

----- September 2014 ---

Abridged notes of the monthly meeting of Sudbrooke Parish Council held on Thursday 4 September in Sudbooke Village Hall. The full set of notes are on the parish website or can be viewed in hard copy in Nettleham Library.

Councillors Peter Heath (Chair), Martin Dickie, Paul Rignall, Mrs Lyn Etheridge, Stuart Curtis, Ian Russell, Mrs C Myers (Clerk), Mrs B Solly (Treasurer), one resident.

——— 39) Open Forum for Parishioners ——

■ It was reported that there appeared to be a water leak in the highway on Holme Drive. The Clerk would report this to Anglian Water.

The public footpath from Sudbrooke to Scothern appeared to be overgrown. The Clerk would contact Veolia regarding this, the footpath being on the contract for cutting.

——— 40) Police Matters —

a) Report received from Police as follows:

August 17 - Alleged motorcycle in Sudbrooke woods, of which there was no trace when officers arrived.

August 24 - Male reported for drinking on Holme Drive; Police have spoken to the male. It was noted that there was no reference to the report of the vandalism to the play equipment on the village hall site reported on August 19.

b) Suggestion of cctv equipment at Village Hall: This was discussed due to the vandalism occurring at the Village Hall. The decision for the installation would be by the Village Hall Committee. However Councillor Martin Dickie offered to obtain some quotations from Security companies for further consideration.

Proposed by Councillor Paul Rignall, seconded by Councillor Peter Heath and Resolved; that Councillor Dickie seek quotations for cctv equipment at the Village Hall.

——— 41) District Councillor's Report —

■ DC Stuart Curtis stated that the Central Lincs Planning Committee had approved the draft local plan.

He also stated that there were new plans submitted for a non-motorised road bridge in conjunction with the Lincoln eastern bypass.

———— 43) Report on Matters Outstanding ————

- **a) Tennis Court upgrading:** This had now been completed.

 Resolved That Councillor Stuart Curtis hold one set of keys to the tennis net box for casual users and that one set be passed to the resident who had originally requested the tennis court be upgraded with a view to forming a tennis club.
- b) Application for grant for wildflower seeds for Jubilee Garden through Lincolnshire County Council Community Wildlife Grant: Cllr Ian Russell reported that he had had a site meeting with the Wildlife Officer of LCC and agreed the types of wildflowers most suited to the conditions of the locality.
- c) Best Kept Village Competition judge's comments: These had been favourable with the village proceeding through to the second round. The comments had been printed in **Sudbrooke News**.
- **d) Grass cutting in village:** Councillor Bob Waller had met the Contracts Manager from Veolia and discussed problems with the grass cutting.
- e) Highway matters:
- i) Community Speed watch Passive and Reactive Sign trial offer of passive signs/ purchase of licence agreement with Lincolnshire Road Safety Partnership and consideration of purchase of reactive device: This was discussed in depth and felt that any passive signs would be ignored by motorists and that it would be of more benefit if a Police speed check were carried out. Resolved: To request that the Police carry out a speed check in the village.
- ii) Archer Survey, West Drive: The Highways Department had agreed to carry out this survey.
- **iii) Condition of footpath outside 3 & 5 Greenway:** The poor condition of this area of footway was highlighted in particular with it being a bus stop. The Clerk to report this to LCC Highways.
- 44) replacement of Bus Shelter opposite Park gates through LCC Grant Scheme -
- A grant of up to £3,000 had been offered to the Parish Council for the replacement of the bus shelter opposite the Park Gates. A price had been obtained from Knights at Langworth for the removal and disposal of the current shelter and erection of a replacement shelter in the sum of £2,990. It had been confirmed by LCC that additional quotations were not required as this figure was under the amount allocated for the grant.

Proposed by Councillor Peter Heath, seconded by Councillor Mrs Lyn Etheridge and Resolved that the above grant be accepted from LCC and Knights of Langworth produce the new bus shelter.

45) Park Gates cleaning

■ The condition of the Park Gates necessitated some cleaning off of the algae in order to maintain them. The Clerk was asked to obtain a price for power washing.

46) Cutting of Footpaths through Woods area

■ It was noted that these paths had not been cut this year. The Clerk was asked to take this matter up with the Footpaths Officer, LCC.

Mention was also made that a walk of the village footpaths could be resumed next summer.

———— 47) Training Courses for Councillors and Clerks ———

Councillor Heath would also attend the Planning/Highways Workshop at Gainsborough on September 11.

48) Purchase of Christmas Tree for Switching-On of Lights

■ **Resolved:** That the Christmas tree be ordered and that a switch on event be scheduled for Sunday November 30, 2014.

——— 49) Consideration of Daffodil Bulbs —

■ Infilling of daffodils was required on Scothern Lane. Councillor Stuart Curtis offered to plant. Proposed by Councillor I Russell, seconded by Councillor M Dickie and **Resolved:**That £20 is spent on daffodil bulbs.

