120 PARISHIONERS ITEMS

A resident had drawn to the Parish Council's attention to a road sign left on the grass verge in St Edward's Drive by LCC Highways workmen. Complaints had also been received about the number of potholes/ the condition of the road surface of the estate roads in Sudbrooke.

The Clerk was asked to write to Alan Brown, Highways Officer, LCC regarding the above matters.

121 DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

Councillor Stuart Curtis declared a personal interest in Jubilee Celebrations as a member of West Lindsey District Council.

122 POLICE MATTERS - No report

123 DISTRICT COUNCILLORS REPORT

DC Stuart Curtis invited members to a seminar to be held at Glentham Village

Hall on the 8^{TH} February to discuss the Core strategy and emerging draft policy.

DC Curtis stated that County Councillor Sue Rawlins was arranging for the County Councillor responsible for Highways to visit Scothern and Welton for a site visit and suggested that Sudbrooke be included. Members agreed that this would be useful and the Clerk was asked to arrange this.

124 NOTES OF MEETING HELD ON 5TH JANUARY 2012

Agreed as a correct record, proposed by Councillor Paul Rignall, seconded by Councillor Stuart Curtis.

125 REPORTS ON MATTERS OUTSTANDING

- a. **Website** Instruction on the setting up and maintaining the website had been given by a member of the County Council Web Team and attended by Councillor Bernard Bartram, the Clerk and resident Roy Summerfield. Roy Summerfield had agreed to be the Website Manager with information being passed to him for the site via the Parish Council.
- b. Village Map update Several offers of assistance for the production of a village map had been received. A local resident attended the meeting and offered to produce a sample and report back to the Parish Council.

Councillor Stuart Curtis had attended a meeting with Nettleham Parish Council to hear of their plans for a possible skateboard park and other sports facilities. It was noted however that the costing for a skateboard park 20m x 50m was in the region of £150K - £200K.

126 JUBILEE CELEBRATIONS/ EVENTS

a. Land fronting Beech Close – quotations for supply of shrubs – Two quotations had been received in the sums of £120.50 and £247.50 Plus VAT. The quobation for £120.50 from British Hardwood Nurseries was accepted.

It was noted that Mr A Morvinson, a local business owner, had offered to pay for the shrubs. Members accepted this public spirited gesture and agreed to offer Mr Morvinson a complimentary advert in Sudbrooke News.

Mrs Helen Link had also agreed that seats provided by the Wood Carving Group could be sited in the area.

- Naming of area Suggestions were made for a name for the area, ie 'Sudbrooke Jubilee Garden', 'Queen Elizabeth Diamond Jubilee Garden'. The Chairman would write an article for Sudbrooke News inviting suggestions from residents.
- c. Celebratory event It was noted that Scothern would be holding several events over the

Jubilee weekend. It was felt that Sudbrooke could, subject to funding, hold an event at a later date to celebrate the opening of the new garden area fronting Beech Close.

127 HIGHWAY MATTERS

a. Obstruction, Church Lane –
 The obstruction on the highway
 fronting the Coach House,
 Church Lane was further dis cussed. The Clerk was in structed to write further to High ways.......

Request for Grip Cutting, Nettleham Lane/Sudbrooke Lane – A reply from the Highways department stated that a meeting with Central Networks was awaited to agree a safe method of work due to the proximity of the 11Kv overhead power lines along the length of this road. Once this is obtained a road closure would be arranged so that the works could be undertaken.

c. Gritting of bus route through village – A grant had been obtained from West Lindsey District Council for £250 for assistance to the village in severe weather.

A quotation for the gritting of the bus route in accordance with LCC instructions had been received from Wilkinson Plant Hire in the sum of £87 per gritting session. This was accepted by the Parish Council.

Martin Dickie agreed to liaise in the event of severe weather and were given authority by the Parish Council to instruct Wilkinson Plant Hire to undertake gritting when they felt it was necessary.

128 WRAGBY ROAD JUNCTION - REPORT OF FURTHER ACCIDENTS

It was noted that further collisions had occurred at this junction. This would be brought to the attention of the County Councillor responsible for Highways at the site visit.


These delightful woods are a joy to wander in all seasons and it is recognised the contribution that the Public Footpaths within these woods make to the village of Sudbrooke.

Dear Editor

Of the 80 Parish Councils (Local Councils) in the West Lindsey district 55% have either reduced or not increased their precepts for the financial year 2012/13.

