ABRIDGED NOTES OF THE MEETING OF SUDBROOKE PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON THURSDAY 4TH OCTOBER 2012 IN THE VILLAGE HALL, SUDBROOKE

65 PARISHIONERS ITEMS

A report was made that debris was blocking the beck on Main Drive. The Clerk had previously reported this to Witham Third but would pursue.

A large pot hole was reported at the junction of Manor Drive/Elm Drive – The Clerk would report this.

Vandalism to a wall had occurred on Holme Drive. It was re-iterated that incidents must be reported to the Police at the time of the occurrence.

66 APOLOGIES

Councillor Bob Waller had sent apologies and requested absence from the meetings during the next two/three months due to personal reasons. This was agreed by members.

67 DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

Councillor Mrs L Etheridge declared a personal interest in item 9ii on the agenda – Play Equipment repairs/ quotations.

68 NOTES OF MEETING HELD ON 6TH SEPTEMBER 2012

Proposed by Councillor Stuart Curtis, seconded by Cllr Mrs Lyn Etheridge that they be signed as a correct record.

69 POLICE MATTERS

Councillor Martin Dickie explained that following the Clerk's report to the Police about the damage to the climbing frame, a letter from the Chief Constable, Lincolnshire Police, regarding the incident had been sent to 'Sudbrooke Parish Council, Scothern Lane, Sudbrooke' referring to 'damage to climbing frame in Nettleham'. It had been felt that this was totally unacceptable and he as Chairman had replied to the Chief Constable regarding this.

A letter had been received from a candidate for the Police and Crime Commissioner election due to be held in November. It was felt however that correspondence could not be entered into until a candidate was elected.

70 COUNTY COUNCILLORS REPORT

CC Sue Rawlins confirmed that an award of £475 had been made from the Councillor Big Society Fund to the Parish Council which was to be used

for the provision of a further plan/map of the village.

CC Rawlins stated that there was nothing further to report regarding the obstruction on the highway in Church Lane.

71 DISTRICT COUNCILLORS REPORT

DC Stuart Curtis stated that a representative of the Sudbrooke Woods Committee had made a request to meet members of the Parish Council with a view to it making application for the footpaths to be placed on the Definitive Map. It was noted however that the transfer of the land had still not been completed and it was felt that it would be more appropriate to await the transfer.

DC Stuart Curtis agreed to contact the agents requesting that the transfer be expedited and that a meeting with the Sudbrooke Woods Committee and Parish Council be arranged.

72 PLAY EQUIPMENT

a) Resignation of Play Equip ment Inspector – The resig nation of Mr Eric Pitt, Play ground Inspector had been received. Thanks were ex tended to Mr Pitt for his work during the time he had been employed by the Parish Coun cil.

> Members were advised that ClIrs Martin Dickie, Stuart Curtis and the Clerk had met with the Play Equipment In spector for Nettleham Parish Council who had agreed to

take on the position. Mem bers agreed this appointment with effect from 1st November 2012.

b) Play Equipment repairs/ further vandalism/ quota tions – Councillor Mrs Lyn Etheridge declared her per sonal interest and left the meeting at 8.15pm whilst this item was discussed.

> It was reported that further vandalism had occurred to t he climbing frame behind the village hall resulting in considerable cost for its re pair. Discussion ensued about the lack of visibility of the play equipment due to a tree shading the area/ overhanging the seat. It was agreed that removal of the tree would make the area less private for vandals and that the tree be removed. In view of its species it was accepted that it kept to a more manageable size. District Councillor Stuart Curtis agreed that an application for funds for the repair and painting of the play equip ment could be made to the District Councillor Initiative Fund.

Two quotations for its repair had been received in the sums of (a) £780 and (b) \pounds 400.

Resolved that quotation (b) be accepted from Mr D Etheridge in the sum of £400.00. Painting of the equipment would be undertaken by the Play Equipment Inspector when repairs were complete.

Councillor Mrs Lyn Etheridge returned to the meeting at 8.21pm.

c) RoSPA Play Inspection Re**port** – The annual report had been received. The new Inspector would undertake any minor works required.

Report of Parish Council meeting held on 1st November 2012

Police Matters - Graffiti had occurred on the notice board and on a dog sign in the village. This had been reported to the Police.

