



PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

SUMMARY OF PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON JUNE 6, 2019

- Damage to a fence on West Drive had occurred: Police are aware. There had been disturbances at the shop caused by youngsters:CCTV footage had been used and the parents of the children made aware.
- Dovergrown hedges/trees: An overgrown hedge was reported on Wragby Road, a tree overhanging the footway on Holme Drive and hedge overgrown on Church Lane towards junction at Scothern Lane A letter would be sent to the property owners requesting they cut back the overgrowth.
- ▶ Police Matters Reports of incidents in Sudbrooke: May 1 - June 4, 2019 May 4: St Edwards Drive - Alarm, audible only: Neighbours away and house alarm going off.

May 9: St Edwards Drive - Vehicle Offences: Possible cloned plates.

May 18: Wragby Road - Traffic Offence: Child not properly restrained in vehicle. May 20: Wragby Road - Concern for safety: Male on all fours with face near to the ground - unsure if he is poorly. May 30: Holme Drive - Possible burglary in progress: Householder thinks someone in

progress: Householder thinks someone in the garage - all in order - no signs of a break in.

May 31: Holme Drive - ASB: Youths causing problems outside the shop.

May 31: Parklands, West Drive - Criminal Damage: Windows broken in new build properties.

▶ Village Sign: The Parish Council approved the cost of siting the village sign in the

Jubilee Garden. This will be a welcome site at last!

▶ Park Development: A progress report on road access from Holme Drive and the potential opening of the pathway from Main Drive had been received.

However a number of residents had approached the Parish Council with requests for information due to the increased traffic flow down Holme Drive relating to the Parklands Development, the Parish Council having only the original Traffic Management Plan produced for the original CDM Construction Phase Plan for the project which does not include Holme Drive

It was noted also that the site entrance to the Parklands appears to not have anyone controlling it, being open all day for anyone to enter posing a safety risk.

The PC would request a copy of the latest revision of the Traffic Management Plan and an indication of how this may develop as the access from Holme Drive.

- ▶ New seats: There are now two new seats situated at the front of the Village Hall, replacing two which were beyond economical repair. The new ones are made from recycled plastic.
- ▶ Chairmans Comments: The Chair drew attention to the children at home during the school holidays and out and about around the village. He requested parents advise their youngsters on the community spirit in the village and that they not cause mischief for other residents.

PUBLIC MATTERS

WITH DISTRICT COUNCILLOR BOB WALLER

IT'S ALL IN THE PLANNING

▶ For this edition of the magazine, I thought that I would try to explain some of the "rules and guidelines" in the complex subject that is Planning.

Planning is about getting the right things built in the right places, about the spaces around buildings and about other issues too, such as job creation, social justice, regeneration and climate change. Fundamentally, planning is about sustainable development balancing the economic, environment and social impacts on new developments.

One of the main considerations on any planning application is: Does it conform with the Central Lincolnshire Local Plan (April 2017)? This document sets a clear framework for how an area will grow, providing clarity for what development will and will not be acceptable. The plan covers City of Lincoln, North Kesteven as well as West Lindsey.

One of the other important documents is the Neighbourhood Plan. Scothern already has its plan in place and Sudbrooke's plan is at the referendum stage. A Neighbourhood Plan attains the same legal status as a local plan once it has been approved at the referendum stage. Not all developments require planning permission (although will still be subject to

building regulations). This is known as permitted development and includes: smaller house extensions, demolition of buildings (not listed) and change of use such as from a restaurant to a shop. This is known as Permitted Development. That said some Permitted Development can have a condition where the applicant must apply for Prior Approval of certain matters such as highways, flooding, siting and design.

When an applicant applies for planning the first stage is Outline Application this is followed by Reserved Matters which will take into consideration scale, layout, appearance, landscaping and access. WLDC has strict timescales of action to determine an application. Eight weeks for household/minor applications, 13 weeks for major applications (10 dwellings or more) and 16 weeks if the application is accompanied by an Environment Statement.

Only a small amount of applications will go in front of the monthly planning committee, where they will discuss applications that are more complex, large development, contentious or have links with any member of the council. So far in 2018/2019 WLDC has received 1,529 applications for planning permission and other consents.

SUDBROOKE GARDENING CLUB AUTUMN SHOW

To be held in the Village Hall on Monday 9 September, 2019

RULES

- 1) Adult entries into the Village Show are welcome from any adult or young person aged 15+ residing in Sudbrooke and all members of the Gardening Club.
- 2) Junior entries are encouraged from all children aged 14 years and under, either residing in Sudbrooke or with connections with the village, ie. grandchildren and local schools.
- 3) All entries must have been grown or made by the exhibitor.
- 4) Winning entries from previous Shows may not be re-exhibited.
- 5) Adults may enter a maximum of two exhibits per class.
- 6) Juniors may enter a maximum of two exhibits per section in Class No. 40.
- 7) Adults will be charged an entrance fee of 20p per exhibit.
- 8) Juniors may enter free of charge. Age to be shown on exhibit.
- 9) All items are left entirely at the owner's own risk.
- 10) Between 6pm and 7pm exhibits must be displayed on the tables provided for each class, ready for judging from 7.05pm.
- 11) Points will be awarded in each Class as follows:

1st place 3 points 2nd place 2 points 3rd place 1 point.

