■ 1 PARISHIONERS' ITEMS

- Decomments had been received from residents re the fitting of a fence around land on Manor Drive and questioned ownership. LCC Highways had confirmed that permission had been granted by them for the fence. Members unanimously resolved that a land registry search be expended to confirm ownership.
- ▶ A request had been made for the beech trees on Beech Tree Corner to have some of the lower branches trimmed. That the owners of the trees be passed this request unanimously Resolved.
- Damage to part of the grass verge had occurred during building works to a nearby property. That LCC Highways be notified and asked to request reinstatement of the verge unanimously Resolved.

■ 8 REPORTS ON MATTERS OUTSTANDING

a) Litter Pick: Thanks were extended to over 20 residents and Scouts who attended the Litter Pick on a bright sunny Saturday morning, exhausting the supply of grabbers from WLDC but collection a copious amount of rubbish, tidying

▶ b) New sportsfield - report on work required to playing surface and to consider quotation: A report had been received on the condition of the field from Glendale Ltd and suggestion of work required. This included infilling and levelling with topsoil where damage had been caused by cars driving on the field, damage by moles and heavy rolling in the sum of £900.00. The work would take place over the summer months.

It was also suggested that a gate should be provided to prevent vehicular access onto the field. That the quotation by Glendale in the sum of £900 be accepted, this being the preferred local company to carry out the work, being the grass cutting contractors for the Parish Council; proposed by Councillor Paul Rignall, seconded by Councillor Andy Cottam and unanimously Resolved.

The Clerk would obtain costs for a gate to be fitted when works to the beck were complete.

C) Consideration of Facebook page for Sudbrooke: Councillor Mike Turnbull agreed to set up and monitor an information only Facebook page for Sudbrooke Parish Council on a trial for a period of three months. Unanimously Resolved.

9 PLANNING MATTERS

a) Application 040934 - Fell one oak tree in adjacent land within G5 of TPO Sudbrooke 1950 - Tree adjacent 4 The Paddock: Comments to be made to WLDC as follows: The tree is close to the house at 4 The Paddock and there does seem to be some safety risk. The tree has three main stems all of which are much taller than the house. If work is to take place this could either be removal or reduction in height to the level of the house. This would be an alternative to complete removal. Reduction in height would be a preference as this tree is part of the belt of trees providing some amenity benefit to the village. It is understood that a site visit from the WLDC Tree Officer would be welcomed by the applicant to discuss options,'

b) Park Development: A copy of the Landscape Management Plan had been received by the Parish Council from the developers which was welcomed, along with a drawing which detailed all works within the woodland area. The Clerk was asked to obtain an AO size copy of this drawing.

• c) Application 139163: Sudbrooke House, Church Lane - change of use and alterations to outbuildings to form holiday let unit - No objections - Note: Councillors Bob Waller, Andy Cottam and Paul Rignall had all declared an interest in this application.

d) Application 139020 - proposed works to improve and prevent deterioration of Nettleham Beck at Sudbrooke Playing Field, Poachers Lane: Comments made to

WLDC: The Parish Council have been fully involved in the development of the proposed works and confirmed their full support at the January 2019 Parish Council meeting as follows: That the Parish Council support the Rivers and Canal Trust in the above works, subject to them obtaining permission from Messrs Trueloves, unanimously Resolved.

The works provide a rare opportunity to enhance the beck from its current straight and uniform profile to a much more interesting feature which will greatly improve habitat and biodiversity as well as being visually beneficial.

The works fully align with Policy 6 of the submitted Sudbrooke Neighbourhood Plan the following parts of which are particularly relevant. Development will only be supported where proposals enhance the setting of Nettleham Beck and its balancing ponds, as identified on figure 12. and the associated amenity and biodiversity value. Development proposals adjacent to these locations should consider the following: Preserve and enhance its amenity, biodiversity, identified significant trees and hedgerows and recreational value. The PC supports the proposed works and will continue to be involved at construction stage.

▶ c) Audit Code of Practice 2020: The Treasurer explained that it was currently unnecessary to comment on the proposals as this was being dealt with by NALC.

The Clerk reported as follows:

- ▶ That she had given publicity to the opening of the Post Office in the village.
- ▶ That Mrs Coral Evans had designed a post for the wildflower garden and this was currently being worked on.

- ▶ That there will be surface dressing works taking place on Holme, Manor and St Edward's Drives, from May 13.
- ▶ That the noticeboard at the Park Gates was in need of refurbishment due to rot, and that she was seeking a quotation.
- ▶ A request for grant funding had been received from CAB. This would be reviewed in the next budget in December.

