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
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### MINDLESS ACT

It was noted that more obstructions were being fixed in the verge on Church Lane. This would be referred to LCC Highways.

The WLDC Street Team had been notified that the Cedar Close street nameplate needed repairing.

Several trees planted in the verge at the end of Oak Close/Courtfield Close were requiring trimming back. Members of the Parish Council offered to do this work providing that LCC Highways would arrange for the removal of the cuttings.

■ Proposed as a true record by Councillor M Dickie, seconded by Councillor Mrs L Etheridge.

### —— 47) Reports on matters outstanding ——————

- a) **Northfield Park Play area** quotations for re-surfacing under play equipment. Quotations received: a) £4256.13 b) £6396
  Agreed to accept quotation (a) from Bingham Ground Services.
- b) **Sports Day 22 September 2013:** A successful grant application of £374 from the 'Community Chest' had been awarded for the sports event.
- c) **Hedge fronting Village Hall:** Further to minute 34 of the meeting held on July 4, 2013, members agreed that due to recent vandalism at the Village Hall, the hedge fronting the hall car park and the multi-purpose play area be cut back to a height of one metre. It was also agreed that in addition to the hedge, the shrubbery on the verge should also be cut to the same height.

Quotations for the hedge cutting received were a) £325.00 and b) £668.00.

The Quotation for £325.00 was accepted from Veolia ES. It was noted that there would be an additional charge for the cutting back of the additional shrubbery.

d) **Dog Bin - Maple Drive:** The Chair reported that a resident had objected to the siting of a dog bin on Maple Drive and this had been removed.

### 48) Proposed re-formation of Subrooke Tennis Club

A request had been made to form a tennis club in the village. Cllr Stuart Curtis would liaise with those interested. An evening for use of the tennis court would be dedicated to the Club's use and following agreement a sign erected on the tennis court to this effect.

### – 49) Closure of Welton Library –

■ A suggestion from Welton Parish Council had been made that funds from the mobile library service at Sudbrooke be used towards the sustainability of a static service in Welton. Members instructed the Clerk to obtain numbers of residents using the mobile library service in Sudbrooke.

This would be an agenda item for the next meeting of the Parish Council

### ——— 50) Highway matters ——

Consideration of request for 20mph speed limit along West Drive/movement of farm waste vehicles through the village: A 20mph speed limit along West Drive had been requested by residents following excessive speeding by farm vehicles in that area.

Following a letter from the Chair of the Parish Council to the farmers concerned, the amount of farm vehicles using West Drive appeared to have declined.

However it was considered that a speed restriction on that stretch of road would be beneficial. A meeting would be arranged with Highways representatives.

### 51) Planning =

a) Central Lincolnshire Local Plan – Feedback from meeting held on August 22, 2013/Parish Council response to potential sites: It was agreed to notify the Joint Planning Unit that Sudbrooke Parish Council is not opposed to further sympathetic development in the village, but those sites to be developed must bring benefits to the village as a whole. The Parish Council reserving the right to study any individual proposals in detail and comment on them in isolation.

Of the specific potential sites listed on the plan of Sudbrooke, the Parish Council had the following comments:

**Site CL1889:** This site would be objected to most strongly on the grounds that it is open countryside and it would increase the traffic problem on Church Lane, Sudbrooke.

Church Lane narrows and has two blind corners bordering this site. Access from and to this site would be between the corners or opposite the church. Either option would dangerous and cause accidents. This is a single carriageway and traffic has to pass with the aid of passing bays along this road. It is also subject to use as a diversion should the A158 become blocked between Cherry Tree cafe and Lodge Lane Nettleham.

**Site CL 1467:** Is an open space with three large beech trees under TPOs. The Parish Council would seek to retain this area as open space and seek the transfer of the land to the Parish Council for public access and to benefit of the village.

**Site CL1468:** The Parish Council would not object to further development of this area with low density housing; however this would be subject to the landowner transferring the adjoining woodland, lakes and old hall gardens to the Parish Council for an amenity area to the benefit of the local community.

