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Welcome to October's Sudbrooke News.


Great news. Sudbrooke looks as though it might be getting a dedicated web site shortly. Lots of opportunities hopefully lie ahead; watch this space.

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Church Letter

Do you like birthdays and anniversaries? Most of us do. We all like remembering the happy times and even though at some times (for example the anniversary of the death of a loved one) the memory is sad we do wish to commemorate past events.

The Church, too, commemorates many events – Christmas when we remember God's greatest gift to us all in the birth of his Son, Jesus; Easter when we remember Jesus' cruel death and glorious resurrection bringing us the forgiveness of sins and the way to everlasting life and Saints' and Holy Days when we remember the lives of holy people or other events which are important to us and help us as we travel along our Christian journey.

In Sudbrooke the church is about to celebrate an important anniversary. There has been a church here for many years - as long ago as 1271, Sudbrooke is recorded as having a Rector (Robert Galle) so we can assume that there was a medieval church here. The earliest surviving Register of Baptisms, Burials and Marriages goes back to 1579.

We know that a church built of red brick was in use until 1860 when it needed so much repair that it was demolished and our existing stone church was built on the site from £2,000 left for the purpose in the will of Richard Ellison who died November 20^{th} 1859 (the Ellisons were Lincoln bankers and at that time lived in Sudbrooke Holme – the large house that was demolished in the 1920s and which stood in Sudbrooke Park).

It took about two years to finish the building and the church was dedicated in 1862. The worldwide church remembers our Patronal Saint – Edward the Confessor on 13th October each year so in that month next year we will celebrate 150 years of our existing building. We will be remembering all those who have contributed to its upkeep over the years, all those who have worshipped in the church and all who have been baptised, married or buried here.

We are planning to hold a special "Songs of Praise" on the evening of Sunday October 14th and hope that as many of you as possible will be able to join us then. More details will be given in the New Year.

Just as we remember those faithful souls who have supported the church in the past we, too, have our part to play in making sure that there is still a church in Sudbrooke for future generations. Who knows? they may be giving thanks for us in another 150 years' time. One thing we are doing is asking people to collect, over the next 50 weeks or so 150 coins of the same denomination (one for each year) – i.e. 150 pennies, 2p, 5p, 10p, 20p, 50p, £1, £2, £5 (if you can get

them) - or even if you were feeling really generous Krugerrands! This means only three coins a week and everyone can contribute according to their means – young people, adults or older people. We will then ask everyone to bring their coins (or, if you want to save weight, notes/cheques to the same value) to church next October on an open day (or days). We do hope you will wish to support your local church in this Anniversary Project

31 PARISHIONERS ITEMS

It was reported that a resident had raised concerns about noise from youths congregating near to the shop and had notified the Police. There had also been an apparent increase in litter around that area. The Clerk was asked to request WLDC Street team to request that the bins in that area be emptied more regularly.

It was also noted that the shop was now under new management and hoping to increase business. It was suggested that it may be useful for some signing indicating 'shop' be positioned at the junction of Holme Drive/Scothern Lane.

A report was also made that motorised scooters were being ridden on footpaths in the village. As this was a matter for the Police it was re-iterated

that the Police had advised that they be notified at the time of the incident.

A parishioner asked about arrangements for viewing the Parish Council accounts, in particular the pay of parish servants. He stated that other parishes published these on their websites as part of the minutes of meetings and requested that they be published in 'Sudbrooke News'. The parishioner was informed that Langworth, Wragby and Nettleham Parish Councils do not publish their accounts/full minutes in their parish magazines.

The resident was advised that as Sudbrooke does not have a web site the full notes of meetings, following approval, are available in Nettleham Library for residents to view. Salaries paid to parish council employees are also itemised on the Council precept which is available with parish accounts for viewing.

After lengthy discussion the parishioner appeared satisfied with the outcome of the discussion and left the meeting.

33 COUNTY COUNCILLORS REPORT

County Councillor Mrs Sue Rawlins reported that consultations re staff reviews were continuing at the County Council.

Another issue currently under discussion within the County Council was long term care in the community and adult social care.

34 DISTRICT COUNCILLORS REPORT

District Councillor Stuart Curtis reported that the Local Government Boundary Review decision was expected in the autumn of this year.

