Vicar's Letter

We tend to take the various Christian seasons as part of the rhythm of the year without necessarily deep reflection on their origins or quite when they became customary : they come and they go and we observe them. So with Ash Wednesday (22 February this year) and the Season of Lent thereafter approaching, I thought this month we might have a look at from whence these two observances came.

Ash Wednesday is the first of the forty days of Lent, the period in the year that both recalls the forty days Christ spent being tempted in the wilderness at the start of his ministry and serves as a preparation for Easter.

Wearing sackcloth and ashes used to mean what it says. In ancient times, when you wanted to show acknowledgement of, and repentance for, your wrong-doing, then you wire sackcloth and covered yourself in ashes. The legacy of this tradition is the tiny smudge of ashes some Christians receive on their foreheads on Ash Wednesday as a sign of their unworthiness.

In churches where this tradition is maintained, the priest first burns the palm crosses that have been kept from the previous year's Palm Sunday. Ashes of these crosses are mixed with holy water or oil to make a kind of greyish paste. Then, usually at a Holy Communion service on Ash Wednesday, the priest dips a thumb in the paste and uses it to make the sign of the cross each person's forehead, saying the traditional word : "Remember, you are dust and unto dust you shall return." In many churches, another form of words is now used, such as: "Turn away from sin and believe in the gospel."

The custom almost certainly dates from the eighth century, and the practice may well owe something to Jewish customs. In Latin, the day is called quite explicitly "day of ashes" (dies cinerum). The English word for Lent is derived from the Old English lencten which simply meant 'springtime' and possibly referred to the lengthening of the daylight. In German, Lenz still means spring. The French for Lent, on the other hand, is careme, and the Italian is quaresima – both being derived from the Latin quadragesima, meaning forty days.

The observance of Lent certainly predates that of Ash Wednesday but its origins are disputed. For the first three centuries of the Church's existence, there was considerable diversity and debate about the practice of fasting before Easter. In the year 331, St Athanasius (Bishop of Alexandria) wrote a pastoral letter to his people instructing them to observe a period of forty lays of fasting before the stricter fast of Holy Week. This, of course, raises the question as to when is Lent. Many people will say that it lasts from Ash Wednesday until the Saturday just before Easter Sunday - this actually spans a period of forty-six days but, so this argument goes, as Sundays are always considered festivals (since they mark the resurrection of Christ) they do not count towards the forty days of Lent. Others follow Athanasius in saying Lent lasts the forty days from Ash Wednesday until Palm Sunday (when the stricter observances of Holy Week begin).

Gradually, the observance of "forty fasting days" became general throughout Christendom. In some churches, especially in Russia and Greece, Lent is still known as the "Great Fast". Some said the number forty reflects the hours Jesus spent in the tomb or that it represents the forty years the Israelites were wandering the desert. More commonly, it is said to mark the forty days Jesus stayed in the wilderness or desert just before he started his work of teaching and healing. During that time, as we read in the Gospels of St Matthew and St Luke, he fasted and was tempted by the devil.

In olden times, people used to fast quite strictly during Lent – as Jesus did in the wilderness. Roman Catholic authorities stated that fasting meant eating just one full meal in twenty-four hours, while totally abstaining from meat. But how much you ate at that one meal was never prescribed ! It was Pope Gregory, writing to St Augustine of Canterbury, who laid down the rule that fasting meant not only abstention from meat but also "from all things that come from flesh, as milk, cheese and eggs" – hence our Shrovetide customs – highlighted on the day before Ash Wednesday, with the pancakes using up these items on Shrove Tuesday.

Few Christians now observe a strict Lenten fast but many, as a matter of selfdiscipline, try to give up something – maybe chocolate or alcohol. In recent years, many preachers have recommended that Lent is not observed "negatively" but as a time for doing some positive good in society. Most of all, just as Jesus was tested by his time in the wilderness, so believers try to use the forty days of Lent as a period of reflection to examine their attitudes and conscience and strengthen their Christian life and commitment. The Church seasonal colour, e.g. on Altar Frontals, for Lent is Purple : a penitential colour.

