
The Parish Council have anticipated this and in response opened a debate about the magazine's future.

#### **VICAR'S LETTER**

#### The Vicarage, Langworth Tel. 01522 - 754233

Churches will resound to the opening Greeting of "The Lord is Risen – He is Risen indeed!" on Easter Day (April 12<sup>th</sup>). Before then, there will be a meditation on Good Friday (April 10<sup>th</sup>) at Three Half Hours by the Cross (1.30 – 3.00 p.m. at St. Hugh's Langworth). The full Easter programme is set out in the Church Diary.

One traditional act of Easter devotion is called "The Stations of the Cross" and, indeed, some churches place these on around the church walls, if they are not permanently depicted.

The "Stations" reflect the story of Good Friday and Easter and, whilst the number may vary, generally there are 14 Stations. Most are taken from the New Testament, but some have their origin in 'legend'. They are:

- 1. Jesus is condemned to death 2. Jesus carries his cross 3. Jesus falls the first time 4. Jesus meets his sorrowful mother 5. Simon of Cyrene helps Jesus to carry the cross 6. Veronica wipes the face of Jesus
- 7. Jesus falls the second time 8. Jesus comforts the women of Jerusalem9. Jesus falls the third time
- 10. Jesus is stripped of his garments
- 11. Jesus is crucified 12. Jesus dies
- 13. Jesus is taken down from the cross
- 14. Jesus is laid in the tomb

Some include a 15<sup>th</sup> Station of Jesus is Risen.

Another set of Stations that I found attractive is "Stations of the Resurrection" that focus on the disciples and their experience of the Risen Christ,

both directly, and in the encouragement they received to go forth as witnesses of the Lord:

Descent into Hell 2. The Myrrh-Bearing Women 3. The Angel's message 4. Mary Magdalene
 Disciples at the Tomb 6. The Locked Room 7. Thomas 8. Appearance at Galilee 9. Christ commissions Peter 10. Emmaus 11. The Ascension 12. Pentecost 13. James the Pilgrim 14. Conversion of Paul

Another set of Stations could cover Jesus' "Journey to Jerusalem" on his final journey with his Disciples. It was a time when He moved from teaching the crowds to instructing His disciples. That journey started way up in the north at Caesarea Philippi (the source of the River Jordan about 30 miles north of Galilee), moves through Galilee, and down the Jordan Valley before moving through Jericho to Jerusalem. Many interesting events occur along the way, before the events of Jesus' final week in Jerusalem.

The last month has seen much discussion about the future shape of the Deanery. With the departure of the incumbent of the South Lawres Group there are currently only three full time incumbents in the 33 parishes of the Deanery: last year there were five. The big issue is whether the Deanery is reshaped with just three (which has major implications) or appoint another to bring the number up to four (as envisaged in the original Deanery Plan).


#### PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Some patients will know we have been experiencing difficulties with our remote booking in system in the waiting room but are pleased to advise that this is now fully functional and would like to encourage patients to use it if attending for appointments.

Further to last newsletter our new podiatry and dietician clinics are now operational and our weight management clinic commences at the beginning of April. Please ask for details at reception if you would like to take advantage of these new services.

Our Health Visitor, Mrs Carmel Walker, is now working with another practice and her caseload is currently being managed by Mrs Jo Cash supported by Mrs Angela Lyons, Nursery Nurse. We are waiting to hear when a full service will be resumed at the Practice but in the meantime please ring on 01673 863556 as always if you require this service.

We have been successful in our application to run the oral anticoagulation clinic in the Practice with effect from June '09. This will mean that patients on warfarin will be able to receive testing and treatment at the surgery and

further details will be made available soon.

