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

Lincoln City's progress to the quarter-final of the FA Cup has been a fairytale of gargantuan proportion and several Sudbrooke residents will be out in force at the Emirates Stadium on Saturday 11 March (kick-off 5.30pm), when the Imps take on the mighty Arsenal.

The Imps are just one game away from Wembley, and two games from a possible place in Europe, following an unbelievable run that has seen them sweep past Football League sides Oldham, Ipswich and Brighton, before they conjured up one of the biggest giant-killing acts of all time when they beat Premier League side Burnley at Turf Moor.

That set up a glamorous tie against the Gunners, with 9,000 City fans heading down to the capital to roar on Danny Cowley's men in what will be the biggest match of their lives. Read a villager's report next month.

Notes of the monthly meeting of Sudbrooke Parish Council held on Thursday 5 January in Sudbrooke Village Hall.

Councillors Peter Heath, Ian Russell, Stuart Curtis, Bob Waller, Miss Rose Dobbs, Paul Rignall, PC Chris Bell, Christine Myers (Clerk), Bridget Solly (Treasurer).

———— 148) Parishioners' Items —

- A resident had requested that a grit bin be sited near to Beech Tree Corner on Manor/West Drive. Resolved unanimously that LCC Highways be requested to provide a grit bin in that location.
- The condition of the road surface on Church Lane was reported as being in severe need of attention. Agenda item for discussion later in the meeting.
- A report was made that protected trees had been felled in Sudbrooke Park and the matter referred to the Trees Officer, WLDC.
- It had been reported to LCC Highways that the hedge on the A158 from the last house to the scout camp entrance (looking east towards Langworth) had grown out over the footpath posing a serious safety hazard to users of the footpath.

— 149) Apologies —

Councillors Andy Cottam and Mrs Lyn Etheridge had sent apologies.

— 150) To Receive Declarations of Interest on any item on the agenda —

- Councillor Paul Rignall declared an interest in item 8g on the agenda, parking problems, Windsor Close.
- Councillor Stuart Curtis declared an interest in item 13 on the agenda Review of Governance Arrangements, WLDC.

- 151) Notes of Meeting held on Dec 1, 2016, to be Approved as Minutes -

■ Resolved unanimously that the notes be accepted as a correct record of the meeting and be signed as minutes.

—— 152) Police Matters———

- PC Chris Bell introduced himself as the new Community Beat Officer for the area. He was asked for advice about parking problems in the village which had been reported to the Parish Council. He stated that the police could only intervene if an emergency vehicle could not gain access due to parked vehicles.

——— 153) County Councillor's Report —

None received.

— 154) District Councillor's Report —

■ DC Stuart Curtis reported that he had received complaints from residents over traffic problems caused by school buses believed to be from Market Rasen and Horncastle at the drop off points close to the junctions of Wragby Road/Scothern Lane and St Edwards Drive. He had suggested to the County Council that only one stop is designated along Scothern Lane for safety reasons and this was being considered by the Passenger Transport Unit.

——— 155) Reports on Matters Outstanding ——

■ Defibrillator - Permission had now been obtained from the building owner for siting the defibrillator on the wall of the hairdressers. Members voted and Resolved unanimously to make payment of £300.00 being the parish's contribution for the defibrillator.

—— 156) Highway Matters —

- a) Request for road safety measures at junction of Scothern Lane/A158 No reply received from LCC, Clerk to contact again. It was noted that two further incidents had occurred at this location over the Christmas period.
- **b)** Church Lane/Nettleham Lane A request for a site meeting with an LCC Highways Officer regarding the condition of the road following works carried out by Anglian Water contractors had been declined by LCC. Members felt that this was unacceptable and the Clerk was instructed to write again to LCC Highways and also seek the support of County Councillor Mrs Sue Rawlins.

It was noted that there had been no response to the request to Truelove Property for reducing the height of the hedge on Church Lane to one metre.

- c) Meeting with LCC Highways Officer to discuss works required within the parish It was understood that there would be a restructuring of staff in the Highways Department and recommended that a meeting be postponed until after March 1, 2017.
- d) Street lighting, Windsor Close Members had viewed the area on Windsor Close considered to be very dark and agreed that the area would benefit from additional lighting. However, due to present constraints on street lighting it was considered that it may be more appropriate to request that one of the present lights be moved, if possible.

Resolved unanimously that a request be made to LCC Highways for moving of a street lamp on Windsor Close to provide more adequate lighting.

- e) Damage to grass verge by contractors at beginning of St Edward's Drive Councillor Curtis had taken up this matter on behalf of a resident and been assured by the site foreman that reinstatement of the verge would be made when the works were complete.
- f) LCC Highways Grass cutting A letter re. LCC contribution to grass cutting for the 2017 season had been received stating that Parish Councils would receive a transitional relief of 20 per cent of the previous payment, where the Parish Council decides to carry on delivering the grass cutting.
- g) Parking problems Windsor Close/other reported locations in the village Correspondence had been received regarding parking problems in Windsor Close and other locations in the village.

