The schools have broken up and the universities have 'come down' and this is traditionally the time of family holidays. I hope you may all have the chance of a refreshing and recharging family break - away from the worries and pressure of work and the daily round of life. Perhaps a lengthy period of real summer weather will turn up. As I write, the skies are still grey and we are being 'monsooned' by heavy thunderstorms. Indeed, yesterday, I had to admit four aged and protesting cats who were not amused by the flooded back yard on their way to the back door !

A summer holiday is a time for reading a book. A good value volume is David Winter's "The One-Stop Guide to Christianity published as a hardback by Lion Hudson at \pounds 9-99 (Melanie Carroll at Unicorn Tree Books in Lincoln's Central Market – Tel. 01522 525557 – can get in a copy if you have difficulty finding it elsewhere).

David Winter is a popular and experienced writer who regularly contributes to "Thought for the Day" on Radio 4,and is a former Head of Religious Broadcasting at the BBC.

He has produced a book in which he guides us through the history, beliefs and practices of the Christian Faith from the time of Jesus to the 21st Century. He includes sections, for example, on key figures in Christianity, churches and denominations, Christian worship and music, art, relationships with other faiths, and practical issues for day to day living. It is attractively laid out with detailed maps, extensive colour photography, background material, and many special features. All this for just £9-99 !

Divided into 59 wide-ranging topic sections and an index, it is an easy to read, highly visual, guide, full of information and insight. It would be helpful to any young student in school or higher education, and, indeed, is ideal for anyone of any age wanting to explore the rich history of Christianity – or wanting to know more about their faith.

Another excellent recent 'find' is "The Bible - New International Version Encyclopaedia Edition" at £13-99. A hardback, in which the first half is a section of Lion material covering just about anything one needs to know about the Christian scriptures. Colourfully illustrated and packed with maps, there are also a Concordance, Dictionary, Subject Index, and individual introductions to each of the 66 books. Copies of this Bible were given recently to the members of Ellison Boulters HC4U Communion Club by the Bishop of Grimsby, when he also awarded them their Certificates of Admission to Holy Communion. Thoroughly recommended.

19 PARISHIONERS ITEMS

The following were brought to the attention of Councillors:

a) That trimming back of shrubs is required along Wragby Road which are overhanging the footway. The Clerk would notify the Highways Officer regarding this.b) A request for allotment space had been made to a Councillor. A request for such provision should be put in writing to the Clerk.

20 POLICE MATTERS

It was noted that PC Mark Lassmans had been promoted to Sergeant and had moved to a post elsewhere. Thanks had been extended to PC Lassmans for his work in the village and his close association with the Parish Council. His replacement would be announced shortly.

21 NOTES OF MEETING HELD ON 2ND MAY 2009

These were signed as a correct record.

22 DISTRICT COUNCILLORS REPORT

DC Stuart Curtis brought to the attention of Councillors the West Lindsey Area Forum to be held on Monday 29th June 2009 at Gainsborough.

23 REPORTS ON MATTERS OUTSTANDING

a) Highway matters - **debris on Scothern Lane verge** – Cllr Stuart Curtis and the Clerk had made further enquiries/reports about the condition in which the verge had been left by the farmer cleaning out the dyke. It was noted that some areas had now been rolled. However the farmer had given assurances that correct re-instatement would take place.

b) Area Response Team – The Highways Area Response Team were currently working in the village on the list of requirements supplied by the Parish Council.

c) Parish Plan update – Nothing to report.

d) Parish Council insurance schedule – amendments – The Clerk reminded members of the decision made by the Parish Council in 2005 not to insure the play equipment, saving \$500/\$600 per year. Members agreed that this decision still apply.

24 BRANCHES/TRESS OVERHANGING FOOTWAY FROM RESIDENTS GARDENS

It was reported that there were several areas where trees/shrubs were overhanging the footway. Members felt that a request in person by a Councillor for trimming back the shrubs would be more appropriate than a letter.

25 SPORTSFIELD REPORT

A) Hiring Agreement – A draft agreement had been drawn up for the users of the sports field. All Councillors were supplied a copy and this would be reviewed and agreed at the next meeting of the Parish Council.

It was also stated that the rent for the field should be paid in advance of use.

B) Payment for hiring of field by Scothern Football Club - 2008/9 season – The Treasurer reported that the cheque payment for the hiring of the Sportsfield for the last season had been returned as uncleared, although payment in cash had now been received. It was pointed out however that a charge had been made by the Parish Council's bank for the uncleared cheque and it was agreed that this payment should also be met by the Football Club.

Following discussions with Mr Nick Truscott he had agreed to continue as Editor. Assistance was required with the publication of the magazine as recent offers of help had not transpired. Further advertising for a Deputy Editor would be made in the magazine.

If your dog is off the lead when it attacks another, and causes injury, it is an offence under the Dangerous Dogs Act, which in some cases can see the offending dogs destroyed. Please make sure your dogs are under control at all times, and are with someone who can handle them.