——— 50) Review of Risk Assessment ————

■ The Treasurer had highlighted some points for consideration and these would be circulated in order to discuss further at the next month's meeting of the Parish Council.

— 51) District Councillor's Initiative Grant – Proposed New Noticeboard —

Councillor Peter Heath drew attention to the safety of the servicing of the noticeboard on the corner of Wragby Road. It was also noted that its condition was deteriorating. **Resolved:** That this noticeboard should be removed from its current location.

DC Stuart Curtis had offered £500 towards the purchase of a new board from the District Councillor's Initiative Fund. A new board could be purchased from Pelican Trust to the same style as the frame containing the map of Sudbrooke and sited in the Jubilee Garden. The current noticeboard at the Jubilee Garden is moved to the Park Gates.

The Clerk would apply for funds for the difference in cost from other sources.

Resolved: That if grants were approved an order could be placed.

52) Planning —

- a) Notice of felling licence application O 017/165/14-15: Hallbrooke Hall Farm Old Hall Wood.
- **b) TPO Work 28 Scothern Lane and 43 Wragby Road:** Cllr I Russell had viewed the proposed work and considered it in order.

Proposed by Cllr Peter Heath, seconded by Councillor Paul Rignall. **Resolved:** That the Parish Council raises no objections to the TPO work in b) above.

c) Permission - 4 Chestnut Close: 131200 - first floor extension over garage.

———— 53) Planning... continued ————

■ d) Land at Poachers Lane/Church Lane: The permission for this development was subject to a Section 106 agreement being agreed between the developers (Truelove) and the Parish Council.

Proposed by Councillor Martin Dickie, seconded by Councillor Paul Rignall and **Resolved:** That the commuted sum payable under the agreement for future maintenance of the hedge should allow for up to two cuts per year (index linked) but that before the matter proceeds the Parish Council solicitors should obtain an undertaking from the Applicant (Truelove) that the hedge would be cut to no more than one metre in height and that the applicant would be responsible for the Parish Councils legal costs.

- **e) LCC Planning applications receipt by email:** Members had no objections to the Clerk receiving these by email and printing off for circulation in the normal manner.
- 54) Chairman's Correspondence and any other items for next meeting -
- The Chair reported on an alleged planning breach which had been forwarded to the Enforcement Officer, WLDC.

It was noted that further damage had been carried out to the log barrel in the play area on the Village Hall site with all the bolts being removed. This would be reported to the Police. Councillor Paul Rignall and Mr Dave Etheridge would undertake repairs.

——— 55) Correspondence —

■ a) The Openness of Local Government Bodies Regulations 2014: These Regulations came into force on August 6, 2014 giving the public and press new rights to film and report council meetings, using digital and social media and to transmit any recordings widely adding their own commentary if required afterwards, including on the internet. (Oral reporting or commentary during the meeting itself is prohibited under the Regulations, if the person making the recording is actually present at the meeting).

It was noted that Standing Orders needed to be amended to incorporate this regulation and that this would be incorporated in to the new Standing Orders which were currently being reviewed.

b) Notice of LALC AGM; October 15, 2014: This was brought to members' attention.

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Brief report of meeting held on October 2, 2014

■ CONSULTATION ON LOCAL PLAN: Residents are welcome to come along to the November Parish Council meeting and give their views/suggestions for the Local Plan. The Open Forum for Parishioners can be extended to half an hour to give residents an opportunity to have their views known. The Parish Council has to make its comments by mid November so NOW IS THE TIME!

Police Report:

Sep 3: Dog mess was smeared on the front door of a property on Windsor Close. Sep 3: A suspicious male was reported calling from door to door asking for charity donations.

Sep 14: A male was seen drinking in the Northfield Avenue area, he was spoken to and moved on. Sep 28: There was a reported smell of cannabis near the woods, the area was searche, but there was no trace or smell.

Noticeboard:

The grant for the new noticeboard has been approved for replacing the one in the Jubilee Garden.

Wild flowers:

A grant has also been obtained for plants for a wildflower area in the Jubilee Garden. The local Scouts have offered some help in planting. It will be interesting to see the results next year.

Replacement of bus shelter:

Another grant obtained for a new bus shelter at the Park Gates - to be made by Knights of Langworth.

■ Treating of carvings in Jubilee Garden:

Thanks were extended to Coral Evans, Leader of the Carving Group for organising the treating of the wood carvings.

Cycle path - Church Lane/Nettleham Lane:

The draft 106 agreement between Truelove Developments and the Parish Council was approved by the Parish Council. This will provide a cycle path to the parish boundary on Nettleham Lane. If approval is given for 75 homes on Sudbrooke Lane Nettleham the cycle path will be continued to Nettleham.

