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Vicar's Letter

September sees schools and colleges return, and the Autumn approaches. For many it will be a new start in their lives – moving on to secondary school or moving from school to university. Do please remember these young people in your prayers as they experience these new adventures on their journey into life.

On Friday 9th September at 6.00 p.m., Stainton by Langworth Parish will be holding a "Dance in the Barn" at Manor Farm, Stainton. The theme is "Western" (cowboys and cowgirls), the 'famous Bowser Brothers' have a Hog Roast, and there is live music, a licensed bar, dancing, a raffle, and "kid's games". Tickets cost £10 – including the Hog Roast and the entertainment : under 12's £5 and family Ticket £25. All proceeds will be shared between the Air Ambulance and St. John the Baptist church. More information (and ticket reservations) can be obtained by telephoning 0742 – 3438421.

Recent events in a number of areas of the country, and the rehearsing of the 10 Commandments in our Book of Common Prayer service on the Sunday following, set my mind thinking as to how the 10 Commandments, like the Lord's Prayer, were a while ago well known and part of the fabric of our national life. They were instructed to almost all youngsters in the country, but knowledge of them has faded in our modern society. For instance, ask yourself if you can confidently list them in the right order. A few years ago, the religious correspondent of a national broadsheet newspaper, when he listed them in a front page article, left one out. The next morning, he was the ex-religious correspondent !

In one sense, Jesus distilled the essence of the Commandments to just two – Love God and Love your Neighbour, but these are somewhat abstract and are short on detail. He assumed, correctly, that his audience at the time would already know the earlier 10 – the first four of which deal with our duty to God, and the last six with our duty to our 'Neighbours' in society. However, it seems that these duties need to be spelt out in a more concrete form. There is a little variation in the Ten Commandments, as there are two lists of them in the Old Testament, but a fair modern rendering of them, I think, would be along the lines of :-

1. I am God : I must always come first in your life. You shall have no other Gods but me.
2. Don't let any other person or thing take God's place in your life – and become your Idol.
3. You shall not dishonour the Name of God.

4. Worship God and rest on Sunday : Remember the Lord's Day.
5. Honour your Father and your Mother : love and respect your family.
6. You shall not Murder.
7. You shall not commit Adultery : don't interfere in other people's marriages.
8. You shall not steal.
9. You shall not give false evidence : no lying or malicious gossip.
10. Don't envy other people and what they may have : you shall not set your heart (coveting) on anything that belongs to your neighbour.

Literally and appropriately, Number 10 is the 'bottom line' of the Commandments : you really cannot break any of the others without you breaking this one – be you an individual, an organisation or, indeed, a country.

If people had these commandments - "God's Blueprint for Living" - etched in their minds and on their hearts, it would be a better (and happier) world to live in today.

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Parish Council Minutes June 2011

NOTES OF THE MEETING OF SUDBROOKE PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON THURSDAY 2ND JUNE 2011 IN THE VILLAGE HALL, SUDBROOKE

19 PARISHIONERS ITEMS

Street light No 1 on Windsor Close not working. Clerk will report.

A report was made of smashed bottles around the entrance to the woods from West Drive. It was noted that the Police have stated that they will be increasing patrols in this area.

A request had been made by a resident of West Drive for the silver birch trees in the vicinity of Beech tree corner to be cut back in order to allow more room for growth of the copper beech tree. It was agreed that this be an agenda item for the next meeting of the Parish Council.

The West Drive sign usually sited near to 'The Cedars' had disappeared. A request for a replacement would be made to WLDC.

It was brought to the attention of the meeting that there is no Main Drive street nameplate. Although it was accepted that this would be useful to visitors/delivery drivers it was pointed

out that as West Drive is a private road the provision of a street nameplate lies with the residents of that road.

20 POLICE MATTERS

PC Donnah Thompson had notified the Clerk that due to increased issues in Sudbrooke Woods with 'off road' bikes, large gatherings of youths, criminal damage etc the area would become one of the Neighbourhood Policing Priorities once again. It was stressed that if incidents occurred residents should ring 999 or 0300 111 0300 at the time of the event.

