# **Vicar's Letter**

The Schools will break up over the coming month, and universities will be "down", and I hope you will have the opportunity to have a family holiday or restful break, home or away, before we all settle down to the coming year in September.

I guess that we would all like to have better control of the direction of our lives. So many choices are put before us today and it can be difficult to choose the right course to take. So I thought, I would set out a few thoughts about Guidance, derived from the Christian tradition, which may be helpful when we face the crossroads of life.

What does it mean when someone says "The Lord said" when someone explains why they have made a particular choice in life? At those moments, people may ask:- "I don't get that at all, when you say 'the Lord said.' Explain HOW the Lord said that. Did you hear a voice, or did you sense something in your thoughts, or in your heart? You say that it is important to know the will of God. I don't want to argue with you, but I really want to know. What does God want and how does He show us His will? I can't figure it out. How do you do know?"

For the Christian, one of the most important tasks is to know God's will. Christians are often much too busy with unimportant things. If we do not know the will of the Lord for us, we ought to put everything aside and concentrate on finding out the right path.

There was once a port that was very dangerous. Under the surface of the water there were many rocks. There were clear markers, but you couldn't see them at night. So the people set up six beacons, three on the left and three on the right. If the lights formed two straight lines, then the helmsman knew that his course was safe. God gives His Guidance in not dissimilar ways. "Guide-Lines" that if they line up in agreement, then you know that you are safe. No one gets lost on a straight path.

Amongst hints in the Bible are :-

Psalm 32 : 8  $\,$  "I will instruct you and teach you in the way you should go; I will counsel you and watch over you"

John 16:13 Jesus himself said "When he, the Spirit of truth (the Holy Spirit) comes, he will guide you into all truth"

The "Guide-Lines" to line up are what I call "The Five CS's of Guidance" because they all begin with the letters "C" and "S". They go as follows:-

- 1. Controlling Spirit what do I feel about the situation in my own heart and mind.
- 2. Counsel of the Saints or Church Suggestion what do others think about the choice : especially those who know us well : our strengths and weaknesses!
- 3. Commanding Scriptures what does my reading of the Bible (both daily and the general thrust of scriptural principles) say to me. What is 'nagging' my mind about the situation from my reading.
- 4. Circumstantial Signs it is often amazing how circumstances and coincidences come into our lives as we wrestle with a choice, giving us prompts or hints as to way to go.
- 5. Common Sense often the one most neglected by Christians in their enthusiasm to do something! For example, if I really don't like creepy-crawlies and snakes, hate humidity, etc., then my thoughts about being a missionary in the deepest Congo may not be appropriate.

There is a Sixth CS that is very, very important – Continuing Supplication: soak the whole thing in Prayer - talk to God about the situation. The more conversations you have with Him (for that is all prayer is), the better you will recognise God's voice in the stillness.

Timing is always important. Once we have reached a decision and all the lines seem to be lined-up in one particular direction, we can be impatient and want to get up and turn the decision into immediate action. But, God's timing (often called by the original Greek word "Kairos") is not necessarily ours. He never calls us to do something for Him until he has equipped us to do it. This may mean, for example, that a period of training is needed first.

A prayer that is helpful in concentrating our minds is :-

"Almighty God,
We thank you for the gift of your Holy Word.
May it be a Lantern to our feet, a Light to our paths,
and a strength to our lives.
Take us and use us to love and serve all people,
in the power of your Spirit,
and in the name of your son Jesus Christ our Lord."

A Lantern and a Light are often what we desperately need on our path through life – even a straight one.

1 SIGNATURES OF DECLARATIONS OF ACCEPTANCE OF OFFICE – These were received by the Clerk from all Councillors.

#### **2 ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN** -

Councillor Bernard Bartram was proposed as Chairman by Councillor Martin Dickie, seconded by Councillor Paul Rignall.

Councillor Bartram accepted the position and signed his Declaration of Acceptance of Office.

# 3 ELECTION OF VICE CHAIRMAN -

Councillor Martin Dickie was proposed as Vice Chairman by Councillor Paul Rignall, seconded by Mrs Lyn Etheridge. Councillor Dickie accepted the position and signed his Declaration of Acceptance of Office.

**4 PARISHIONERS ITEMS** - A request was made for the planting of trees in the verge area between Holme Drive and Greenway. This would be an agenda item for the next meeting of the Parish Council.

**<u>5 POLICE MATTERS</u>** – No Police Officer present.

## **6 CO-OPTION OF COUNCILLOR -**

Two residents had offered themselves for co-option as members of the Parish Council. A vote was taken and Peter Heath was successful. Mr Heath signed his Declaration of Acceptance of Office.

## **7 DISTRICT COUNCILLORS**

**REPORT** – DC Stuart Curtis reported that there were large potholes in the road surface in The Paddock. The Clerk would notify the Highways Department.

