■ 150 MATTERS OUTSTANDING

▶ Village Sign: Nothing further to report.
▶ CCTV, Village Hall: Works required to housing cupboard/replacement of broken camera. The Village Hall Management Committee had been approached for permission to move the door of the cupboard housing the CCTV, this would be discussed at a future meeting of the Committee.

It was noted that the recent servicing of the equipment had revealed a broken lens on a camera of which replacement/repair had been quoted at £125.00. Unanimously Resolved that the repair be carried out.

▶ General Data Protection Regulations – further information received: An update from LALC confirmed that they would continue to keep member Councils informed of the new Regulations.

■ 151 HIGHWAY MATTERS

- ▶ To consider agreement with LCC re grass cutting 2018 season: Unanimously Resolved that Sudbrooke Parish Council enter into agreement with LCC Highways as in previous years for grass cutting in the parish and receive an allowance of £458.00.
- Lincolnshire Coastal Highway Engagement session on January 16: Unanimously Resolved that Sudbrooke not be represented.
- ▶ Highway works, Church Lane: It was noted that some patching work had been carried out along the Lane nearer to Nettleham but that no repairs had been carried out near to Sudbrooke.

Unanimously Resolved that a letter be written to LC Highways asking that pressure be put on Anglian Water to instigate effective repairs to the road.

■ 152 TO CONSIDER NAMING OF NEW SPORTSFIELD, SCOTHERN LANE

Members considered the naming of the new sportsfield on Scothern Lane, and that as the late Councillor Stuart Curtis had assisted in gaining the land, provided grant funds for the goalposts and assisted with their siting that a fitting tribute would be to name the new sportsfield 'The Stuart Curtis Memorial Sports Park'. Unanimously Resolved.

- ▶ Application 137177 3 Beech Close. single storey extension: Unanimously Resolved No objections.
- Application 137168 Land west of 91 Wragby Road, Sudbrooke: Approval of reserved matters (access, appearance, landscaping, layout and scale) for erection of six dwellings, following outline planning permission 132795 granted 15 February 2016.

Sudbrooke Parish Council have viewed this application and note that there are protected trees on this site. There

appears to be no mention of how these will be managed and how the impact will be mitigated eg Arborist/Landscape Plan. Unanimously Resolved.



SUMMARY OF PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON FEBRUARY 1, 2018

PARISHIONERS ITEMS

▶ A resident had reported that vehicles were continually parking on grass verges in the village, making it difficult for users of wheelchairs to pass and also churning up the verges. It was pointed out that the Police had been informed on previous occasions, but that adequate space should be left for pedestrians to pass on the footway.

■ POLICE MATTERS

▶ Report received of incidents in the village as follows:

January 12 - Courtfield Close - Sus Circs: Female reporting that two males have come to the house claiming to be investigating a gas leak - all in order when checked.

January 12 - Wragby Road - Transport hazard: Report of a vehicle swerving all over the road

January 16 - Church Lane - Transport hazard: Report of dangerous driving and parking by parents after school.

January 21 - Wragby Road - PSW Wildlife: Report of three shetland ponies in a field with the gate to the road wide open.(This is perhaps more Langworth)

January 23 - Transport RTC (road traffic collision) - damage only: Ambulance has hit a deer which is in the middle of the road deceased.

FLYTIPPING

Flytipping is a very anti-social, potentially dangerous and disgusting practice. There is no need for it. However, some people make money from it.

It can be difficult for the Council to get waste removed, especially if it is on private land. If the landowner does not live near the land or has sublet it, they are sometimes reluctant to pay to have it removed.

If you discover fly-tipped waste:

- Do not touch the waste: fly-tipped waste can be dangerous - it may contain syringes, broken glass, asbestos, toxic chemicals or other hazardous substances.
- Visually inspect the waste: try to determine what the waste consists of and how much there is. Note the contents.
- Take note of its exact location: and also whether it is in or near water.

• Do not disturb the site: there may be evidence that could be used to bring as prosecution.

I have spoken and sent photographs to the Nettleham District Councillors regarding the fly tipping on Church Lane/Sudbrooke Lane as it comes under their jurisdiction. I will continue to monitor this.

POTHOLES

I thought it might be useful to publish the guidelines on the repair of potholes. Pothole repairs and road surfaces are the responsibility of the County Council

The county's highways are routinely inspected for faults, including potholes, by the County

Council but West Lindsey District Council also rely on the public to report them.

All reports are assessed quickly and response times for potholes are prioritised by size, location and type of road. To find timescales for inspections and repairs, download the Highways Asset Management Plan.

Temporary repairs are sometimes required to make a pothole safe. These are carried out when:

• Wet or icy conditions would prevent a full repair bonding to the road

• Its location means a full repair requires temporary traffic lights or a road closure

• There is an underlying problem with the road which cannot be fixed immediately

• Potholes not considered to be a danger will be included in current or future planned works programmes.

The County Council are only potentially liable for damage to vehicles or personal injury if we have been negligent, contravening Section 58 of the Highways Act 1980. If you wish to submit an insurance claim, call 01522 782070.

custom. Since we last had a shop we have all chosen to shop else where for our daily needs, but please support the shop if you can, and think of the health advantages of walking to our village shop rather than jumping in the car and going elsewhere.

JOBS FOR MARCH

If the warmer spring days entice you outdoors there is of course lots of jobs to be done around the garden, including planting summer flowering bulbs, shallots and onion sets; setting early potatoes; lifting and dividing overgrown clumps of perennials as well as moving snowdrops whilst they are 'in the green'; top dress patio containers with fresh compost and plant some pot-grown primroses in them as their early flowers can support bees roused from hibernation.

