Welcome back after the summer break. September is in many ways like the start of a new year, e.g. schools have their new intake of students, as do universities, and in the Church we start looking towards Harvest, Remembrance, Advent, Carols and Christmas – before arriving at the real New Year's Day.

The Harvest Family Service will be on the **14**th **October** and will be combined with a celebration of 150 years since the building of the 'modern' church in the village. The 14th is the nearest Sunday to the Feast of St.Edward the Confessor – believed to be the patron saint of the church. You may recall that Chris Clarke wrote on this page a little while ago about the idea of collecting 150 coins to bring to the service that day as a special commemoration of that anniversary. Chris will be writing again, in more detail, about the event next month. I hope your collecting 'jar' is growing – mine is!

They say that "you can never go back", especially to places where one has lived. There are always changes. This was brought back to me vividly, when contemplating places to retire to, I revisited an old abode, armed with a couple of publications relating to the surrounding area.

The book and booklet included some interesting photographs showing the village in bygone days, and it was extraordinary to see the difference that 50 years has made. Truly astounding – not least the linking to other surrounding villages by new 'ribbon' housing developments along the roads to these villages. It had become one 'built-up' area with the loss of so much open 'green' land.

Today, it is a busy, featureless area with little to distinguish it from any other suburban or urban sprawl, whereas the old photographs showed it had changed very little 50 years ago from 100 years before then. Were it possible to travel through time, a visitor from the past would imagine they had come to the wrong place, except for one feature: the parish church at its centre - as in so many places around our land that have lost most of their rural and rustic attraction, it is a welcome reference point in an ever-changing landscape. Not that you have to go back a hundred and fifty years to notice changes: almost every shop I remember had either closed down or changed its use, and once quiet roads are now busy thoroughfares.

Such experiences are repeated in towns and villages up and down our country, and is but one more example of the way life itself is in a constant state of flux. As the years pass, not only places change but us with them - our attitudes, opinions, beliefs and convictions are repeatedly challenged and shaken, if not completely undermined. Many find themselves not knowing what to believe in, with life often appearing as being without meaning or direction.

Yet, as the prophet Malachi reminded the old testament people of God centuries ago (Ch.3 v.6a), there is a constant point of reference for us all in the one true God: the God who tells us, "I, the Lord, do not change." That is a promise which generations of believers across the years have found to be true, in a world where everything else seems never to stay the same.

It may be good advice that "you can never go back" as far as old haunts are concerned, but its very easy to come back to the "God who does not change" and to Jesus Christ who is "the same yesterday, today and tomorrow" (Hebrews 13:8).

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Parish Council Minutes - June 2012

ABRIDGED NOTES OF THE MEETING OF SUDBROOKE PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON THURSDAY 7TH JUNE 2012 IN THE VILLAGE HALL, SUDBROOKE

APOLOGIES: Councillors S Curtis, I Russell, County councillor Mrs S Rawlins, PCSO R Payne

23 PARISHIONERS ITEMS

A resident handed a list of 271 signatures to the Parish Council requesting that they be used to endeavour to pursue the best possible results for Sudbrooke. The resident was informed that discussions would take place with the new landowner when the sale of the land was completed.

24 SIGNATURE OF DECLARATION OF ACCEPTANCE OF OFFICE BY VICE CHAIRMAN

This was duly signed by Councillor Peter Heath.

25 POLICE MATTERS

Notification had been received that there had been some burglaries in the village and a male had been arrested.

26 NOTES OF MEETING HELD ON 10TH MAY 2012

These were signed as a correct record.

27 REPORTS ON MATTERS OUT-STANDING

- **a)** Sudbrooke Woods Footpaths See minute 23 above.
- a) Village Map unveiling 10th June 2012 The frame had now been fixed into the ground by volunteers. The unveiling and naming of The Jubilee Garden would take place on 10th June 2012 at 3.30pm and all residents would be welcome to attend.
- c) Land fronting Beech Close/Jubilee Garden suggested additional planting byCllr I Russell. As Councillor Russell was not present this item was deferred for discussion to a future meeting of the Parish Council.

It was noted however that correspondence had been received on behalf of residents of Beech Close stating that they opposed any additional planting to the area fronting their properties as this had not been agreed at the site meeting which they attended.

The Chairman stated that residents would be consulted prior to any further scheme being approved.

- **d)** Greenway/junction of Windsor Close suggestion of tree planting/dog bin in verge A reply from the LCC Highways was still awaited re services in the verge.
- **e)** Formation of Youth Club update There was nothing further to report on this matter; therefore it would be left

in abeyance.

