## VICAR'S LETTER

#### The Vicarage, Langworth Tel. 01522 – 754233

The Home Group restarts on Friday 17 June at 10.30 at 36 Scothern Lane (see Diary). The Church Wardens elected at the APCM (Lyn Curtis and John Edmunds) were admitted for the coming year by the Archdeacon on 18<sup>th</sup> May. On 22<sup>nd</sup> May, the Rural Dean formally authorised Chris and Eleanor Clarke as Lay Ministers for the Parish and Benefice. After the late Easter date, the cycle of major Festivals that started in Advent is nearly complete – with just Ascension Day (2 June), Pentecost (12 June), and Trinity Sunday (19 June) lying ahead this month.

It is good from time to time to remember the "Great Cloud of Witnesses" to the Christian faith that have gone before us and who appear in what the Church calls "Lesser Festivals". In June, for example we remember :-

1 June – **Justin** (c.100 –c.165). Born of a pagan family, Justin was a philosopher and became a Martyr at Rome. Becoming a Christian at the age of thirty, he went first to Ephesus, and then to Rome, where he established a school. He wrote many works in defence of Christianity and also gave us the earliest descriptions of a baptism and a Sunday communion service. He was martyred with six others about 165 AD.

5 June - **Boniface** (c.675-754). Bishop, Missionary, and Martyr, he was born in Crediton in Devon, became a monk at Exeter and felt called to be a missionary. Going to Germany he returned in a few months shattered by the experience. However, his call would not be denied and eventually he became 'the apostle of Germany', spending the whole of his remaining life in missionary work. He was murdered by the very people whom he had gone to serve, as he sat in his tent reading. Boniface is widely revererenced in Germany, much more than in his native land, and his tomb at Fulda is a sacred shrine.

9 June – **Columba** (c.521-597), Abbot of Iona, Columba was an Irishman who became a priest and spent some fifteen years preaching and teaching in Ireland. At the age of forty-two he left and settled on the small island of Iona. From there, with his companions, he preached to the heathen Picts of Scotland and did great missionary work. He is recorded as being "loving to everyone" and "happy with the joy of the Holy Spirit."

14 June - **Basil the Great** (c.330-379) Bishop of Caesarea and Teacher of the Faith, Basil was one of a family noted for its Christian love and piety, and two of his brothers also became bishops. From this background St. Basil's Rule emerged as the model for monastic life in the Eastern Church, as it still is to-day. He had a strong practical sympathy for the poor and a merciless attitude to wealthy sinners and bureaucrats of the Roman Empire.

22 June – **Alban**. The first Christian martyr in Britain, St Alban (died c.209) was a local soldier in Verulamium who gave shelter to a priest and took his place to die in his stead. The great Abbey stands on the site of his martyrdom and St Alban's shrine stands at the heart of the Abbey today.

28 June - **Irenaeus** (c.130-c.200), was a disciple of Polycarp who was himself a disciple of the Apostle John, and was thus linked historically to the apostolic church. He moved to France and became bishop of Lyons, witnessing a cruel persecution in which he lost his life. A powerful defender of the faith, above all against the mythical, unhistorical beliefs of the Gnostics, his writings are of unique importance in promoting faith and order which are truly apostolic.

Such people, stretching across the centuries of time and facing many difficulties, are an inspiration to us who live in our modern world of short-termism and impatience. In this connection it is helpful to remember the words of Spanish nun and mystic St. Teresa of Avila (1515 – 1582) :-

"Trust in God. Let nothing disturb you, let nothing frighten you; All things pass : God never changes. Patience achieves all it strives for. He who has God finds he lacks nothing – God alone suffices."

NOTES OF THE MEETING OF SUD-BROOKE PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON THURSDAY 7<sup>TH</sup> APRIL 2011 IN THE VILLAGE HALL, SUDBROOKE

#### **138 PARISHIONERS ITEMS**

It was reported that the multi-purpose sports area required some boards repairing and the surface cleaning. The Clerk and ClIr S Curtis would obtain quotations.

A resident had reported litter around the vicinity of the shop and his contribution to the forthcoming litter pick had been to tidy that area. WLDC had been advised of the litter problem and would speak to shop owner and local schools.

Quad bikes had been using the Sudbrooke woods again and it was emphasised that reports must be made to the Police at the time of the incident.

**<u>139</u> POLICE MATTERS** – No Police Officer present

#### 140 COUNTY COUNCILLORS REPORT

Cc Sue Rawlins informed the meeting that the Highways Department were

currently looking into the gritting of estate roads in emergency situations, such as the previous winter.