- D Co-option to Council: The Council co-opted two new members to fill vacancies Mrs Barbara Bingham who many residents will already know and Stuart Hewson, a new resident to Sudbrooke. Both were warmly welcomed to the Council by the Chairman.
- ▶ Litter and Dog Bins in the village: It was noted that the bins in the village appeared to have missed being emptied over the Easter period. This was a problem with West Lindsey District Council which has hopefully now been resolved. However, if any resident notices a bin that requires emptying please do notify the Parish Clerk.

ELECTION, ELECTION, ELECTION

I did not write an article for last month's magazine due to the local elections. If I had submitted an article it would have appeared after the elections and I may not have been your District

Councillor - as it was, I was re-elected and can now carry on and build on what we have achieved over the last



18 months and I can continue to serve the residents of Sudbrooke Ward.

The elections delivered what most people expected; a protest vote based on national issues (Brexit) against the two main parties.

That said the Conservatives went against a national trend and held onto their majority at WLDC, albeit reduced (but still receiving 44% of votes counted), while the Labour Party lost all their seats.

The winners on the night were the Lib Dem's and the Independents. The Conservative group held their AGM two days after the election and voted in a new leader of the council. Cllr Jeff Summers steps down and is replaced by Cllr

Giles McNeil, who is one of the district councillors for Nettleham Ward.

Jeff did a good job as leader over the last six years. We all wish him well and hope that he stays within the group to help deliver the manifesto, that he himself helped to design.

From a personal point of view the election showed another interesting facet of tactical

politics. For whatever reason the Sudbrooke Ward was not contested by the other parties.

Whilst some of my fellow councillors thought I was lucky not to have to fight an election, I felt as though this was not good for democracy.

The electorate were not given a choice to vote on an individual or specific policies or issues that affect them, a situation that I do not necessarily agree with.

All I can say is that I will continue to work hard for the residents of Sudbrooke Ward and represent you to best of my ability over the coming four years as your District Councillor and Vice Chair of your Parish Council.

A PENSIONER REMINISCES: ANOTHER TALE BY TERRY MAYO



Te had a lovely break in the Scillies in May, and if you've never been they are an enchanting group of islands, and well worth a visit. You could just go for a short break - there are several cheap trains to Penzance if you don't like driving, and you could stay in one of my daughter's cottages if you'd like, St Michaels Coastal Cottages, but we had a week, and we found enough to do.

We chose a week which was followed by an international festival of gig racing, and there were about 160 gigs there from all over Cornwall, as well as Holland, France and many other European countries. It's like the boats used for the boat race, except they have space for two people sitting side by side, and the seats do not move backwards and forwards. Since 1990, the World Pilot Gig Championships have been held annually on the Isles of Scilly.

Held over the first May bank holiday weekend, they are attended by over 2,000 rowers and spectators, and is widely believed to be the busiest weekend on the islands, with an approximate doubling of the population. They were originally used in the 17th century for the rescue of mariners in distress, but later to take pilots out to cargo boats to help them navigate the rocks. The gig boats that got there first got the business!

The museum is well worth a visit, and an island tour in a minibus is a must. The five

inhabited islands are worth visiting, all by local Marazion. Our eight-seater plane, including boats, but you have to keep an eve on the tides if you don't want an overnight stay. My daughter and son-in-law missed the boat back from Tresco, and had to cadge a lift back

We rented a house that came right up to the beach at Hugh Town with great views out to sea, on a road called The Strand. With no crime, the police have an easy time of it. When



we went to get our house keys, the agent said they're in the door! We were flying over water so regulations required us to have instructions for safety explained, but it was done in the air terminal, and was on a DVD (and took longer than the flight). They said there was a problem with the aircraft, and would we mind waiting 10 minutes while they got a replacement. A quarter of an hour later we were in Lands End, and on our way back to our base in

the pilot, about to take off from St Mary's. As you can imagine, as an ex-airman, it wasn't the first time I had flown, and it took me back to my very first flight in an Avro Anson at RAF Shawbury in Shropshire in 1958.

Thousands were built during the war years, and most had been retired, but there were a few left in service. I was 18 at the time, and because I was on a non-flying station (at RAF Stoke Heath, also in Shropshire) they let us go for a "jolly" to get some air experience. Stoke Heath was a maintenance unit for the repair and refurbishment of radio equipment, near RAF Tern Hill. All there was there was a couple of hangers where we worked, and the accommodation was about 10 Nissen huts in the middle of a field about a mile away.

Every airman was issued with an old "sit up and beg" push bike which took you to the work site and back (well you took it!). The sick quarters were three miles away at Tern Hill, so you had to be really ill to go sick. The standard procedure for sick airmen was to report to the orderly, and then to strip off to your trousers and braces no matter what was wrong with you. I never did figure that out. The only heating in the hut was a pot bellied coke stove, in the middle of the hut. When a man moved out, if he had a bed space near the stove it was quickly "bagged", and there was one hand basin with a cold tap at the end of

the hut, serving about 16 men. A hot wash or a shower entailed a trek across the field to the centre of it, hail, rain, or 6ft drifts of snow, clad in nothing but a towel and your army boots which was done infrequently in winter.