DC Curtis was also pleased to report that Scothern Football Club were keen to rent the football pitch on the sports field on Scothern Lane for the next season. It was agreed that due to previous problems with the payment of rent by the Club that this must be made in advance of use of the field.

**8 NOTES OF MEETING HELD ON 7<sup>TH</sup> APRIL 2011** - These were signed as a correct record.

# 9 REPORTS ON MATTERS OUT-STANDING

- a) Extension of sports field lease – a reply was still awaited from Mr Truelove
- b) Multi-purpose sports area prices for repairs/cleaning Two prices had been received for the repair of the boards around the tennis courts in the sums of £342.00 and £90.00. Resolved that the quotation for £90.00 be accepted from Mr Eric Pitt. Mr Pitt had also agreed to sweep the area to remove leaves and grit.
- c) Parish Paths Partnership This item was deferred to a future meeting of the Parish Council.

#### **10 HIGHWAY MATTERS**

- a) Neighbourhood Watch
   Signs a reply was awaited
   from the Police.
- b) Overhanging trees around bus shelter The trees from a residents property in Wragby Road were now growing thicker around the bus shelter and members asked the Clerk to make a polite request to the resident concerned for Councillors Bernard Bartram and Martin Dickie to discuss the matter with him and in the interest of public safety, they cut the

- trees back at no cost to the resident.
- c) Signs in village The Chairman informed the meeting that the new playing field sign had now been erected.

It was noted that many signs in the village were dirty and covered in algae. Councillor Peter Heath offered to clean them.

- d) Holme Drive footpath to Northfield Park - weeds -The Chairman was authorised to obtain a price for weed spraying in this vicinity.
- e) Lights in central refuge of A158/Scothern Lane junction These lights, which were not working, had been reported again to the Highways Department. The original notification to the Highways Department of them not working had been on 17<sup>th</sup> January 2011.

## 11 SUDBROOKE SPORTS DAY -

This had been arranged for Sunday  $10^{\text{th}}$  July. Mr Mike Halliday would undertake the organisation of the sports with assistance from Parish Council members. The Parish Council would contribute £250 to the event allocated from the precept.

The Clerk would notify the insurance company.

It was felt that this would not be to the best advantage for Sudbrooke and it was agreed that a letter be sent to the Commission asking that Sudbrooke be included in the same ward as Scothern and Langworth.

# 17 CORRESPONDENCE



During this time of cutbacks, Sudbrooke has gained an additional service. Lincolnshire County Council has reinstated the Mobile Library Service on a monthly basis with dates fixed till March 2012.

The van parks in Ellison Close at the junction with Holme Drive, just near the shop. The next visits will be on 20th July and 17th August, between 12.45 and 13.15. There is a list of future dates it will stop in Sudbrooke actually inside the shop.

Apart from fiction for all ages there are large print and audio books, CDs, DVDs, reference books and local information. You'll need a borrower number and a PIN, but I'm told that the Staff will be able to sort that out. It is also possible to request, view the library catalogue and renew books on line with your number and PIN.

There is also the Community Library Service, where book collections are delivered to customers who need a specialist service. If you want more information on any of the above, the number to ring is 01522 782010.

The Mobile Library Service is valuable in rural locations, and although there is a very good Library in Nettleham, this is one of those services, if we don't use it we lose it.

The Switchover starts in the Yorkshire television region on 3<sup>rd</sup> August 2011 and ends on 21 September 2011.

Individuals qualify for the scheme if they:

- are aged 75 or over; or
- have lived in a care home for 6 months or more; or
- get (or could get) Disability Living Allowance (DLA), Attendance Allowance, Constant Attendance Allowance or mobility supplement; or
- are registered blind or partially sighted.

If you **or anyone you know** falls into any of these categories they will qualify for help under the scheme.

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# The Old Codger.....



I read in the papers the other day that Pubs in the UK are closing down and going out of business at the rate of 20 or more a week due to falling trade. In towns it is not such a tragedy as very often there used to be far too many pubs for the size of the population but in small villages and in the countryside and remote areas of the country the loss of a Pub is a disas-

ter and great loss to the area. The small village Pub epitomises the very essence and character of the place and for centuries has often been the focal point of village social life.

If you turn on any of the" Soaps "on TV you could be led to believe that the whole of these communities lives totally revolve around the village pub. In view of the fact that these programmes are supposed to show everyday folk in everyday situations I personally think that the script writers and directors are all living in cloud cuckoo land. Where the heck are these people supposed to get the cash to spend their lives in pubs ordering rounds of drinks for all and sundry. It's not any type of life that I recognise.