A further 22% increased their precept by no more than 10%, leaving 23% who have raised theirs by more than 10%. Nine of the councils, including Sudbrooke, raised their precept above 15%. Sudbrooke's is 19%.

In our local area the figures are these;

•	Dunholme	minus 1.7%				
•	Langworth	no change				
•	Reepham	no change				
•	Scothern	plus 0.7%				
•	Welton	plus 1.6%				
•	Nettleham	plus 2.7%				
•	Sudbrooke	plus 19.0%				
•	Cherry Willingham	plus 31.2%				

Over the last 10 years the precept has gone up on 6 occasions and gone down on 4.

The average reduction has been 7.8%, whilst the average increase has been 24.2%.

The last three years have seen consecutive increases amounting to 58.3%. Perhaps it would be more efficient and economic for Sudbrooke to join with one of its neighbours, preferably not Cherry Willingham.

Nettleham Neighbourhood Policing Team

Police are being informed of an increase in incidents around the village of Anti Social Behaviour and Theft or Damage. Incidents since September 2011 include:

- Off-Road motorbikes and quad bikes in Sudbrooke Woods
- Youths banging on doors & windows or ringing door bells, then running off, during the hours of darkness
- Ornaments and other items being stolen from gardens and later found around the village often damaged beyond repair
- Items being stolen from gardens and placed in the road
- Items taken out of skips and thrown in the road
- Laser pens being used and shone into windows of properties and more alarmingly at motorists
- During the recent wintery weather we had countless calls of snowballs being thrown at properties

This will not be tolerated and we would ask

the residents of Sudbrooke to support Police in bringing this kind of behaviour to a **STOP**.

So what can **YOU** do to help? - If you are victim of any acts of Anti Social Behaviour or Crime then please contact the POLICE AT THE TIME or immediately after the incident has occurred, using 999 if appropriate or alternatively **101** if you feel the call is of a less urgent nature. Please DO NOT wait until you next see an officer to report it, or ring one of Team's mobiles or the local office and leave a voicemail. It is possible that the message will not be picked up for 24 hours or more, by which time the offenders will have left the area and YOU will feel annoyed that Police didn't attend at the time.

By calling 999 or 101, the incident will be recorded and depending on the severity of the incident an Officer will be allocated to attend immediately if appropriate, as a priority which will be as soon as possible or at a time to suit you if this is more appropriate.

From the information we have received from the incidents to date we believe that many of the youths involved in this behaviour are unfortunately local youths to the village and they do appear to be praying on the older residents of Sudbrooke.

When the Team have dealt with this kind of behaviour in other villages we are ordinarily met with two kinds of parents:

<u>Cooperative and Supportive Parents</u> – Who are happy to assist Police, to educate their child, discipline their own child accordingly to the situation, this enforces that there are consequences to their actions and that their behaviour is not acceptable and will not be tolerated.

<u>Uncooperative Parents</u> – Who defend their children, wanting Police to believe that their child would not cause such issues. This unfortunately passes the message to their child that it is ok to lie to the Police, it is ok to carry on with the behaviour that has led the Police to your door and that there is no consequences to their behaviour. When in fact there are consequences not just for your

child but for the victim also.

So what are the consequences? - The following is a range of disposals available to Police to deal with offenders of crime:

Shining of Laser Pens at Motorists – Under the Road Traffic Act 1988 if caught and found guilty the offender(s) can be arrested and can receive a fine or up to 7 years imprisonment.

and found guilty the offender(s) can be arrested and can receive from a Fixed Penalty Notice (£80 fixed fine), a caution, a fine in court or upto 7 years imprisonment.

1981 if found guilty the offender can receive a Fixed Penalty Notice (£80 fixed fine), a can be arrested. caution, a fine in court or up to 10 years imimprisonment.

Riding Motorbikes/Quad Bikes on Public Footpaths/Bridlepaths and Common Land or on a Public Road or Place - A valid driving licence, valid certificate of insurance and valid test certificate (MOT) is required by the rider of a motor/guad bike, failing to have any of these will result in prosecution. If the motorbike or quad is being ridden to the annoyance of others in that it is causing person harassment, alarm or distress a warning will be given to the rider. If a 2nd warning is given to the same rider (on the same or different bike) or a different rider on the same bike then that bike within 12 months of the 1st warning the bike will be seized by Police. The cost to recover this bike will include the recovery fee which is currently £150, plus an additional £20 per day in which it remains seized, up to a total of 21 days when the motor/guad bike will be destroyed. To recover the bike a valid certificate of insurance and/or driving licence will also be required. If it is an unregistered off road motor/quad bike of course this will not be possible but the costs will still payable. As well as having the motor/guad bike seized any document offences as outlined above will also be dealt with. This can attract an additional fine in

court and points of your driving licence. If you do not have a driving licence currently then do not worry as soon as you come of age the points will already be there.