DC Curtis suggested that Mr Mark Sturgess, Planning Officer, WLDC be invited to address the Parish Council on new planning issues. It was agreed that this could be held on the first Thursday of August and that Reepham, Dunholme, Scothern and Langworth Parish Councils be invited to attend.

35 NOTES OF MEETING HELD ON 2ND JUNE 2011

These were signed as a correct record.

Trimming of silver birch tree, Beech Tree Corner – This item was deferred until Cllr I Russell could give a report.

Sudbrooke Sports Day – Mr Mike Halliday had confirmed that a Risk Assessment had been carried out on the

equipment to be used and a final check would be made on the sports field prior to the commencement of the races.

It was agreed that the £250 Parish Council sponsorship of the Sports Day be paid to Mr Halliday prior to the event and receipts collected from him for items purchased.

Meet the Council evening – 8th July 2011 – Arrangements were in hand for what it was hoped would be an interesting evening.

Bus shelter opposite Park Gates – quotations for repairs/electrical disconnection -

The quotation for the repairs to broken cladding was accepted in the sum of £51.00 from Mr F Pitt.

The Clerk reported that she had sought two quotations for the disconnection of the broken light, receiving only one in the sum of £35.00 plus VAT. In the interest of safety she had instructed that the work be carried out. It was noted that some of the electric cable to the light fitting had previously been stolen.

Play area fence repair, rear of Village Hall – Two quotations had been sought for the concreting in of the loose fence posts and only one received in the sum of £110.00. It was agreed that this be accepted from Mr E Pitt.

Extension of sports field lease – Nothing further to report.

36 HIGHWAY MATTERS

Neighbourhood Watch Signs – replacement – These were still awaited.

New Road signs, Scothern Lane -

The new signage for the 40mph extended speed limit were now in place.

Hedge trimming – It was noted that the hedge on Church Lane bordering Barber Farms field had been cut at the side but not at the top. Following discussion it was agreed to leave the matter in abeyance.

Suggestion of trimming trees in verge on Holme Drive - Some of the trees were reported as hanging low onto the footpaths. Members agreed they would trim some of the lower branches off the trees.

The Internal Auditor had examined the accounts for the year 2010/2011 which were found to be satisfactory.

She drew to the attention of Councillors the following:-

That electrical equipment owned by the Parish Council and used by the Clerk and Treasurer should be PAT tested.

That it was advisable to provide up to 15 minutes for parishioners items prior to the start of a meeting, Confirm in the minutes that Standing Orders had been issued to new Councillors.

That a letter of appointment be issued to the Internal Auditor. (This would be an agenda item for the next meeting of the Parish Council).

Request by Sudbrooke and Langworth LIVES First Responders for financial support – A written request had been received by the Parish Council for consideration to be given in the next precept to supporting the local LIVES Responders Group. At this point (8.50pm) the Chairman suspended Standing Orders in order to allow Mr Johnson of Sudbrooke LIVES Group, to address the meeting and

Mr Johnson stated that a similar request for financial consideration had been made to Langworth Group and Scothern Parish Councils. £1400.00 per year was required to maintain the local service.

Members agreed in principle to financially support the Group. The Clerk was asked to liaise with the neighbouring Parish Councils with a view to each Council proportioning their donation equally according to the size of the parish.

Standing Orders were resumed at 9.00pm.

A picturesque scene, I think readers will agree.

I worked as a youth leader for twenty years and feel a younger generation should offer their time.

There are many thriving groups in Sudbrooke and, whilst many people have grown out of wanting to work with young people, there is no barrier to new clubs starting up.

The District Councillor Initiative Fund is advertised on page 11. This states that support may be offered to new groups.

If anyone feels there is a need for a new club then why not start one? That is how the existing groups were established.

If there had been a Bobby walking on the beat I would have told him but you never see one these days. I've tried to report things to one of those mobile Police Stations, but they go too fast, I get out of breath running alongside. If they do have to be mobile can't they slow down a bit. I suppose it's one way of keeping reported crime figures down. If they are always mobile not many folk have enough breath left to report things.