75 PARISHIONERS ITEMS

Residents of West Drive attended the meeting to endorse recent letters in the Sudbrooke News about speeding of cars and farm vehicles along West Drive. The comments of the residents were noted and they were informed that the matter would be discussed later in the meeting.

Two further items were drawn to the attention of the Parish Council:

a) Increase in dog fouling in the village

b) Cycles being ridden in the dark without lights

It was agreed a note be put in the Sudbrooke News about both of the above items.

76 POLICE MATTERS

PCSO Ross Payne had sent a report as

follows:-

• Man hole covers have been taken on Scothern Lane

• Police are still receiving reports of off-road motorcycles being ridden in the Sudbrooke woods.

• Lincs Alert –This is a two way communication system designed to put residents in touch with Lincolnshire Police and Neighbourhood Watch. It is a totally free service.

77 COUNTY COUNCILLORS REPORT

CC Mrs Sue Rawlins stated that the County Council were encouraging Parish Councils not to increase the Council tax in the next financial year.

78 DISTRICT COUNCILLORS REPORT

DC Stuart Curtis stated that West Lindsey District Council had made funds available for equipment for use during bad weather. Members asked the Clerk to seek clarification as to whether these funds could be used for contracting a local person to undertake road gritting.

79 NOTES OF MEETING HELD ON 6TH OCTOBER 2011 – These were signed as a correct record.

80 REPORTS ON MATTERS OUT-STANDING

a) **Speeding – West Drive** – The Chairman suspended Standing Orders at 8.00pm until 8.10pm to allow residents to take part in the discussion. The residents expressed grave concern for the safety of children and cyclists using West Drive due to the speeding of cars and farm vehicles. The Parish Council agreed to write to the Principal Highways Officer at Lincolnshire County Council to ascertain whether some form of traffic calming could be put in place at the end of the adopted roadway where it joins the private section (woodland area) with an additional 30mph restriction sign erected.

Residents were also encouraged to write individual letters to the Principal Highways Officer.

b) **Website** – The Chairman introduced Roy Summerfield, a resident of Sudbrooke, who had offered to help out with the web site. Instruction/ training was currently being organised.

c) **Training Courses** – Cllr Paul Rignall agreed to attend the training course organised by LALC at Dunholme on 17th November.

Cllrs Bernard Bartram, Peter Heath, Stuart Curtis and the Clerk would attend the training course organised by WLDC on electronic planning applications, at Glentham on 17th November.

Cllr M Dickie or Playground Inspector Mr Eric Pitt would attend the Play Area Risk assessment training at Saxilby on 17th November.

d) **Christmas Tree Event** – To be held on Sunday 27th November at 4.30pm at the tree. The cost of the Christmas tree would be £215 and would be erected on Thursday 24th November with the lights being fitted on 26th November. e) **Millennium stone lighting** – update - Cllr Martin Dickie advised that the millennium stone lighting had now been switched on.

f) Landscaping:-

I. **Beech Close/Millennium Stone area** – A site meeting was planned for Sunday 27th November 2011 commencing at 9.30am when the residents living nearby would be invited to attend.

II. Land to front of sports field, Scothern Lane – this was continuing to be cut by the grass cutting contractors.

III. Northfield Park hedges/ Village Hall hedges – These would also be looked at by Councillors on 27th November and any works required discussed at the next meeting of the Parish Council.

g) **Silver Birch tree, Beech tree corner**- The Chairman suspended Standing Orders from 8.45pm – 8.50pm to allow residents to speak. They stated that the silver birch tree was restricting the view of the beech trees from West Drive and requested that it be cut back. It was pointed out that the owners of the tree were Sommerville Properties Ltd and that the Parish Council could only advise.

However, ClIr Ian Russell had inspected the tree and gave his opinion that it was in good condition and reasonably well shaped. He suggested that it be allowed to continue growing at present but that it be monitored. Members agreed with ClIr Russell's suggestion. h) Letter to residents regarding cutting back trees/shrubs overhanging footpaths - The wording of a polite letter was agreed which would be sent to residents who had not responded to the request in Sudbrooke News to cut back their overhanging shrubs.

