### 139) Open Forum for Parishioners

- The following items were brought to the attention of members:
- That Northfield Park hedge had been trimmed and clippings not cleared away. The Clerk would notify Veolia.
- A person had slipped on the icy path near to the shop.
- Trees outside 46 Holme Drive were considered to be in need of cutting back. The Clerk would inform LCC Highways.
- Potholes had been patched on Holme Drive and in only days the filling was coming out. This would be reported to LCC Highways.
- The hedge on Nettleham Lane to be cut by Truelove's had not been completed. The Clerk was asked to pursue this.
- A further incident of fly tipping had occurred on Church Lane. This had been removed by WLDC Street Team.

The report stated that the Firearms incident was a resident handing in a gun from a deceased family member when clearing a house. It was also drawn to members attention by the Police report that four males were stopped in a vehicle at Sudbrooke Village Hall on February 4 (they were parked up) and were found in possession of Cannabis and dealt with accordingly.

CC Mrs Sue Rawlins reported that the consultation of the proposed closure of libraries was continuing.

### 143) District Councillor's Report

DC Stuart Curtis stated that a report was awaited from the Environment Agency in connection with proposed development in Sudbrooke Park of 130 dwellings.

### 144) Notes of Meeting held on December 4

■ Amendment - Minute 130D) After 'necessary' (end of second sentence) add 'One member through a window was necessary'.

### 145) Reports on Matters Outstanding

**a) CCTV equipment at Village Hall:** Reply received from Village Hall Committee as follows:

That the Sudbrooke Village Hall Management Committee had discussed the proposal at its meeting on January 27, 2015 (SVHMC) and supports the provision of CCTV as discussed at the site meetings between members of the Parish Council, the SVHMC and the Lincolnshire Police. It is understood that the cost of approximately £1400 will be met by grant aid of £1000, with the remainder being shared between the Parish Council and the SVHMC. The annual maintenance costs of approximately £80 will be shared between the Parish Council and the SVHMC.

This agreement is subject to the following conditions:

- a) That the second grant of £500 is obtained, leaving approximately £200 to be contributed by the SVHMC.
- b) That a lockable cupboard is installed in the back kitchen for the CCTV equipment. The SVHMC does not consent to any equipment being installed behind the bar.
- c) The costs to be shared between the Parish Council and SVHMC.
- d) The Parish Council to be the lead partner with all administrative and financial matters to be dealt with by the Parish Council and recharged to the SVHMC. care of the Honorary Treasurer.
- e) The images to be of a standard acceptable to Lincolnshire Police.'

Proposed by Councillor Peter Heath, seconded by Councillor Martin Dickie and Resolved that the above be agreed subject to grant aid being received. Councillor Martin Dickie agreed to act as liaison with the contractor.

- b) New bus shelter, Wragby Road: A price for a wired glass window had been received in the sum of £163.00. It was debated whether this cost should be met at the request of only one resident. However, the Chair requested that all members take a look at the shelter and in the meantime a price for a small opening in the side of the bus shelter be sought.
- **c)** Footpath between Fox Covert and Main Drive: Consideration for maintenance LCC Highways had confirmed that this footpath was not a designated footway on the definitive map. Members unanimously agreed that no maintenance be made to the footpath.

- d) Overhanging hedges in village: A note had been put in **Sudbrooke News** requesting residents with overhanging hedges to cut them back. Response from residents was awaited.
- e) Transporting of waste along West Drive: Proposed by Councillor Martin Dickie, seconded by Miss Rose Dobbs and Resolved that a meeting with the Environment Agency be arranged to discuss this in more detail.
- **f) Elections:** The Clerk reported that nomination forms would be available at the end of February and that Councils were being encouraged to publicise the local elections.
- **g) Standing Orders:** The Council were advised that an amendment was required to the recently adopted Standing Orders as follows:

3k: The press shall be provided with reasonable facilities for the taking of their report of all or part of a meeting at which they are entitled to be present.