#### 141 DISTRICT COUNCILLORS RE-PORT

DC Stuart Curtis stated that it may be worth considering a Village Design Statement in the future.

DC Curtis was questioned about the percentage increase shown on Council tax bills for Sudbrooke when in fact Sudbrooke's precept was reduced for the forthcoming financial year. DC Curtis explained that this was due to the District Council withdrawing a contribution to parishes but stated that he would put an explanatory note in Sudbrooke News regarding this.

#### 142 NOTES OF MEETING HELD ON 3<sup>RD</sup> MARCH 2011

These were signed as a correct record.

#### 143 REPORTS ON MATTERS OUTSTANDING

Extension of sports field lease – a Reply was awaited from Mr Paul True-love.

#### 144 SUDBROOKE NEWS

It was agreed to bring this item forward in the meeting and to suspend Standing Orders to enable a member of the public to speak on the matter.

The resident stated that he was disappointed that there did not appear to be the normal level of advertisers in the

magazine and that some companies were choosing not to advertise in Sudbrooke News. He had also made an effort to attract more advertising to the magazine and had been sending out flyers/tucking them on vehicles. However as this contained personal information of the Treasurer he was asked to cease doing this.

Members felt that the current level of advertising was sufficient and that parishioners preferred to read articles submitted. It was agreed that the matter be discussed further at a future meeting of the Parish Council. The resident was thanked for bringing the matter to the attention of members.

#### **145 HIGHWAY MATTERS**

- A Neighbourhood Watch signs replacement – Despite further correspondence regarding this matter a reply was still awaited.
- B Overhanging trees around bus shelter – a reply from the Highways Department had still not been received despite the intervention of CC Mrs Sue Rawlins.
- C Dyke clearance by millennium stone – It was reported that Councillors Bernard Bartram, Martin Dickie and Stuart Curtis had cleared the open dyke by the millennium stone to allow drainage into the brook.
- D Beech Tree Corner A resident had sent a note stating that the stones on Beech Tree corner had been put in situ by her and another resident to prevent drivers using the grass verge. This had protected the grass and the stones had now been removed.

#### 5<sup>TH</sup> MAY 2011

7 Parish Councillors had been reelected to the Council as the election had not been contested. A vacancy had also arisen with Councillor Nick James not seeking re-election. Notices were currently being displayed in notice boards advertising the vacancy of which co-option could take place at the next meeting of the Parish Council.

#### 147 REVIEW IOF RISK ASSESS-MENT

This was deferred until the next meeting.

It was agreed that the village enter the competition again this year at a cost of  $\pounds 10$  per entry.

## **Letters to the Editor**

#### **Dear Editor**

The village have been asked over a period of time by the Parish Council to come up with designs for a village sign.

I would like to bring to the attention of the village, two designs that have been submitted. They come from the Sudbrooke Woodcarving Group in consultation with the Parish Council Sub Committee that was set up to look at and present a village sign design to the Parish Council.

The first thought and idea of a village sign came from the initial Parish Plan consultation held in the village at the village hall a few year back. The village consultation revealed the desire for a village sign. The Parish Council instigated through the Parish Plan Committee investigations of the various points raised at the consultation. The village sign being one of them.

A sub committee set up by the Parish Council was formed to investigate, to seek designs, costs and then present their findings before the Parish Council. The village was asked to submit designs as was the Carving Group. So below are the two designs submitted by the Carving Group for the village to see. These proposed designs have been investigated for feasibility, suitability and also aesthetically by the Sub Committee who were pleased with the designs and were presented to the Parish Council last November.

It would be very helpful to all if as many folks as possible from the village would supply feedback about these designs, to the Parish Council and/or through a letter to the Sudbrooke News.

Some explanation of each design may be helpful. Both designs are constructed from a combination of metal and wood. Contrast of materials add distinction and individuality. Galvanised metal for the main sections for strength, durability, low maintenance and longevity. Any sign will be in place for a long time. Long lasting seasoned oak would be used for the roundels in design one and for the panel in design two. These would be carved by the Wood Carving Group. At this stage, we are looking for preference of village sign design only, imagery that would be carved on the roundels or panel would be considered after, or if one of the designs happens to be chosen by the Parish Council.

Through the Parish Plan, residents have said they value the rural environment of Sudbrooke, its trees, wild life and open spaces. We think both signs capture this in their organic form. The Carving Group with offering these designs felt Sudbrooke needs something unique that captures the imagination, something to reflect Sudbrooke's historical past,

recognises the present time and can be adapted to reflect Sudbrooke in its future.