A letter had also been received from the Deputy Chief Constable stating that the Police budget in Lincolnshire would be reduced by 16% or £19m over the next four years. The letter explained the changes that were required to be made.

21 DISTRICT COUNCILLORS REPORT

DC Stuart Curtis reported further on the suggested electoral boundary changes for the district in that a meeting had been held between local District Councillors. At the meeting it had been further agreed that Sudbrooke should be within the same electoral boundary as Langworth and that this should continue to be re-iterated to the Commission.

DC Curtis also explained intentions to relax planning laws when converting from commercial to residential.

22 NOTES OF MEETING HELD ON 11th MAY 2011

Amendment:- No 12 – To read 'Now completed'.

Save for the above amendment the notes were signed as a correct record.

23 REPORTS ON MATTERS OUTSTANDING

a) Overhanging trees around bus shelter – This matter was now resolved.

b) Parish Paths Partnership – It was agreed that there did not appear to be any work required through the Parish Paths Partnership. However some of the finger posts did need re-aligning and the Clerk would ask the Footpaths Officer at the County Council to check these and re-align where necessary.

The Clerk would also check with the Editor of Sudbrooke News regarding the printing of the footpath maps in the magazine for the use of residents.

c) Sports Fun Day - Arrangements were in hand for the Sports Fun Day to be held on 10th July 2011. Parish Council members present would be Paul Rignall and Stuart Curtis. The £250 precepted for the event would be required as sponsors had not been forthcoming.

d) Meet the Council evening – 8th July 2011 - It is hoped that that this evening will prove to be a good social event giving residents an opportunity to meet members

of the Parish Council and County Councillor Sue Rawlins. The Kurling equipment will be available for a game, representatives of the Sudbrooke Dig will bring along some unearthened artefacts. The Clerk and Treasurer will organise refreshments and were allocated a budget of £25.

e) Extension of sports field lease – Nothing further to report.

f) Suggestion of planting trees on verge between Greenway/ Holme Drive – Councillor Ian Russell would have a closer look at the size of the verge and make suggestions of appropriate trees to be purchased.

g) Weed spraying in village – Members ratified the actions of the Chairman and Clerk in arranging for the weed spraying of the area between Holme Drive into Northfield Park and the area around the millennium stone. The cost for three treatments being £75 per annum.

h) Neighbourhood Watch Signs – Councillor Martin Dickie would contact Police Headquarters with a view to the Parish Council purchasing some in order that the current faded signs could be replaced.

i) Speed Limit Signs – Scothern Lane – The signs for the extended speed limit along Scothern Lane were currently being sited ready for implementation on 24th June 2011.

j) Bus shelter – Opposite Park Gates –

The parish owned bus shelter opposite the Park Gates, Wragby Road was reported as being in need of some repair. It was agreed that repairs be arranged.

- k) **Information sign – Sudbrooke Park Gates** – Councillor Mrs Lyn Etheridge agreed to clean the sign.

Reply from the Chairman, Sudbrooke Parish Council

Dear resident - thank you for your comments and I would like this opportunity to reply.

I think it is unfair to blame the Parish Council as you state. I would like to point out that the Parish Council has in fact the younger generation very much in mind and already has in place various facilities including a tennis court, (the court has been resurfaced but still appears to be only used infrequently), playing fields both behind and adjacent to the village hall, children's play areas in two locations (which have to be maintained in accordance with strict regulations).

The village hall is already utilised for kick boxing and any responsible adult can organise any other functions at this venue appealing to any generation, within reason, using these facilities at very reasonable cost. The Parish Council has also recently looked into the feasibility of providing a skate park (although no-one came forward to assist with grant funding) and currently sponsors the village Sports Day. We organise litter picking days to keep the village neat and tidy, prune small trees where we can and have planted lots of spring flowering bulbs around the village, so please do not criticise our efforts too much. The Parish Council believe it is only a few young people who are tainting the reputation of others and we have to react to this accordingly in conjunction with the police.