There had recently been the theft of a blue Raleigh pedal cycle stolen from Holme Drive and anti-social behaviour by a group of youths occurring on Beresford Drive.

Sudbrooke Woods Footpaths - Mr Richard Drabble, representing the Sudbrooke Woods Committee, had supplied the Parish Council with 16 completed Public Rights of Way User evidence forms completed by persons using Sudbrooke Park footways.

Members of the Parish Council agreed that it is required to act on parishioner's requests to serve relevant forms to establish rights of ways/footpaths in Sudbrooke Park.

Dogs on playing field to rear of village hall - A report had been made that dogs had been running loose on the playing field behind the Village Hall near to properties and that these had caused some users of the field to become frightened.

This occurrence was noted and a polite reminder is made to dog owners to not allow them to be on the playing field at any time.

Switch on of Christmas tree lights - The lights will be switched on at 4.30pm on Sunday 2nd December 2012. Mulled wine and mince pies will be served, with drinks for the children.

Planning – Following consultation with a representative from the Planning Department, West Lindsey District Council and Mr Paul Truelove, a revised planning application is awaited.

Climbing Frame – The climbing frame on the play area behind the Village Hall has been removed for repair following vandalism. When it is re-sited the play equipment will be painted.

Village Map/Frame – the second village map has now been sited on the wall by the hairdressers. Thanks must be extended to Mrs Lisa Broadbent and Bernard Bartram for assisting with its production. It is really is an asset to the village.

DATE OF NEXT PARISH COUNCIL MEETING – Thursday 13th December 2012. (Changed from 6th December)

Nettleham Skate Park – Councillor Stuart Curtis had attended a meeting of the Nettleham Skate Park Committee and reported that an agreed preferred site was Mulsanne Park, Nettleham. The costing for the project was expected to be 60 – 80k. The majority of this would be required to be funded from grants arranged by Nettleham Parish Council, but some financial input would be required from Sudbrooke which would have to be included in the Precept for the forthcoming year. Obviously public opinion is required on this matter and you are asked to take part in the following survey:-

- 1. Do you support a proposal for a Skateboard Park?
- 2. Would your children use a Skateboard Park in Nettleham?
- 3. Would you be able to sit on a Steering Committee?
- 4. Would you be prepared to support an increase in the Precept (addition on your Council tax) in order to fund such a project.

Sudbrooke Woods Action Committee

At the beginning of November members of the Committee met with a number of Parish Councillors and handed them all the User Evidence Forms that had been completed giving evidence of peoples use of the numerous paths and tracks in the Woods over many years. Along with these Forms was a map indicating the most frequently used of these paths and tracks.

We were told that the Parish Council would now formally apply to Lincolnshire County Council for a Definitive Map Modification Order [DMMO] to be made to add these routes to the County Council's Definitive Map. As part of this process the owner and any occupier has to be served with formal notification of the application and given chance to comment. I do not know whether the people who blocked off all these paths in March have yet bought the land but, certainly, if they have it is only recently. Villagers should therefore be aware that it is more than likely they have been deprived of their enjoyment of these numerous pleasurable walks during the spring and summer months by non-landowners.

I can also not let pass without comment previous letters from" Name and Address Supplied" criticising people in the village and beyond who have the temerity to walk over land they do not own. Setting aside my annoyance at letters being published from people who want to hide behind the cloak of anonymity, are they seriously suggesting they will be vilified if they reveal who they are ?, from the outset all this Committee has been seeking to achieve is to put this issue in the public arena so all the evidence can be looked at and determined. If the County Council decide there is insufficient evidence they won't make an Order. If they do make an Order it can be objected to [but you will have to give your name and address then "Name and Address Supplied"] and thereafter, in all probability , a Public Inquiry will ensue when all the evidence will be tested by a planning inspector. This takes some time but a decision will be made and I trust accepted by all sides. That is the way the legal process works and we are not seeking to do anything illegal or underhand.

Finally, may I take this opportunity to thank everyone who has taken the trouble to complete a User Evidence Form as well as my fellow committee members for their efforts. There is still plenty of time for others to fill in Forms if they wish to do so and I left a supply with the Parish Council reps at our meeting a few weeks ago if you want to obtain one. Alternatively, Andrew Pickwell in the County Council's Rights of Way Section will send you a form if you contact him [Telephone number Lincoln 553083].