#### Design One (Our preferred design)

The main structure of the design comes from a combination of organic natural forms and of the shape of a Roman key which references our ancient history through the discovery of a Roman villa close to the village which is still an active archaeological site.

The roundels again reflect organic origins and can be interpreted as berries or fruit. This looks to the continuance of the present and also of new growth and ongoing vibrancy. These brings together the past, present and future aspects of Sudbrooke.

This thought can be further enhanced by an in-design ability, if required and desired, to change the roundels imagery from time to time either by new carving or by bringing into use other materials such as colourful mosaics or eye catching stainless steel reflecting the changing future modes of Sudbrooke, keeping the sign fresh and forward looking.

These unique possibilities would be available with this particular contemporary sculptural design.

The village name and the word "Welcome" also appears prominently on this design.

#### Design Two


This design also comes from rural organic considerations, Galvanised metal form its main stem in a contemporary tree and branch shape which then holds a seasoned oak panel on which would be carved relevant imagery. The village name and "Welcome" would be incorporated in this design into the carved panel.

It is felt by the Carving Group, however, that this sculptural design although interesting does not quite reflect the individual and unique sculptural quality that is present with design one and which we consider Sudbrooke merits and deserves.

We do hope you like one of the designs and we would appreciate your comments and feedback.

Can I also say that there is always room for more to come and learn to carve and I extend the same invitation as Coral Evans has in her article. Do come and see and join in Sudbrooke's own community project. If you would like to know more about the designs or talk about the carving project we are doing at the moment, please give me a ring, Helen Link - 01522 595802. On July 7th the Parish Council are planning a "Meet the Council" evening at the Village Hall where these village sign designs can be seen. There will be a carving demonstration and an opportunity for people to try their hand at carving.

#### **Dear Editor**

I came across the enclosed and thought it was interesting - so others may be interested to read it also.

Prior to the demolition of Sudbrooke Hall in 1928, parts were sold off. In 1924, Robert Godfrey, the clerk of works at the Cathedral bought the Gate Lodge of the Hall. In 1927, during the sale of the contents of the Hall, Mr. Godfrey bought 2 old call bells. In 1953, he presented one of these bells complete with bracket to the Cathedral where it still hangs today at the doorway leading from the Crossing into the North Choir Aisle, the north east pillar of the central tower. It is used as a signal to visitors that the cathedral is about to close for the night and also rung when they have concerts in the Cathedral to mark the end of the intermission.

#### New Electoral Arrangements for West Lindsey

The Local Government Boundary Commission for England is an independent Body. Its main aim under the electoral review is to try to ensure electoral equality so that all Councillors in a single authority represent approximately the same number of electors in each Ward. It is proposed under the electoral review for Sudbrooke/Scothern Ward to merge with Nettleham. Personally I am not convinced that this would be for the benefit of Sudbrooke and Scothern residents for the following reasons:-

- 1. It would not provide a clearly identifiable ward boundary or reflect communication between Sudbrooke/Scothern and that of Nettleham
- 2. Sudbrooke and Scothern are very much rural Parishes similar in size wishing to retain their existing identity and character whereas Nettleham is a large settlement joining the City of Lincoln boundary
- 3. The Parish Plans for Sudbrooke and Scothern have nothing in common with those aspirations for Nettleham
- 4. With Nettleham having two ward members and Sudbrooke only one there would be no guarantee that these would be a fair distribution of benefits between the two wards

If it is necessary to merge with another adjoining Parish the obvious choice would be Langworth due to:

- a. Scothern Sudbrooke and Langworth are similar in size and have common interests
- b. Scothern Sudbrooke and Langworth are served by the same C of E Primary School
- c. Sudbrooke and Langworth Churches share the same Vicar/Rector who also works with Scothern School
- d. Sudbrooke Scothern and Langworth are all farming communities
- e. The three Parish Councils already communicate with each other on a regular basis concerning such common issues as Highways, Health, Education, Gas Storage, Public Footpaths and Planning matters

## The Old Codger...



I have always loved cricket. As a spectator, as a player, and latterly as an Umpire. One of my earliest memories as a spectator was of being taken by a favourite uncle to Lords just after the War to watch an Ashes Match against Australia. My boyhood hero Dennis Compton came in to bat and was doing rather well. At the time he was one of the very first sportsmen to be given sponsorship for advertising. His face appeared everywhere in adverts for Brylcream hairdressing which was used by most men at that time.

At Lords, such professionals were very much frowned on. Even to play cricket for money was rather looked down on and the printed programs of the day show that professional players such as Len Hutton and Dennis Compton were easily identified and distinguished from Gentlemen amateurs by having their names in the programme with their initials after their surnames, whereas gentleman players had their initials printed in front of their surnames. Talk about snobbery !!!