28 HIGHWAY MATTERS

- **a)** Weeds in gutters The Clerk was asked to notify LCC Highways of the amount of the weeds in the gutters which needed treating.
- **b)** Potholes Holme Drive/Manor Drive – Despite several reports made to the Highways Department only minimal in-filling of the potholes had been carried out. A request would be made for a site meeting with the local Highways Officer.

29 JUBILEE SPORTS DAY

The grant awarded towards costs for the Jubilee Garden stipulated that a celebratory jubilee event should be held in the village. Members agreed therefore that the Sports Day be named Jubilee Sports Day. Children from neighbouring Langworth and Scothern would be invited to join their friends from Sudbrooke at the event.

30 PROPOSED FIRST AID COURSE FOR COUNCILLORS

A local Training Officer had offered to give members of the Parish Council/ staff First Aid training at a cost of approximately £10 per person. This was welcomed due to a First Aider being required to be in attendance at village events/functions. It was agreed that costs be met from parish funds.

In order to make the course viable neighbouring Parish Councils could be offered inclusion in the course.

31 LOCALISM BILL SEMINAR - 24th JULY 2012

Approval was given for Councillor Peter Heath to attend this course.

32 PLANNING

Applications

TPO – remove 1 leaning yew – 029661 – 29 Wragby Road, Sudbrooke – no objections

Barfield Farm, Wragby Road – 128696 – Change mixed use offices and residential back to full residential status – No objections.

9 Northfield Avenue – 128712 - rear extension – No objections

Refusal - TPO – crown reduction of 1 ash – 61 Wragby Road – 029477

33 FINANCE

a) Audit - The Treasurer requested that the completion of the Annual Governance Statement be deferred until the next meeting of the Parish Council by such time the Internal Audit would have been carried out.

34 CHAIRMANS COMMENTS

- a) Marquee Discussion took place regarding the marquee owned by the Parish Council, purchased in 2007 mainly for use at the Christmas tree event and which had not been used for some time. Members agreed that it not being used would result in its deterioration therefore it would be preferable to put it for sale. The Clerk was asked to advertise it for the best offer in the region of £150.00.
- **b)** Code of Conduct Notification had

been received from WLDC that pursuant to Section 27 of the Localism Act 2011 Councils were required to adopt a new Code of Conduct. The District Council had recommended to adopt a code primarily based on that produced by the Local Government Association. The Parish Council could draft its own Code; it may wish to adopt the District Council's code; or it may adopt the code which has been drafted by the National Association of Local Councils.

Members discussed this further and agreed to adopt the code suggested by

WLDC which would be confirmed by that Council on 2nd July 2012 by WLDC.

35 CORRESPONDENCE

Councillor vacancy – The advertising of the Councillor vacancy was going through the statutory process and it was hoped that co-option could take place at the July meeting of the Parish Council.

36 DATE OF NEXT MEETING -Thursday 5th July 2012

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Report of the Parish Council Meeting held on 5 July 2012

<u>1 Parishioners Items</u> – There were 7 members of the public present at the meeting. Interest had been shown in two planning applications received, one for land off Poachers Lane and one for land off Sudbrooke Lane, Sudbrooke. Following an anonymous letter which had been delivered to residents in Church Lane, the Chairman, Martin Dickie, opened the meeting by stating the following:-

'The Parish council does not reply to anonymous and inaccurate letters, which were hand delivered to properties around the Church Lane area. Until a planning application is in the public domain the Parish Council has no requirement to discuss it.

Minor applications are dealt with by being circulated amongst members, but major applications, i.e. ones which will be outside of Parish Development Limits would be discussed at council meeting and then consider a public meeting to discuss merits of application prior to our decision.

These are major applications. Any member of the public has the right to make a written or email comment either for or against the application. West Lindsey District Council Planning Committee will make the final decision not the Parish Council'.

A question and answer sessions was held between the Public and Council.

Later in the meeting the Parish Council discussed the applications further and their comments submitted to the Planning Department of the District Council are as below:-

a) Planning Application 128675, Land off Poachers Lane - Outline planning application for proposed development of 4no. detached dwellings with associated garages, plots and infrastructure including new passing places to Poachers Lane, new bridge crossing Sudbrooke beck and necessary works to existing road. Also, proposed new store building for existing football field, new car parking to replace existing and associated works - layout to be considered and not reserved for subsequent applications.

The application was discussed in depth and members resolved unanimously that the following comments be submitted to WLDC Planning Department:-

Any planning permission to be granted must be subject to the applicant entering into a Planning Obligation Agreement (Section

106) with the Parish Council prior to any residential development taking place to:-

Transfer the freehold of the playing field shown edged blue on the Drawing No TL-SB-12-02 to the Parish Council without consideration and being responsible for the Parish Council's legal costs and disbursements.