Perhaps more people should come along to our meetings and hear exactly what we are trying achieve for Sudbrooke. Remember all Councillors are unpaid volunteers who give up their valuable time to help develop Sudbrooke as a community to be proud of. So what can you do to help? Did you come to our informal "Meet the Council" evening and discuss with us your views and ideas?

SELF SERVICE - UPDATE

The response from our customers to the new self-service machines, and shelving layout, at Nettleham Library has been generally positive; although we do appreciate that the change isn't everybody's preferred option. These have been big changes for all of us to adapt to – don't forget that we are still available to help, give advice or simply to chat to.

We have listened to feedback on all our changes from customers and, where we can act on suggestions ourselves, we have: for example: realigning some shelf units to make it easier for customers to follow the fiction sequence, and increasing the space around the study table and large print section for easier accessibility. We have also introduced shelf signage throughout fiction to subdivide this large section into smaller A – Z chunks to aid locating authors. We also plan to do something similar throughout non-fiction to allow for quicker identification of individual subject areas. Other feedback which we can't address ourselves is passed to senior colleagues.

Please remember to always have your library card with you as the self service kiosks can't be used without one. Don't forget that the machines do NOT automatically renew your books for you – the staff can show you how to do this. We also recommend that you always obtain a printout receipt as we no longer date stamp the books – this printout tells you what you have on loan and when each item is due back.

We now use a computerized booking system for when you want to use a computer. This means that you can phone the telephone number above even when we are closed, and our colleagues in the call centre will be able to book you a computer at the library. You will need a library card in order to be able to use the public computers, as well as a PIN number which staff can give you (this takes 24 hours to become active).

1. Who Else writes Like?

Lincolnshire Libraries have recently subscribed to the online version of Who else writes like...? For many years we had a hardcopy book version to help customers find new authors to read but now you can go to our website and click on the relevant link.

The online version has much more going for it than the old book format:

- ◆ It is continually updated
- ◆ has many more authors than the hardcopy version we had
- ◆ All are linked with up to 16 other authors who write in a similar way
- ◆ With the click of a mouse users can:
 - browse the list of authors by genre (crime, adventure, historical, chick lit etc)
 - search for characters they write about (Miss Marple, D I Frost, Wallander, Tilly Trotter, Bridget Jones)
 - seek environments (Sweden, NE England, 'Midsomer Worthy', Botswana) within a novel or
 - look for occupations (journalist, pathologist, actor, PI) of characters
 - explore lists of prize-winning authors and titles, which are updated as winners are announced - most recently The Booker Prize and the Crime Writers' Association awards, and
 - view authors considered to be 'cross-over authors' – adult fiction authors some of whose material is suitable for young adults – to encourage teenage readers

The Old Codger.....



As I totter around the village with my dog looking for a seat or even a low wall to rest on (there does seem to be a shortage of these around the village) I can't help noticing inside the open garage doors of houses, how very many sets of golf clubs are inside. Almost every garage has the obligatory golf bag inside complete with a full set of clubs and often a trolley. Has the world gone golf mad ?

I can't understand the fascination myself !!Cricket is a far better game. If you hit the ball a long way in cricket ... someone else has to run and find and fetch the ball. In golf you have to do it yourself. In golf the ball is often stood up on a peg when driving off to make it easier to hit. In cricket the ball is flying at you at about 80 miles an hour and if you miss hitting it the result can often be painful and is very likely to make your participation in the game a very brief affair.

Golf is so easy !! I have watched it on TV.!!

The hole is so wide, the players very rarely miss putting the ball in the hole. I have seen some nice smiley little coloured American chap called "Tigger ", or some such daft name. He never ever seems to miss the hole so it can't be that hard. It would be a much more challenging game if the hole was the same size as the ball, that would really be a challenge !! Another thing you might notice is that golfers tend to fib sometimes . When they hit the ball very hard and it goes a long way they cry out...." FOUR " Anyone who plays cricket would tell you that that shot would never have reached the boundary, so why try to pretend otherwise just to make other people look up and see what a fine shot they have played. I notice these things !!!