Anti Social Behaviour - Although a general term, there are a number of methods that Police and the Community Safety Teams at the District Council can use to tackle ASB. which can include Acceptable Behaviour Contracts. Any person under the age of 16 Theft - Under the Theft Act 1968 if caught in a group of 2 or more where their behaviour is deemed either intimidating, to be causing harassment, alarm or distress can be dispersed from the area to a place of safety or their home address. If the person Damage - Under the Criminal Damage Act contravenes the direction to leave by the officer an offence is committed for which you

prisonment, or in cases of Criminal Damage We should not have to remind you that any that endangers life this can be up to Life of the above penalties or disposals may possibly impact on any future career choices the children choose, not to mention the financial costs to them or the parents now.

> We would also like to take this time to inform you that Anti Social Behaviour will not be tolerated and that incidents of crime will be dealt with robustly.

> If you are a parent of a child or children of an age that do go out, ask yourself:

> Do you know where your child is? Where are they tonight? What are they doing? Who are they with?

> DO NOT forget - Call Police on 999 if the incident is of an urgent nature - 101 if the incident is of a less urgent nature - Only contact the Nettleham NPT Officers on their mobiles or office number if it is for general advice or to discuss an incident that has previously been reported.

If Police are unaware of incidents we are not able to respond and are not able to deal with them

Neighbourhood Policing Team - Update

Police Incidents

We have received numerous incidents with regards to anti-social behaviour. The ASB is occurring on a nightly basis anytime after 1700hrs. Nettleham NPT have been conducting plain-clothes patrols around the village. Very recently the NPT spoke to a group who were in the car park the village shop. Drugs were found inside a car along with two cannabis grinders. The driver of the vehicle accepted responsibility and was fined £80 for possession. We are continuing increased patrols of the area to try and combat the anti-social behaviour. We are urging residents of Sudbrooke contact Lincolnshire Police when the incidents of ASB are occurring – this allows a resource to be assigned to the incident.

Neighbourhood Watch / Lincs Alert

Lincolnshire Alert (LincsAlert) is a community messaging system run by **Lincolnshire Police.** The messaging system acts a tool for the police to give information to the registered members on crime reduction and community safety issues. Members are also able to provide information to the police. You can unsubscribe, update and manage your profile and messages at any time

Benefits of the system include:

- 1. Website available 24 hours a day.
- Totally confidential, secure service, your data is never shared without your consent
- 3. Configure how and when you want to receive messages,
- 4. Subscribe to receive alerts by email, phone, and text.
- 5. Reply to messages instantly
- 6. View crime stat reports for your local area,
- Completely free to receive service
- 8. Unsubscribe at anytime

The Neighbourhood Policing Team (NPT) are still promoting the free service offered by Immobilise - property database where users can input details of their valuables. This database is searched by many Police Forces for stolen property. If your property is stolen and recovered by Police we can identify the owners and return the property.

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GARDENING NEWS

Hello and welcome to the garden. Last month I commented that that it felt as though spring had finally arrived, but a few days later it was snowing! However it seems more settled now and the forecasters predict high pressure settled over the country, which should mean a few days of fine weather and sunshine. Looking around the garden I can see the early flowers such as crocus and snowdrops are now beginning to fade away, and the daffodils have pulled their heads up and are bursting into flower. The daffodils along the verge in Scothern Lane are blooming, and I can remember that when I was a Parish Councillor, the first daffodil bulbs were bought and planted on the verge, and other volunteers now add to them each year, introducing crocus and snowdrops, not only on the verges but around the Village Hall as well. This a welcome sign of spring that we can all enjoy each year.

The front garden is also coming to life slowly, and the lawn has now been cut three times and is looking good, and any time now the Salix tree will burst into leafy growth. In the greenhouse geraniums have arrived and have been potted on. This is one plant that I don't grow from seed. I buy them as plug plants from Jersey Plants, which means I have 160 plants growing which will be identical in size and growth.

