

#### Remembrance

Over the past few decades there has been an increasing interest and awareness of all things "Celtic" – be they musical, historical, cultural or religious : including Celtic Christianity. Lindisfarne (Holy Island) in Northumbria and Iona of the end of the tip of Mull are popular pilgrimage and retreat destination.

The Celtic Church was one of the earliest in the British Isles. Christianity does not seem to have taken a deep root during the period of Roman occupation. It appears to have been confined largely to Roman colonists and those Britons who had adopted Roman attitudes and customs and not to have made much impact on the bulk of the indigenous Celtic population. When the Romans left in the early fifth century, much of England seems to have reverted to paganism although some pockets of Christian belief and observance may have survived.

Whether those living in the Celtic fringes of Britain first I came into contact with the Christian religion through the Romans or via some independent source is difficult to establish. Tertullian of Carthage (in North Africa), writing around the year 210, refers to "regions of the Britons inaccessible to the Romans but subject to Christ"

Whatever its source, the Christian faith of the Celtic peoples of Ireland, Scotland and Wales was certainly vigorous enough to have a considerable impact well beyond the shores of Britain when the Romans departed at the beginning of the fifth century. As Teutonic tribes overran the rest of Europe, including most of England which experienced its first Saxon invasion in 428, and brought a return to barbarism and paganism, the Celtic lands on the western extremity of the Continent alone retained their culture and faith. They quickly became a haven for Christians fleeing from the Continent in the face of these barbarian hordes and this must have further strengthened their position as strongholds of the faith.

Christian recovery in the south of England began with 597 Augustine's mission from Rome to England (the south). Inevitably the two Christian 'understandings' would meet to try and resolve differences in their approach. The Council of Whitby in 664 resulted in the future dominance of the Church of Rome rather than the Celtic across Britain: Rome was better organised and resourced – they rode on horses to the Whitby meeting; the Celtic Christians walked! ....? orthodox allegiance & influence...? dates of split

News of the distinctive principles and practices of the churches in the eastern Mediterranean, including the idea of monasticism, may have reached the British Isles directly and not just via Gaul. There are a number of fascinating similari-

ties between the Celtic Christianity which developed in the far west of Europe from the fifth century and the older church communities on the eastern edge of Christendom.

There are many interesting concepts in the Celtic Christian tradition. Until recently, access to source documents and writings of the tradition have been restricted generally to academics in universities. Now, with the publication of Mary C. Earle's "Celtic Christian Spirituality" (subtitled "Essential writings) a wider audience can be reached. The Celtic Christians beheld the world around them and perceived the divine life of God upholding every aspect of the material universe. Their prayers and poems, their liturgies and their theological texts give Christians a sense of a faith that is confident in a merciful and infinitely creative, healing God. The primary texts from the Celtic Christian tradition are presented in the book – with selections from the writings of Pelagius, Eriugena and St Patrick, as well as prayers and poems from Wales, the Outer Hebrides and Ireland.

The price of this valuable book to our understanding of our own native Christian heritage is priced at £9-99 (RRP), but is available by post from "A Great Read" at £8-49 (Tel.01373 - 823451).

#### **52 PARISHIONERS ITEMS**

It was noted that the sign indicating 'West Drive' normally sited near to 'The Cedars', had been missing for some time. This would be reported to WLDC for replacement.

It was also noted that footpath finger signs were either broken or missing in that area and Cllr Ian Russell agreed to take this matter up with the Footpaths Officer at Lincolnshire County Council.

PCSO Jackie Parker reported as follows:-

Overall appearance and condition - small amount of litter, no graffiti or vandalism observed. Roads and paths well maintained. Several driveways in need of weeding.

Green spaces - Football field in good condition. Secure children's playground behind the village hall. Little obvious provision for wildlife seen. Jubilee Garden project - a credit to the village.

Public premises - Village Hall well maintained. Notices displayed were clear and included BKV competition poster. There was a very useful village map. The Jubilee Garden notice board was very informative. Sudbrooke Park Gates and information in good order – well maintained paths and hedges to entrance.

Private premises - These varied in standard of care. With some being outstanding and others being in need of some attention.

Religious buildings - The newer section of the churchyard to the rear of the church was well maintained. The older graves to the front and adjacent to the road are in need of attention.

**Notice board** is clear and displays BKV poster.

#### Dear Householder

With the end of British Summertime and the clocks changing consider the advice below, to make your home less attractive to the opportunist criminal.


The PDA would like to give a huge thank you to everyone who supported this event or who helped in any way. Without our supporters and helpers we couldn't make an event like this possible so thank you!

#### **Great October Storm of 1987**

The day started well. I was lying in bed. Then I got up, and it went downhill from there. The date was Friday 15th October 1987. I was living and working at that time in North West London long before I returned to my roots and moved back to live in Sudbrooke. You may recall the date. It was when the weather forecaster for the BBC Michael

Fish made the biggest gaff of his life by announcing that the weather would be reasonably calm and dry with the odd shower and light winds. The reality was far from that. It turned out to be the date of The Great Storm. It was when a hurricane hit South East England causing terrible damage to property and brought down hundreds of trees, walls and fences providing loads of columns for newspapers TV and radio and many books have been written about it. Here is my story of how it affected me personally .