### **b) Applications:**

- i) Grange Farm, Wragby Road poultry unit and thre feed silos 130054 comments as follows:
- a) There shall be no means of access for HGVs or other vehicles to or from the permitted development other than along the existing private service roads within the farm complex.
- b) No development shall take place until a scheme of landscaping/tree planting along the northern and eastern boundaries of the site have been submitted to and approved in writing by the Local Planning Authority, and to be carried out in the first planting and seeding season following the occupation of the units or the completion of the development whichever is the sooner.
  - c) Disposal of any slurry from the site shall not take place at weekends or Bank Holidays.
- d) The transport of any slurry from the site shall not be over any adopted public highway within the parish of Sudbrooke.
- e) The number of poultry shall not at any one time exceed 250,000 within the Grange Park complex.
- ii) Outline application for proposed development of six detached dwellings with associated garages, plots and infrastructure including new passing places to Poachers Lane, new bridge crossing Sudbrooke beck and necessary works to existing road. Also proposed new cycle/pedestrian pathway to parish boundary with Nettleham adjoining Church Lane 128675

Sudbrooke Parish Council have viewed this application and have no objections providing that it is strictly subject to the Playing Field on Scothern Lane being transferred to the Parish Council for nil consideration and the applicant is responsible for all costs under a Section 106 Agreement.

It should be noted that residents living nearby are raising objections and their comments should be taken into consideration.

### **PARISH COUNCIL REPORT**

Brief report of meeting held on October 3, 2013

■ **Oak from Scout Camp Site:** Mrs Coral Evans attended the meeting on behalf of the Carving Group. The Scout Camp have had to have an unsafe oak tree removed from the camp and have offered a large piece of it to the Carving Group to use. Mrs Evans hoped that it could possibly be used for the carving of a village sign.

The Parish Council thought this was a good idea and agreed to the suggestion in principal. The work on the sign is not imminent due to the Carving Group being involved in further post carving, but it is a project for the future. It will be great to have a piece of Sudbrooke oak used for the sign.

- **Broadband in Village Hall:** Sudbrooke Village Hall should shortly have broadband installed.
- **Closure of Welton Library:** Suggestion of funding from mobile service in Sudbrooke to be diverted to static service in Welton. Confirmation had been received from LCC that an average of 12 residents were using the mobile library on a regular basis when it visited Sudbrooke.

The PC agreed unanimously that as the mobile library service is a valuable asset to the village and is to continue to visit Sudbrooke that funding for the service should remain for that purpose and not be diverted to Welton.

- **Grass cutting Church Lane:** A request has been made from the County Council Highways that an area of grass verge in Church Lane be incorporated in the Parish Council grass cutting contract. Reimbursement by the County Council will be made to the Parish Council.
- **Formation of Youth Club:** Members have asked me to respond to the letter in **Sudbrooke News** suggesting that the Parish Council start a youth club in the village.

Looking back through notes of meetings, this has come up pretty regularly over the years. The Parish Council cannot be expected to run clubs in the village, although they will do their best to give support/backup to anyone wanting to start up a club. They have supported the Kick Boxing and the Carving Group when they were formed and will usually consider a bit of financial support.

I am happy to help with advice on grant applications and filling in of forms. Come on mums and dads, there are needs for Toddlers, Pre-Schools, Brownies/Scouts and you help with all these, can you start a youth club between you?

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The qualified Responders all renewed their qualifications in October.

The group offers emergency care and Basic Life Support in Stainton, Scothern, Langworth and Sudbrooke. A Responder may be called out when you dial 999 in an emergency. This means life-saving treatment can begin before a paramedic arrives.

We are seeking to recruit potential Responders, especially the young retired who are in the area during the daytime as we currently all have work commitments.

You can apply if you are aged 18 or over and able to drive. There is no fixed commitment. The on-call system is very

flexible and you will be welcome if you have just a few hours a month to help. Full training and support is provided.

Thanks go to local businesses which hold our collecting tins. These are an essential part of the fundraising which keeps the group going and helps to pay for training and equipment. Donations from local community groups are also most welcome. We are grateful to The Bottle and Glass and Lakeside for the use of a room for our meetings.

## BEST KEPT VILLAGE AND SMALL TOWN COMPETITION

### **SUDBROOKE'S ENTRY** =

#### SO NEAR. BUT YET SO FAR

Congratulations to near-neighbours Nettleham (Class III Large Villages) and Scothern (Class II Medium Villages) on scooping top honours in their respective sections, but how did Sudbrooke fare? Well, below you can see for yourself what the judges made of Sudbrooke's entry...