Waste collections by WLDC i) Members felt that the recent change to waste collections, including the withdrawal of the green bins from November - March had been handled poorly. Despite the Chairman writing two letters to Mr Glynn Pilkington, Waste Control Manager, neither had received a response.

81 QUEEN'S DIAMOND JUBILEE

Members were informed that an event to celebrate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee was being organised by the Village Hall Committee.

82 VOLUNTARY CAR SCHEME IN WEST LINDSEY - Deferred until next meeting.

83 HIGHWAY MATTERS

a) Litter Pick – 15th October 2011 - It was reported that there was a poor turnout by residents.

Mr Mike Halliday had agreed to organise future litter picks within the village.

b) Request for grip cutting -Sudbrooke Lane/Nettleham Lane -

Following a request by the Clerk to the Highways Department for the grip cutting along this stretch of lane she had been informed that it would necessitate a road closure of which notice of 3 87 CHAIRMANS COMMENTS months had to be given. It was

agreed however, that this work needed carrying out and that the Highways Department be requested to arrange this.

c) Weed Treatment 2012 – A quotation was being arranged by WLDC for the weed treatment during 2012. It was suggested that the perimeter of the village hall could be included in the contract if the Committee were in agreement.

89 PARISHIONERS ITEMS

Councillor Martin Dickie mentioned that there had been problems with the lights on the tree and millennium stone not working but this was currently being worked on and monitored.

Residents of West Drive were in attendance for further discussion on the speeding problems on that road. (see Item 94f)

90 PERSONAL AND PREJUDICIAL DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

Councillor Miss Rose Dobbs declared an interest in the following items on the agenda:-

8c - Landscaping/works by millennium stone and weed treatment for 2012 quotation

91 COUNTY COUNCILLORS REPORT

CC Sue Rawlins stated the County

Council were in the process of preparing the budget for the forthcoming financial year and were hoping to reduce it.

92 DISTRICT COUNCILLORS REPORT

DC Stuart Curtis reported that objections continued to be raised that the green bin collection had been withdrawn too soon in the year.

DC Curtis reported on the meeting at Glentham attended by 3 Councillors and the Clerk to discuss the introduction of electronic planning applications. He re-iterated that consideration was being given to the re-introduction of paper plans for Parish Councils.

93 NOTES OF MEETING HELD ON 3RD NOVEMBER 2011

It was proposed by M Dickie and seconded by P Rignall these be signed as a correct record.

94 CORRESPONDENCE AND REPORTS

a) Website update – Training being arranged for early 2012

b) Christmas tree event – 27th November 2011 – Councillor Martin Dickie reported that this had been a successful event. Thanks were made for the donation of a raffle prize from Sudbrooke Shop and to the ladies who made up the hamper, and to Pat Wright and Roger Adams for the erection and fixing of the lights to the tree. It is hoped that a similar event will be held in 2012. c) Landscaping /suggested works – land by millennium stone/ fronting Beech Close - Residents living nearby had been invited to attend a site meeting with members of the Parish Council on 27th November to discuss how best to tidy the area.

Residents at the site meeting had requested that two of the weaker trees be removed at the Wragby Road end of the piece of land. Clearance of the ground area leaving one or two existing shrubs if possible was agreed. The Parish Council would replant with other specimen shrubs.

The Clerk would invite quotations from local contractors for the work.

d) Northfield Park - Members had also viewed Northfield Park and agreed that the hedge cutting on the footpath side, north and south side be cut twice per year in January and September, cutting to be on the outside edge and top keeping height to 6 feet. The Dogwood on the opposite side of the footpath/cycleway be cut back to remove dead sections. The cutting of the shrubs inside Northfield Park to remain as required.

It was also agreed that the grass cutting contractors be asked to take care when strimming around young trees so as not to damage the trunks. It was agreed to consider weed treatment or clearance around young trees instead of strimming.

e) Football field, Scothern Lane - It was agreed that no work be undertaken at this location at present.

f) Speeding – West Drive – Letter received from LCC Highways Department stated that in the current climate funding is not available for traffic calming. It also stated that it was felt that a speed restriction or warning signage would not be effective in this case as the drivers know the road and are aware of the hazards and conditions. They also felt that a site meeting would be unproductive.