 Minute 152 16/17 Police Matters was however re-iterated.

157) New Sports Field:

To Consider Proposals for Improving Car Park/Landscaping

■ All Councillors were asked to view the new sports field prior to the next meeting of the Parish Council as to ideas for improving the car park and landscaping of the area.

Councillor Ian Russell agreed to look at the area to assess current maintenance required. It was noted that the new goalposts would shortly be delivered and would be stored in the Village Hall until such time as they could be put in situ.

= 158) Play Area Inspections =

a) Appointment of Play Equipment Inspector - The Chairman, Vice Chairman and Clerk had met with a representative of Greenfield Groundskeeping Services regarding the weekly inspection of the play equipment being carried out by the company. That the company be appointed for the weekly inspections Resolved unanimously.

It was noted that some work was required to some items of play equipment. Resolved unanimously that the Clerk seek a price for the work not able to be carried out by the Play Equipment Inspector.

b) Signage for Northfield Park and Village Hall play areas - Draft signage for the play areas had been produced by the Clerk. Apart from a minor alteration the wording was agreed.

Resolved unanimously that the Clerk be authorised to order the signs at a cost of approximately £50.00.

159) Training for Councillors/Clerk/Treasurer for 2017: Courses offered by LALC

■ The training courses organised by LALC was brought to the attention of members. Members were asked to inform the Clerk of courses which were of interest in order for bookings to be made.

The Clerk and Treasurer were interested in attending some courses and approval for attendance be an agenda item for the next meeting of the Parish Council.

– 160)Best Kept Village Competition –

■ Suggestions for review of the competition was being sought by the organisers. Members considered that it may be more appropriate for villages to be judged throughout the year, not just in June/July. In particular many villages look very different in the spring, Sudbrooke in especially, with an array of daffodils which have been planted by residents over 20 years, showing community spirit.

161) Review of Governance Arrangements, WLDC -

Notification received that West Lindsey is reviewing its governance arrangements with two option being considered - Committee System and Leader and Cabinet Model. A questionnaire would be available on line for Councillors to complete and submit.

- Central Lincolnshire Plan: The modifications are now under consultation until March 6, 2017.

FEBRUARY WALK

■ Ten walkers set off on a glorious winter sunny day from Binbrook in the Wolds heading towards Kirmond le Mire over Binbrook Top.

Just beyond the fish ponds in Thornton le Vale, we came across delightful wooded areas covered in snowdrops and aconites.

We encountered just one really muddy field that would have removed your boots if not tightly laced up.

We were all a good three inches taller by the end of the field.

The long views throughout the eight-and-a-half mile walk were superb.

MARCH WALK =

A seven-mile circular walk from Nocton village skirting around Nocton wood heading towards Wasp Nest.

The terrain is good apart from one very muddy field.

The walk provides an opportunity to see the remains of Nocton Hall, *pictured*, originally built in the 1530s and visited by Henry V111 and Catherine Howard.

Walkers should meet at the village hall at 9-30am and are advised to take a waterproof coat, bring a drink and a snack and wear suitable footwear.

ST EDWARD'S ALERT!

Repairs to the chancel arch means the church will be temporarily closed

Readers of **Sudbrooke News** will be aware of the ongoing work required on St Edward's Church. Sudbrooke, to maintain the fabric of the building.

This principally involves major repairs to the Chancel Arch and in phase two repairs to the roof (we hope then to move on to raise the path to allow access for wheelchairs and pushchairs. deal with repairs required to the organ, put in a sound and loop system and who knows what will come next!).

The good news is that we are about to embark on repairs to the Chancel Arch.

This is internal work and involves the erection of scaffolding, removing a significant amount of plaster, fitting strengthening bars, renovating stonework, plastering and painting.

The work will start at the beginning

period of four weeks. We hope then to return for Sunday Services in Sudbrooke, but because of the erection of scaffolding, the Church will be closed during the week until the scaffolding has been removed. This could be a period of 12-16 weeks (the scaffolding will be erected so that we can work around it for Services).

We are expecting to be open for Easter and for the West Lindsey Open Churches Festival (May 13-14). If the work isn't complete, well it's a chance to come and see what is happening!

Honestly, this situation is likely to be 'fluid' and we will make decisions month on month until the work is complete. Access to the Churchvard will not be affected.

LONELINESS —

Over January there seems to have been quite a lot on the news and radio about the issue of Loneliness.

It does seem particularly acute over the winter months because of the short days, long nights and to some extent the weather drives us back into our homes.