<u>At the time of writing we are putting our</u> <u>pandemic plans into place in anticipation of a</u> <u>potential surge in Swine Flu cases</u>

The GP surgeries at Welton and Nettleham are working closely with each other to ensure that we can both continue to serve the patients of our practices if resources become overstretched.

Current advice if you have a temperature and are displaying flu like symptoms is to remain at home and contact either NHS Direct (0845 4647) or your surgery for advice. Do NOT come in person to the surgery if you think you may have flu. Shortly a National Flu Line will become available which will aim to deal with the majority of uncomplicated flu with surgeries concentrating on those aged under five or over sixty five, pregnant or with known underlying health problems and others with complications. Every patient is advised to identify a "'Flu Friend" as a precautionary measure - this person may be asked to collect the authorisation letter from the surgery to take to an Anti Viral Centre where the antiviral medications are given out. Anti-viral drugs will NOT be available from the GP surgeries, only at these designated collection points and with an authorisation letter. The Flu Friend will also be required to produce identification for themselves and for the patient when collecting the medication. Hospitals will also be working under additional pressures in the event of a large outbreak and routine operations may need to be cancelled, outpatient appointments suspended and some patients who would normally be seen in hospital may need to be treated at home instead

A vaccination is anticipated in early autumn and we understand that it will be offered to a similar group of patients to those who are normally entitled to the seasonal flu vaccination. Our websites will be updated regularly with the current information (<u>www.weltonsurgery.co.uk</u>) and (<u>www.nettlehammedical.co.uk</u>).

We would also like to point out that we have cleared our waiting room of toys, books and all other items which may get in the way of thorough cleaning and ask patients to kindly suspend bringing in magazines for us at the present time.

Sudbrooke Archaeology Family Fun Day



On Saturday July 18th I attended Sudbrooke Sports Field where The Friends of Sudbrooke Roman Villa together with Bishop Grosseteste.....(That's a mouthful!!) ...Archaeology department were holding an open day to show villagers what they get up to (or down to really !!!)

The display was organised by Craig Spence the Director of Archaeology at the College and his very cheerful and enthusiastic band of volunteer helpers. It consisted of many stalls where you were encouraged to take part in metal detecting and recognising artefacts that can be found around Sudbrooke which was a Roman Settlement in the 1st Century AD and up to the 3rd Century AD and was an Iron Age Settlement before that ...A bit before my time .

I saw lots of village children and their parents having an great time dressing up in Roman costumes and handling tools and weapons that had been unearthed at the site and had last seen the light of day centuries ago. They were shown plans and maps of the site and were encouraged to show their skills at pottery and mosaic making .There were even volunteers modelling suits of armour and dressed in Roman civilian clothing who wandered about amongst the visitors only too happy to discuss their costumes and you could feel and touch materials and tools that our ancestors might have worn. Some of them even greeted you in ancient Roman language. Some families even found time to have a picnic on the grass near the stalls and I felt very envious of the lovely food and drink they were so obviously enjoying in the fresh air on this sunny warm day.

Courses are run at The University College which can result in a BA (Hons) Degree and anyone who is interested in Education studies and history can apply to join and study there if they contact Craig Spence at The University ' If you just want to have fun and get nice and muddy and pretend you are Bill Oddy on the TV you can contact The Friends of Sudbrooke Roman Villa who will be only too happy to enlist your help, Age is no barrier ... there is plenty to do for old and young .

The highlight of the show from my personal point of view, was our very own Sarah Truscott, daughter of our Editor, who together with her parents had fled the country for a fortnight on their annual pilgrimage to sunny Spain. Her father Nick had entrusted me with a coin found by Sarah in Sudbrooke in the woods near to the beck not far from where children use a rope swing to have fun. This coin, which looked like a very grubby twenty pence piece and was dull and pitted had been found by Sarah in the earth on a bank just visible to her sharp eyes . It has been examined and certified as being an 18mm bronze coin belonging to the era of Constantine the Great who reigned from 307 to 374 AD.

As it seems unlikely that Constantine would be likely to claim it, she has been allowed to keep it and it is now resplendent in a plastic case together with all the official documentation and certification proving it's authenticity.....So keep your eyes peeled folks !!!....History is there just waiting to be found. That can't be the only bit of spare cash lying about in our woods. But if it has the image of our dear Queen on it then it is probably mine.

Armed with Sarah's precious find I was basking in her reflected glory at the show and it seemed everyone wanted to see and touch this excellent example of Roman history.... I spent a long time flashing the cash (as they say in the films) and very much felt part of the show, even though I had just gone there as a visitor. It was a great few hours out....the show was free and I recommend it to anyone, old or young, next time it comes to the village.




The Chairman said that the parish plan had been launched in April 2007 and that all of the 34 requirements in the action plan had now been reviewed.


