PARISH COUNCIL MINUTES

April 2017

Notes of the monthly meeting of Sudbrooke Parish Council held on Thursday 6 April in the Sudbrooke Village Hall.

PRESENT:

Councillors Peter Heath (Chairman), Bob Waller (Vice Chairman), Stuart Curtis, Miss Rose Dobbs, Mrs Lyn Etheridge, County Councillor Mrs Sue Rawlins, (till 8.50pm), Mrs Christine Myers (Clerk), Mrs Bridget Solly (Treasurer) and three members of the public.

1) Parishioners' Items

■ **Two seats required treating:** One near to the Millennium Stone, one at Fox Covert. The Clerk was instructed to obtain a quotation.

■ **A new light in Holme Drive was still not working although previously reported.**

■ A resident stated that as a member of the Rotary Club of Bailgate, he was bringing to the attention of the Parish Council that the Club was able to obtain grants for crocus bulbs which would be set by members of the Rotary Club in specified areas. The resident suggested that this may be something which the Parish Council could pursue at no cost to the parish. This was welcomed by members and would be an item for the May meeting's agenda.

2) Apologies

■ Councillors Andy Cottam, Paul Rignall and Ian Russell. That the reasons given for being unable to attend be accepted Resolved unanimously.

3) To Receive Declarations of Interest on any item on the agenda

■ Councillor Bob Waller declared an interest as a friend of the applicant, in item 15g on the agenda - Appeal, land to the rear of Sudbrooke House.

4) Notes of the meeting held on March 2 2017 to be signed as minutes

■ That the notes be signed as Minutes Resolved unanimously.

5) Police Matters

■ **Incident Statistics:** None received.

■ **Reply from Chief Constable re. monthly incident statistics:** The letter stated that the statistics were to allow members of the public to be alert to crime trends that may be affecting their communities and that further details could not be divulged.

6) County Councillor's Report

■ CC CC Mrs Sue Rawlins reported on the drastic cuts in finance made for road maintenance and school transport. She also stated that the Lincolnshire Pension Scheme had amalgamated with six large pension schemes in the country.

7) District Councillor's Report

■ DC Stuart Curtis reported as follows on the development on Poachers Lane:

1. The freehold of the new playing field would be transferred to the PC prior to the first occupation of any dwelling within the development.
2. The height of the Nettleham Lane hedge would be reduced to no more than one metre and then transferred to the PC prior to the first occupation of no more than three dwellings.
3. No more than three dwellings shall be occupied until the Nettleham Lane path has been constructed to an adoptable standard for adoption by the County Council.

8) Reports on Matters Outstanding

■ **a) New Sportsfield improvements:** The Chair reported that it was hoped that the car park could be improved upon transfer of ownership.

The goalposts had been sited by Greenfield Groundskeeping Services, with the voluntary help of Councillors Stuart Curtis, Andy Cottam, Bob Waller and Peter Heath.

Ivy requires removing from the metal cabin to enable it to be used and it was considered that this may be a project for The National Citizen Service Action 2017, organised through the Education Business Partnership, along with cutting back of shrubs and sweeping of the tennis courts. That the Clerk pursue this possibility offer of help Resolved unanimously.

■ **b) Village Sign:** The District Councillor's Initiative Fund grant application, for the metal part of the sign, had been submitted to WLDC.

The LCC Highways Officer had met with the Chairman, Councillor Stuart Curtis and the Clerk. Possible sites for the sign had been identified as by the Millennium Stone on the wide verge; roadside verge opposite the Millennium Stone; by the carvings, near to Holme Drive.

It was noted, however, that further advice required to be sought for the siting and positioning of the sign with a view to services under ground. The Highways Officer had notified the Clerk of structural engineers who may be able to advise the Parish Council on whether the sign should be positioned in a plinth, giving it additional height and stability.

Resolved unanimously that the advice of structural engineers be sought.

■ **c) Electrical Box check, Scothern Lane/Millennium Stone lighting:** One quotation had been received for this work. Councillors considered that a further price for the work be sought and in view of the necessity for the check and to ensure the lights were working effectively the Clerk and Chair to authorise the works. Resolved unanimously.

■ **d) Defibrillator:** Training for use of the defibrillator arranged for Monday 24 April.

8) Reports on Matters Outstanding continued

■ **e) Highway matters - outstanding issues:** The Chairman, Councillor Stuart Curtis and the Clerk had met with the LCC Highways Officer to view highway issues in the village as follows:-

1. Repairs to Church Lane/Nettleham Lane - to be carried out as soon as practical in conjunction with Anglian Water. Grips also to be cut out along the Lane between Sudbrooke and Nettleham.
2. Supply of LCC policy on potholes.
3. Encroachment of conifer hedge over public footpath at St. Edwards Drive - LCC to pursue
4. Cutting back of hedge on A158 - detail explained of date of proposed cut back of April 6, 2017 in conjunction with road closure at Langworth level crossing.
5. Surface water standing on footpath adjacent to driveway of 66 Scothern Lane - this would require further investigation by Highways.
6. Footpath to be slurry sealed along Scothern Lane between Manor Drive and Holme Drive in next programme of works.
7. Breaking up of footpath adjacent 8 St. Edwards Drive - area to be patched
8. Potholes along St Edwards Drive at the junction of The Paddock - to be patched
9. To establish whether the grass roundabout in Courtfield Close is adopted by the HA and to investigate the possibility of tree pruning

9) Sudbrooke Parish Council Code of Conduct

■ The Code of Conduct was reviewed with amendments. That it be adopted Resolved unanimously.