I was a shift worker and was working late in the West End of Central London, finishing work at two am. Towards the end of my shift it became clear that this was not going to be just any normal old night. The wind got up and was extremely strong and with savage strong gusts of enormous power which was literally bowling pedestrians off their feet. Dustbins and roof tiles were flying around with clouds of newspaper, leaves and full bags of rubbish and bundles of cardboard, together with torn off branches from trees and bushes. As I drove home along Park Lane in Mayfair I had to swerve around several huge fully grown trees that had fallen across the road. Most of these were hundreds of years old. Torn up by the roots. What few cars were about at this time of day were swerving about both from the gusty conditions and to avoid debris on the roads. It was quite a job to hold my vehicle on course as I headed home and I was greatly relieved when finally I arrived there.

It so happened that my wife was away for a few days visiting relatives at this time so I was in charge of the house and alone that weekend. I was relieved to see that no apparent damage had been caused to my home as the full force of the storm had not fully reached that far north at that time as my home was some twelve miles from the West End. I turned on the radio and it was full of reports about this storm creating devastation in South East England. It was with that knowledge that I retired to bed and being extremely tired after work and the drive home I fell asleep at about 4am. Despite the crashing and bashing outside and the roar of the wind and teeming rain, lashing against the windows. I soon nodded off. I have

always been a heavy sleeper and it takes a lot to disturb me once I have gone into deep sleep.

I woke at around 8am with my front doorbell ringing loudly. The curtains were still drawn and I opened my front door to suddenly see the following scene. It takes quite a time to describe this scene. But you, Dear Reader, will have to bear with me as I explain. My house was on a hill and had 4 steps leading up to the front door so that on opening my door I had a panoramic view over the scene outside. The house stood on a main road but with a wide service road between the house and that main road. This service road was separated from traffic by a wide strip of bushes grass and a row of very large mature trees. It was bright sunshine outside and there was no wind and no rain .

The scene that met my eyes was truly amazing. Across my driveway and garden a massive 4 feet wide trunk of a huge oak tree was lying with part of it lying on top of my neighbours pride and joy a Mercedes sports car. It had missed my car but completely blocked it in with no damage. Several of the branches had struck the house next door and the debris was lying all around. The roof and front of the house next door was ripped open.

On the main road in front of my house there was water spurting some ten feet up in the air and landing all around. Red London buses were crawling past and there were blue, yellow and green flashing lights from Police, Gas, Electricity and Emergency and Council vehicles flashing away merrily. It was a scene of utter devastation with huge great roots from the trees sticking up in the air in the road having to be negotiated by the traffic. All this greeted me at a glance as I opened my door.

Suddenly a voice said "Morning Guv!. That'll be four pounds eighty please." I looked down and before me saw. It was the milkman.!! In all that mayhem here was sanity. He had obviously been making his way along the street conducting his normal routine and because he had taken it all in already it must have seemed perfectly normal and reasonable to get on with his job. Talk about putting it in context. Life goes on whatever happens. But I will never forget that scene on that morning.

Keep smiling.!. But don't tell anyone what you are smiling about! That'll keep them guessing!! Life should be fun !!

To quote that little rabbit in the old newsreel "Loony Tune" cartoons. "That's all folks!"

## Hi Folks, This month:

Building Your
Own PC-1

I guess the first

question you'll be asking is: why would you want to build your own PC? There are 2 answers I can provide. Firstly, you want to know how all the components connect and work together inside the case—this may be a curiosity thing or it might be an educational or vocational need. Secondly, there is a great sense of satisfaction when you power-up the PC for the first time and everything works as you expect. However, even if it doesn't work first time, the subsequent diagnosis and rectification of the fault provides an even greater sense of accomplishment when the PC does eventually burst into life.

When you've made the decision to build your own PC, you need to decide upon a budget and try to stick to it. The PC will be more expensive to build than buy but there are good reasons to go this way. You'll know exactly what went into the PC's case and how it all connects together and therefore, you'll be able to diagnose a faulty component fairly quickly. Also, a PC you buy with a manufacturers badge possibly means that it contains proprietary components that may be difficult to source and/or expensive to buy if the need for

replacement arises. However, some components in these systems can be replaced by generic items.

In this series of articles, I'm going to cover the build of a standard PC for family use. To start, you need to create a list of the components you need to buy along with their prices and you should place them in order of importance. Researching the Internet will ensure the components you buy will be at the best price and will fit together physically. For instance, will the hard drive or processor you buy connect to the system board? Also, beware of using parts from an old system. The hard drive in your 5 year old Dell might have an IDE connection but the new system board you buy might only have SATA connections. These are all considerations that you have to take into account.
