

PARISH COUNCIL MINUTES

October 2014

Abridged notes of the monthly meeting of Sudbrooke Parish Council held on Thursday 2 October in Sudbooke Village Hall. The full set of notes are on the parish website or can be viewed in hard copy in Nettleham Library.

—— 87) Open Forum for Parishioners ——

■ A resident present expressed thanks to the Parish Council and its staff for their continuing work for the village.

A report was made of potholes on Elm Drive, near to the shop and on Ellison Close. The Clerk would report these to highways.

Councillors Paul Rignall, Mrs Lyn Etheridge, Bob Waller, Miss Rose Dobbs and Stuart Curtis declared an interest in item 4b - cctv at Village Hall.

——— 89) Police Matters —

Report received as follows:

03/09/2014: Dog mess was smeared on the front door of a property on Windsor Close. 03/09/2014: A suspicious male was reported calling from door to door asking for charity donations. 14/09/2014: A male was seen drinking in the Northfield Avenue area, he was spoken to and moved on. 28/09/2014: There was a reported smell of cannabis near the woods, the area was searched, but there was no trace or smell.

90) County Councillor's Report

CC Sue Rawlins gave an update on the finances at Lincolnshire County Council.

She also stated that the consultations on the Local Plan were taking places in various venues around the area and encouraged residents to make their views known.

91) District Councillor's Report

DC Stuart Curtis stated that the emptying of green bins would continue until the end of November. DC Curtis pointed out the importance of the Local Plan which when adopted would be in place for the next 30 years.

It was unanimously Resolved: That the Public Forum item on the agenda for the Parish Council meeting on November 6 is extended to half an hour, if required, to enable residents to make their views about the proposals for the Local Plan known to the Parish Council.

PARISH COUNCIL MINUTES

——— 93) Report on Matters Outstanding ———

a) Standing Orders: The new Standing Orders had been prepared by Councillors Bob Waller, Stuart Curtis and the Clerk and circulated to all members for perusal.

Following discussion and slight alterations it was proposed by Councillor Ian Russell, seconded by Councillor Martin Dickie and RESOLVED: That the Standing Orders be adopted for Sudbrooke Parish Council.

- **b)** Risk Assessment: Deferred until next meeting.
- c) Grass cutting in village: Councillor Bob Waller had met with the contracts manager of Veolia and discussed the possible weed treatment of the grass verges in the village. The cost of the treatment would be in the region of £1000.

Proposed by Councillor Martin Dickie, seconded by Councillor Ian Russell and **RESOLVED**: That members assess the verges and the item be discussed again at the Parish Council meeting on November 6.

d) Cleaning of Park Gates: No quotation had been received for pressure washing the gates but on further assessment it was considered that if they were washed painting would also be required.

Following discussion it was proposed by Councillor Bob Waller, seconded by Councillor Martin Dickie and **RESOLVED** That the gates not be pressure washed but that monies be budgeted in the next precept for their painting.

- **e)** Cutting of footpaths through woods area: A discussion was held into the cutting of the three public footpaths within the village of Sudbrooke:-
- From West Drive to the oilfields at Scothern to be cut 4 times per year
- From the Balancing ponds towards the Stone bridge and onto Main Drive also to be cut 4 times per year.
- Balancing ponds to metal bridge to be cut four times per year.

It was felt that to bring the cutting/management under Parish Council control would be more beneficial than the County Council's current two cuts per year.

Proposed M Dickie, Seconded Councillor Ian Russell and **RESOLVED**: That the Parish Council apply to the Parish Paths Partnership for the funding for cutting the footpaths.

- f) Notice boards update: The Clerk reported that confirmation of the grant for the new notice board had been received. Further to minute 51 of the Parish Council meeting held on September 4, 2014 an order for the new board had now been placed.
- **g) Planting of wildflowers in Jubilee Garden:** Cllr Ian Russell reported that the plug plants had arrived. The local Scouts Leader had offered assistance in planting as a project for the scouts.