10) Best Kept Village Competition

■ Resolved unanimously that Sudbrooke be entered into the competition at a cost of £24.00 entry fee.

11) Consideration of obtaining quotes for painting of Park gates

■ That quotations be sought for the painting Resolved unanimously.

12) Sports Fun Day

■ Mrs Emma Chapman, with members of the Parish Council present, had offered to be the organiser of the Sports Fun Day which was combining with the Village Hall Garden Fete on July 1.

Mrs Chapman had stated that it was unlikely that the total £250 precepted by the Parish Council would be required and that she would keep receipts of all expenditure for reimbursement after the event.

The above Resolved unanimously.

■ This was brought to the attention of the meeting. Councillor Andy Cottam and Mr Mike Halliday would be organising the Litter Pick.

■ Apologies for our absence over the past few months, but we can assure you that Sudbrooke Preschool is thriving and as busy as ever!

The preschool continues to operate very near to capacity for both this and the next academic year, though we do have a very limited number of vacancies, so if you are thinking of enrolling your child with us, now is the time!

We had a very busy start to the new term in January with an inspection from Ofsted. We are delighted to announce that we received an overall rating of 'Good', which is a fantastic achievement for a setting such as ours, that does not have a purpose built premises.

With work continuing at St Edwards church, we were unable to make our usual Easter visit to the church. However, the children put on a production of one of our favourite stories 'Handa's Surprise', at the village hall. This was well attended by parents, relatives and friends of the preschool and, as always, the children did a brilliant job of telling the story.

We have been fortunate to have some lovely visitors to the setting over the past few months.

The children love our visits from Jo Jingles, a music and movement workshop, which includes the children using musical instruments, parachute games, bubbles and lots of singing!

We have also had a visit from 'Move It Mobility', an outdoor physical play activity, similar to a PE class at school, which promotes physical development as well as listening skills, confidence and social skills.

The children's faces were a picture the morning they saw the fire engine pull up in the carpark!

The fire service brought the engine and allowed the children to look at the equipment, sit in the fire engine and wear the fire helmets.

As we now move on to our final term of the academic year, the older children will begin their transition visits to 'big school'. This year we will see 21 children move onto school, the majority attending Ellison Boulters Academy. We will enjoy visits from the teachers as they get to know the

children and we will spend three afternoons at school, familiarising ourselves with the new environment.

- 1) The constituency was created under the Redistribution of Seats Act 1885 that year, which lasted until it was reformed as Gainsborough and Horncastle on a boundary change for the 1983 election
- 2) Joseph Bennett won the first-ever election in the constituency, for the Liberal Party
- 3) Edward Leigh stood in the 1974 General Election in Middlesbrough, but came second behind Labour's Arthur Bottomley.
- 4) The largest turnout was in 1950, when 83.5 per cent of the electorate voted
- 5) The Gainsborough constituency has a total population of 92,546, of which 74,131 are eligible to vote

The back garden is tiered and leads out into woodland, where wild flowers proliferate. Wildlife is encouraged into the garden with a myriad of feeding stations and, right on cue as darkness fell, a hedgehog turned up for its supper.

Speciality parsnips and carrots are grown in very deep beds protected by carrot-fly netting; strawberries and potatoes were thriving in large pots bordering the rear pathway.

Colourful clematis and various azaleas contrasted well with the manicured box plants. John is developing his topiary expertise on two large shrubs overlooking the pond and the outline shape of a rabbit and a hedgehog were clearly discernible.

The side garden is a great example of space utilisation - every available inch is productive. The large greenhouse is full of flower and vegetable seedlings as well as more advanced planting, for example the dahlias, destined for the front garden, were a good nine inches tall.

Well protected vegetable plots in raised beds housed a wide range of produce. Apples, pears and gooseberries are grown espalier fashion on a side fence.

The front garden is fairly traditional with a neat oblong lawn surrounded by flower beds and a small mixed shrubbery at one end - the pink

rhododendron will soon be in full flower. Clearly, a garden for all seasons. Our thanks to John and Iris for a splendid evening.

THY KINGDOM COME

I am writing this having spent an evening at Reepham Church listening to Garth Hewitt.

Garth is a musician and songwriter, who has travelled the world sharing his music and his passion for justice and the promotion of human rights - a passion rooted in his Christian faith.

He speaks of gatherings with people of all faiths and none, of equality, of simplicity of life and of the need to challenge the pervading culture of the day. I find him entertaining and challenging in equal measure.