It was suggested by the Highways Department that a letter be sent from the Parish Council to all residents/ occupants along West Drive and Main Drive reminding residents to reduce their speed along West Drive. Members agreed to this and the Clerk would arrange.

95 VOLUNTARY CAR SCHEME IN WEST LINDSEY

Councillor Stuart Curtis outlined this scheme but it was felt that currently there was not a need for this in Sudbrooke.

96 REQUEST BY WLDC STREET TEAM FOR SITING OF REFUSE VEHICLE IN VILLAGE IN THE EVENT OF ADVERSE WEATHER

Two locations had been suggested for the siting of a vehicle, namely the village shop to which the owner had given his consent, and the village hall. WLDC would be advised of these two locations.

97 DONATION OF SEAT IN MEMORY OF THE LATE GORDON AND KATHRYN FREESTONE

The family had donated a seat which was now sited to the front of the Village Hall. Bulbs had been planted around it by the Chairman.

98 HIGHWAY MATTERS

- a) Weed treatment 2012 quotation Quotation received from
 WLDC for the weed treating contract for 2012 £75.00 for two existing areas and additional weed treatment around the Village Hall £60.00. Members agreed that this could be invoiced to the Parish Council and £60 reclaimed from the Village Hall Committee.
- b) Obstruction Church Lane This was currently not being dealt with by the County Council Highways Department. Councillor S Curtis to follow up.
- c) Grip Cutting, Sudbrooke Lane/ Nettleham Lane – Notification had been received that a road closure, of which 3 months notice was required, would need to be put in place for this work. It was felt however that due to recent heavy usage of the Lane this needed to be undertaken immediately and a request would be made to LCC for an emergency road closure so that the work could be undertaken.
- d) Grants available for winter snow clearance - It was agreed to wait for further details from LCC regarding winter weather.
- e) Green bin collections No reply had been received from WLDC to the Parish Councils letter objecting to the early withdrawal of this service.

99 PLANNING

a) Applications:-

Park Farm, Sudbrooke – erection of Poultry Unit – comments:-

Sudbrooke Parish Council object to the above application as follows:-

Policy econ 2 – The proposal would have an unacceptable adverse effect upon the environment and residential amenity. The proposed units would be an extension into the open countryside. In visual terms the buildings would be conspicuous when viewed across the land to the south from residential properties in Wragby Road.

Policy econ 5 – The units would be within 400m of existing dwelling which is not related to the enterprise.

Policy NBE 8 – The development would be within historic park and would have a detrimental impact upon the remaining parkland setting.

Also access from the site to the A158 would be along an unadopted private road and crossing a bridge unsuitable for HGV's.

The Parish Council requests that this application is determined by the Planning Committee.'

5 Wragby Road – 127917 – demolish existing dwelling and construct replacement – No objections providing any comments by neighbours are taken into account.



A villager has suggested that a map/plan of the village would be a useful and decorative item for the village and is currently sourcing some suppliers/artwork for this.

Members felt that subject to funding, which may be available from the District Council for Jubilee events, this landscaping scheme and village plan could be the project for the Diamond Jubilee and named ' Diamond Jubilee Garden'. All efforts will be made to have this completed for June.

WEST DRIVE/MAIN DRIVE, SUDBROOKE

As you are probably aware West Drive in Sudbrooke is a public footway as well as forming a vehicle access for the residents who live along West Drive and Main Drive.

This results in a dual use with pedestrians sharing the route with vehicles. This has led to concerns being raised about the speed of vehicles using this route and the potential for conflict between vehicles and pedestrians.

Various options have been considered to try and draw attention to this issue such as signs and speed limits, however it is felt that the majority of users of this route are aware of the situation and physical measures would prove ineffective.

Therefore if you drive a vehicle along this route you are asked you to bear in mind this dual usage and be aware that pedestrians could be encountered at any time.