Anyway, it was a scorching hot day (we used to have summers like that th en) when play stopped for the drinks to be brought out for the players on the pitch. All the players gathered around the drinks trays and were busy quaffing iced water and orange squash. Suddenly, on to the pitch strode a black suited elderly man wearing a Butlers outfit and carrying a silver tray high on his shoulder. The tray held a green square shaped bottle which everyone at once recognised as a bottle of Gilbeys Gin together with a bottle of (you know who's) tonic water and two glistening glasses and a jug with ice and slices of lemon.

The butler was met halfway by Dennis Compton and on arrival the Butler at once poured out a Gin and Tonic which Compton drank at once and then held up his empty glass towards the nursery end of the terraces which held ticket paying peasants like us who had risen to a man and begun to applaud what was to us, a very funny interlude. The Butler then strode off the pitch towards the Members Gallery where he was promptly escorted inside by two burly policemen. Compton went on after the drinks break to score 50. However, the next day the newspapers revealed that he had been fined by the MCC the sum of £100, which in those days was a colossal amount as players were only paid £10 a day for representing England in a 5 day test match. He was also dropped for a couple of matches. Compton and his brother Leslie both played football for England and Arsenal. His flamboyant style of batting made him a great crowd pleaser. He was the Botham, Peterson or Flintoff of his day.

A few years ago I was at Trent bridge watching England play the West Indies in a Test match. I was seated with my son and a friend in the very front row of the stands. A very young, fresh faced Brian Lara, who, at about 5 foot 3 inches looked every bit a schoolboy, was playing his first match for the West Indies. (He was later to go on to Captain The West Indian Team and break all batting records but at that time was a virtual unknown to English spectators ). He was sent to field on the boundary directly in front of where we were seated.

Suddenly there was a break in play as one of the English batsman was receiving treatment after a particularly aggressive piece of bowling by one of the West Indian fast bowlers had laid him low. In front of me several young autograph hunters with their programs, pens and autograph books had collected and in the break Lara was signing and speaking briefly to the lads. At the end of the queue with her book and pen was a little girl aged about 6 or 7 years. Lara took her book and I heard him say to her "Do you like pussy cats ?' The girl nodded shyly and Lara spent a few moments with the book and pen in his hand and then with a great big West Indian grin handed it back to her just as the players were starting to resume their positions ready for play to begin. The little girl turned to rejoin her Daddy seated a few seats away from us and proudly showed us her book on which Lara had drawn a Cat, complete with eyes, face, whiskers and tail and underneath had written "Brian Lara". Not one of those scribbled slurred daubs that one so often sees stars scrawling for fans who are eagerly collecting what purports to be their autographs on TV. I could clearly read his name and see the lovely cat drawing. That must be that little girl, and her fathers, most proud possession. It must now be worth a fortune on E bay. Not that I think they would ever dream of selling it. I know I wouldn't !! What a lovely fellow !! It made our day to see such a human touch from someone who went on to become one of the worlds greatest batsmen of all time .

Do any of you remember the calypso songs that the West Indians used to sing on the radio in the 1950s. "Clicket, Lovely Clicket " (No it's not a a spelling mistake, that's what it sounded like ). There was also another very good one. "Those two friends of mine, Ramadin and Valentine " which extolled the virtues of two spin bowlers who routed the England Team in the 50's. When I go to Heaven I hope they play cricket up there !!

## How's That !! .... THE OLD CODGER



Hello and welcome to my garden.

One more survivor of last winter has been discovered - the Eucalyptus which looked dead, and was cut down to ground level, has now thrown up shoots which I will allow to grow to about 3ft high, and then pinch out the tops to form a shrub.

Last month I mentioned that the dreadful Mares Tail weed was very active and I was trying a flame gun to tame it, but the weed was growing faster than I could burn it off, I am therefore trying a new plan on a badly affected area. I have removed the gravel, laid down a heavy plastic sheet, pinned this down and replaced the gravel. I am hoping that this will help to tame this most persistent weed. I will keep you informed of the results.

The wall baskets fronting the property have now been planted up with a mixture of bedding plants. Once the wind drops they will take care of themselves. The greenhouse is nearly empty, all the vegetable and bedding plants having been moved out into the cold frames to harden off, only seedlings and stock plants remaining. In the polytunnel tomato and cucumber are growing well, and I am also growing carrots and beetroot in there. I am hoping that the carrots can stay in the ground longer, and also avoid the carrot root fly. I will let you know if this has worked, later in the year.