To construct at its own cost (a) a suitable store to serve the playing field of a design and specification approved by the Parish Council and (b) a hard standing car park shown on the said drawing to serve a minimum of 30 car parking spaces.

b) Planning Application 128674, Land off Sudbrooke Lane, Sudbrooke - Outline planning application for proposed development of 6no. detached dwellings with associated garages, plots and infrastructure. Extension to existing cemetery at church, additional car parking for church with new proposed footpath to church. Also, area of 13 allotments with additional parking and bridleway links to Nettleham - layout to be considered and not reserved for subsequent applications

Members discussed the above application depth and resolved unanimously that the following comments be submitted to WLDC Planning Department:-

Any planning permission must be subject to the applicant entering into a Planning obligation (Section 106) Agreement with the Parish Council prior to any residential development taking place to:-

Provide a cycleway of a standard acceptable to the Highway Authority along the route shown on Drawing No 5B-CP-12-01 (April 2012).

Provide a car park to a standard/specification approval by the Parish Council for a minimum of 50 cars to serve Sudbrooke Parish Church together with a footpath leading to the church, as shown on the said drawing.

To transfer the freehold of the proposed car park and site for 13 allotments shown on the said drawing to the Parish Council and to be responsible for its reasonable legal costs and disbursements.

<u>Co-option of Councillor</u> – Bob Waller of Two Corners, Church Lane, was co-opted to the Parish Council as its new member.

<u>Police Matters</u> – An offender had been arrested and charged for the spate of burglaries in Welton, Dunholme and Sudbrooke.

Criminal damage had been reported to the Northfield Park play area and the Policing Team had stated that they would be increasing patrols in the area. Since the meeting the repair to the damaged gate has cost the village £250.

Additional plan/map of Sudbrooke – Resident Lisa Broadbent, graphic designer for the map situated in the Jubilee Garden had offered a further map to the Parish Council for displaying if felt appropriate. It was agreed that depending upon permission from the owner of the building this would be ideally placed near to the shop/hairdressers. The Clerk would explore possible funding for a frame.

<u>Trees and shrubs overhanging footpaths</u> – Members asked that thanks be extended to those residents who had responded to the request for trimming back their shrubs and trees from overhanging the footpaths.

<u>Next Parish Council meeting</u> – Monday 3rd September 2012 - 7.30pm – Village Hall. Residents very welcome to attend.



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The Central Lincolnshire Core Strategy

The Central Lincolnshire Joint Strategic Planning Committee has issued the draft Core Strategy for consultation and this will be discussed at the next Parish Council meeting on 6 September 2012. This is a local development document that sets out the overall approach to development and growth in West Lindsey, North Kesteven and the City of Lincoln for the next twenty years covering the following:-

- How sustainable development will be achieved to improve the quality of life, well being and resilience of Central Lincolnshire's communities
- How Central Lincolnshire will contribute to a low carbon future by helping to reduce carbon emissions
- The overall amount of growth proposed and how this should be distributed around Central Lincolnshire to maximise sustainability, including major locations for new development for Lincoln, Gainsborough and Sleaford
- The provision of new and improved services and infrastructure (schools, transport facilities, open space etc) needed as part of growth and how they will be delivered
- How Central Lincolnshire's environment will be conserved and improved, including its ecology, landscapes, built heritage and natural resources, as part of an approach to maintaining the area's local character and diversity

Winter Garden Waste Collection

We continue our book stall and small coin collection. The money raised is donated to a local charity when it reaches £200.



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

GARDENING NEWS

Early in August we left home to spend some time with our daughter and grandson just outside Shrewsbury, close to the border of Wales . Before leaving I had to make some adjustment to the automatic watering system in the polytunnel, which already watered the tomatoes and cucumbers, but needed to be extended to include the pepper plants. In addition to this the automatic watering system to the wall baskets along the front had broken down a few days before we were due to leave and a replacement had to be bought and quickly installed before we left. I was kept really busy during that week, especially as I was given the wrong replacement part, and it had to be re-ordered.

Unfortunately the vegetables growing outside this year have suffered badly due to the wet weather and had become smothered in weeds. The weather and various family commitments meant that I couldn't find time to deal with this, so I have to hope for more success next year.

However it was good to have a relaxing break in a lovely part of Shropshire. We visited Chirk Castle (Castell a Gerddi'r Waun) in Wales. The castle stands on a mound overlooking the Cheshire and Shropshire countryside with views stretching for miles, and has a very interesting history. The gardens are not extensive, but there are herbaceous borders, and some wonderful clipped yews arranged in intricate patterns and shapes. These yews are very old and some are having to undergo repair work which will take a year or two to be effective..