It's true though! There is often a murder in that area. It's the birds that live there that are to blame. No, not the ladies! The crows! Surely you realised that's what I was talking about. A lot of crows are known collectively as a murder of crows. Strange isn't it? Who decided on that as a collective noun? For that matter who decides on collective nouns for any group?

If you care to look up a list of collective nouns you will see all sorts of strange words which over the years have been used to describe collections. A quick click onto Google comes up with. A cuddle of kiddies. A disgrace of litter louts. An eyesore of graffiti artists. A puddle of puppies. A beauty of gardeners. A pedal of cyclists. A pest of cold callers. I can think of many

more. How about you?

Sweet rationing finally ended in the UK in 1952. Seven years after the ending of WW2. A year before in 1951, the Government had ended the rationing of sweets and for a few short weeks they were off ration and sweets and confectionery were on sale in shops. Such was the instant rush to buy, that within a few days, there was not a single sweet or chocolate left in any shop. The shops were absolutely empty. It was even worse than when they were on ration. At least

then you had a very limited choice of sweets. They were forced to reintroduce rationing again for another year. For that year even though you had a ration book each child was allowed 4 ounces of sweets a month. (The same amount that had been allowed during the war years). It was impossible to find a shop that displayed sweets of any kind. Those shops that had any in stock kept them under the counter, out of sight and only sold them to special customers or black market spivs.

With no sweets to buy children were reduced to hunting around sweet shops to find substitutes such as liquorice wood or Tiger nuts or several types of penny chews which had no sugar in them and tasted like wood. Another substitute was lemonade powder which was sold loose in paper bags and which you dipped your finger into and which stained finger and tongue bright yellow or orange. Any children living near American bases were lucky because American Troops were very generous and handed out chewing gum and if you were very lucky, chocolate Hershy bars to small children. Youngsters would call out to passing GIs "Any Gum Chum?" and usually be rewarded with a few packets of gum tossed to them as the troops passed. Can any of you Old Codgers remember doing that?

After a year, by which time the shops had managed to re-stock and now had full shelves, rationing was finally ended. Of course, there was an immediate rush to buy and for a short period some shops ran low on stock but unlike the previous year they were able to keep restocking and finally demand evened out. GARDENING NEWS



Welcome to my garden again. In the last week the strong winds that have been blowing have changed the shape of the Salix tree in the front garden it is now leaning to the East. I am hoping it will straighten up. The plants in the wall baskets have given a very good display this summer, but they are now fading so they will be removed and the baskets prepared for winter pansies. These are now ready for planting out. During last winter the pansies put on a brave show, although the harsh winter did seem to finish them off but as soon as the worst of the snow disappeared, they recovered and continued to flower until spring, when it was time to think about re-planting for summer.

Today has been a beautiful day, just right for some gardening, but by early evening a chill had set in, which makes one realise that the summer has ended.

It will be time to clean out the greenhouse and put bubble wrap insulation in place, ready for bringing some of the basket plants in for protection and to use them as stock plants ready for next season.

The concrete path which runs from the greenhouse alongside the vegetable beds has a post and rail fence on one side along which the blackberries grow and are tied in. We have had a really good crop this year, most of which end up in the freezer or are given to neighbours, or those that I eat as I pass byjust too tempting!

The polytunnel is still producing some salad crops, although the cucumbers have now finished and the tomatoes have given very good results, the last of which I encouraged to ripen by removing the leaves and thereby allowing the sun to get to get to all of them. As they finish these will be cleared away, making room for the more tender plants from the gravel garden to spend the winter months in there, for protection.

During August we left our garden in the care of our neighbour and went off to Shropshire to spend a holiday with our daughter. She lives in an old farmhouse (1834) with her family, near Shrewsbury and three miles from the Welsh border. There is lovely stone-walled garden at the back and front of the house. The area behind the house had been a small yard, but has now been developed as a decorative area with stone slabs and gravel. In the corner stood a large unruly conifer which had to go. My daughter and I spent the best part of a day removing branches and extra stems down to a very thick stump in which a metal pipe and thick rope were embedded, which had obviously been used to secure the tree when it was newly planted. In spite of our best efforts we were unable to remove the pipe. The farmer who had previously owned the property came to the rescue with a tractor and front loader which easily pulled the pipe out. We were then able to cut the stump down to ground level, very carefully using a chain saw. The area is now completely covered in gravel with no sign of the conifer remaining, and finished off with planted pots and seating.