The Parish Council are asking Nettleham Parish Council to request that additional passing bays are provided if the development is to go ahead.

■ Precept 2015/16:

The Parish Council will be setting the budget for the next financial year at its meeting in December. Residents are welcome to make any suggestions that come to mind with regard to expenditure.



OCTOBER MEETING =

■ Marvin Liddel gave a fascinating talk about bees and honey production.

Marvin has three hives and uses Buckfast

Abbey bees because of their superior foraging abilities.

The hives are a standard national design and each hive costs approximately £200

Marvin demonstrated a hive construction and explained the function of each component part.

He covered the hive hierarchy starting with the queen who typically produces between one and two thousand eggs per day. Next are the drones, between 300 and 500 of

them and finally the worker bees who number between 60,000 and 80,000.

Bee keeping is not without its challenges, particularly from the Veroa mite. Because bees

are now imported on a large scale, new challenges are emerging such as the Asian hornet and the small hive beetle.

Marvin covered the reasons why bees swarm and recounted his recent experiences around Dunholme.

Members took the opportunity to buy Marvin's honey and beeswax candles.

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IDENTIFYING BRITISH VALUES

VALUE ADDED SOCIETY?

Whether we call our society 'broken' or 'sick' or 'fragmented' or 'alienated', what we do currently have is a general feeling of dis-enfranchisement amongst certain, if not all sections of the population. In other words, we lack a sense of 'belongingness'.

We hear much from politicians who try to promote the idea of social cohesion via various party slogans which without a set of values to underpin them become meaningless 'soundbites'.

Firstly, we had the Tory notion of 'Big Society' which failed to engage the public. This was followed by Labour who promoted the notion of 'One Nation'.

More recently, as we approach the 2015 General Election, the politicians of both major parties are trying to seduce us with a single value of 'togetherness'. ("We are all in this together" from the Tories, and 51 mentions of the word 'together' in Ed Miliband's recent Conference speech).

The fast-emerging UKIP talks of 'traditional values' and argues that "UKIP strength is more about values than policy" yet these values are hard to locate, being implied at this stage rather than specified.

Consequently, it might be helpful to take a step back, and try to establish a commonly agreed set of 'British Values' to which all sections of society could subscribe, whatever their social, ethnic, cultural, political, or religious background.

Values are a set of recognised/accepted moral standards which underpin conduct by a person, group or institution. In other words, values are made meaningful, not by what you say, but by what you do.

It is no use identifying a set of common values if we do not 'live them out'. The

following list identifies 33 core values that could possibly form the basis for such a set of societal values: accountability, advocacy, charity, commitment, common-sense, compassion, decency, democracy, duty, faithfulness, freedom, gallantry, governance, harmony, honesty, hospitality, humility, inclusiveness, industriousness, integrity, justice, mercy, modernity, preservation, resilience, respectfulness, restraint, rights, security, service, tolerance, transparency, unity.

If such a set of commonly agreed values were in place, then it may be that the following benefits would accrue:

- Act as a re-vitalisation tool for our society, giving us all fresh hope for the future.
- Create social harmony, by providing a strong base which would inform and underpin everything we believe, or say or do, in all areas of society and for all members of society (law-making Parliamentarians, policy-makers (Central and Local Government), public service delivery standards (Central and Local Government), ethical practices and standards in the workplace (commercial and industrial), international relations, community involvement, family life, social relationships, individual living, education.
- Help people to see the reasons why they should participate in the 'Big Society OR 'One Nation' A common purpose based on shared values (even if people do not want, or are unable to participate, then they might still endorse such a set of shared values as a 'way of 'living together').
- Help in the formation of a British Bill of Rights (if required).

In response to the letter from Paul Davies in last month's edition of the **Sudbrooke News**, I have recently spoken to a Rights of Way officer at the County Council in relation to the Parish Council's application in December 2012 to register a number of paths through Sudbrooke Woods as public rights of way.

The application is currently 139th on the priority list of 155 rights of way applications, and the County Council is only progressing 14 of

these at the moment. You therefore do not have to be a skilled mathematician to work out that it will be many years before the Parish Council's application is progressed.

If residents are dismayed by this state of affairs they should contact any of our parish councillors and/or our County Councillor, Sue Rawlins, to see if pressure can be put to bear on the County Council in order for the application to be moved up the priority list.

Dear Editor,

In response to the letter in last month's **Sudbrooke News** from Paul Davies I can confirm that the application for registration of the footpaths within Sudbrooke Park on the definitive map is now number 139 out of 154 in the County Councils list of priorities.

According to the Footpaths Officer, no work will be done on the case until it is its turn to be worked on or is subsequently reprioritised.

With regard to future use of the claimed routes, the public are not legally entitled to

continue to use the disputed routes until such time that public rights are found to exist on one or more of them.