If possible, try and avoid turning over the contents of your compost heap until midspring as it could be sheltering hibernating frogs, small mammals and insects.


■ FEBRUARY WALK

The following is a reply from the Department of Transport to a villager who got in touch with them about the thorny subject of cars parked on paths within the village....

PARKING ON PAVEMENTS

Dear Resident,

Thank you for your email of 30 August 2017 to the Department of Transport (DfT) about cars parking on the pavements and the issue of obstruction. Your email was passed to Traffic and Technology Division and I have been asked to reply. The DfT understands your concerns about drivers who drive and park their vehicles on the pavement or kerb, obstructing pedestrian access. You have also raised a question about advice given to Blue Badge holders on where they shouldn't park.

The Government recognises the importance of making the local environment convenient, safe and attractive to walk in, and of keeping pavements in good order. However, in some streets pavement parking may be inevitable to maintain free passage of traffic.

In London, there is in general a ban on parking on the pavement (or footway), whilst in the rest of England there is no such prohibition. However, local authorities outside London have wide-ranging powers, under the

Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984, to make Traffic Regulation Orders (TROs) to prohibit footway parking on designated lengths of highway or over a wide area. The DfT has issued guidance to local authorities about doing this.

Any ban needs to be appropriately signed so that motorists are aware that the restriction is in operation. We have also removed the requirement for individual sign authorisation for local authorities in such cases, making it simpler and easier for them to implement such bans.

In many areas the local authority has obtained Civil Parking Enforcement powers which, in place of criminal proceedings by the Police for their breach, enable Civil Enforcement Officers to enforce footway parking bans on designated highways by issuing Penalty Charge Notices.

It is important that local authorities are able to decide on local parking restrictions themselves and they clearly need to consider all road users when taking such decisions.

Enforcement of the law relating to dangerous or obstructive parking is a matter for the Police. It is for them to decide whether an obstruction is being caused based on the circumstances in which the vehicle is parked.

You mention the Blue Badge Scheme Rights and Responsibilities leaflet. This booklet sets out our guidance on safe and responsible parking and explains that having a badge is not a licence to park anywhere. However, there are certain situations in which it is permissible for a Blue Badge holder (or other motorist) to park on the footway.

It is a matter for local authorities to decide whether to ban or allow pavement parking so you may wish to contact Lincolnshire County Council for further information.

A PENSIONER REMINISCES

As I sit here with nothing to do but contemplate my naval, my thoughts naturally turn to pockets! The things that we have in our trousers.

What did little boys of yesteryear put in them? Today they're being replaced by man bags (heaven forbid) or not being used at all, as boys today only seem to carry a phone in one hand, and a bottle of water in the other.

To digress, why do people carry a bottle of water with them? Is it a fear that they might suddenly die of thirst, or get overcome with a burning desire to waterboard someone.

As a boy growing up in the 40s, the only time we drank water was from the tap (the chrome thing above the kitchen sink) at meal times, or maybe if your school had a fountain, you pushed a button and took a swig from the faucet (a posh American word).

Before the 1970s they hadn't invented the idea of buying the stuff in bottles, but now they dig it out of the ground from what they call a spring, charge the earth ('scuse the pun) for it (more than a bottle of milk) and put a 'best before' date on it! It's been in the ground for a million years for goodness sake, and someone decides it's getting to it's sell by date!! If it's past it's best-beforedate, what will you do, tip it down the sink, right next to the tap that you could have got it from in the first place?

My home-made catapult was probably for weekend use only. Made from a tree branch, and

using aeroplane elastic, and a leather pouch from an old pair of shoes. Too big to go in the pocket, and too obvious sticking out the back one, it may have been the only thing carried in the hand.

The marbles carried for entertainment made useful ammo, but rather expensive, we would normally use stones from the railway track.

Talking of the railway, weekend fun was got from making a bow and arrows. Fashioned from local trees, the arrows were fitted with nails on the end, with plaster-scene to hold in place.

Fired into the wooden trucks, they would arrive at our village station looking like the result of an attack by Indians.

LENT



A TALE OF TWO LANCS

An illustrated talk about the Battle of Britain Memorial Flight Lancaster and that at East Kirkby - with personal tales and recollections of the experience of flying and taxying these fantastic machines.

Mike Chatterton's father, John, served in WW2 as a pilot of a Lancaster Bomber. He survived his tour of operations with 44 (Rhodesia) squadron, flying out of RAF Dunholme Lodge, and then became an instructor on Lancasters.

After the war, John went back to his full time occupation as a farmer, farming near Horncastle in Lincolnshire.

Son Mike also joined the RAF. He initially flew the Avro Shackleton, then onto the Nimrod aircraft.

Mike eventually became captain of the BBMF Lancaster at Coningsby. During this time, Mike flew many commemorative events for the start and end of WW2. He piloted PA474 during the poppy drop on The Mall in London, for the 50th anniversary of D Day, and celebrations of the Dambusters attack.

He also flew PA474 with his father John, alongside him, the only father and son team to do so.

Mike can still be seen at the controls of a Lancaster, when he performs taxi runs of Just Jane at East Kirkby Aviation Heritage Centre.

His talk is complemented with many interesting photos, video clips and history of the Lancaster Bomber, as well as the ongoing recovery of a crashed Lancaster in Scotland.