Though time limited (up to 12 weeks), this service is invaluable in assisting people to build their self confidence and increase their ability to cope. The Red Cross provides individuals and their carers with access to support and services that the users feel are relevant to increase their independence and personal confidence. If at the end of our support it is felt that the person needs longer term help, we can assist with referrals to the appropriate organisations.

Hello and welcome back to my garden. Extended family holidays and family commitments have made a backlog of work to deal with. In the front garden the herbaceous plants have had to be cut back, and those that have grown too large will be lifted and reduced in the spring. I need to see how well they survive during the winter months, before splitting them. The wall baskets which have done very well have now finished their summer flowering and have been cleared prior to planting with the winter pansies. These have been growing on in the greenhouse and are just coming into flower, but the flowers will be removed when planted out, as they need to grow in to strong plants before starting to flower again in a couple of weeks.

Earlier in the year I mentioned that the automatic irrigation system to the wall baskets had broken and needed to be replaced. The new timer is digital and was very easy to set up, and gives three minutes of watering each day through the micro-feed system. No carrying heavy cans of water for me!

In the greenhouse the bubble wrap insulation has been replaced and the nonhardy plants that spent summer in the garden have been brought inside for the winter months. I had decided earlier in the year that some of the crops grown in the polytunnel would be grafted plants supplied from a commercial nursery, and I am very pleased with the results. The tomato I grew was 'Shirley' which has produced a very good crop. In November I cut the plants down and the remaining green fruit was brought indoors to ripen by a sunny window. We have been eating our home-grown tomatoes until the end of November! The peppers showed the biggest improvement in being grown from grafted stock. I had two of the normal plants and two grafted ones. The grafted plants grew larger and produced more fruit of a bigger size, so I hope to repeat this success next year. However the cucumbers were a disappointment. I had chosen a small variety, but will change to the larger variety next year.

I have previously mentioned problems with squirrels destroying our bird feeders when trying to get at nuts. For my birthday earlier this year I was given a feeder which claimed, as many others do, to be 'squirrel proof'. It is a new very strong design, spring loaded which closes down covering the feeding tube when weight is applied. It is easily accessible to the birds as it remains open for them, but shuts right down covering the nuts when a squirrel tries to get at them. So far we have only seen one squirrel attempt this, but it did work very well. It is not that I object to squirrels being fed, but we are tired of our bird feeders being destroyed!

Well, it's farewell for this year, so I will wish everyone a very happy Christmas, and hope that our winter will not be too severe, and look forward to getting back in the garden and starting another gardening season.

For my part, at my annual check up my Doctor pointed out that like most folks these days I was a bit overweight. He suggested an ideal weight that ought to be my target. I was a bit shocked! I pointed out that the last time I managed to make that weight on the scales a bell rang and a man rushed out from the opposite corner and started to punch me. He promised that if I managed to make the weight again he would organise and referee a rematch. I might win than one. It was over 50 years ago.

We are so lucky in this village to have the wonderful availability of modern Medical Centres staffed by a great crew of Doctors, Nursing Staff and their backing crews and very well equipped modern surgeries and equipment. The close proximity of The County Hospital means that referrals there are very common and all in all we get a very good service from our local NHS.

As a matter of routine I get called up for regular checkups as I am sure most of you do and it is comforting to know that someone there is concerned for us, not only when we feel under the weather but as a matter of routine on the basis that prevention for anything is better than cure. How different from days gone by when our Doctors Surgeries were dark, damp, dim miserable places where you attended with no appointment system in place and had to wait in crowded waiting rooms full of coughing, sniffing, wheezing, scratching and sometimes rather smelly patients of all ages from tiny tots and their Mums to OAPs. With a full range of ages and sexes in between. It was usually (except in emergencies) on a first come first served basis so the wait was often long. I used to think that an appropriate sign above the door could have well been "Abandon hope all you who enter here "Our Doctors waiting room bore a striking resemblance to the one in "Doc Martin" the TV Sit Com currently being shown on TV and about as welcoming. I reckon that if there was not much wrong with you when you entered you could contract anything by the time you left. There was usually only one (or occasionally) two Doctors in attendance in most surgeries and they were hard pressed to cope. How much better it is now. Clean, clinical, well organised, and despite the oft voiced criticisms from some quarters it is so much better than it used to be. I wouldn't want to go back to the old days of crowded local surgeries.