Any person who attends a meeting may not orally report or comment about a meeting as it takes place if he/she is present at a meeting of the Parish Council or its Committees, but otherwise may:

- 1. Film, photograph or make an audio recording of a meeting;
- 2. Use any other means for enabling persons not present to see or hear proceedings at a meeting as it takes place or later;
- 3. Report or comment on the proceedings in writing during or after a meeting or orally report or comment after the meeting.

Each venue where a meeting of the Parish Council or its Committees takes place will have a separate designated area for those in attendance to sit that object to being filmed, recorded, photographed or otherwise and to protect children and other vulnerable people where the relevant responsible adult has not given consent for them to be filmed, recorded, photographed or otherwise.

Proposed by Councillor Bob Waller, seconded by Councillor Stuart Curtis and Resolved that the amendment be made and Standing Orders adopted in their new form.

■ g) Benches – Locations for siting: The Chair suspended Standing Orders between 8.10 and 8.15pm in order to allow the resident to speak who was donating the benches. Suggestions had been made in the **Sudbrooke News** for locations including Beech Tree Corner, near to the shop and on Church Lane.

A vote was taken as follows: Near to the shop - unanimous Beech Tree corner - 6 Church Lane - 1 Resolved that subject to permi

Resolved that subject to permission being granted a seat be sited at Beech Tree Corner and near to the shop.



# ROBIN TOOD IS COMING TO SUDBROOKE

THERE is exciting news to tell from the world of movies - there is going to be a new Robin Hood film (yes, another one) and some of the scenes are to be shot in Sudbrooke Woods.

The blockbuster, scheduled for release in early 2017, focuses on medieval outlaw Roger Godberd, who some historians believe was the true basis of the Robin Hood legend, and early indications are that the film will be called 'The Sherwood Roger'.

Film production company 'Spoof Titles' have pinpointed Sudbrooke Woods as the location for some scenes due to the 'resemblance to certain parts of Sherwood Forest'.

"We are not allowed to film in Sherwood Forest, but we became aware of Sudbrooke Woods through one of the production team, whose family is from the area," said Jay Prolphule, whose job it is to find locations to film.

"Some of the woodland is very similar to parts of Sherwood and it is easily accessible, making filming a lot easier than in other woods in the country.

"Another plus is the high wall still intact, around the old Sudbrooke Holme site, which not only will give us some privacy, but we can also project backdrops onto the wall and use it for green screening, which will bring the whole site to life in a way it has never been done before."

And if that's not enough, the film company will also be looking for residents to open their doors to potential A-list Hollywood actors, who will need housing during filming in Sudbrooke, although cast lists have yet to be finalised just yet.

"We prefer the actors to be right on site and as there are no hotels to speak of in the immediate area, we would welcome being put up in houses in the village, so if anyone fancies offering some accomodation to a film star or two, then please get in touch," added Jay.

### Dear Mr Jackson,

Ref: Article in Sudbrooke News, February 2015 We are writing in response to the above mentioned.

Unfortunately we were not able to attend your open meeting on February 25 due to the fact that Mrs Johnson was working in Germany.

In response to the points that you make in the article we would like to make the following comments:

- 1) Your proposed plan will reduce crime: Having been a resident in the Park for the last 21 vears we have been fortunate enough to enjoy living in a relatively crime-free environment.
- 2) Your proposed plan will provide additional walking areas: For the last 21 years we have walked freely in the Park at Sudbrooke: this was only disrupted by the destruction caused by the Wilkinsons initially annihilating the beautiful woodland and then employing a "thug" to intimidate responsible walkers and deterring them from using paths that had been well walked for countless years.

Your aim is NONE other than that which delivers the fat cheque that will hit your bank account at the end of just another project.

You are setting out to destroy history, the homes of numerous wildlife species and countless tree. You have clearly had no thought for the negative impact that your "toy town" will have on the daily lives of those of us living in the Park, not to mention the value of properties that have been here since before you were born.