Together with our daughter we left Shropshire to spend a few days in Bath, before collecting our grandson who had already been there a week on a residential music course. While exploring Bath, we found right in the City a lovely park and gardens with stone steps which led right down from street level to beautiful very green lawns and flower beds situated alongside the river. Visitors to the garden were asked to pay on entrance, although residents had free access. This reminded me of visiting Kew Gardens many years ago, when you had to pay one penny (when 240 pence equalled £1)) to go through the turnstile.

We are now home and catching up in the garden, where everything is slowing down. We will be planting spring bulbs and getting ready with winter protection, although we will continue with work on clearing the shrubbery, as weather allows. So farewell for this month.

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CUSTODIANS OF CONTINUITY? The Premonstratensian Abbey at Barlings and the Landscape of Ritual

By Paul Everson and David Stocker

on Saturday 26th November at 3.30pm in Scothern Church (refreshments will be served)

In 1980 Paul Everson carried out a field survey of the earthworks of the exceptionally well-preserved site of the Premonstratensian abbey of Barlings, on the remote Oxney Island, east of Lincoln. In collaboration with David Stocker, that work was to develop into a study of the archaeology of the abbey's social, economic and religious 'home estate'; an area extending to nearly 200 square kilometres north and east of Lincoln itself. Within this area the authors have not only undertaken detailed surveys and reconstructions of the abbey buildings, and of its fate after the Dissolution - when it was converted into a major country house - but they have also undertaken surveys of the abbey's six granges, its villages (Caenby, North and South Carlton, Newball, Reepham, Scothern, Snelland, Stainton, Sudbrooke) the monastic town of Langworth and many other notable landscape features. The authors go on to suggest that this monastic estate had its origins long before the abbey was founded, and may even extend back as far as the Romano-British period.

Custodians of Continuity is essential reading for anyone interested in the history of Lincolnshire, in the history of landscape or in the study of monasteries.

Custodians Of Continuity will be launched on Saturday 26 November at Scothern Church at 3.30pm. There will be illustrated presentations by Paul Everson and David Stocker and by Prof. David Austin (Prof of Archaeology at Lampeter University). The manuscript of the Premonstratensian antiphoner found at Scothern and possibly originating from Barlings Abbey, willbe on display. The programme finishes with tea and book-signing until 6.30pm.

Custodians Of Continuity is published as an A4 monograph of over 450 pages. The normal price is £25.00 but it will be available at the book launch at the special price of £20.00

As a registered patient of the Welton Health Centre (WHC) you are automatically a member of the Patient Doctors Association (PDA.)

The PDA is a voluntary organisation which was formed in the early 1990s with the aim of enhancing the services provided by the WHC to its patients. This is achieved in two ways.

First through fund raising; specific medical equipment is purchased for use by the Practice, equipment that is not necessarily available through NHS funding.

Second, an increasingly important function is the Patient Transport Scheme. The PDA makes use of some 32 voluntary drivers to offer transport to and from any medical appointment either at the WHC or elsewhere. This service is offered to those patients who may have difficulty attending appointments and is booked through the WHC reception.

As an organisation, the PDA has a formal constitution and a committee comprising; a chairman, vice-chairman, secretary, treasurer, health liaison officer and 12 committee members. Should you wish to help and become a member of the Committee then please contact the WHC.

The PDA holds an AGM each year, this year it will be held on Thursday October 20th in the WHC from 7.30pm – all are welcome. The speaker is Dr Sunil Hindocha, the Chair of the Commissioning Group to which the Welton Health Centre belongs. He will address proposed changes to the NHS.

YOUR OPINION COUNTS

A number of patients may have received a GP Patient Survey to complete. I would ask those receiving this survey to complete and return it to the relevant address. You may not be aware but the results of these surveys have a substantial financial effect on the funding received by the Practice. Consequently, there may be less money available for the services provided by the Health Centre and to offset this there becomes an increased need for the PDA to fund raise. Should you have a problem then please mention it to the receptionist or alternatively put it in writing, addressed to the PDA Chairman.
