Vicars Letter

As I write this, Easter is just under two weeks away, but I guess you will be reading this after the event. However, it can be good to remember the Lord Jesus' words on the Cross on Good Friday.

According to the four Gospels, Jesus spoke several times when he was being crucified. Considering the pain involved, it's amazing that he was able to talk at all. If you add all the four Gospels together, we have seven 'famous last words' of Jesus on the record. They are called the 'seven words from the cross' and each one tells us something about how we should live, and hope to die.

Father, forgive: The first of the seven words from the cross was spoken, according to St. Luke, while the soldiers were nailing Jesus to the cross. Then, Jesus said, "Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing." It was not only the soldiers – each one of us often does things which hurt Jesus. But he forgives us; bringing forgiveness was the purpose of his life and death.

In paradise: To the penitent thief, Jesus said "Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in paradise".

Here was forgiveness at its most demanding; Jesus forgives someone who was a criminal, but who, at the last minute, showed a flash of faith. Nobody's beyond redemption. Jesus encouraged him with the promise of eternal life.

Here is your mother: According to St. John, when Jesus saw his mother, and the disciple whom he loved standing beside her, he said to his mother, "Woman, here is your son." Then he said to the disciple, "Here is your mother." And from that hour the disciple took her into his own home. At times of intense pain, most of us are only capable of thinking of ourselves; Jesus was unselfishly caring for his mother and his best friend.

Forsaken: St. Mark writes, "At three o'clock Jesus cried out with a loud voice, "Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani?" which means, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" St. Matthew has the same thing in slightly different words. Jesus entered fully into our human experience, even to the extent of feeling as though God had deserted him. Yet the words were a quotation from Psalm 22, which ends on a joyful note. It's as though he had to work bravely through his despair in order to return to hope.

Thirst: St John writes, "when Jesus knew that all was now finished, he said (in order to fulfil the scripture), "I am thirsty." Psalm 69 includes the words, "When I was thirsty, they gave me vinegar to drink." Jesus, was dehydrated after three hours in the heat of the noonday sun, but he was also thirsting to obey his Father's will, and to win our souls for heaven

Finished: When Jesus had received the wine, he said, "It is finished." This is a cry of triumph; Jesus seized victory from the jaws of defeat. As the old hymn begins – "Love's redeeming work is done".

Commending his spirit: Then Jesus, as St. Luke records, crying with a loud voice, said, "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit." Having said this, he breathed his last. This is a quotation from Psalm 31, and may well have been the prayer of faith which Jesus, in common with many other people, used to say just before he went to sleep each night.

As we look at Cross, as we recall these last seven sayings, we can also remember the beginning of a blessing from 'Common Prayer' - "Christ crucified draw you to himself, to find in him a sure ground for faith, a firm support for hope, and the assurance of sins forgiven".

118 PARISHIONERS ITEMS

It was noted that following a request to the County Council and West Lindsey District Council Scothern Lane had had a road sweep.

119 POLICE MATTERS – No Police Officer present.

120 COUNTY COUNCILLORS RE-PORT

CC Mrs Sue Rawlins reported that there was to be no increase in the County Council tax element for the next financial year.

She also agreed to pursue the legal department of the County Council for an update on the obstruction on Church Lane.

121 DISTRICT COUNCILLORS REPORT

DC Stuart Curtis explained about pro-

posed development of 2000 houses in the Bunkers Hill/Greetwell quarry area (north east quadrant).

122 NOTES OF THE MEETINGS OF 13TH DECEMBER 2012 AND 3RD JANUARY 2013

These were signed as correct records of the meetings.

123 SUDBROOKE NEWS - REVIEW OF ADVERTISING COSTS

The Chairman suspended Standing Orders for the duration of this discussion to enable Nick Truscott, Editor and Advertising Manager of the magazine, to speak.

Following advice from the Internal Auditor that the advertising costs of Sudbrooke News be reviewed annually the Treasurer produced the following financial information from April 2012 to December 2012:

Income - £1,402, Expenditure - £1759 (management and printing costs).

These figures indicated that Sudbrooke News was close to becoming self funding.

It was felt that there was no necessity at the present time to increase advertising costs and the Editor/Advertising Manager was asked to continue with obtaining advertising at his discretion.

124 REPORTS ON MATTERS OUTSTANDING

A. Transfer of land Beech Close/

near to Millennium stone – The transfer of the land was in the hands of the solicitors and progressing.

B. Siting of carved seats – Jubilee Garden – the Chairman suspended Standing Orders for the duration of this discussion to enable Helen Link of the Wood Carving Group to speak.