It is our view that your article does nothing other than insult the intelligence of the people of Sudbrooke. Should your plans be passed it will be an extremely sad day and most certainly detrimental to the village of Sudbrooke.

The public consultation held at the Village Hall on February 25 was well attended. The main concerns expressed by local residents were:

- 1) Increase of traffic along West Drive and Holme Drive with access onto the A158 particularly at peak periods.
  - 2) Impact on local schools and health centre.
  - 3) Loss of existing rights of way.
  - 4) Effect on wildlife habitats.

On the positive side, residents welcomed the proposed transfer of the woodlands/amenity areas to the Parish, together with the creation of

new public footpaths, but also felt that retirement homes, allotments and sites allocated for potential small business opportunities should also be included.

The next step will be for a formal planning application to be submitted to the Planning Authority and at that stage the Parish Council intends to hold a public meeting to enable residents to have their final say before the application is determined by the West Lindsey Planning Committee.

### Dear Editor.

Re. Proposed large-scale development in Sudbrooke Park

If you have read the February edition of the parish magazine, you will be aware that a large development of at least 120 houses has been proposed for the Park.

Whilst this will obviously have a serious impact on the residents of this part of Sudbrooke, it will also affect residents in the rest of the village. A development of this size would lead to a severe increase in traffic passing through whole village.

It is proposed to cut off the exit to the A158 through the park gates and all traffic will be directed along West Drive and Manor Drive, and Holme Drive will also be affected, as a proposed loop road will join the end of Holme Drive (where at present it ends at the woods) and will then pass through the park.

ALL the traffic from the proposed 120 or more houses will have to leave the Park via these roads to enable them to access Scothern Lane to reach the A158 junction.

This is already a very busy junction - where accidents have occurred in the past - and is also used by traffic coming from Scothern and other villages, which are expanding as well.

Assuming two cars per household, not to mention visitors and commercial traffic, there would be the potential for at least 240 additional cars passing through these roads to access this junction on a daily basis.

Residents of Church Lane would suffer, too, as many more vehicles would use the single track road to get to Nettleham. The promised reduction in the number of farm vehicles passing

through the village will be more than offset by the massive volume of other traffic!

Likewise, the promise of additional amenity and dog walking areas in the village will not be compensated for by the loss of large slices of the woodland and the greater numbers of people using the areas that are left! There would also be damaging effects on the local wildlife - bats, owls, newts, herons, kingfishers and so on...

Another major concern for residents in all parts of Sudbrooke is the lack of provision as regards schools and health services. Even now, the school at Scothern has applied for an extension to accommodate its pupils.

All the new houses in Sudbrooke, as well as those to be built in Scothern, Nettleham, Langworth, Welton, Dunholme etc..., and possibly North Greetwell, where another sizable development is planned, will presumably make use of the existing medical facilities at Welton and Nettleham, where it is already difficult to get an appointment. The same knock-on effect also applies to Lincoln County Hospital, of course.

As you can see, this huge development will adversely affect us all, so it would be worthwhile making your views known - especially if you want to help save a peaceful rural village like Sudbrooke for future generations!

You can do this by emailing your Councillors and forwarding your comments to West Lindsey District Council's Planning Department once the developers have put in their planning application, which will probably be within the next few weeks - there is a limited time allowed for comments after the application has been submitted, and your views will not be considered if you miss the deadline!

In July 2014 I went to the Parish Council meeting, mainly to enquire about the rumours of the above development including some 170 houses. I also took a copy of the Nettleham Neighbourhood Draft Plan.

It was a comprehensive, well thought out document that included a questionnaire and, in the circumstances; I thought it might be useful for Sudbrooke to produce a similar plan or at least a questionnaire. I was told it would be too expensive for a small village the size of Sudbrooke.

More importantly, the Draft Central Lincolnshire Local Plan was also discussed and one member of the Parish Council proposed that the status of Sudbrooke be raised from a small village with housing development limited to infilling with no major developments, to a higher status allowing more development.