#### Overall appearance and condition -

Absence of litter, unauthorised/unsightly refuse, absence of graffiti/vandalism, dumps on verges, condition of roads and paths (max 25 points) All the public areas, and there are many, are well maintained. There was no litter anywhere and several litter/dog bins provided. All grass areas and verges recently cut. Roads and path are well maintained (23/25).

**Green Spaces** – Provision for wildlife (such as bird boxes/feeders, bat boxes and wild flowers) and general appearance of trees, ponds, streams, dykes, verges, parks, playing fields, nature areas, hedges, footpaths, stiles, field gates, signposting, childrens' play areas and public green amenities **(max 20 points)**The playing field behind the village hall and play area well kept, as was the Northfield Park Green areas. All green spaces and verges well kept. The sculptures (wooden) are an added interest in Scothern Lane. The signposting to Northfield Park could have been better (18/20).

**Public Premises** – Community Centres, community buildings, schools, road signs, notice boards, advertisements, directional signs, bus stops and shelters, school yards, public seats, telephone boxes, gardens and allotments, public halls, sports facilities and car parks. Cleanliness of public toilets **(max 25 points)** 

We counted five notice boards all with up-to-date info. Best Kept Village competition advertised on several as were Parish Council members and up-to-date minutes. Telephone box well kept and a bin provided by the bus stop. There were two well preserved and clean seats in Scothern Lane. There were a few weeds near the village hall and a nice garden planted at the rear of it (23/25).

**Private Premises** - Private gardens, hedges, fences and walls (max 15 points)
Sudbrooke consists mainly of new housing estates where most property owners keep their front gardens and hedges to a high standard, as do the rest of the village (13/15).

Religious buildings and memorials -

Condition of church yards, cemeteries, chapel surrounds, memorials and their notice boards (max 15 points)

The church and graveyard are kept very tidy (13/15).

**Business Premises** – Including inns, farms and farmyards, workshops, post offices, shops and caravan sites. Condition of public halls, sports facilities and car parks, including advertisements and other signs (max 20 points)

There was a notice board outside the village shop, all up to date. There was a refuse bin outside the shop thaqt had a tidy surround. New cafe building beautifully kept (13/15).

**Overall community effort** - Evidence of community activity and initiative in the care of the environment of the village and the community for all ages **(max 15 points)**Everywhere we visited showed evidence of a good community pulling together (14/15).

Total score: 122/135

#### Final comments:

All the verges and grass areas were well manicured and showed regular attendance with their maintanence. The seats and new wooden sculptures in Scothern Lane looks to be a peaceful area in which to sit.

#### GARDENING CLUB UPDATE -

■ We are writing to update you on the progress made by the school's Gardening Club. 'Brilliant Buds' was established in September 2011 and has been regularly attended by its members on a Thursday lunchtime.

The children put forward their initial ideas and learning goals, which the Gardening Club Co-ordinator developed into a timetable of activities. The club is co-ordinated by Mrs Cavill and Mrs Hadley (parent helper) and are joined each week by Mr Pyrah (grandparent) and Mrs Kerridge (parent).

The 'Brilliant Buds' has its own notice board that the children add to and it includes photos of just some of our activities, featuring our whole school gardening project.

Ellison Boulters is registered with the Royal Horticultural Society Campaign for School Gardening. The school have



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(\*Terms & conditions apply. Free pair from selected range. Voucher must be presented at time of purchase.) completed Levels 1 (Planning) and 2 (Getting Started). We take part in the Morrison 'Let's Grow' campaign and have purchased many items to use in the garden over the last year.

Fundraising has been a key part of our planning and the children worked hard to plant and decorate 33 pots of prepared hyacinth bulbs to sell at the Christmas Fayre.

Lincolnshire Co-operative Society run a Community Dividend Grant Scheme which we were awarded. Our project actively supports their schools 'Healthy Habits' programme which seeks to promote healthier lifestyles. In addition, we were awarded a grant from The Mukajee Brothers trust to support our whole-school gardening project.

The Gardening Club have purchased quality resources such as a greenhouse, shed, full sets of tools, personal protective equipment and day-to-day gardening equipment.