Helen informed the meeting that 5 seats and 4 sculptures, made by the Wood Carving Group, were now complete and ready to site in the Jubilee Garden and she agreed to prepare a specification for the fixing of the seats. This would be forwarded to the Clerk in order for quotations to be obtained.

Thanks were extended to Helen and the Group for the outstanding effort put into the carvings which would be an asset to the village.

Helen requested provision of funds from the Parish Council in order for the group to produce more carved posts to continue around the corner onto Holme Drive. This would be an agenda item for the next meeting of the Parish Council.

125 HIGHWAY MATTERS

a) Overhanging trees/shrubs
A158 to Langworth crossing

- The footway along the A158 was again becoming difficult to walk due to overhanging trees and shrubs. The Clerk was instructed to request that the Highways Department arrange for them to be cut back.

b) Overhanging hedge – Church Lane – Further to minute 94i of the December 2012 meeting of the Parish Council a reply from the Highways Department stated that they have no powers to enforce height restrictions on hedges unless they encroach over the highway.

126 GRASS CUTTING CONTRACT 2013

This had been received from Veolia Environmental Services. The Clerk was asked to make an enquiry about one item on the contract and report back to the next meeting of the Parish Council.

The cost of the service provided by WLDC for weed spraying for the next season would be sought.

127 REVIEW OF RISK ASSESS-MENT

The Treasurer confirmed that there were no amendments from last year.

128 LITTER PICK 16TH MARCH 2013

Mr Mike Halliday and Councillor Stuart Curtis were organising the Litter Pick and notices would be placed in the Sudbrooke News and notice boards.

requested support from other Parish Councils in the fight against the erection of wind turbines/farms in the area. Members agreed to give their support and instructed the Clerk to write to the Central Lincolnshire Joint Planning Unit opposing these.

BRIEF REPORT OF PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON THURSDAY 7TH MARCH 2013

Police matters - PCSO Jackie Parker reported on the following:-

- That there had been door to door salesman in the area. On some occasions ID had been requested but had proved to be false. To verify that a Door to Door Salesman is genuine he/she requires an official Pedlars Licence issued by Lincolnshire Police.
- A wallet had been found in the village contact the Police if you have lost one.
- There had been a burglary from a garage in the village.

Damage to Play Equipment at Village Hall – Unfortunately another piece of play equipment has been severely damaged/vandalised. The Log Barrel has been worked off its frame and amazingly made its way, over the play area fence to the middle of the football field.

Thanks were extended to local resident Dave Etheridge who kindly made the equipment/area safe and has offered to do the repair at very low cost.

Fly tipping on Playing field car park – A large amount of tree cuttings and pipes (surprisingly deposited in a very orderly heap) has been left on the playing field car park. This will need to be removed at parish expense.

Area of land fronting Beech Close – The transfer of this area of land to the Parish Council should take place very soon.

Wood Carving Group Seats/Posts – Quotations are being sought for the siting of the seats in the Jubilee Garden.

The Parish Council also approved expenditure for the cost of wood for the Group to carve some more posts.

Date of Next Meeting - Annual Parish Meeting at 7.30pm on 4^{th} April 2013, followed by the Parish Council meeting at 8.00pm.

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GARDENING NEWS

Hello and welcome to more news from my garden. Because of the weather and the late start to spring there has not been much progress. When I last wrote there was a blanket of snow covering our garden and it was very cold. Apart from a few flurries this week the snow has gone, but it still feels very cold. Fortunately nature has carried on working and as the snow cleared the flowers emerged, showing that winter is slowly changing to spring. The snowdrops are being followed by crocus, pansies and the early daffodils, with the promise of so much more to come.

Looking back to last year's Gardening News, I said that I had mowed the lawn for the second time by the end of March and carried out spring pruning and clean up of the front garden. However the current weather forecast is showing higher temperatures and wet weather next week, so there should be a chance to catch up if the rain is not too heavy.

The Geraniums bought as plug plants are growing well in the greenhouse, and should be ready for planting out in late spring. The polytunnel has been cleared and prepared ready for this year's plants. I will be repeating the grafted plants as used last year, Tomato var, Shirley, with cucumber and pepper varieties still to be chosen. After walking around the back garden this morning I was pleased to find winter jasmine still in bloom, primroses, Erica, and the small Magnolia and the more mature Camellia in bud ready to burst into flower soon. Even if it doesn't feel very spring-like, the garden is showing the signs. Does this mean that we will soon be seeing real spring weather, followed by a good summer?

Let's hope so.

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
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The Old Codger.....