Also if you use this route as a pedestrian please be aware that there is a legitimate vehicle access requirement and you should proceed with care.

Would you also please bring this to the attention of your visitors or in the case of farms/businesses, employees or delivery drivers.

The situation will be monitored in the future and Sudbrooke Parish Council will liaise with Lincolnshire County Council's Highways department with a view to taking further action if there are any major safety concerns.

The Old Codger

All too often these days I read in the papers or see on the TV that yet another person of my age or older has passed away. Folks aged in the late seventies or older are dying off. There are very few of our servicemen and women who fought in WW11 around to tell their stories. Equally civilians who were children and their parents who lived through the war years and just after and endured all the hardships, restrictions, shortages, dangers and bereavements are getting fewer by the month. Often they have not passed on their memories to the following generations. What a shame !! The country has a right to know what we went through and hopefully learn by it so that the same mistakes are not made again. Today's generation finds it hard to believe the tales we have to tell them, whether in The Forces or as a civilian actually took place. Often such memories have been too hard to relate before now. But if we don't tell them now it will soon be too late.

So if you lived through the War Years and the austerity, shortages and hardships which followed I am asking you to sit down, put pen to paper or finger to computer and put your memories into print so that long after we of my generation have gone, what we went through will not be forgotten. It doesn't have to be all gloom and doom. Lots of very happy simple things took place as well. We want to hear about your wartime memories. Your story! Before it is too late. Tell it!

For my own contribution I would like to tell you of a historical memory that will forever remain with me. In September 1944 I was a 10 year evacuee on a small run down farm about 20 miles from Sudbrooke. Having arrived with my Mickey Mouse gas mask in a cardboard box over my shoulder and a label pinned to the collar of my coat and wearing a schoolboy cap and short trousers (Who ever sees short trousers these days ?) Sent to the country to avoid the Blitz in London. I had been there for about 3 years.

On this day I was in a field helping to reap the wheat harvest together with the farmer, his wife, an elderly farm labourer and two Land Army girls in their smart uniforms. There was a harvester machine with its huge whirling blades pulled by two Shire horses cutting the corn and tossing the sheaves of corn tied with string to one side where we picked it up, one sheaf under each arm and by crashing them together formed stooks of eight or so sheaves in the form of a tent to dry out and be ready to be collected a week or so later by the thrashing machine to separate the wheat seed from the stalks. There were no tractors on this farm or in the surrounding area. In fact it was a couple of years later before I even saw one (A small grey Ferguson on a neighbouring farm). Who could have imagined in their wildest dreams today's combined harvester monsters that do all this in one action. But I digress. All of a sudden everything stopped. The machine, the horses and the workers. The air was filled with noise and appearing overhead were dozens if not scores of planes, most of them towing gliders. Some even towed two gliders to each engine powered plane. I recognised the planes as being Dakotas. They were all very low no more than a couple of hundred feet above us and you could clearly see the tow ropes. They were painted grey and brown with broad white stripes on the wings and fuselage. The gliders were bulky with square fronts. The noise on the ground was terrific. They were circling around very slowly clockwise and so close to each other it was a wonder they did not collide. The noise was so great that the horses had to be restrained.

Everyone was shocked, it was 4 months after the D day landings in Normandy and nothing had happened anything like this then. The Farmer commented stating the obvious that "There's something very big going on!". No one had any idea what. After what seemed an age all the planes moved off and the silence after all that noise was eerie. Everyone was talking excitedly but got on with the harvesting.

Several days later we learned from the radio that the planes we had seen were bound for the Dutch town of Arnhem and would cost the lives of most of those on board in what it had been hoped would be the shortening of the war by several months. Instead it turned out to be one of the biggest blunders of the war. Costing hundreds of Allied lives. The invasion had been planned and co-ordinated from an old mansion called Fulbeck Hall quite close to Cranwell and was code named "Market Garden ".