- h) Highway Matters:
- i. Request for Archer Survey, West Drive: LCC Highways had confirmed that this would be carried out ASAP.
 - ii. Footpath outside 3 & 5 Greenway: Patching had been carried out in this area.
- **iii. Replacement of bus shelter opposite Park Gates:** The construction of the new bus shelter was progressing and that Knights hoped to erect it within the next 6 weeks.
- i) Suggestion of CCTV cameras for Village Hall: Councillor Martin Dickie had obtained quotations for CCTV installation at the Village Hall in the sums of a) £1245.00 and b) £2590.00.

Members favoured quotation a) and would seek the views of the Village Hall Committee with the suggestion that the Parish Council and the Village Hall Committee each contribute 50 per cent of the cost.

Proposed by Councillor I Russell, seconded by Councillor Martine Dickie and Resolved as above.

94) Annual play equipment report

■ The Annual RoSPA Report had been received and passed to the Play Equipment Inspector for comment.

It was noted that some shrinkage had occurred to the surface under some of the equipment on Northfield Park. The Clerk had taken action and contacted the installer to assess and rectify the problem.

————— 96) Planning Matters —

■ **Residential development Poachers Lane:** Cllr Stuart Curtis went through the draft Section 106 Agreement and fully explained the covenants to be complied with by the landowner, County Council and Parish Council.

The draft was approved and Members also agreed to the proposed commuted sum for the future maintenance of the hedge in Nettleham Lane.

————— 97) Chairman's Report —

■ The Chair stated that Mrs Coral Evans had kindly arranged the treating of all the wood carvings on the Jubilee Garden. Proposed by Councillor Stuart Curtis, seconded by Miss Rose Dobbs and **RESOLVED** that the Clerk write a note of appreciation and thanks to Mrs Evans.

The Chair also asked members to give thought to the budget for next year and any items that would need to precepted for. The Clerk was also asked to mention this to residents in her report of the meeting in **Sudbrooke News**.

Members **RESOLVED** to move into closed session to discuss this item.

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Brief report of meeting held on November 6, 2014

Six Councillors were present, along with the Clerk, Treasurer and four members of the public.

■ **Preliminary Draft Local Plan:** This was discussed and residents advised that the closing date for comments was November 11. The Parish Council resolved to make the following comments on the draft plan for Sudbrooke:

'By unanimous decision, Sudbrooke Parish Council wish the Parish of Sudbrooke to remain in Group 5 (Small Villages) of the Settlement Hierarchy (Policy LP2).

In addition, the Parish Council wish to register the existing woodlands and lakes in Sudbrooke Park as Local Green Spaces under Policy LP25. (If necessary a suitable plan of these areas can be made available).'

- Offer of seats to the village: A resident kindly offered one or two seats to the village if locations for siting them could be decided. The Council decided to put a request to residents for suggestions. If you have an ideas of where a seat would be useful please let any Parish Councillor know or contact the Clerk on myespc94@gmail.com or ring 01522 750531.
- **Police Report:** It was reported that Sudbrooke had been very quiet this last month, with only one incident being reported an RTC on Wragby Road.

It was noted however that Nettleham's Mulsanne Park had had incidents of graffiti on the Sports pavilion brickwork.

- **Planting of wildflowers in Jubilee Garden:** Assistance for the planting of 700 plug plants had been given by the 25th Lincoln (Scothern) Scout Group and thanks extended to the Group.
- **CCTV equipment at Village Hall:** The Village Hall Committee had stated that they were not in favour of the installation of a CCTV system at the Hall, but the Chair of the Committee agreed to a site meeting for further explanation of the benefits it could bring.
- **Replacement of bus shelter opposite Park Gates:** This has now been completed and really is a great improvement to the previous shelter and at no cost to the parish.
- Archer Survey, West Drive: The survey had been taken from 23-29 September 2014 and appeared to show that the majority of the vehicles using the road were keeping to the speed limit or near to it and that only a small percentage were commercial/HGV's.
- **DATE OF NEXT MEETING:** Thursday 4 December 2014. All residents welcome.