Additionally, the old and rotten wooden planters which were in the school garden have been replaced with practical wooden raised planters. Each class has their own plot to plant in which to plant vegetables and bulbs, supported by Mrs Cavill.

We have prepared a school garden plan, policy and formal risk assessment to ensure that all children are safe and supported in school.

- Making the best use of your greenhouse

John commented on how the growing season was extended this year with many plants in flower and the trees well covered in green leaf.

He talked at length about preparing herbaceous borders for winter, the need to aerate soil and mulch around plants where possible.

He covered pruning fruit and ornamental trees as well as flowering shrubs - ideally trim back soon after

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flowering. A tip for anyone wishing to insulate their greenhouse was to use clear polythene sheets in order to maximise the light rather than bubble wrap.

A popular trend is for growing chrysanthemums in greenhouses once the summer tomatoes were finished.

A general question and answer session on any gardening topics rounded off the evening.

Out and about with Bella - kicking up the autumn leaves (September to November)

#### THERE ARE CHANGES AFOOT

As the nights draw in and the temperature drops, we sense the changing of the season. Daily walks with Bella, a labradoodle, have enabled us to see some of these changes in 'slowmotion', as it were.

Our first indication of autumn was the extraordinary sight of some 80 swallows, whirling over the water and fields in mid-September swooping up insects, fodder on their long journey to Africa. As we walked through damp fields, crane flies emerged in multitudes almost as though our steps urged them forth. I had not seen so many since childhood days when they, and grasshoppers, were common.

Now, squirrels are busy gathering acorns and burying them in our lawn. In the background a jay squawks; a single jay can gather up to 5,000 acorns in a season and remember where it has stored its cache – even memorising the squirrel's store too!

We've been blessed with an unusually warm Indian summer that has lasted well into mid-October. The balmy weather and the moist soil from the spring rains means that plants are sugar rich and so leaves are more likely to turn to bright yellows and reds towards the back-end of the year.

As early as mid-September horse chestnut, along with its exquisite waxy, rich-brown fruits, is the first of the trees to turn, then a little later, willows, silver birches and limes. Their leaves drift down to cover the pathways of Sudbrooke woods forming an autumn

patchwork of elongated willow leaves mixed with heart-shaped birches and the palmate shapes of the sycamores in a myriad of russets, golds, flame pinks and purples. Although well into October, not all of the trees have shed their leaves, some such as oak, beech, and ash are still green.

#### A SOMBRE PICTURE

■ Days have a tranquil, peaceful quality and mornings are mist-moist. The countryside seems sombre after the fire-burst of late summer's colours.

Autumn's muted palette envelops us like the dense velvet of the bull-rushes; russety-orange browns and yellow-gold leaves of the first turnings in the hedgerows are sharp against the pale, straw-coloured grasses.

The Prickly Ox-tongue thistle, its once plump, succulent leaves reminiscent of its namesake, is now withered and dry. White thistledown has replaced purple flowers, and flocks of gold finches, with black and yellow wings and red faces, chatter gleefully at this bountiful feast of seed, as thick as the contents of a discarded duyet.

The pink petals of Rosebay willowherb are now white wisps of seed, as fine as babies' curls, ideal for transportation by the wind.

Few wild flowers survive and a once dense carpet of Devil's bit scabious that spread in late summer like a powder blue lake across the wild flower meadow at Chambers Farm Woods is now a mere trickle. Their only companions are a few Sneezeworts with greenish white discs of

florets. In medieval times its roots were used for toothache, but it is aptly named, for any part of the plant when ground, is likely to cause sneezing.

Hidden beneath the shelter of hedgerows are the delicate, star-shaped flowers of Herb Robert, the only remnant of the vibrant pinks of summer.

#### **FUNGI FEAST =**

Autumn is the best time of year to look for all types of fungi, and we were delighted to find a clump of Shaggy pholiota fungi nestled in the scar tissue of an otherwise healthy ash tree (pictured).

The cap, which is covered in many orange-brown scales, and the stem are yellow in colour. We've seen Fly agaric with its unmistakable red cap pitted with white scales, and numerous Brown roll-rim fungi lining the top avenue on the upper meadow of Goltho plantation. It has a yellow-brown funnel-shaped cap and the rim rolls under as it matures.

All these fungi are inedible so accurate identification is vital - Chambers Farm Woods nature reserve has a 'Fungus Foray' each October with explanations and a guided tour.