This was defeated at the meeting as it contravened the wishes of the Parish Council as outlined by Mike Halliday's document.

Lastly, thanks to Mr Carrotte for his interesting philosophical discourses. May I add that the practice of Loving Kindness to oneself and to those we come in contact with would eventually lead to a more compassionate society?

Tree Felling in Sudbrooke Park:

It may well be that other residents of Sudbrooke share our concerns as regards the extensive felling of trees in what were the Old Hall grounds.

We understand that this area is covered by a blanket tree protection order, which does not necessarily include all trees, but does cover those more than 50 years old.

Given the size of the tree trunks piled up along Main Drive, some of the trees felled are certainly older than this. It may be that those responsible for their clearance would argue that these huge logs come from trees that were dead, unsafe etc...

However, at the time of writing, there is also a pile of vew logs which are (or rather, were) definitely not dead, judging by the greenery sprouting from their trunks.

Yews are also very slow-growing and are known for their longevity in cases where they are lucky enough to escape pre-meditated destruction, so these trees must surely have

been well over 50 years old. We believe that the landowners have obtained permission to thin the trees, and that they may have had a licence to remove the trees concerned, but does this not raise the question of the value of a tree protection order if it can be so readily set aside for the sake of either convenience, or pecuniary interests, or both?

Perhaps the reason for the landowners' actions is a genuine desire to care for the environment by thinning the trees, as they have already done elsewhere in the Park, to allow those that are left to thrive.

It may have nothing to do with pre-emptive work arising from an ambition to develop this area as well as the area of Sudbrooke Park currently under threat from a massive housing scheme, with the value of the timber a useful secondary consideration.

Clearly nothing can be done to save the trees that have already been felled, but would it not be remiss to allow this to pass without so much as a comment?

#### EASTER THOUGHTS —

A man, a carpenter who lived 2000 years ago in an obscure Roman province in a town called Nazareth.

At age 30, the Man hung up his carpenter's apron and began to speak publically up and down the countryside. Religious leaders were ambivalent at best. Most felt deeply threatened, because this ex-carpenter taught in huge outdoor meetings with compelling authority - and he healed people.

Not just colds and fevers, but crippled limbs and blind eyes. The religious leaders saw their orderly world spinning out of their control. And so they determined to eliminate the Man.

They infiltrated his inner circle so they could grab him away from public view. And once in custody, they engineered a trial behind closed doors, and then put huge political pressure on the Roman governor to execute him immediately. Within 12 hours of his arrest, the Man hung on a cross. Six hours later he was dead – seemingly a martyr to a glorious, but hopeless cause.

But there's more. The Man did not resist his arrest and crucifixion - in fact, he had predicted it to his followers again and again.

And he taught that his death would have

incredible meaning - that he would give his life as a ransom for many. And on the cross he prayed for his crucifiers -"Father, forgive them, for they don't know what they're doing."

And he died. A Roman centurion who saw him die said: "Surely, this man was the Son of God." He died at just about three in the afternoon. By dusk he had been buried by a rich follower in a tomb hollowed out of solid rock, a tomb protected by a huge stone that rolled into place along a channel in the rock, then clunk! The tomb was secure.

A couple of days later, a group of women came to complete the burial and they found the stone rolled back and the tomb empty.

An angel appeared to them saying: "He is not here, he has risen." This, too, the Man, Jesus, had foretold to his followers.

Over the next 40 days, he appeared to his disciples and others, to even 500 at one time. And then he left, promising to return.

His Spirit was poured out on his followers a few days later. Within a single generation his followers travelled with the amazing story.

Our world has never been the same, because where people engage with the Man Jesus, they find forgiveness and freedom and meaning.

Community Lincs also work alongside the Lincolnshire Credit Union, or Lincup, who have devised an Oil Savers Scheme to allow members to put aside money each month for their oil purchases.