The newly cleared shrubbery border at the end if the garden has been finally cleared of all unwanted undergrowth and overgrown shrubs. The next step will be to dig over the area, prior to planting up a mainly shrubbery area, with a few perennial flowers to bring added colour. The rockery which always has some of the earliest flowers is really coming to life with small and dainty spring flowers, and looking very colourful. So the work continues in the garden as the season really gets going, and as always the weeds are thriving nothing seems to deter the weeds, snails, slugs, other bugs or weather unfortunately don't worry them in the least! Still plenty to do, so farewell for now. **GP**

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Whenever I see old photographs or film taken from the 1920's right up to the late 40's I notice that all of the men are wearing hats. They could be in a soccer match a political demonstration or just out and about in a street scene. Even though they could be as poor as church mice they would always have a hat on. Very often you could notice the difference between the social classes by their headgear.

The working class would normally wear a flat cap, thicker and larger than today's version. Tradesmen wore a version of a bowler hat a bit taller than today's one. The City businessmen wore the bowler hat, normally accompanied by a furled umbrella, as did off duty Officers in the armed forces whilst The Lords of the Realm and the Upper Classes. male or female including Eton Schoolboys wore Top Hats. Harrow schoolboys and rowing fanatics wore straw Boaters. The trilby was popular and was also worn by many middle class men. Actors found the Fedora with its large brim popular and artists and French or Spanish men favoured the beret with a small tassel like a mouse's tail on top. Country gentry of both gender wore a slimmer type of flat cap called cheese cutters because of the sloping narrow peak, or sometimes a Sherlock Holmes deerstalker or a type of trilby, often with a small feather in the side. But they all wore hats of one sort or another.

Today very few men wear hats except in inclement weather. Lots of men who wear those Yankee Doodle type baseball hats with a gap at the back and a plastic adjuster wear them to show allegiance for a particular sports team or to advertise a product. Some of these feel it fashionable to wear them back to front but may be surprised to know that in the 1930s this was a fashion in American black and white movies. So nothing is new. You still get Old Codgers like me who wear the trilby or flat cap but most crowd scenes will show little headgear. I can't remember when I last saw anyone wearing the "Steed" type bowler and rolled umbrella not even in the City of London The exception to this is at a military parade such as Armistice Day. I always think how smart those officers are as they march past the Cenotaph with their medals and canes or furled umbrellas. Despite their age, or perhaps because of it, their pride shows through and always bring a large lump to my throat.

At the recent Ceremony in Lincoln when The Grenadier Guards trooped their Colour through the City it was noticeable how many men, almost certainly old Servicemen, standing proudly to attention took off their headgear and placed it over their left breast to salute the Colour. This is a form of salute that is afforded a funeral party as the hearse passes. Any man wearing headgear of any sort will still do this as a manner of respect. I feel that this is very touching and I know from experience it is very much appreciated by the following relatives and friends of the deceased.

All our Armed Forces wear hats of various sorts depending on what sort of duty they are currently performing. From the Ceremonial Bearskin or Plumed Helmet of Guardsmen to the Pill Box of the Gurkha. From the steel helmet to the humble beret or forage cap and peaked cap. Those serving in Burma and the Far East wore the Australian type Bush hats with a side button whilst in action. I wonder if they still do? Tell me if you know!

On the subject of steel helmets it always makes me choke with rage when I see footage of our troops in both Worlds Wars and right up to the late sixties who were sent into action wearing that old fashioned steel helmet with the large rim. No side or rear protection at all. They were no protection from any incoming fire unless it was falling from the sky above you or you bent your head forward towards the direction of shot. I shudder to think how many thousands of lives were lost because of the stupidity of our leaders in not seeing this. I wore one myself and I envied other armies who did not have to wear that type of helmet. Surely they should have learnt from our American and French Allies and even from the Germans who all used helmets with side and rear protection. At long last they have now realized the need and issued more appropriate headgear for our boys and girls in the armed forces.

It's funny how wearing headgear has entered into our language. We have all heard the following expressions :

EAT MY HAT: When the likelihood of an event seems impossible. TAKE MY HAT OFF TO HIM: When you are amazed at someone's achievement.

OLD HAT: Out of date.

THROW YOUR HAT IN THE RING: When you wish to be considered or elected.

DOFF YOUR HAT : Take of your hat or touch the peak as a mark of respect or salute .

HAT TRICK: Three successes (Usually a sports success)

Walkers should meet at the village hall at 9-30am.


Walkers are advised to take a waterproof coat, use suitable footwear and bring a snack and a drink.

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The Royal British Legion Welton and District Branch

On the 6th of March 2012 another six soldiers were killed in Afghanistan. It was reported as the highest casualty figure for a single incident in the campaign, and for the people of West Yorkshire the news was devastating. Five of the men were from the 3rd Battalion the Yorkshire Regiment, with two from Huddersfield, one from Bradford and one from Dewsbury.

