Independent Examination – February to March. Public Referendum April 2019 and finally Adoption by WLDC May 2019.

■ 38 PARISHIONERS' ITEMS

- A local club had asked for advice re. a past District Councillor's Initiative award and had been directed to the correct person for advice.
- Two complaints had been received by Councillors about the condition of the grass cutting in the village, i.e. lack of strimming in some areas, width of cutting on roadside verges being insufficient. The Clerk was asked to contact the grass cutting contractors regarding this matter.
- The Millennium Stone lights were lit in the evening. Clerk to contact electrician re. adjusting timer.
- A report was received that the previously reported protruding metal spike in ground leading into Sudbrooke Park from Northfield Park had not been removed. Although on private land, the Clerk was instructed to report it to the police.
- ▶ A resident had drawn attention to the overgrown conifer hedge on St Edward's Drive. This had previously been observed by LCC Highways two years ago and considered that no action be taken. However, the hedge had continued to grow and was now covering the footpath. The Clerk had further reported it to LCC Highways and upon the Chairman's instruction had written to County Councillor Sue Rawlins requesting her intervention. A reply was awaited.

▶ The Clerk reported that the vacancy had been notified to the WLDC Electoral Registration and had taken immediate effect. If an election was not requested by 10 residents then the vacancy could be advertised and the Parish Council could co-opt a member.

This amendment is requesting changes to overall design, glazing, plot position, footprint, elevations and materials. The new proposal is substantially different to the original submitted under TL024-SP-01 in 2015. Concern is expressed as to whether the houses overall are going to be bigger and the elevation changed as such that they are overlooking the propertiescurrently situated on Poachers Lane. The Parish Council is also concerned that these changes are for plot number 1. Plot number 6 has been built and is now occupied. If plot number 1 is the next to be built will this cause implications to the Section 106 agreement that has been agreed to? It is considered that issues

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

SUMMARY OF PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON JULY 5, 2018

- ▶ Sudbrooke Tennis Court Proposals for additional use: Following proposals and a discussion with two local residents, the Parish Council agreed that the tennis court (multi-purpose sports area) be used for football as a community project.
- D Christmas Tree Event 2018: The switch on will take place on November 25, 2018. The Parish Council's aim in the event is to raise funds for the provision of the Christmas tree. It was therefore felt that the Parish Council should continue to hold an event at the tree, selling mulled wine.
- ▶ Street nameplate St Edward's Drive: This had been reported to West Lindsey District Council and would shortly be repaired or replaced.
- Development: Notification had been received from the developers that the street names for the new development had been submitted to WLDC with the amendments as requested by the Parish Council and had been approved, but they did not include the option of naming a

road after the late Stuart Curtis.

▶ Policy for the sustainability of the **Sudbrooke News**: The Internal Auditor had drawn attention to the cost of the production of the village magazine which was increasing annually.

Whilst acknowledging the efforts of the Editor in seeking advertising to offset some of the production costs, it was noted that many of the adverts not bringing in revenue were from outside organisations or other villages. Following careful consideration the following Policy was devised:

- 1. Business advertisers to be charged at current advertising rate.
- 2. Doctors Surgeries/Medical Practices to be charged at current advertising rate.
- 3. Clubs/Societies/Charities not within Sudbrooke parish to be charged 50% of current advertising rate.

LATEST UPDATE

▶ The hot summer spell seems to have come to an end and the children will be returning to school shortly with some parents breathing a sigh of relief! Although we have had the holidays, work at WLDC has been continuing throughout the period, with officers and members working on a host of issues to make West Lindsey and even more attractive and enjoyable place to live.

An announcement regarding the proposed closure of RAF Scampton by the MOD was not good news. We at the council, along with your MP Sir Edward Leigh, do not want this to happen and will try our best in the next four years to try to reverse this proposal. RAF Scampton is steeped in history and when the Red Arrows fly over Sudbrooke I feel very proud and have an "ownership" of them.

Planning Applications and Building Control Regulations can be a nightmare. As a member of the planning committee at WLDC I appreciate that our decisions, based on many factors and governed by law, will always mean that one party is ultimately disappointed. Occasionally the decision goes against an applicant due to errors in the plans or drawings. However, there is a service provided by a team of professionals at the council who can help. Building control exists to make sure

your new home or extension is safe, well-built and energy efficient, meeting today's standards for homes and is in accordance with building regulations.