Can any of you remember Ena Sharples and her friends sitting in "The Snug "of The Rovers Return sipping their Port and Lemon. That was the start of these images. But how many pubs have a "Snug Bar" these days? Pubs have changed a great deal over the years. Out have gone bars for Men only. Smoke Rooms and many Games rooms. Most Public bars have been amalgamated with Lounge and Restaurant rooms. The old fashioned image of a Pub has changed. The Off Licences attached to the Local have all but vanished. No more bottles and jugs are filled with draught ale or cider and taken away to be drunk in folks houses. The Off Licence trade has long since been gobbled up by the Supermarkets and local takeaways. The pubs just cannot compete with their prices or their opening hours. Until a few years ago only pubs had an Off Licence except for a very few Off Licence shops that dealt solely with that trade. The first Supermarkets started to come into the country in the 1950's and they didn't sell alcohol until much later. Even then it was only wine and spirits that was sold and this didn't affect the Pub Off Licence trade very much. If you wanted beer either in a jug or a bottle you got it from your local pub.

I remember the scorn that was heaped upon the first cans of beer that began to be sold in off licences. Canned beer had been sold in the USA for many years but was very much a novelty in Britain. After all it was thought. How could canned beer taste like the real thing? The public expected to buy it's beer or cider in a jug or bottle at their local pub off licence and children would often be dispatched to get it. They would be served in the Off Licence of a pub even though they would never have been allowed to enter the main

Pub premises. Whether this was strictly legal I am not sure but it certainly happened quite openly and it was a common sight to see a young child with a jug covered with a tea towel or napkin making their way home with the family tipple. I never ever saw any child trying to steal a mouthful.

Wages were low in those days and working conditions were hard. As a result in the poorer working class areas it was a great temptation for the wage earner to take his weekly wage, paid in cash, to the local and spend it on alcohol. Because of this and the sight of small children sitting forlornly outside pubs for hours waiting for their parent to emerge and the great deal of domestic violence that resulted from the effects of alcohol consumption The Temperance Society sprang up and in most towns huge parades of placard waving women and children marched to protest about the evils of drink. The Methodist Church also became involved as it had always been against alcoholic drink.

The thing that I remember was that it was very uncommon to see young men or women under the obvious effects of drink. It was almost always older working men. If you did see a woman under the effect of drink it would usually be some old "Bag Lady" or one of what were commonly called" Lady's Of the Night ". What a change today when young men and scantily clad young girls are a frequent sight on most High Streets often falling about or indulging in raucous behaviour. Very often they appear well under the legal age for alcohol consumption.

I feel that the Authorities who loudly call for curbs on this sort of youthful misbehaviour are wide of the mark when they call for a blanket huge increase in the price of beer. What they should, in my opinion, be doing is increasing the price of beer and cider and so called Pop alcoholic drinks when sold in Supermarkets and Off Licences but decreasing the tax and price of draught beers when sold in Pubs. This might well help save the Local Pub as we know it.

They miss out on very important free source of supervision that exists when drinks are served in Licensed Premises. No Licensee would risk his Licence by serving drinks to a obviously drunk youngster or one that appears under age and unable to produce his proof of age card. But it is all too easy to obtain drinks bought at Supermarkets or Off Licences. Putting up the price of drinks in a blanket price hike punishes the person most likely to keep the Pub trade alive . The Pub Regular, often an OAP, who is priced out of his visit to his Local. This trade is what has kept the Pub trade alive over all these years and if we want to retain this very important piece of our National Heritage we need Government to recognise the need to attract back local Pub business by reducing the price of draught beers sold in Pubs and giving our Publicans a helping hand before we lose them for ever .

# GARDENING NEWS

Hello and welcome to my garden.

There is now a definite change in the weather, and we have had some rain falling, with more forecast for next week - very welcome for the garden. In the front garden the wall baskets are coming on well and providing lots of colour. The changeover from hanging baskets to wall baskets has been well worth the effort, because the hanging baskets were blown about too much, causing damage to the plants.



In the back garden the crops in the polytunnel are growing well. The tomatoes have six trusses of fruit and cucumbers have lots of flowers and young fruit looking very promising. The rockery still has many plants in flower, the earliest to flower are now ready to be cut back which should promote a second flush.

Earlier in the season I told you about hanging up a new bird seed feeder containing Nyger seed. It took a while for the Goldfinches to find it, but eventually two were feeding on a regular basis Two weeks ago we had a surprise when two adult birds arrived with two youngsters. It was interesting to see how the parents fed the young ones then over the course of a few days taught the young ones to use the feeder themselves - fascinating! A count of the plants currently in flower shows twenty four, the most striking of which are the bright

blue delphiniums standing above the other herbaceous plants in the border.



A newcomer to the gravel area is a deep blue-black Zantedeschia (Arum Lily) a very interesting flower.

The garden continues to make demands on time. With constant weeding to be done as usual, it will keep us occupied for the rest of the summer, although we are looking forward to holidays to come, and will return with more gardening news in the next issue of Sudbrooke News in September.