- 12) Place cards will be awarded for each class 1st, 2nd or 3rd places.
- 13) Gift vouchers will be awarded to category winners.
- 14) A trophy will be awarded for the 'Best in Show' exhibit. The exhibitor will hold the trophy until the next Show.
- 15) A trophy will be awarded to the adult exhibitor scoring most points overall. The exhibitor will hold the trophy until the next Show.

e went away in our Commer motorhome on many holidays subsequent to our initial adventure to the south of France in 1975 and covered much of Europe in the process. Those were the days when it wasn't illegal to take your children out of school, but they had a good lesson in geography, and I am sure their education didn't suffer overall.

We always put the children to bed the night before in the motorhome, and travelled through the night to catch an early morning ferry. We never ate in the ferry restaurant, far too expensive, eating sandwiches made at home the night before, much to the children's disappointment (with children of their own they now understand why). One ferry that we would use was the service from Pegwell Bay in Ramsgate operated by Hoverlloyd, to Calais, and consisted of a 250-seater SR.

N4 hovercraft that could carry about 30 vehicles. It was a spectacular sight watching it coming in over the water and then directly up the beach with its huge jet engines and propellors making so much noise as they slowly wound down. The journey time was only half an hour!

Money had to be changed for each country we were visiting. We had to estimate our needs and purchase in advance, so it was a bit of a juggling act really. Self-service petrol stations weren't available either, and pulling into a gas station with a "fullen bitte" was mandatory in Austria.

In the four years we owned the motorhome, though, it never broke down once, but it lost the battle to get it up into fourth gear sometimes, it was rather underpowered in a strong wind. It was time to search for a new and bigger motorhome, and there was not the choice in those days. There was no dealer in Lincoln at the time, but I spotted one in North Hykeham, on a Bedford chassis, called an Advantura, brand new at about £6,500. In 1974, Sheikh Yamani quadrupled the price of

oil, a massive rise at the time leading to a huge increase in the price of oil, increasing the value of all vehicles at the time. The upshot was that I was able to sell it privately four years later for more than I paid for it!

The Advantura was a lovely vehicle, and a lot bigger than the Commer. It was a six-berth, with more facilities than the Commer, including a tank of hot water when you had been travelling a while. We decided to drive through Europe and make our way to Greece, crossing the Alps over the Grossglockner pass, the highest pass in Austria at 8,215ft. First of all we were to visit Rheims and meet up with a friend of my daughter from a school visit.

He worked at the Mercier champagne cellar at Epernay so a tour round the cellar was on the cards. Its claim to fame is the massive wine barrel within its walls. Towed to Paris by 24

oxen and 18 horses for the Paris exhibition of 1889, two bridges collapsed under its weight and Mercier had to buy five adjoined houses in Paris which he tore down so he would have somewhere to park it! Aboard a little train you can visit 18km of tunnels to watch the wine bottles being turned to extract the sediment, which we did!

Saying au revoir to our host, we headed south through Austria, camping in the warm Lake District of Karinthia. We had arrived on a special occasion, and there were free rides available all week on the cable car, so you can guess what the children were doing nearly all week. After a few days there we set our sights for the communist country of Yugoslavia, crossing the border at Ljubljana. Border formalities were rather intense with all our paperwork scrutinised in detail. Yugoslavian dinars were obtained at currency exchange and we were on our way. There was a huge difference between the beauty of Austria and the drabness of this communist land. Even the kids noticed it. The fields were full of people working the land, not a tractor in site, and so it

went on for mile after mile. There was no motorway, in fact the whole road through the country north to south was single carriageway, which presented lots of problems, especially if there was an accident. We had contact with an elderly couple whose son was studying in Lincoln and he asked us if we could drop them some coffee in, and we were happy to oblige.

We turned off just short of Belgrade, and alighted in a one-horse town called Novi Sad, and sought out the address we had been given. The old couple were eestatic to receive us all the way from England, and I gave the dad a letter from his son to explain who we were, and he invited all his neighbours in to share his good fortune. One of them was a girl about 10 years old who translated for us. They insisted on us staying for a meal, and she went down the back garden with a big knife, and with a lot of clucking and commotion, arrived back at the door with the unfortunate chicken in her hands. I didn't dare tell the kids what I'd just seen, they'd never had eaten it!

The next day we took our leave and once again made our way south to the border with

Greece, and this time we had more trouble with the border guards. They seemed to be looking for something in the roof of the van, and jabbed and probed with their rifle butts on the ceiling

before letting us through. Northern Greece was just as primative as Yugoslavia. The roads seemed worse, and we went badly wrong at one point, driving 70 miles out of our way, finishing up in some sort of cowboy town full of people on horseback, and wooden verandas etc, and folk that appeared rather hostile.

We had a nightmarish drive over potholed roads, but eventually arrived at the port of Igoumenitsa, and drove down to the docks, seeking a boat to Corfu. We couldn't work out the system to get tickets or ferry times, but with a lot of pointing and gesticulating we got our ferry and we were on our way to Corfu.