▶ Fifteen members and friends visited Scampston Hall and Walled Gardens set in 80 acres of parkland and lakes, near Malton in North Yorkshire. Impressively remodelled in the Regency period, Scampston Hall has been the family home of the Legard family since the 17th century.

We were greeted on arrival, enjoyed our refreshments (including delicious freshly made biscuits and scones) and given a short introductory talk, after which we made our way across the grounds to the Hall where Sir Charles Legard welcomed us to his family home which is now occupied by his son Christopher, wife Miranda and their children - Sir Charles having been "downsized" to a smaller property on the estate.

Over the centuries the family have collected many fine antiques and porcelain, as well as several paintings by Gainsborough who was a close family friend. Our guide was superb, spoke eloquently and divulged several anecdotes about the family which made our visit even more interesting and enjoyable.

A freshly prepared lunch was enjoyed in the very comfortable cafe, after which we explored the award-winning contemporary garden set within the original 18th-century

kitchen garden walls. The nine separate garden areas were designed in 1999 by the renowned Dutch Plantsman, Piet Oudolf and are striking in style as well as being a very tranquil space to explore.

The vegetable garden was in full production providing produce for the cafe, and several local schools have ongoing projects in several areas. The Perennial Meadow is designed as a magnet for butterflies and bees and the use of naturalised planting gives a long season of interest. The Victorian Conservatory has recently been restored to its former glory and houses some interesting exhibits recalling the history of Scampston.

Some members explored the extended parkland which were designed by Lancelot 'Capability' Brown and particularly enjoyed the views from the Palladian Bridge which stands at the end of three linked lakes in the park. Almost everyone bought at least one plant from the well-stocked nursery which specialises in the unusual species grown within the garden.

A truly delightful visit - well worth the trip over the Humber Bridge to be greeted by the beautiful rolling Yorkshire countryside whilst progressing towards Malton.

AUGUST AGM

- This was held on August 13 and we welcomed Kim Richards as our new Treasurer, taking over from Colin Rose. Members thanked Colin for his sterling efforts over the past two years and wished him well for the future.
- ▶ Tallest Sunflower Horticultural Challenge: To conclude our AGM meeting the results of the latest challenge undertaken by gardening club members was announced. Of the nine sunflowers to make it to maturity, Jenny Rose's was declared the winner her superb specimen measured 319cm. In second place

was husband Colin's plant coming in at 311cm, followed by John Whitaker's sunflower measuring 272.5cm in third place. All plants are still putting on further growth at the time of writing!

▶ Flower of the Month Competition:
Throughout the club year there were four occasions when members brought along a single flower or stem from their garden and points were awarded for 1st, 2nd and 3rd places. Coral Evans was declared our winner with eight points and was presented with a trophy. In second place with four points was John Whitaker, while Margaret Halliday and Margaret Reeves tied for third place with three points.

The walk passed through Sudbrooke Park and then across fields towards Reasby Grange.



A PENSIONER REMINISCES:

I'm twiddling my thumbs here again this morning, whilst waiting for the undertaker to call (don't believe everything you read), so I thought I'd go into Google Earth at street level and look up the house where I was born, at 33 Cliffwood Avenue Extension, Birstall, Leicestershire.

Plenty of cars in the street there now, but none in 1937 when the estate was built. You'd see a big extension on the back of our old house if you took a look on the aerial view, and between our house and the row behind there is a narrow footpath, fenced each side, called the black path. It starts opposite Beechfield Avenue at the A6, and runs between housing estates, almost forlorn, past the back of our house, up to the railway line where the Main Line Steam Trust now runs a popular steam railway.

It currently operates trips between Loughborough and Leicester North (Birstall) and it was a popular steam railway when I was a lad too. Incidentally at the spot on the A6 where the path begins, I began my criminal career at about 12 years old. (Perhaps after I've gone they'll give me a blue plaque there!). I had the temerity to light an explosive device contrary to the Explosives Act.

The local Bobby spotted me lighting a 'banger' on a public street, and reported it to the authorities. Weeks later a summons dropped on the doormat, much to my mother's horror, it actually brought her to tears.

She had to accompany me to juvenile court in Leicester where three magistrates including the famous TV star-of the 50s, Lady Isobel Barnet JP, above, sat in judgement. I was fined the princely sum of five shillings (25p) and told to sin no more. On the way home I'd parted from my mum, and got caught by the truant catcher, demanding to know why I

wasn't in school! You really can't win eh? Funnily enough Lady Barnet was arrested for shoplifting many years later, but got off with a caution (*Ed: She was actually fined £75*, and died a few days later having electrocuted herself in the bath). I believe that sadly she was suffering from dementia.