Entertainment in the evening was afforded by walking over the lane to the NAFFI, and grabbing a beer or watching a 21" black and white tv with its three channels! The mess was next door. (The place where we ate our food)

The Anson was full when we took off with about 20 souls on board, and we burned petrol for an hour before coming back to terra ferma. I think we were disappointed that we didn't have to put our parachutes to good use, that would have been something to share with our grandchildren.

Whilst waiting for the other guys to take their turn in the Anson, I wandered off into the flight operations room to see if there was a chance of another flight in something else. I didn't know if there was a protocol for this, but Sealand had opened up as the main service heyho there was only one way to find out. I enquired if anyone was willing to take me up for a flight as I was such an expert passenger by this time, and to my amazement someone was. After sorting out a parachute (which I was too naive to consider), Flt Lt Allinson told me to hop into a waiting Percival and didn't seem willing to risk their Provost and he'd take me up for an hour's aerobatics. I couldn't believe my luck, it was a young airman's dream. It was the forerunner

to the Jet Provost, but had a petrol engine with two side-by-side seats, and the RAF had about 40 of them in a training role.

This was real flying, and for an hour we were doing loops and turns, barrel rolls and every other move in the book designed to make me part with my breakfast, and still I hung on to it. And I didn't have to use my parachute. A super day out for an 18-year-old. One in private ownership came down near the River Ancholme in July 2009, and killed the pilot, I wonder if that was the plane I flew in.

For the next year there was to be be no more flying as I was posted to RAF Yatesbury in Wiltshire to do a year's training to qualify as an RAF fitter, and to move up from a Senior Aircraftmen to a Junior Technician, and that would mean one stripe instead of a propeller, and a pay rise.

In the meanwhile RAF Stoke Heath had closed down (not before time) and RAF depot for radio repairs in the uk, and was in a nice location just inside North Wales near Chester. They also carried out parachute training there from balloons as they did on the West Common in the 90s, but then we weren't allowed to do it (they'd spent a year training us investment).

I got married to a Leicester girl in 1961, and moved swiftly in to married quarters.

MAY WALK

▶ The weather forecast was for sunny spells and heavy showers so we decided to confine our walk to forest trails and footpaths where we had ready access to some shelter.

A WATCHING BRIEF

I have just sat in some SATS. It is an opportunity for me to look and see what our 11-year-old children are being asked to spend their time doing in May every year.

I wasn't there to watch the children, but to 'monitor' the fact that staff were following the guidelines associated with the tests.

I am not a fan of the tests or the process. I don't believe that they are an activity that is 'life-giving'. But, they have become a fact of life and a fact of education, and we have to smooth the process as far as we are able for everyone involved, encourage the children to do their best, work hard and then go and play. I will now descend from my soapbox...

One of the reasons I am not a fan is because, by their very nature, the tests are limited. Children and adults are far more than the results of a few tests.

Some words from Psalm 139: For you created my inmost being:

you knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made;

your works are wonderful,

I know that full well.

My frame was not hidden from you
when I was made in the secret place,
when I was woven together in the depths of

Those words describe to us the intricate nature of life.

Every time I walk into school I see children that I have baptised, and who are growing into incredible human beings.

I find it amazing! They are curious, sometimes wise beyond their age, funny, joyful, intelligent, kind, caring, compassionate, passionate, gentle, welcoming, accepting, inclusive... they are good at running, sharing, speaking a second language, poetic, they paint, they draw they craft, they make conversation, they sing and dance... and none of it is measured in a Test.

We are WHOLE people, God created us that way - lets not minimise our value, our gifts, and those of our children by limiting them to the results of Tests in May... let's celebrate who they are and what they bring and lets let them know their true worth.

■ LATEST UPDATE

We welcomed Rosemary Mortlake-French, a volunteer for Lincs and Notts Air Ambulance, to our May meeting to tell us about the Air Ambulance.

This charity-run service saves lives by flying two or three missions every day. It was set up in Lincolnshire in 1994 to reduce response times in the large geographical area of the county.

It flew for four months in 1994, and in 1995 enough funds were raised for it to fly again before joining with Nottinghamshire. It is based at RAF Waddington, which is fairly central to its operational area, and can be anywhere in Lincs/Notts within 20 minutes.

It carries two pilots, a doctor and two paramedics on a shift system. This enables more patients to be treated in 'the golden hour', during which life changing treatment is given. It costs £2,500 per mission. The service needs £4million a year to continue operating. The current new helicopter can fly

at night and land on roads or fields in area free of cables and trees.

The charity operates with a minimum of staff and 500 volunteers. This was another well received presentation.