Watering of the plants in the polytunnel is done by automatic irrigation, which means that mains pressure is supplied to the site. This then goes through a reducer to low pressure small bore pipes to the plants. Another victim of last winter was the pressure reducer which I failed to check before using it. When I turned the water supply on at the stop cock, water at full pressure was flying around inside the polytunnel. I am glad I wasn't in there at the time. A new reducer has been fitted, and all is well.

There are now twenty three plants flowering in the garden, of which eighteen different species are on the rockery. A clump of lupins is doing particularly well in the border, having started to bloom much earlier than usual. The rockery is looking very colourful, with white, red, orange and yellow flowers with blue campanula about to bloom. The fastest growing plant in the garden is the Golden Hop which we have on the pergola. This plant grows rapidly from ground level to the top of the pergola, and is now growing across the top. The first roses are in bloom, with clematis climbing amongst them.

Weeds of course still need constant attention on the pathways, and ground elder in the border, so plenty to keep me busy. Farewell for now, and happy gardening.  $\widehat{\mathbb{G}}$

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## **Welton Family Health Centre**

#### JUNE 2011

We are regularly approached by patients moving house asking if they can remain on the Practice list at their new address. Sometimes this is possible if they are moving within the defined Practice area ( which covers most of the surrounding villages including Dunholme, Scothern, Sudbrooke, Langworth, Nettleham, Faldingworth, Scampton and various hamlets in between) but when the new address is further afield we frequently have to ask patients to register with a local Practice. We fully appreciate patients are often reluctant to change doctors, particularly if they have been with the same practice for several years and empathise totally with their position and therefore this situation can often be difficult. Many patients assure us that they have their own transport and would never call a doctor out to visit them, but obviously none of us know when or if our own situation may change. In order to provide a full and safe service to our patients we, in line with all other GP practices, have to restrict registrations to an area that we know we can service consistently and appropriately. We are also aware that there may be moves afoot by the government to change the present arrangements and introduce new rules which may give patients more choice of GP, irrespective of address, but as yet this is not legislation and we have no guidance as to how this would be operated.

If you move house please check with us if we are able to continue to provide medical services to your new address. If not, NHS Lincolnshire can provide details of the local GP service and may be contacted on 01522 513355.

Following on from last months report, the amount collected in sponsorship for Dr Barton running the Lincoln 10k is four hundred and twenty one pounds to date. This is an excellent achievement and has been passed on to our Patient Group and will be used to help support the care and comfort of patients in our Practice.

Finally, a reminder that authorised repeat medication requests may be made in person, via post, by answer phone (24/7) or by email allowing two working days to process the request. Please remember to allow sufficient time to cover bank holidays and help us by not putting in urgent requests which slow the system considerably. Thank you.

## **VERA MURDOCH**

# This month saw the passing of one of Sudbrooke's oldest residents, Vera Murdoch, just one month short of her 94th birthday.

Vera was born in Old Bollingbroke and lived much of her life in Wragby where her father, Master Builder, Sid Leggate, ran a successful building firm employing around twenty men. Mr Leggate was responsible for building a great many of the more substantial properties in Wragby.

Vera worked all her working life as a nurse and was extremely fond and proud of her vocation, taking particular pride in her appearance. Her work took her all over the country, with a great deal of time spent caring for the mentally handicapped. For many years she worked at Rampton Mental Hospital and would cycle home 30 miles every weekend to Wragby and then later to Sudbrooke where she moved to in 1951. Her husband Jim Murdoch was an iron worker by trade working as a fettler at Smiths Iron Factory in Lincoln. Vera's husband predeceased her by 12 years.

Vera and her husband were keen cyclists and toured around the country covering many hundreds of miles at a time. They were enthusiastic members of several cycling clubs. Vera was a keen sportswoman and excelled at swimming which she kept up almost all her life.

One of her proudest achievements, in her mid 80's, was to swim a distance of 1500 metres to raise money for charity. The certificate awarded to her that day was always displayed on the wall of her home in Wragby Road with the many cups and medals she won for other sports events together with numerous cups and rosettes awarded to her for horticultural achievements connected with her beloved garden.

Vera was a frequent correspondent to Sudbrooke News and few months went by without a letter about some subject in Sudbrooke that interested her. She played an active role in the planning and raising of money for the building of the Village Hall.

Not a lady to be trifled with, she had ideas about how she thought things should be done properly and wasn't afraid of challenging anyone in authority whom appeared to her to be negligent.

Her funeral at Wragby Methodist Church, where she had worshipped for many years, was attended by over 100 people who were led by her son Barry and his sister Julie.