The landowner is therefore entitled to prevent further use (other than on those previously registered) since no public rights are currently recorded on the Definitive Map.

Having personally walked the footpaths all my life I can fully understand the concerns of local residents.

A LETTER FROM BISHOP CHRISTOPHER —

■ This year's time of remembrance is particularly poignant, given that it is the centenary of the dreadful tragic events of the First World War.

By the end of the war a million British men were dead, and two million more had been wounded. There was not a single family

unacquainted with grief, nor a corner of life unaffected.

Many of us have become familiar with the story of Amy Beechey, a mother from Lincoln who saw eight sons go to war, and only three return. We can only imagine her grief; but every day of the war, her pain was known and understood by grieving relatives in households all over England.

The horror of the trenches, the scale of the slaughter, the tragic loss of so much human potential - all these things meant that long-held notions of an all-powerful God began

to be questioned. Put simply: If God is loving and all-powerful, how could evil be allowed to flourish on this devastating scale? And why would we continue to trust in a God seemingly indifferent to our fate?

One person who wrestled with these questions was Geoffrey Studdert Kennedy, an army chaplain who earned the nickname Woodbine Willie for handing out cigarettes to the troops at the same time as copies of the New Testament. Woodbine Willie insisted on

being on the front line with the troops whenever he could, and those battlefield experiences forced him to confront depths of evil and suffering which few of us will ever see.

Having entered the war with a secure faith in God and an abstract notion of evil, he ended it being absolutely certain of the existence of evil as a real and palpable force at work in the

world.

The challenge, then, was to find a way to reconcile all that he had seen in the trenches with the existence of a God who was worth believing in.

For Woodbine Willie, hope came with an understanding that God was no longer a remote and detached figure at the peak of a great social pyramid.


No longer was God the almighty force of his pre-war understanding, able to prevent humans from harming one another if he so chose.

Instead, God was present in the heat of battle, suffering along with humanity, in the

intolerable conditions of the trenches, in the endless slaughter of young lives, in the agony of Amy Beechey and all those like her back home.

God was characterised not by force and power, but by love; no longer remote from all that was going on, but intimately connected with it and suffering through it.

Writing in 1918, he said this: "God loves us enough to bear our burdens and suffer along with us: the destruction of war will not have

WHO ARE THEY? -

"Life Story" is the Creasey family band, who perform the music of The Shadows – plus a smattering of 50's rock'n'roll. While not a "tribute band" (we like to "do our own thing" from time-to-time, and the real Shadows still have their own hair!) we work quite hard to re-create the Shadows sound.

Peter and Paul played in various bands "back in the day", but the two brothers had always enjoyed the music of The Shadows, and included some of their tunes in their gigs. Family, mortgages and work pressures intervened, and by the 1980's most of their musical activities were but happy memories.

Trips to Shadows concerts kept the flame alive and the brothers became aware of an internet-based community of Shadows fans, and a network of Shadows guitar clubs around the country. A visit to a nearby club a dozenor-so years ago sealed their fate, and the germ of an idea for a family Shadows-style band was formed.

Peter dusted-off his trusty Fender Stratocaster and Paul bought himself a 1970s Premier Drum Kit.

Paul's son, Dave, had been "messing about with guitars" for some years, but hadn't really been "going anywhere".

Peter's daughter, Charlotte, had been showing interest in music, and was keen to develop her Keyboard skills.

Peter's wife (and Charlotte's mother), Kim, agreed to learn bass guitar literally from scratch, and the embryo "Life Story" was born!

Taking the name "Life Story" seemed appropriate as it was one of The Shadows last album titles and, as the band comprises two

generations of the Creasey family, it has been literally a life's work to bring it together.

Initial rehearsals took place "far from easily offended ears" at a farm on the outskirts of Saxilby, followed by "proper" gigs as far afield as Northwich, Chester le Street, Worksop, Barnsley, Nottingham and Lincoln Drill Hall.

We now rehearse regularly at High Green,

Sheffield, and play at community and charitable functions around the East Midlands and the north of England.

The members of "Life Story" are (in descending order of decrepitude!):


- Paul Creasey, living in Sudbrooke, plays Drums and is a retired training manager.

"Life Story" is a strictly amateur (but certainly not "amateurish"!) band who are pleased to perform without charge for charitable and community organisations.



FIREWORKS CODE FOR ADULTS

- Keep fireworks in a closed box.
- Follow the instructions on each firework.
- Light them at arm's length, using a taper.
- Stand well back.
- Never go near a firework that has been lit, even if it hasn't gone off, it could still explode.

Never put fireworks in your pocket or throw them.

Always supervise children around fireworks.

Light sparklers one at a time and wear gloves.

Never give sparklers to a child under five.

Keep pets indoors.

On't set off noisy fireworks late at night and never after 11pm.