I read with interest the article about Sudbrooke Holme in April's edition and thought you might like to know a little more about one of the last owners you mention, **Ernest Terah Hooley.** 



Hooley was born at a house in Beaumont Street, Sneinton, Nottinghamshire, on February 5, 1859, the son of young parents. Both his father, Terah Hooley, and his mother, Eliza, were just 20 years old. In about 1878 he started in business with about £20,000 given to him by his father. He turned out to be an entrepreneurial businessman with a magnetic personality whose extravagant lifestyle was funded by massive fraud. He was a serial fraudster, a man who bought up promising companies and then resold them to the public at hugely inflated prices.

Hooley floated companies that went on to become great British names and was involved in buying and selling on the Bovril Co, Coventry Machinists Co, Cycle Manufacturers Tube Co, Dunlop Pneumatic Tyre Co and Dunlop Pneumatic Tyre

Co (France), various overseas subsidiaries of Humber, Raleigh Cycle Co, Schweppes Ltd, Singer Cycle Co, Swift Cycle Co and Trent Cycle Co<sup>r</sup> Raleigh, Schweppes, Dunlop and Bovril among them – and, by the end of the 19th century, had a personal fortune worth millions of pounds.

In 1896, however, came Ernest Terah Hooley's greatest moment. Recognising that rubber tyres were a vital commodity in the ever-expanding bicycle manufacturing market, Hooley bought the Dunlop Pneumatic Tyre Company for £3m. He then floated Dunlop as a public company for £5m. Within a few months, Hooley's personal profit on that deal was £2m, a staggering amount of money at the end of the 19th Century.

And it just got better. In two years, 1896-97, it was estimated that he had pocketed a personal fortune of between £6-£7m. But Hooley wasn't just interested in money for money's sake. He also enjoyed the fame, and perhaps even the notoriety, that came with it.

His name was constantly in newspapers and society magazines, not least for gestures such as buying the estate next to Sandringham and then selling it on to the Prince of Wales for no profit; or for making a gift of gold plate to St Paul's Cathedral. Meanwhile, his flamboyant lifestyle – by now his London base was a sumptuous £200-a-week suite at the Midland Grand Hotel at St Pancras station – captured the public's imagination and his reputation as a daring and innovative businessman carried him from one deal to the next as he made important contacts.

But it was all built on such a fragile base – to some degree all smoke and mirrors. Hooley had created around him a huge bubble of confidence but, as with all bubbles, it would, eventually, burst and, in 1898, only two years after his greatest coups, Hooley was declared bankrupt with a personal deficiency of £1.5m.

His fall from grace was every bit as spectacular as his rise to fame. Once one of the most well-known men in Europe, the friend of kings and princes, he was declared bankrupt, served two prison sentences, and died, apparently penniless, at his Long Eaton home from complications associated with acute bronchitis on February 12, 1947, at 197 College Street, Long Eaton. He was 88. His occupation was given as "financier".

If anybody knows anymore about Hooley's connection with Sudbrooke Holme I would love to know. I did hear he sold the deeds to Sudbrooke Holme Estate twice over which caused considerable confusion for a time in Sudbrooke Park when proving "Title" of land.

You can often see flags being waved or flown from buildings upside down. People mean well but don't know the flags are upside down. You can ask any Boy Scout or Girl Guide to explain the correct way up the flag should go. They are clever that way.

The Union Flag has diagonal white stripes across it with a red cross over it. The white cross is wider (Broader ) on one side of the flag and narrower (or thinner ) on the other side of the red diagonal cross. The broad white section should always be on the top side of the flag which is closest to the mast (or Flag Pole or stick) and the narrow white stripe below it. Have a look at the flag shown above and get an adult to explain. If the flag is the

For information, on a random Monday morning we had 457 people attempting to access the surgery via telephone between 8.00 and 9.00am! 278 of these were rejected as more than 20 in the queuing system – which gives an indication of the volume of traffic the 'phone system deals with. We have now changed the system to allow up to the maximum of 50 people to wait, and all should be told where they are in that queue. We also received some comments about the lines not being open at 8.30am and upon checking, the engineer found that the clock was 90 seconds slow and has now reset this so the opening time should now be correct. We are currently working with the provider to look at options to improve access and apologise to anyone who has experienced any difficulty with our system.

We have said farewell to two colleagues this week – Dr Jeanette Barber has left to take a career break and Nurse Judy Green has taken early retirement from the Practice. We will miss them both but wish them all the very best. We have been advised that we will be having another two GP Registrars joining the Practice in August as part of the vocational training scheme and look forward to welcoming them to the team.

Finally a total of 48 patients failed to attend booked appointments during April and we were notified of another 28 hospital appointments which were not kept. As always, please help us by cancelling if unable to keep so that others may benefit.