Lincoln Racecourse

I was stuck in traffic on the A57 road the other day alongside the Old Grandstand of the Lincoln Racecourse and couldn't help thinking that it was a great shame that we no longer have a racecourse in the City of Lincoln. That Grandstand is all that remains of what was once the home of the famous "Lincoln Handicap" one mile horse race, one of the Classic British races ranking alongside The Derby, The Oaks, Ascot Gold Cup, Cheltenham and the Grand National. The race itself is now held annually at Doncaster but still called "The Lincoln". It is important due to the fact that it is the first race in the flat race season and always attracts vast crowds and interest in the National Press with huge amounts of money swelling the Bookies wallets.



How on Earth did we come to lose it? Why was the Racecourse closed and the Race itself moved to Doncaster, be it in name only. If a small town like Market Rasen can have a racecourse why did Lincoln's have to close down? The amount of money that it must have attracted during the meetings would have meant that every hotel and boarding house in the City must have been packed out and pubs, shops and restaurants must have made fortunes. The numbers of local folk employed either on the course itself or servicing it such as those

employed on taxis, buses, coaches and ground staff and railway workers in the days before road traffic became so widely used must have been colossal. What a boost to the local economy! How was it allowed to happen? Who was responsible for allowing it to happen?

Popular opinion these days hints that it closed down so that the dual carriage-way A46 ring road which crosses the A57 at The Carholme Roundabout and runs across what was once the racecourse itself could be built. This is a fallacy. My research shows that the racecourse closed down in 1965 and the ring road A46 was not built until 1985 and it was not even planned until 1975 when the first plans were proposed in 1965.

The history of the Racecourse, which used to be known as The Carholme Racecourse shows it to have been created on West Common in 1773 and the first "Lincoln Handicap Race" was run in 1849 after which the course became known as Lincoln Racecourse. The race itself was over a one mile straight course towards the City of Lincoln finishing in front of where the Grandstand now stands having been erected in 1897. It was an extremely popular race attracting a huge field of runners being the first race of the Flat Season. The meeting itself lasted a week It was a chance to try out horses that had been more or less idle all winter and set the standard and odds for the rest of the Flat Racing Season. It holds the record for the number of runners in one race, still standing today, of a field of 58 runners in 1948. That record will never be broken due to restrictions to the number of runners in any one race later brought into force.

The popular board game "TOTOPOLY" made by the makers of the game of Monopoly used the names of the winners of "The Lincoln" from 1926 to 1937 in their game which is still popular and played today. When BBC television began showing horseracing on screens Lincoln Racecourse was widely acclaimed as the best possible coverage that you could get of any course in the land due to the fact that the A57 road was closed for the duration of the days meeting and it's tarmac smooth road surface ran alongside the track between the Grandstand and the course rails for the entire one mile of the race very near to the runners enabling very close up shots to millions of viewers. To this day no other racecourse in the country has this same unique feature.

The Betting Levy Board who had subsidised the race and the course itself for many years appealed to Lincoln County and City Council in 1965 for assistance in funding it and when this was refused decided to stop its financial support and the racecourse duly closed and the venue of "The Lincoln Handicap" was transferred to our lucky neighbours Doncaster where it is still held to this day attracting massive crowds for the weeks meeting every year. With all the benefits to this City that Doncaster now reaps the rewards for how could those in authority in our County allow this to happen? To allow the financial benefits, let alone the prestige of having one of the première sports events and venues in the country to slip away from us without fighting to keep it is mind boggling. It is the same mentality that allowed the world famous twin towers of Wembley

Stadium to be raised to the ground yet insists that red telephone boxes at the roadside be preserved for austerity.

In case there are other like minded moronic nitwits in other authorities throughout the UK I would like to submit (tongue in cheek) other similar events that they may consider moving: The Isle of Man TT races to be held on The Isle of Wight. The Grand National to be held in Brighton. Edinburgh Military Tattoo to be held in Birmingham. The London Marathon to be held in Glasgow The Great North Run to be held in Southend on Sea. The FA Cup Final be held at Gretna Green.

And you Dear Readers, I am sure can come up with dozens more equally stupid ones but hardly any that will equal the stupidity and carelessness of our local leaders and former Council Worthies who allowed our heritage to slip away.

vineyard.

Walkers should meet at the village hall at 9-30am. Walkers are advised to take a waterproof coat, wear suitable footwear, take a couple of drinks (for two short stops) and a snack.

In view of the extra distance to Binbrook, the likely return time to Sudbrooke is around 2-30pm.

If you wish to walk and need a lift, please turn up at the village hall. Everyone is welcome to join in this free and healthy activity.

Future walk is Saturday 4th May.

A 6 mile walk around the Wibsey and Thorpe areas starting from the Wibsey Visitor Centre. Lakes, woodland and good flat surfaces Walkers should meet at the village hall at 9-30am.