A few years ago I visited this mansion which you can click on "Google " to read about and at that time it had preserved the actual planning operation headquarters with all the plans models and paraphernalia of "Market Garden" in situe and was open to the public to view. It may still be but I suggest you make enquiries to confirm because it was sold to new owners a couple of years ago who carried out extensive renovations. If it still open to view I recommend everyone reading this article visit it. Take a large handkerchief. It has been featured in the Film "A Bridge Too Far" and is exactly as it is shown in the film. You could even sit on the bench in the garden that formed such a dramatic moment in the film. Do yourself a nostalgic favour and go there if it is still open to the public. I promise you won't regret it.

Well ! That's my contribution of one of my memories of the war. Now let's have yours. Happy or sad. Write or E mail in any memories of the war years. We would love to hear them. What did YOU do in the war? If anyone knows from which local airfields those planes and gliders took off from which must have been fairly local perhaps they would write or E mail in with the information.



New Clinical Computer System

The practice is excited to be moving to its new clinical computer system in May 2012. The new system, called Systmone, has many new facilities which will help improve our care to you. One of the new features in the system is the ability for us to share information with the local district nurses, OOH and the walk in centre, with patient consent. This is a major step forward, reducing duplication of work, increasing safety and making sure a patient's latest records are shared by more of the teams who support them.

Whilst we shall try and make the migration as smooth as possible, there will inevitably be some disruption whilst staff and GPs become fully trained in the new system. More details will be given nearer the time.

Controlled Drug Collection

Some of our patients have prescriptions for controlled drug medication such as Morphine. These medications have to be treated differently in the dispensary and are governed by very strict legislation. To improve our management of these particular drugs, from the New Year when a patient or a patient's representative comes to collect these medications from the dispensary at either practice they will be asked for ID. This is so that the dispensers can be 100% sure who is collecting the medication. We would request that anybody collecting any of these medications bring some form of ID with them so that the medication can be issued without delay.

Winter Driving Tips

With the colder weather rapidly approaching I thought it may be useful to give a little motoring advice as far as driving on slippery roads is concerned.

The best advice for driving in extreme winter weather is not to drive at all if you can avoid it. If you must go out wait until the snow ploughs and gritting trucks have had a chance to do their work. Remember that road salt takes time to permeate the ice and work effectively, particularly if the temperature is very low. Don't assume that just because a road has been gritted you can drive on it normally.

Before the extreme weather arrives make sure your vehicle is prepared. Ensure it is running reliably, make sure the battery is fully charged and the lights are working. Make sure your windscreen wash bottle is filled with screen wash to the correct concentration as it will help prevent the water from freezing.

Before setting off make sure you know your route. Don't rely solely on a satellite navigation device, if a road is closed or impassable you will have to find an alternative. Make sure your car has plenty of fuel and take a moment to completely clear your car windows of ice and snow. It's amazing how often we see motorists attempting to drive whilst peering out of a small patch of defrosted windscreen! It's a good idea to carry a shovel in case you get stuck, some sturdy boots in case you need to leave your vehicle and make sure your mobile phone is fully charged in case you need to summon assistance.

Finally, keep to main roads wherever possible as they are most likely to be the safest. If a road looks impassable please don't try to chance it. The chances are you will get stuck! Here are a few tips that will help you drive safely on slippery roads -

- 1. Decrease your speed and leave yourself plenty of room to stop. You should allow at least five times more space than usual between you and the car in front of you.
- 2. Brake gently to avoid skidding. If your wheels start to lock up do not place further pressure on the brake pedal, ease off the brake to regain steering control.
- 3. Turn on your lights to increase your visibility to other motorists.
- 4. Keep your lights and windscreen clean.
- 5. Use low gears to keep traction, especially on hills.
- 6. Don't use cruise control where there is a risk of ice.
- 7. Be especially careful on bridges, overpasses and infrequently travelled roads as they often freeze first. Even at temperatures above freezing you might encounter ice in shady or exposed areas.
- 8. Don't pass snow ploughs or gritting trucks. The drivers have limited visibility, and you're likely to find the road in front of them worse than the road behind.
- 9. Don't assume your vehicle can handle all conditions. Even four-wheel drive vehicles can lose grip winter roads.

That's all for this month, drive safely.