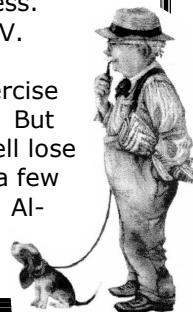

They were having to play on what appeared to be a disused and abandoned building site. All bumps and hillocks and abandoned sand pits with bushes and gorse and long grass all over the place. Most of the time when driving

off you could only just see the top of the flag they were aiming for over the uneven ground. Someone must have bought that course really cheaply it was in such a state. Just think they could have had a really nice level and flat couple of fields in Lincolnshire to play on at half the price and had lovely sunny weather as well. Then they could truthfully say that it was a LINC (Links) Course.

I knew they were hard up for money because I noticed that they couldn't even afford a proper trophy as a prize for the winner. They had to award him an old battered Claret Jug that they had probably bought from a charity shop or a car boot sale. You could even see that it had been inscribed with a lot of names on it which of course made it worth much less. (They tell you that on Antiques Road Show). I know, I watch TV.

In the front garden the hemerocallus (day lily) gave a wonderful show but has now finished and are starting to die back; first signs of autumn. Other plants such as Hydrangea, Lobelia cardinalis and Michaelmas daisies are giving a late summer show. The lawn has been re-laid which is a big improvement. All it needs now is a top dressing with a fine soil to remove any blemishes.

The vegetable plot is full with leeks, carrots, beetroots and radishes. The onions are finished and lifted and in the poly tunnel tomatoes have cropped very well. The variety is Shirley; full of flavour and with a soft skin. The cucumbers are still cropping well and will do so until the cold weather arrives. The house faces south and one part of the garden looks over to Wales where mountains can be seen in the distance. We will be visiting National Trust and other properties while we are here. 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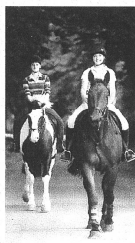
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Sudbrooke Gardening Club

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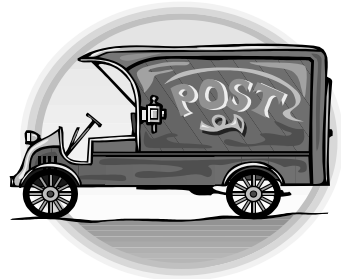
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Dear Old Codger

It all began when King Edward V11 advised Conningsby Charles Sibthorpe to invest in Krupps, the German armaments manufacturer. They were paying good rates to their shareholders in the early years of the 20 Century. At the start of the First World War contact with them ceased and the money was lost. This brought about the sale of Sudbrooke Holme Estate enabling Ernest Terah Hooley to purchase large amounts (or all ?) of Sudbrooke Holme.

Terah Hooley endeavoured to increase his money by selling parts of the Estate, land and buildings to more than one person. By this I mean the same land and buildings. The buyers of course soon realised they had been swindled and Hooley was summoned by the courts. Apparently on his way to the courts he attempted to cover his fraud by destroying the deeds to the land and buildings. People were left not knowing who owned what.

My own home was built in the late 19th Century but the deeds to my purchase of the property are dated 1928!

Deeds seem to have been made up and therefore land boundaries were not clearly defined.

This has lead to continuing confusion ever since. Human nature being what it is, some have attempted to possess land that was not theirs. They were led into temptation by not having defined boundaries. This situation goes on for years. Even local authorities seem to have passed on unreliable information regarding road, bridleways and footpaths resulting in many court cases causing much misery. All is well if we are happy to live on the bit we own but when another feels they have a right to it much unhappiness is caused.

This is Hooley's legacy!