### FRUITS OF THE FOREST

■ This year has also produced an abundance of fruit, berries and seeds. Goltho meadow has a plethora of pale-brown seed discs, formed from the summer masses of the white, umbrella shaped flowers of Cow parsley, Hogweed and Wild carrot (we used to gather these for fairy money) – the umbels of the



latter are inverted creating an intricate cradle to protect the seeds.

Woodlands and fields along Ashing Lane, Bella's favourite walk, are home to a splendid harvest. At least six types of crab and other apples can be found in the remarkable plantation at Watts Wood along with fruits of oak, alder and wild cherry.

Adjacent to this is Monks Wood created by the folk of Nettleham – species here includie the pinkish-red, almost glassy fruits of the Guelder rose; red waxy fruits of the Rowan tree, sought by Scandinavian winter visitors such as fieldfares and waxwings; and the gaudy-coloured Spindle fruits with clusters of shocking pink florets with bright orange centres – very '60s'!

Hedgerows are loaded with scarlet and crimson hips and haws and dark purple sloes. Lush blackberries provide birds, foxes, and small rodents with an autumn feast and two-legged animals with delicious blackberry and apple crumbles!

What a glorious summer we have had, but the nights are drawing in and Halloween and Bonfire Night will soon be upon us.

Most of us like a good bonfire and fireworks display, so check out the fireworks codes below to ensure your party goes well with the right type of flashing lights.

### **FIREWORKS CODE FOR CHILDREN**

- Fireworks will scare your pets, so keep them safely indoors
- If you are given a sparkler, always wear gloves
- Always hold sparklers at arm's length
- When a sparkler goes out, DON'T TOUCH IT. It could still burn you, so put it in a bucket of water, hot end down
- You have to be 18 years old before you are allowed to buy fireworks in the shops
- NEVER PLAY WITH FIREWORKS they are dangerous and can hurt you
- Never go near a firework when it has been lit. Even if it hasn't gone off, it could still explode
- Only adults should light and hold fire works
- When you are watching fireworks, always stand well back
- Never give sparklers to a child under five

### **FIREWORKS CODE FOR ADULTS**

Only buy fireworks marked BS 7114

- Don't drink alcohol if setting off fireworks
- ▶ Keep fireworks in a closed box
- ▶ Follow the instructions on each firework
- Light them at arm's length, using a taper
- ▶ Stand well back
- Never go near a firework that has been lit. Even if it hasn't gone off, it could still explode
- Never put fireworks in your pocket or throw them
- Always supervise children around fireworks
- Light sparklers one at a time and wear gloves
- Never give sparklers to a child under five
- ▶ Keep pets indoors
- Don't set off noisy fireworks late at night and never after 11pm

### CUTTING THROUGH THE STUFF

Last week I attended a development day for Church School Governors run by the Diocese of Lincoln Board of Education.

It was an excellent day, although rather overwhelming at times. Overwhelming because the days of school governors just popping in for a chat, are well gone.

Now the task is to monitor and steer and challenge and read copious amounts of information sent out by the Department for Education - and that presents an issue for many of us who want to serve our schools and local communities.

Sometimes I feel overwhelmed by stuff. So it needs someone or something to 'cut through the stuff' for us and take us to the heart of it all. On that day, it was a brilliant presentation from a headteacher and chair of governors who told a story, a story of how they had set a new school up, a story of how they had set the vision for the school and how they had found ways of cutting through the 'stuff' and made the task of the governor less overwhelming and more focussed.

I came away feeling that actually I could

do it, that it just needed me to focus on the right things...

Focussing on the right thing is key to our wellbeing. I have been listening recently to some talks by Archbishop Justin Welby. I expect he is a rather busy man faced with what must seem like intractable difficulties.

However, he gives me a sense that he is a man who knows what is most important and where to focus - 'seek first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness says Jesus and then all things will be added' for that is what 'cuts through the stuff'. Justin was insistent that the important thing for all Christians, no matter how busy we are and how much 'stuff' we are surrounded by is to focus on Jesus.

How delightful it was that at the end, the governors were treated to an act of collective worship led by the children from Ellison Boulters Church of England Academy. A few moments led by children and helping us to focus on Jesus - delightful!