He founded an organisation called The Amos Trust - a small organisation that works with Street Children in Brazil and South Africa, funds and supports a hospital in Gaza and works in Nicaragua, Tanzania, Burundi and India - check them out here www.amostrust.org.

During the course of the evening, Chris Rose, the Director of Amos Trust talked about his recent visits to meet Street Children in Africa and refugees at Dunkirk. He went with a question on his mind 'What does hope smell like?'.

Quite a fascinating question really. I never thought that hope had a smell... until he spoke. He asked that question to refugees at Dunkirk...



And the answer was that hope smells like home.

It is the smell of freshly-brewed coffee in the morning, of fresh laundry, of the smell of herbs and spices - all of which speak of home.

The hope was that one day they would find a home and for some that they would return home, to a place of safety and security - a place of refuge, a place where they could give and receive love - hope has a smell - I wonder, what does it smell like to you?

He went on to speak of the work of the Amos Trust and what Hope looked like for them... it was concrete... concrete in the sense that hope was often found in practical things - taking a child off the street and providing a meal and a bed and a place of safety; but it was also literally found in concrete - in the building or rebuilding of a home - providing the smell of hope that would fulfil the dreams of the

homeless, the refugee, the street child...

I came away massively challenged and trying to make sense of all I heard in the context of God's calling on my life and the life of our communities here, particularly at this time when we are preparing to vote in a General election.

That might be a good question to ask of those who seek to represent us locally or nationally: What does hope smell like to you?

REFLECTION CORNER

Where Sudbrooke residents can share their thoughts on life and living

ALEC C. CARROTTE ON REFLECTION IN LATER LIFE

So here you are in your 'later years', with a lifetime of experience behind you – a wonderful time to reflect on the whole of your life.

If you have been retired for some years you will hopefully already have made the transition from your work role to your personal role (ie) a free agent. So now is a period of your life when you can look back and try to put your life experiences into some perspective, a time to review, reflect and self-appraise. This is perhaps best achieved in distinct stages as follows:

Life Story

Create a descriptive and factual account of your life with no opinion, no reflection and no analysis. This is a purely 'black and white' description of events as they happened, when they happened where they happened and the people involved.

Life Review

This is where you try to understand your past experiences by remembering the people who caused things to happen, events that caused things to happen and finally the reasons why things happened.

Areas of possible exploration:

- ▶ Have I lived a successful life (*after you have identified what the term 'success' means to you*)
- ▶ Did I make good decisions at all the crossroads in my life?
- ▶ Have I dealt reasonably adequately with all the losses in my life?
- ▶ Do I have any regrets and have I learned from them?
- ▶ Who were the teachers and heroes in my life?
- ▶ What lessons have I learned from my life?

Role Review

This is an outline of the roles that you have fulfilled throughout your life as a love partner, domestic partner, parent, grandparent, friend, employee and as a person.

Self Review

This section looks at you: What are my personal values? How do I function? What have I become? What could I have done better?

Autobiography

If you have survived all the above self-scrutiny of your life, you may wish to use the information to construct a *positive and wise autobiography*. This can have four main benefits:-

Firstly, it helps you to look back and judge whether or not it has been a life that has been 'well-lived' in terms of personal satisfaction, having done your best within your personal circumstances.

Secondly, it helps you to identify some of the positive impacts that you have had on other people's lives (whether they realise it or not).

Thirdly, it can provide a means by which your family can understand you and your journey.

Fourthly, (*and don't hold your breath on this one*), your children and grandchildren may even read it and take its lessons on board as a guide to avoiding potential pitfalls in their own lives, a sort of Life Manual as part of their inheritance.

If there is an item that you do not usually have on repeat, the staff may need to ask the GP's permission to add this to your records and if the GP says you need to book an appointment then the Dispensary staff must adhere to this. Please do not ask them to overrule the GP's decision.

DNAs

■ In March, patients did not attend for 34 appointments with the doctors and 67 appointments with the nurses, almost 17 hours of clinical time was lost due to patients not attending for their appointments.

Please try to remember appointments or cancel with us if they are no longer required.

If you would like to be able to receive booking confirmations and text message reminders for appointments, please see Reception to sign up for this.

■ Whenever possible, please could we request

that patients telephone the surgery between 2pm and 4pm for test results.

EAR SYRINGING

■ In April, a decision was taken to halt the ear syringing service at Welton Family Health Centre.

This decision was not taken lightly. Ear syringing is part of a range of unfunded services which some GPs have chosen to offer to patients over the years in addition to their core medical services. Due to the severe pressure currently on general practices, many have been forced to review what services they offer in the interest of safety, and as a result the decision was taken locally to withdraw this service.

Having received several complaints, which we completely appreciate and understand, we re-discussed the issue. As a result we have decided to continue with the ear syringing service, but on a limited basis.

We will allocate a finite number of appointments each week with the Healthcare Assistant and once these have been filled we will operate a waiting list system. We do, however, anticipate this will still provide a much quicker service to patients overall.

We appreciate all patient feedback on this topic and feel happy that we are able to listen to the relevant concerns and respond accordingly.