The results of our Patient Satisfaction Questionnaire have now been collated and are available for viewing in the Waiting Room at the surgery and also on our website. We are grateful to everyone for their input and, as always, welcome comments and feedback on our services. We will be discussing the results with our Patient Participation Group. Bailgate Rotary Club has agreed to match fund the Cubs cheque, producing a total of £550 or 157 Life Straws. Many of these Life Straws will be sent out to support people in the border areas of Zimbabwe where a major cholera epidemic is currently developing. Life Straws have

also been used over recent years to provide clean drinking water for people across the world including the summer 2007 floods in Britain.

Various Rotary Clubs have been participating in this UN Millennium Development Goal which aims by 2015 to reduce by half the proportion of people without sustainable access to safe drinking water.


To start the Cubs fundraising effort, one of the local Rotary Club members, Chris Atkin gave an illustrated talk regarding the Life Straws and how Rotary Clubs were raising money to buy more. This presentation highlighted the world problem with water:



- More than one billion people worldwide do not have access to safe drinking water – i.e. around 1/6th of the world's population
- Five million people, mostly children, die each year from waterborne disease (That's one person every six seconds)

Each Life Straw costs around £3.50 and provides a method of purifying dirty and stagnant water for an adult for up to one year. The Life Straws can be distributed around the world wherever there are difficulties with accessing safe drinking water.

Each Cub was given a full 500 ml bottle of water and asked to first of all drink the contents. Once the bottle was empty they were then asked to take

them home and collect as much loose change and money as possible and bring them back to Cubs. Whilst some raided their own piggy banks'; others pestered friends and families.

The overall total raised by the Cubs was £275. In addition to raising the much needed money all the Cubs learnt about global issues and this contributed to their Global Challenge Award.

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#### **COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S CORNER**

#### To Do, or NOT To Do

I'm afraid I don't keep up to date with fashions in children's toys, so I have no idea if 'Transformers' are still in vogue. These were, or may be still are, toys that could be changed from one thing into another, but still using the same basic components. Well the idea has been taken into the County Council and we are proposing to change the way we operate after June's election. The basic component, the councillor, will still be there and

there will be the same number, 77. But the way some things will get done will change.

Councils can't change their number of councillors or the areas they represent. That would open to abuse. Then there are some rules about the ways that they can be organised to take decisions. But there is much more flexibility around this and around how those decisions can be informed and sometimes challenged. The county adopted a 'Leader and Executive' model some years ago and this will stay the same. However, until now, executive members have been supported by all party Policy Development Groups. These groups take no decisions but do produce recommendations (which the relevant executive member can accept or ignore!)

These groups have a somewhat mixed record, some working rather better than others The main deficiency of this system has been that the policy advice produced tends to be related solely to those things that officers want the executive member to consider. The is not much scope for considering what should be done, only what it is already proposed to do. The existing set up also has 'Scrutiny Committees' who tend to be somewhat backward looking – was the decision taken the right one?

The new arrangements are intended to change both approaches. But before setting out the new structure, there are several other objectives that we are trying to

achieve.

and the police, has set targets that all partners are trying to achieve by action in their area of responsibility. This is sensible joined up government at a Lincolnshire level and these targets are a good basis to look at the council's performance.

A council also needs to consider succession planning amongst councillors, so that there is someone who can assume the role of an executive councillor if the need arises. It is also highly desirable that we make use of the talents of all councillors in formulating and assessing the policies and performance of the council. The ambition for our 'transformer' is to use our 77 councillors, whoever they are after the election, to achieve as many of the above objectives as possible.


We are creating a new role of executive support councillor and seven new scrutiny committees, each aligned with one of the themes of the Lincolnshire Assembly's Lincolnshire Area Agreement.

The main work of these new scrutiny committees will be carried out by small 'Task and Finish' groups whose members will be chosen by party group leaders on the basis of interest, expertise or other relevant qualification for the subject of the investigation.

Whilst this may seem esoteric, and whilst the proof of the pudding will be in the eating, it is my belief we will see improved council performance as the outcome. It is the behind the scenes co-operation between the parties for a wider community good that gets little publicity but does much good