Back to the footpath, which could also be accessed from our back garden. Fifty yards further up it opened onto coarse waste land, now filled in with housing, of course, and was a great place to play as a 10-year-old. People dumped their rubbish there, an interesting place to scavenge. After the War, peoples' rubbish was always picked through and was quickly recycled, so it didn't remain there long.

Unwanted prams were the prime source for making carts that could run downhill. As my mechanical skills developed, the chain, crank

ete, from an old tricycle was fitted to the cart and could thus be powered by two skinny legs. A large hole in the ground in that area served as a 'den', and was covered with a sheet or two of rusty corregated iron.

First thing to do in a den was to pull out a box of matches and light a fire. I've no idea why this activity was so important, but what else can you poke a stick into and have so much fun? Still

too young to experiment with tobacco, we would light up with wood pith, but it was horrible. With fire smoke puthering out of all the gaps, and us coughing from the smoke, older boys would detect it was occupied, and often broke up the party by banging on the tin roof with sticks, and we would scatter out of there like wood lice from under a stone.

Further up towards the railway line the scrub turned to hard ground, and we turned that into a cycle speedway track. A suitable bike was built from basic equipment. It had no brakes, no mud guards, no gears or

accessories. Just 'cow horn' wide handlebars. We raced each other round this track, sticking a leg out into the dust at the end of each straight stretch to slow it down a bit before picking up speed again on the straight stretch. How did we survive the tumbles we had?

Google Earth will finally reveal the path finishing its journey at a crossing over the railway line. After waiting for several trains to pass by and noting down their numbers in our notebooks, and making reference to information in our Ian Allen train spotting guides, we might turn our attention to something a bit more interesting. Old pennies could have their shape changed in an instant by placing them on the line before a train passed. They would be squashed flat and come out almost double the size. If you couldn't afford a penny to be

altered, the next best thing was a small stone on the line. It never seemed dangerous to us, and the stone would disintegrate into powder.

If we happened to be playing cowboys and indians, we would enjoy shooting our home-made arrows into the side of the goods vehicles, and watch them thunder into the distance as they approached Birstall railway station. No doubt the station staff would have been in fear and trembling at what awaited them down the line!

Once over the line and across the style, we were on our way to the 'willow' pond. I see now it's a harvested corn field, but then it supplied cows with grass. If you had a banger in your pocket and matches to light it (most boys did around bonfire time) it was a lot of fun to plant the banger in a cow pat and run as far as you could before it went off. I don't need to explain the result! And Mr Plod wouldn't have been anywhere near there.

Willow pond had a very bent willow tree hanging over it and we loved to fish in there for sticklebacks. Hanging over the sloping trunk

with a stick that had thread tied to it and a bent pin on the end, all you had to do was dangle the worm you'd dug out of the ground, and it was quite easy to pull them in. If you were a bit luckier it might be a newt. I wished we'd been a little more educated then about conservation. We could well finish up playing on an old rotten log that had been in the pond as long as I can remember. It served as a pirate ship, as we sat astride it, trying to get it to move, but I guess it was waterlogged, and it barely moved forward or back, but it did roll ok. Many is the time I arrived home almost soaking wet. I say almost because I would strip off to my shreddies, build another fire, and attempt to dry my clothes on the resulting bonfire. It only worked in films though, and I would get back home almost as wet as when I

began my effort, but stinking of pond weed and wood smoke.

If it was late August, the return path across the field would take us past the bramble bushes that I spoke of in last month's rendition, and the berries might end up in my knotted handkerchief.

You probably realise I'm into foraging, and it's still not too late to pick samphire on the east coast. London restaurants charge a

fortune for this seaweed, and I think it's absolutely gorgeous. It's difficult to say what it tastes like, some would say a bit like asparagus? Goes so perfectly with fish, and the stuff that comes from Israel can usually be bought at a supermarket fish counter. It's not salty and can simply be eaten raw. But there are vast beds of it north of Cleethorpes, and it won't cost you owt. The Ordnance Survey map is well marked for the samphire beds, just take one of the sea roads near Saltfleetby, park up and stroll towards the 'beach'. I don't pull the sprigs out by the roots, but take a pair of clippers to leave the roots in place, and bring it away in a bucket. Bonne appetite.