We also visited Sunnycroft, described as a villa built for the prosperous middle classes in the late Victorian period, it is one of the very few to have survived. The house has a comfortable homely feel about it. The gardens contain a large vegetable area, an orchard with some very old fruit trees, and attractive herbaceous borders. A large shrubbery surrounds the gardens. The tea room at the back of the house opens on to a large lawned area where visitors are able to play croquet, skittles or badminton. However we left these activities to the more energetic visitors, mostly the children, while we enjoyed our cream tea!

On returning home I am concentrating on tidying the flower borders, vegetable plots and greenhouse and continuing with the work on the shrubbery which I hope will be completed this autumn. I will continue to harvest the tomatoes, cucumbers and peppers which have cropped very well.

The organisation that went into it was truly amazing and everyone who contributed to it from the most menial labourer or volunteer steward to the highest paid official did the nation and the world proud. Well done to all of them.

The TV coverage was truly wonderful and anyone interested in any particular sports event was able to click around over five channels of the BBC and follow their choice through all stages. There were also so many outdoor events that were free to attend and watch that tens of thousands of people found themselves getting involved in as spectators even though they probably wouldn't have dream of attending these events if held in a stadium or arena. Best of all these were completely free. Those who were lucky enough to attend the main events held in The Stadiums and Sports Hall or Swim-

ming Pools were treated to mind blowing involvement and crowd participation which we who watched on TV were able to share.

I was lucky enough to attend Hyde Park and watch those wonderful Brownlow brothers as they romped home to win Gold and Bronze medals for Team GB after running past us about ten times on circuits during which they swam, cycled and ran mind boggling distances to the roars of the thousands like me who packed the park free of charge with magnificent views and close proximity to the athletes. Whoever organised that and the other free events in Hyde Park deserves a medal himself.

I attended another free event in Hampton Court (I always was a skinflint) and was there within touching distance of Bradley Wiggins sideburns as he won his Gold Medal for cycling. Yet again that event was attended by thousands as they roared on our hero and all the other competitors. That was the nice thing about these events . The crowd not only cheered Team GB but sportingly every other participant as well. The rest of the Games I watched on TV and fell in love with Victoria Pendleton. I wept with the first of our Girl rowers. I got a lump in my throat as our Gold Medal Judo girl offered a prayer to her dead mother. Shouted myself hoarse as Moe Farrow and Chris Hoy won their medals and all the other s who thrilled and excited the Nation over the whole spectrum of events. It was gripping and spectacular and I have not watched as much TV in my life and have never been more excited. I found myself watching events that I would never have considered watching before. A good example of this was that wonderful spectacle of that Gold medal winning horse dancing to one of my favourite pieces of music "The Great Escape" in Greenwich Park . Truly wonderful! Brilliant!. Even the weather was great with only the briefest spot of rain.

Summing it all up It was truly great and our athletes' did us proud. I don't think their efforts and results will ever be bettered, certainly not in my lifetime. I have never been prouder of being BRITISH. The Opening and Closing ceremonies had my family glued to the TV for the whole of each evening.

Being an Old Codger though I have to have a moan and it is the view behind the TV commentators of that ugly pile of red scaffolding and twisted metal in front of the main arena. Whoever dumped that there on view to the rest of the world allegedly as a piece of modern art ought in my opinion to be shot. Is that eyesore the best we could offer?

I leave you with the words that left me with speechless with a sore throat for hours after roaring them out as I watched on a giant screen and then saw the man in person as he crossed the finish line . "GO WIGGINS GO! I might even get out my old bike now.

This month:

Upgrading your PC-2

Something else that you can upgrade is your video card, also known as a graphics card.

This is the device that allows you to see what your PC is doing and interact with it. Many PCs come with the video card hardware integrated onto the system board, normally with 1 output VGA connector and a basic amount of graphics RAM. However, the same board provides expansion slots into which you can add another video card

Why would you add another card? Well, as software develops, so does the video requirements of the video card. Some basic monitors can only display resolutions of up to 1024 x 768 but higher specification monitors can display much higher resolutions which gives the User a much more detailed visual experience, displaying many more pixels (the small dots of light that make up the picture) and millions of colours to make the picture you see as realistic as possible.

You can spend anything from £40 to 100s of


pounds for a video card. A real benefit of adding a second card with one or more output connectors (VGA, S-Video, DVI, HDMI) is that it will allow you to add a second or more monitors so you could sit at your desk with 2 or more monitors, one displaying an Access database and the others displaying your Windows Explorer file system and a couple of other open windows. This enables you to actually see more of your work at the same time and work independently in each window as you need to, rather that switching between windows on the taskbar to find the one you need.

You can also send the video signal to your TV to view movies, DVDs, programs and files that are displaying on your PC; audio is another issue to address in this case. Depending upon the add-in card you use, you could also gain more video RAM to further improve the visual experience.

Many of the games being developed today require a really good video card so that you can immerse yourself in the gaming experience.