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Bob-a-Job Week – a response to The Old Codger



As usual I read the article by The Old Codger with interest especially last month with his reference to "Boba-Job Week". I well remember going around my village in Sussex trying to persuade friends and neighbours to let me wash windows or cars, carry out weeding or any other jobs. Those were the days when it was always sunny, people said hello to each other in the street, and there were no computers, I-pods or mobile phones. Bliss!

Fast forward a few decades and I am now running Scouts. The Scout Association has changed. It is now open to boys and girls, a great step forward. The age ranges for the sections have changed slightly and Venture Scouts have become Explorers.

One of the things that did disappear was "Bob-a-Job Week". Bob-a-job week was first introduced as a good turn day in 1914 by scout movement founder Lord Baden-Powell. Over various years it was improved until during Easter week 1949 it became an annual fixture. The scheme got its nickname from shilling, colloquially 'bob', that the youngsters were paid for completing their good turn - which would now be worth 5p.

The aims of the week were to raise funds for the Scouts and to raise their public profile.

It continued, with changes due to decimalisation rebranding it as "Scout Job Week". Scouts began to do more 'sophisticated' jobs like bag packing and so on, and the money was a lot better. It was realised that a shilling, or 5p, was not a realistic sum. However, the knocking at doors in the area was still there, except that it was confined to your own immediate areas, neighbours and friends. As time went on the idea of any young child knocking on any strangers' door, as well as concerns about compensation such as scratching cars being washed caused the scheme to be halted in 1992.



20 years later, Scout Community Week was introduced. This modern equivalent of "Scout Job Week" was revived by the Scout Association, as leaders attempt to rebuild the movement's traditional commitment to helping others. The revamped scheme has been designed to comply with health and safety laws and to avoid the risk of compensation claims. Now, the scouts will operate in groups while carrying out work and will be supervised all the time by their leaders. And instead of washing neighbours' cars or mowing their lawns, the new

scheme will see groups work on larger tasks, designed to help the wider community. As the new format relies more on adult participation, it is taking place during term time, with work carried out at weekends and during the evenings.

Taking place from 3-9 June 2013, Scout Community Week not only gives Scouting the opportunity to bond with the local community and raise essentials funds for local and national Scouting, but it's a chance to promote and champion all the inspiring things we do during the other 51 weeks of the year. As before, the Scouts will collect donations and sponsorship for their good deeds. A quarter of the money raised goes to the Scout Association's central body, to be used to set up new groups. The remainder stays with local groups.

Last year the 25th Lincoln (Scothern) Scouts, my Group, worked with the local Police Community Support Officers. Whilst the PCSO's were post coding bikes for security purposes, the Scouts sold refreshments and home-made cakes. All the money raised was sent to the Scout Association HQ to support other less fortunate groups.



So "Bob-a-Job Week" is still there, now badged as "Do 1 Thing", but it does need support. Any suggestions on what the Scouts can do to support and improve the local community would be welcomed, but please also remember it is a fund raising activity as well.

Continuing on the subject of software, you have seen the differences between Microsoft and Apple. IBM is very similar to Microsoft in its approach to software. Linux, on the other hand, is an operating system (OS) that was conceived by one man with a vision to create a free operating system which was distributed under a licence prohibiting commercial distribution and has grown over the years to the existing General Public Licence. This means that anyone can install a version of the Linux OS on their computer at no cost. There are many different versions of this OS; Ubuntu, Red Hat, SUSE, TurboLinux, Fedora, to name just a few. As you can see, there is a massive selection of OSs to choose from and again, the Internet is the tool to use to do your research.

Once you've chosen your OS, the next consideration is the protection of the PC; you MUST consider an anti-virus package to protect the PC against malicious threats. McAfee and Norton are 2 popular packages but there are also free offerings that will do the job but not as thoroughly as a commercial

product. You should also consider an anti-malware package such as Malwarebytes.

Once protection is decided, what productivity software do you want? This is software that will enable you to do the jobs you want to do: Microsoft Office, Open Office, Roxio Easy Media Creator, AutoCAD, Visio, and Money Manager are all examples of productivity software. So many to choose from that all do the job to varying degrees and prices. Once again, only you know what you want to do on your PC so only you can make that decision. Then there's leisure time—do you want games? Flight simulators, cards, Mahjongg, shoot-em-ups, strategy—there are so many out there.

You will also need to ensure that your drivers are up-to-date and yes, there is software out there to do that job for you, such as DriverMax and Driver Genius. There are a few hundred drivers on each PC that allows hardware or software interaction with the OS and it is vital that these are the latest versions to ensure your PC is working at its best.

Next month, I'll start the actual building of the PC.