From a purely personal point of view, the losses had a particular significance because the forebear of the 3rd Battalion the Yorkshire Regiment was the Duke of Wellington's Regiment, with which my grandfather had served during the First World War.

The connection between this latest loss and the First World War losses is significant, because many towns and villages in the North and Midlands raised entire battalions of local volunteers. They were known as the Pals Battalions, and when tragedy struck it affected the entire town or village, in much the same way as the losses are being felt in West Yorkshire today.

Over three quarters of a million British servicemen were killed during the First World War, and most of them lay 'in the corner of a foreign field'. With the absence of graves on home soil, national mourning was focussed on the tens of thousands of war memorials that were raised by public subscription throughout the country: and these are still lovingly tended.

But there was another need for public attention, which was recognised by those who wished to 'honour the dead' and 'remember the living'. Among those who were in danger of being forgotten were the wounded, the widowed, and the children of those who had died. The wounded needed work and the widows and their children needed support.

In 1921 a number of ex-servicemen's organisations became united under the name of the British Legion. Thereafter, it was the British Legion that took up the cause of servicemen and their dependants, and it is still the British Legion that campaigns for the cause of servicemen and their dependant, and provides them with support. The work is as relevant today as it was in the aftermath of the First and Second World Wars; but the Royal British Legion needs active membership, if it is to continue to provide support and assistance.

At the Lincolnshire County Annual Conference, on the $14^{\rm th}$ of January 2012, it was reported that Legion membership is in decline. Nationally, the number of Branches has fallen from 8,000 to 4,000 in the last ten years. However, the situation in Lincolnshire is steady with 59 Branches and about 6,000 Members; but we need to reverse the national decline if the organisation is to prosper.

The County Welfare team is the busiest in the country, spending £250,000 in 2011, on 1,145 beneficiaries. In 2010/11, the County's Poppy Appeal raised £731,964, and the Appeal for 2011/12 was in excess of £735,000, and thanks excellent efforts of the Poppy Collectors and the generosity of local people, the Welton and District Branch raised some £14,000. It is through such sterling efforts that the work of the Legion is made possible.

Since the Second World War there has been only one year in which the British Services have not been involved in armed conflict, and away from conflict British Service Men and Women have been killed or injured in training. Five of the six men killed on the $6^{\rm th}$ of March were in their teens and early twenties, and so we are reminded that National Security has passed on to another generation. What we now need is another generation to come along and join the Royal British Legion to continue its work.

A Walk in the Woods with the Romans

On the 3rd March 2012 the Lincoln Archaeology Group for Excavation, Education and Research (LAGER) undertook a walk over survey within the 'New Ten Acre Covert' wood in Sudbrooke. The wood is to the south of the field where the excavations of the Roman villa took place between 2005 and 2009. LAGER is the volunteer group that was involved in these excavations. Ten volunteers from the group made a visual survey by walking five metre transects from the western edge of the woods to a line parallel with the eastern end of the cultivated field. The survey concentrated on the area immediately south of the field. The conditions on the day were generally dry although overcast and cold. The survey took about three hours and we were all very grateful for the cup of tea at the end! The purpose of the survey was to see if there was any evidence for a continuation of the villa site into to the wood.

We found very little evidence of potential earthwork structures within the woods. The ground was however seen to fall away from the field boundary



ditch for a distance of approximately ten to fifteen metres and then rise slightly. Approximately one hundred metres from the south east corner of the cultivated field a shallow ditch orientated NNW by SSE was seen to run through the woods (this alignment is shown on current OS maps). The northern end of this ditch joined to the east west oriented field boundary ditch. Towards the western end of the woods a dry ditch orientated NS extended for some thirty metres. This ditch appeared to be isolated from any other earthwork features.

A small number of surface finds (mainly small sherds of Roman pottery) were identified with the greatest concentration in an area south of the field boundary. These finds were associated with animal burrowing and had therefore been brought to the surface from a buried context. The finds were returned to Bishop Grosseteste University College for processing and recording. A short report on the survey will soon be available from the University College. The presence of Roman pottery concentrated in the area indicated above does suggest a possible continuation of the villa site into the wood.

We would like to thank the landowner for permission to access the wood and Sudbrooke Parish Council for allowing us to park in the Village Hall car park. Please note that the wood is private property and has no public access.


Dunholme Camera Club