I do wonder how many people this affects in Sudbrooke and I wonder if there is anything we can do to help?

I recently read about an initiative to help with this issue, trying to enable groups of people across the generations to meet together for a tea party.

The gathering is normally in a home and is designed to help people build relationships across the generations.

It's simple and it seems to work... is anyone interested? Would anyone join me in holding a tea party? Is there anyone out there who

wants to come to a tea party at the vicarage to break the monotony of their own four walls? If so, please contact me.

One of the difficulties I find in trying to contact people is that those who are feeling lonely, don't tend to put themselves forward – I realise it's a bold thing to do, but why not try?

Or maybe - ask a neighbour to do it for you! We are now approaching Lent in the Church year. Our season of preparation for Easter.

It is the time when we remember Jesus taking himself away from everyone and everything to prepare for three years of teaching, healing, being with crowds of people and ultimately where He faced the cross and resurrection.

He had to face Himself too, with many temptations, and to understand His identity as the Christ. the Son of God.

On His own He found solitude – an ability to be Himself in the presence of His Father, to face the future with courage and to resist every distraction that was thrown at Him.

He came away from 40 days apart, to a place of assurance and peace and knowing His true identity... may we all know that strength and that peace.

ALEC C. CARROTTE ON THE ROLE OF PLAY IN OUR LIVES

"Defining play is difficult because it's a moving target. It's a process not a thing"

(Eberle)

"A state of being" purposeless, fun and pleasure" (Brown)

The above definitions would seem to suggest therefore that the main focus of play is on enjoying the actual experience and not in accomplishing an actual goal. The situation is even more confusing when consulting Collins Dictionary and Thesaurus as, there are 32 variations.

However, perhaps a summary might be that play is "to occupy one's self in a diversion". If we accept this latter definition, then we also have to ask the question – Diversion from what?

Children

The answer in the case of children might well be a diversion from something less attractive, such as bath-time or bed-time or tidying the bedroom. (In the case of adults, playtime might also be a welcome diversion from employment or house-cleaning).

These would appear to be fairly negative views of play and would tend to suggest that it is a non-central and non-purposive activity and thereby serves a non-important function in our lives. But is this true?

With regard to children, solo or group play whether at school or at home, provides a whole range of benefits (social skills, cognitive development, physical development etc).

Adults

In view of all the benefits for children via play, what role does play have in the adult world? Assuming that we have all had a 'wonderful' childhood full of functional play-time, what does play actually mean for adults?

In our hectic modern lives, many of us focus so heavily on work and family commitments that we never seem to have time for pure fun and have stopped valuing play as a diversion, and treat it as a time for aggressive competition thus denying the 'diversion' or even 'fun factor' in play. (eg) bragging rights arising from inter-departmental sports at work or competitive sports in the home situation, eg. Dad does not necessarily have to win every time at Scrabble or table tennis against his children!

Referring back to the notion that play is a diversion from everyday stressful situations, below are a few examples of 'play inside and outside the home. (NB) Don't forget to switch off computers and television)

- Take it in turn to nominate activities
- Have a regular family games night
- Enjoy a weekend family car outing or walk
- Have a water pistol fight in the garden
- Treasure hunt in the garden or in the house

Our society tends to dismissive of non-purposive fun-play for adults. Play is perceived as unproductive, petty or even a guilty pleasure. The notion is that once we reach adulthood, it's time to get serious, and between personal and professional responsibilities, there's no time to play or re-kindle relationships. How sad?

"He was said to be on about it, but sadly he never came," added Charlie.


The cafe, which employs between four and nine people, depending on how busy they are, will continue trading until the Masseys find a buyer, with the hope that the new owners will carry on with the business.


Foundation. The service provides monthly cinema screenings to seven rural locations across Lincolnshire.

LATEST UPDATE

■ The doctors are aiming to review repeat medications annually in the month of the patients' birthday. This is to check that medication is still required and that appropriate monitoring has taken place during the year.

Some of these reviews can be carried out over the telephone and others require blood tests or specialist review appointments. Patients on repeat medications should ask at reception before their birthday month so that checks and appointments may be made to enable re-authorisation of medication.

It may not be possible to re-authorise medication without the appropriate checks or discussion, which may cause delays.

A doctor will need to authorise any acute prescriptions before being added to patients' repeat medication list. Urgent requests for medication - please help us by trying to avoid

these situations and order medication in good time. Following risk assessments, the doctors have asked that their surgeries are not interrupted except in emergency situations.

As a result they will be signing urgent prescriptions at the end of morning surgery which will be available to collect after 4pm and any urgent requests received after 4pm may not be available until the next day.

Staff have asked for a reminder that mindful of patient confidentiality we are not able to supply information about other patients' appointment times, test results etc. without the express consent from the patient concerned.