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LOVE AT CHRISTMAS TIME

LOVE AT CHRISTMAS TIME =

For many people, Christmas is a time of love. We express this love in many ways, whether in the form of family get-togethers, exchanging gifts, workplace parties, sharing meals with friends, sending greetings cards, or even by making monetary donations to charities for those people who are experiencing difficult times. Each in our own way believes that we know the true meaning of love - but do we? What exactly is love? The experts have declared that there exist seven types of love. These are as follows:

Eros (Erotic love)

A physical, passionate, emotional and romantic love filled with sensual desire and longing

pure beauty and intimate love without the balance of logic. It does not necessarily have to be sexual in nature. It can also be an appreciation of beauty itself in its various forms (eg) nature, art etc.

Storge (natural affection - unconditional love)

This is usually the slowly-emerging natural affectionate love, acceptance and tolerance (unconditional love), of others, via familiarity, similarity, family membership, friendship, brotherly-sisterly love, or people who have otherwise found themselves together by chance.

It is present without consent or coercion. and is also emotive because it is the result of fondness due to familiarity, and most widely diffused because it pays least attention to those characteristics deemed 'valuable' or 'worthy of love', and as a result is able to transcend most discriminating factors. Affection includes both need-love and gift-love. Can go bad via jealousy, ambivalence and smothering.

Philia (mental love, friendship)

This is an affectionate regard. This type of love has both 'give and take'. It is a dispassionate virtuous love, which includes loyalty to friends, family and community and requires virtue, equality and familiarity.

A love that embraces shared common interests or activities. It is a deeply appreciative love but with dangers of cliquishness, anti-authoritarianism and pride

Ludus (Insincere, cruel, manipulative)

A love that is played as a game or sport: conquest: may have multiple partners at once

Pragma (cold, calculating)

It is a love that is driven by the head and not the heart. Undemonstrative, pragmatic love with the purpose of achieving a common goal. as in a coalition

Manic (dangerous, volatile, dynamic) Obsessive love, experience with great emo-

tional highs and lows.

Agape (sacrificial, selfless, altruistic, charitable and spiritual love)

Means love in a spiritual sense. It often refers to general affection or a deeper sense of 'true unconditional love rather than attraction.

This love is selfless (ie) it gives but expects nothing in return. In other words it expects no self-benefit (eg) feelings for a spouse or children - the love given by God.

It brings forth caring, regardless of the circumstance.

Agape love is regarded as the greatest of loves.

As you can see, like everything else in life, love and loving is a complicated business.

Central Lincolnshire 2011 **LOCAL PLAN** 2036



I WOULD like to thank all those who attended the draft Local Plan consultation session held at the Village Hall on 8 October.

The general feeling was to direct new major residential development only towards those villages which have the facilities and services to sustain new residents.

Under the Settlement Hierarchy of the Local Plan, Sudbrooke is designated a small village where development will be considered on its merits, but will normally be of a very limited nature with residential infilling on small sites or a small business opportunity.

As previously mentioned, however, any planning application coming forward in

the meantime prior to the adoption of the Local Plan will have to be determined by the West Lindsey Planning Committee on existing planning policies.

The next and final stage of the draft Local Plan before it is submitted to the Government Inspector for approval prior to its adoption in November 2016 will show specific sites for development in West Lindsey and residents will have the opportunity to have their final say on the Plan mid summer next year.

I have a copy of the first stage of the Local Plan should anyone wish to inspect it.

LOOK FORWARD TO WILDFLOWERS NEXT SPRING!

■ With help from the 25th Lincoln (Scothern) Scout Group, the Parish Council have recently planted 700 wild flower "plugs" in the Millennium Garden. These should provide a spectacular show in this focal point of the village - benefitting both wildlife and people.

The plants were selected from a list provided by Lincolnshire Wildlife Trust to suit the conditions and environment at the site, next to the footpath and under the trees.