Speaking of how things used to be and how they have changed over the years."When I were nought but a lad" I used to visit my Grandparents home and there was always a coal or log fire burning in the small living room. Even in the hottest day of summer that fire was always blazing away. Granddad, a veteran of the First World War who suffered from being gassed in the trenches would be sitting rocking in his large wooden arm-chair gazing at the coals and dozing off. That fire was the focal point in the room. It provided hot water from the back boiler behind the grate to the large container built into that black kitchen range which had to be filled up with water and drawn off from a small tap at the front when needed. No such thing as piped hot water in those days. It all had to be carried to wherever in the house it was needed. A large black kettle was always on the boil at the front or side of the fire.

There was no such thing as a TV. Only a battery wireless. (That is a radio in today's parlance. Not a computer gismo) This wireless was powered by an "Accumulator". This was a heavy oblong acid filled thing like a motor cycle battery which had to be exchanged at the local garage every week. You carried it there by hand. Remember no motor cars for poor folk in those days .I used to earn my two pence pocket money that way each week.

The most wonderful thing about that fire was the delicious tasting toast , crumpets and tea cakes you made with that long handled wire toasting fork. (I've still got that toasting fork) None of today's sliced bread either. Everything was home baked by Grandma in the oven on the side if the fire .The flavour was delicious. My mouth is watering just recalling it. I feel like chucking my modern fancy pop up toaster in the kitchen into the bin. It just can't compare with that taste.

But that is progress! Very few homes have open fires in them today. Almost all are fully central heated and labour saving with no cleaning away ash and laying the fire every morning. It was all very old fashioned and hard work but in my memory was lovely. Today the focal point of the room is invariably the TV set and all furniture faces it. Sometimes I recall those wonderful flickering embers and the flames which ran away with your imagination as you sat gazing at them. Just as good as anything on TV these days and the most wonderful thing was that there were no adverts offering 50% off everything but not telling you the actual price of anything whilst reminding you that the offer must end on Monday I'm so glad I can still remember the old days fondly.



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Hi Folks, This month: Building Your Own PC-2

What items

do you need to add to your build wishlist? Here's a start for you — processor (and thermal paste), system board, RAM, graphics card, power supply, optical drive, storage drives, case, fans, processor cooler, keyboard, mouse and monitor. Don't forget to budget for operating system and antivirus software. There's multiple options for each of these items and you really do need to research each one to ensure you get the right item you want and within your budget.

So, you've decided upon the most important component in your list. From a personal perspective, I consider the processor, as the brains of the computer, to be the most important part and this is always first on my list. But which one, there are many to choose from. Do you go with Intel or AMD; Pentium, Athlon, Phenom, Core2Duo, i3, i5, i7, Quad Core, Xeon or Opteron? What speed, what L2 cache? The list goes on. This is where the Internet comes into its own. You can research all the various options and decide upon which one meets your needs and budget. Also, there are radical price differences for the same item everywhere you look so once you decide upon each item for your system, compare suppliers to get the very best price.

Once you have decided upon the processor, the next component to choose is the system board. This is the heart of the PC and comes in many various sizes (form factors) and layouts. The processor has a specific pin layout referred to as a 'socket' number and the motherboard must have the same 'socket' fitting to accept the processor. This narrows down choice but there are still plenty of options available. System boards come with different I/O (Input/Output) connectors, slots and RAM configurations, and some have basic graphics integrated so no need for a separate graphics card; others vary the number and type of USB and LAN connections, as well as other features.

Then there's the RAM which comes in various types and speeds. As a general rule, 4Gb RAM should be the minimum for a system but that really depends upon the technology in use. For instance, a Windows XP Starter Edition 32-bit system is limited to 512Mb RAM but a Windows XP 64-bit system can use up to 128Gb RAM. Similarly, a Windows 7 Starter 32-bit system is limited to 2Gb RAM whereas a Windows 7 Ultimate 64-bit system can use up to 192Gb. Higher RAM amounts are standard in a server in a commercial environment.