Vaccination is available for patients who fit one of the criteria listed

- ◆ Have Chronic Respiratory Disease (including Asthma when regularly using an inhaled steroid)
- ◆ Have Chronic Liver Disease
- ◆ Have Chronic Renal Disease
- ◆ Have Diabetes
- ◆ Have Suppressed Immune Systems
- ◆ Are a Carer
- ◆ Have Multiple Sclerosis
- ◆ Currently pregnant

Please contact either surgery from the middle of September to book an appointment in one of the flu clinics. There is no need to wait until you receive a letter. If you fit into one of the criteria listed above, please contact the surgery to make an appointment.

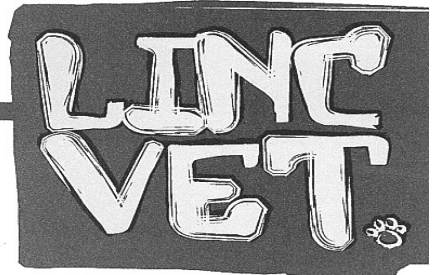
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Welton Family Health Centre

We have had a few incidents recently where young children have been sent in to our dispensary to collect medication for parents etc. Whilst wishing to appear reasonable, we need written consent from the person concerned if they want a young person to collect on their behalf and then only if over 14 years old. We reserve the right to check at any time if we are unsure about handing over the prescription.

We are hoping to get our first delivery of this years influenza vaccinations at the end of September for those in the " at risk " groups These are: all patients aged over 65 years, all those aged 6 months and over in a clinical risk group, carers, chronic respiratory disease, heart disease, kidney, liver, diabetic or with chronic neurological disease, immunosuppressed (or household contacts of immunocompromised individuals) aged six months and over, all pregnant women, people living in long stay residential or care facilities. Other patients may be able to receive the vaccine on the NHS if the medical practitioner deems appropriate.

We cannot offer the vaccine on a private basis to our own registered patients but are happy to do so for patients registered with Nettleham, with whom we have a reciprocal arrangement, assuming sufficient supplies are made available to us. The World Health Organisation has advised that for 2011/12 the vaccination composes an A/California/7/2009(H1N1)-like virus + an A/Perth/16/2009 (H3N2)-like virus +a B/Brisbane/60/2008-like virus. Please do not wait to be called in if you are in the at risk groups – appointments will be available as soon as the supplies are received.

We have been disappointed to learn that some patients have been abusing the Surgerypod machine in our waiting room. This machine allows patients to record certain personal information about themselves which is then transmitted to their medical records without the need to see a doctor or nurse. It has just come to light that over the last few months some patients have been entering inappropriate and incorrect information about themselves and others which could obviously lead to problems in the future if undetected. Could parents please watch their children whilst in the waiting room and ensure that they do not try and use the machine and we would appreciate it if anyone would report anyone seen to be messing around with the machine.

The results of the recent patient survey have now been published and will be available shortly on our website. Whilst we have scored well on most indicators it may be worth offering a reminder on a few points:

The surgery is open from 8.30am – 8.00pm Monday to Wednesday and 8.30am to 6.30pm Thursday and Friday. We do NOT close for lunch and our dispensary is also open daily from 8.30 – 6.30pm.

Appointments with the doctors are offered in different ways – usually one third of appointments are booked on the day, one third are booked up to forty eight hours in advance and the remainder up to four weeks ahead. In addition we have an open access surgery which runs from 11.00 – noon daily for anyone who wishes to be seen by a doctor and appointments available most days with our Nurse Practitioner. Dr Barton reduced his commitment in the Practice last year and now works four sessions per week, usually on a Monday and Tuesday but Dr Nellist has been employed to work for six sessions so no appointment time has been lost as a result of this change.

We are pleased to receive unused returned medication which is **in date** for transporting to South Africa via Intercare. However, if your medicines are out of date please dispose of them by taking to the nearest chemist, they should not be flushed down the toilet or put into regular refuse bins. Since we started supporting this scheme we have sent 100kgs of medicines via Intercare for use in South Africa.

January 2001

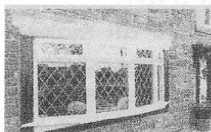
March 1992