Species included cowslip, primrose, bluebell, foxglove, ox-eye

daisy, betony, pink and white campions and agrimony. These will

attract a wide range of insects with some species being particularly attractive to bees which sadly are on the decline

We are very grateful to have received a Community Wildlife Grant from Lincolnshire County Council for the plants. We also thank the

planting all the plugs in less than an hour.
We now look forward to a good show next year.

Christmas is on the horizon - the time when we're all scratching our heads and thinking what gifts to buy.



BE MERRY, BE VIGILANT

■ Christmas is nearly upon us, we all want to have a merry time but we need to be aware of certain things so that this Christmas is a happy time for everyone.

Nationally, 25 per cent of all road deaths involve the driver being under the influence of alcohol.

That means 1 in 7 of road deaths involved drink drivers over the alcohol limit.

In recent years, young drivers, 17 to 29-year-olds, have been over represented in drink drive casualty figures, and more drivers prove positive between the hours midnight to midday, we want to remind drivers that they maybe over the limit the morning after a night out.

Drinking even very small amounts of alcohol along with many prescribed medicines and some medicines you can buy over the counter can be dangerous. Alcohol will multiply the adverse effects that some medicines have on your ability to drive safely.

Look at the label on your medicine and the leaflet in the package. If you see a phrase such as "Warning: this medicine may make you sleepy", it is not safe to drink even a small amount of alcohol whilst you are taking it before you drive."

So stay safe, think before you drink and drive, where ever possible have a nominated driver, you can all pitch in and buy their soft drinks for the night, meaning that everyone will arrive home safely and have a great night out.

KEEP POSSESSIONS SAFE

NEXT IN THE SPOTLIGHT IS DAVID ETHERIDGE

You're not from round these parts are you? How long have you lived in the village and where are you from originally?

Almost seven years, we moved up from Wallington in Surrey in January 2007.

You are retired now, but what did you do for a living?

I started as an avionics technician in 1964 and after being with two companies at Biggin Hill in Kent, was then offered a post at a company in Mitcham.

This soon led to a senior technical position and later Quality Assurance and Environmental Management. In 2005 we had a contract to support the 'Sentry' AWACS aircraft based at RAF Waddington and I used to drive up and down the A1 sorting out quality and supply issues.

Eventually a new company was established at Waddington and I was one of a handful of people who accepted an offer to move up here full time.

You're the man who repairs the playground equipment, aren't you? What have you done so far?

Before I retired my first job was a small repair to the slide, then the climbing frame was vandalised and required major surgery and last year it was the log tunnel.

This was vandalised again this year and needed some serious welding.

You're into your music - what's currently floating your boat and who would you love to see/have seen at the Village Hall?

I still have a Hi-Fi system in my attic and a wide selection of LPs ranging from Beethoven,

Winifred Atwell and The Shadows, to Pink Floyd and the Rolling Stones, and almost anything in between.

The Stones once played at Wallington Public Hall back in the early 60s, supported by Screaming Lord Sutch and The Crazy World of Arthur Brown, but I don't think Mick and the boys would come to Sudbrooke!

I understand you like your motors and have had a fair few in your time - which ones stand out for you that youn have owned over the years?

Cars are a big thing with me and I was once a mechanic for a mate who raced hot rods in the 60s.

At one time I was running two Land Rovers and a Jaguar. Starting in 1964, the list is: a 1953 Rover 75, Sunbeam Rapier Convertible, Land Rover 107 Station Wagon, Land Rover 80, Daimler V8 250, Land Rover 109 and a 88 (which I still own), Jaguar XJ6, Rover 3500, Daimler Sovereign, 'Classic' 1989 Range Rover, Range Rover P38 and now a Range Rover Sport.

I should never have sold the Land Rover 107 and the 80 I bought for £25 and later sold for £150 is now worth about 10 grand!

Finally, what would you change about Sudbrooke given the chance?

I wouldn't change anything, but I think that will soon be done for us!

We love the place as it is, which is why we moved here. We've made many new friends and been happy to get involved with the community.
