Highways Department of the County Council.

**Bulb Planting** – Volunteers offered their services for planting bulbs around the village nameplates at the entrances to the village.

**Play equipment** re-surfacing – The works were now complete on the re-surfacing of the equipment on the Village Hall site, £4,000 of the total sum being a grant from the Landfill communities fund.

#### **Seat in memory of Ryan Hides**

Ryan's Mum and Auntie were in attendance at the meeting and said that they would like to site a seat in the village in Ryan's memory and that the family would like the seat sited in the Northfield Park area if possible. Councillors thought this would be an ideal place for the seat and agreed to have a site meeting to agree a suitable site and report back to the next meeting.

Planting of Christmas Trees – Consideration would be given to the planting

of some Christmas trees in the area of the Millennium stone with a hope that one of them could be used in a few years time as the Village Christmas Tree.

**Christmas Tree Event** - All arrangements were well in hand for the switch on of the Christmas tree lights on 30th November.

**Dropped Kerbs** – At last, after 3 years and much communication with the County Council, the dropped kerbs have been fitted on Elm Drive, providing easier access when crossing the road to the shop for wheelchair users and mums with push chairs. Persistence must be the key in this matter and former Parish Councillor Derek Ordish was thanked for his efforts, many meetings with representatives of the County Council and his patience in endeavouring to see this project fulfilled!

# NEW YEAR'S EVE

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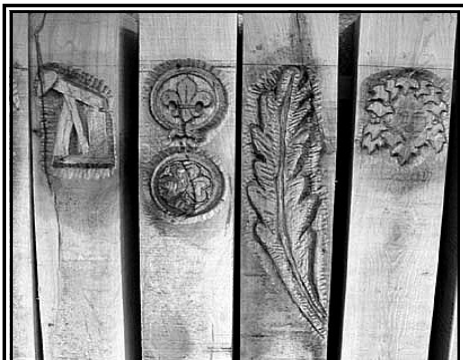

Welcome to this December edition of Police News. Firstly, let me wish you all a very merry Christmas, and Jackie and I, along with everyone here at Nettleham Police Station, hope you have an enjoyable time whatever your plans may be.

It's customary at this time of year to start our annual drink drive campaign. This year is no exception, and although we deal with those who drink drive throughout the year, December is a time when more parties are held than at any other time, and the likelihood of someone driving under the influence of alcohol increases. Increased patrols, particularly in rural areas, will be carried out to deter people from committing offences. It is no secret that many people will drive from their homes to the pub, even if its in the same village, and back again later after consuming alcohol believing that they will not be caught. Extra patrols will be carried out in rural villages to deter this from happening, and if you are caught drink driving you will be dealt with according to the law, even if you are caught outside your home address or pulling onto your driveway. If you are convicted of drink driving you will be banned from driving for at least 12 months, usually longer, and also be required to pay a hefty fine. If you're involved in an acci-

dent whilst under the influence of alcohol, whether you are to blame or not, and someone is injured, you could even face a prison sentence. Think of the effects that a ban or a prison sentence will have on your family, your friends, and your livelihood, and ask yourself is it really worth it? If you have to drive, don't drink, but if you do drink, then don't drive, it's that easy!!

Can I ask all parents, particularly those who have children that do paper rounds, to make sure your children have working lights on their bikes, and helmets on, please? The longer nights have been with us for a while now, and Jackie and I are seeing an increasing number of children riding on bikes on roads and pavements without lights or helmets on. This can make them very difficult to see until you are almost upon them, and the chances of a child being knocked off and injured are greatly increased, particularly if a helmet isn't being worn. Cycling is a great way of exercising, and gets children and adults alike out into the fresh air and away from the TV and the computers, but it needs to be done safely. Adults, you could set an example to your children by doing likewise! If anyone would like some advice on safe cycling, please don't hesitate to get in touch with Jackie or myself, as we have

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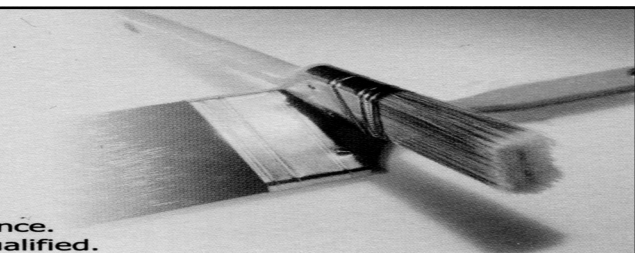
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## **Green Waste Bins**

A free green bin garden waste collection service for over 65s will be introduced throughout West Lindsey from April 2009.

The Council is also committed to providing a value for money service which returns a recycling rate of 55% by 2015. The rate for 2007/8 was 37.7% and the forecast for 2008-9 is between 40 and 43%.

To achieve the increase required it is hoped that all households will get free garden waste recycling from September/October 2009.

Before the new green waste schemes are introduced the Council is planning a major public consultation exercise on how the arrangements can best be implemented.

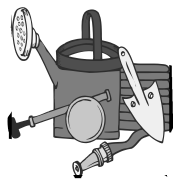

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## COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S CORNER

### Credit Crunch Consequences

Last month, I undertook to keep people up to date on the effects of the credit crunch on our councils. I gave the address (URL) of my new county council web site (listed below) which contains a page with the latest details I have. You can also contact me via this site as well if you wish.

But this service will not replace these articles.

Last month I mentioned the possible effect of this financial turmoil on council pension funds. A lower valuation of a fund's assets might give rise for the need for an increase in employer contributions which would in turn end up being a cost to the council tax payer. I have been assured that this will not be a problem in the short and medium term for the county council.

I think it might be useful to explain that most county council staff belong to a normal pension scheme, which pays pensions from invested funds. This is not the norm in other sections of public services. These have **unfunded** pension arrangements.

With this system, this month's contributions pay this month's pensions. The employer, often the government, makes good any shortfall. This is the arrangement for our police officers for example. I have been told that **over half of the budget** for the Metropolitan Police Service in London is used to top up pensions in this way. One of the few advantages of these pension arrangements for taxpayers is the fact that they are not susceptible to fluctuations in the stock market valuation. But this is an exception. Over time, the public purse is substantially worse off with the long term consequences of unfunded

schemes.

As far as I am aware, no government to date has attempted direct major reform of this, but it would be a huge short term cost for the nation as a whole. It is one effect of privatisation that the pension arrangements are privatised as well. One may speculate that this is one unpublicised benefit to the public purse of such outsourcing, when the organisational and efficiency benefits of these changes are not all that apparent! Overall, therefore, we benefit from the present arrangements at LCC compared to other services our taxes pay for.

On a completely different tack, I was instrumental in organising a seminar bringing together all three tiers of Local Government in this area. That is Parish, District and County Councils. Delegates were of the view that such get togethers were a useful forum and I am grateful to the parish and district representatives for giving up their time. 8 of the nine parish

councils were represented, as were two of the three district council wards. It is my belief that we should try to offer a seamless service to those we represent although there are quite a few hurdles in the way at present.

The security arrangements at County Hall on a Saturday meant that this first meeting was not open to the public, but this is an issue we can consider at our next meeting which will be in Welton in January. As ever, your thoughts would be appreciated.
