


# GONG Ranbows GOONE?

# 1) Parishioners Items

Overgrown hedges that are hanging over footways was again brought to the attention of the meeting. Members felt reluctant to refer the matter to LCC Highways and agreed to all observe any problem hedges/shrubs in their vicinity and report back to the next meeting of the Council.

Reports of a black labrador again running loose in the village. It was noted that Sec 5 (Part 1) of The Dangerous Dogs Act 1991 allows a dog in a public place to be secured by a Police Officer or Dog Warden.

West Lindsey District Council no longer has a dog warden and therefore it is a matter for the police. However, if a member of the public is able to restrain the dog they can call WLDC who will then arrange for it to be collected and taken to the Dog Rescue Centre at Ingham. The owner would then have to collect the dog and pay for its release.

# 7) District Councillor's Report

DC Stuart Curtis reported that planning application for 56 Scothern Lane, Sudbrooke had been withdrawn.

**a) Footpaths 816/87 Laying of woodchips:** This was still in abeyance.

**b) CCTV at Village Hall:** Inspection of the equipment had taken place and a report/quotation awaited for work required.

**d)** Damaged caused by horse riders to footpaths not designated as bridleways in village: LCC Highways had confirmed that it was prohibited to ride horses on public footpaths and had agreed to supply signage to this effect

■ e) Footway and verge near to Church Court: Councillor Andy Cottam reported that surfacing of the private road had been carried out since the last meeting. The verge opposite, however, was churned up by large vehicles having to turn into the private road. The Clerk was instructed to ask LCC Highways if the verge could be repaired and to ensure that vehicles driving over the footpath adjoining the private road was not causing damage to underlying services.

**f) Lincolnshire Fire and Rescue Integrated Management Plan:** Circulated amongst members. No comments made.

**g)** Community Speedwatch: The County Road Safety Partnership had requested that signage previously supplied by them be moved or turned around on the posts. This would be done where possible.

In the meantime, WLDC had agreed to guarantee the funds for the work until the grant monies come through an application which Luke Brown, WLDC, was assisting with.

**b)** Planning training at WLDC: Courses noted by members and to attend.

## **c)** Planning Applications:

**i. 134071** - 11 The Paddock, erect two storey front and rear extension - No objections, but requested that the following observations be taken into account

- It is recommended that there be obscure glazing to the bathroom window
- To protect the privacy of neighbours, it is suggested that there be ground floor screening

· Comments from neighbours should be taken into account.

**ii Proposed base station installation** - Land at Hall Farm, Off West Drive, Sudbrooke - comments made:

Although this base station would benefit the community, there are concerns as to the proposed site at Hall Farm.

1 It is not clear whether the site is within Sudbrooke or Scothern parish.

2 The ideal site is considered to be the existing Scothern oil well site, where the proposed tower would be of a similar height to the existing apparatus. This would cause less adverse visual impact across open countryside. In addition there is an existing access from the public highway, thus preventing a new access/HGVs through Sudbrooke Park.

3 The proposed site at Hall Farm would be a blot on the landscape as the existing trees would only provide a small degree of screening.

**ii 133284 - Land adjacent Sudbrooke Park** - Amendments to original proposals; number of dwellings up to 130; (reduced from 140) relocation of attenuation pond; removal of covert and details of biodiversity enhancements - comments submitted as follows:

'Sudbrooke Parish Council has considered the amendments to planning application 133284 and wish to make the following objections:

The original objections from the Parish Council to the planning application are unchanged.

The changes made in the amendment are small, but are to the detriment of Sudbrooke. The developer has withdrawn the public offers made on the basis of a Section 106 agreement, mainly the transfer of ownership of the woods/ amenity area and 10 Acre covert. The inclusion of a Pub/ Restaurant is still thought to be an unviable enterprise and no information on the management of the proposed allotments has been given.

The original discussions with the developer had included the gift of the woods to the Parish. The developer has stated that the woods will be held by the current owners and a management company will maintain the woods. The Parish Council are concerned that access to the woods/amenity area will be restricted. The residents will now have to rely on the goodwill of any management regime contracted to maintain them for access. Also from the amendment it states that the only access would be via the new footpaths.

The developer had stated that 10 Acre Covert would be gifted to the Parish - this has now been withdrawn. This area would have extended the amenity area of the woodland in the Parish and created greater access. By retaining ownership of both the areas previously in consideration for transfer to the parish, there is still the prospect of future development of both areas.

The Parish Council were willing to work with the owners of the land and the developer and sought repeatedly to engage with them about their plans. However, the plans for this site were presented ready formed and no changes of significance were made to satisfy our concerns. The developer has made clear in the amendment that they are prepared to use the full regime of planning law to force this development through. Such an indication does not engender confidence for any discussions with the developer.'

# Brief report of meeting held on May 12, 2016

**Election of Chairman and Vice Chairman:** Councillor Peter Heath was elected Chairman and Councillor Bob Waller as Vice Chairman.

**Parishioners Items** - It was brought to the Council's attention that vandalism has again occurred to the boards around the tennis courts.

A complaint was received of late deliveries of **Sudbrooke News** – it was noted that this was possibly due to a distributor being on holiday. However, Councillor Mrs Lyn Etheridge, distributor for the magazine, would be grateful to hear form anyone who can help out with deliveries on a relief basis to ensure that the magazine reaches doorsteps as early as possible. If you can help out occasionally please ring Lyn on 01522 750905.

**County Councillor's Report** - CC Mrs Sue Rawlins spoke of the withdrawal of funds from Lincolnshire County Council for amenity grass cutting from April 2017.

It was understood also that grass verges would cease to be cut except at junctions and on dangerous corners.

Further cuts were required to be made by LCC and street lighting would be reduced in residential areas, with switch off of lights taking place at 10pm or midnight.

Members felt that a 10pm switch off was unacceptable for safety of persons dog walking or returning from work. CC Mrs Rawlins offered to pass on the comments of the Parish Council to LCC, but felt that the cuts were inevitable to attain the level of savings required.

## Horse riding on footpaths, not designated as

**bridleways** - This appears to be continuing and LCC Highways have agreed to display signage indicating that horses should not be riding on footpaths.

**Sports Day** - This event will be organised for Sunday 4, September 2016.

■ Chairman's Comments - The Chair reported that it had been suggested that there may be buildings/properties in the village which should be considered for Listing - agenda item for next meeting of the Parish Council.

Hedges overgrowing onto footpaths had been raised again and the Chair respectfully requested that residents cut back any shrubbery that was growing onto footways.

■ Parish Council meeting dates 2016/17 - Meetings of Sudbrooke Parish Council meetings will be held on the first Thursday of a month (whenever possible) excluding August, in the Village Hall, Scothern Lane, Sudbrooke commencing at 7.30pm.

Everyone is welcome to join us. We meet on the first Saturday of every month.

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

## CHURCH BUILDINGS

■ I wonder, do you like having a church building in your village? Is it something that 'adds' to your village? It may not be that you would ever visit it as a place of worship, but it may be that you appreciate the history and the fact that it is there and adds character and history. What if it were looking dilapidated and

not in good order?

I ask this question because as a group of churches, we have been thinking about financing the church buildings for which we have stewardship.

Most of them

are listed, most of them require the services of specialist architects if any are required, most require a significant amount of finance every year to keep them maintained, and most of them rely on the good offices of a small number of people who worship in them, to either give or to raise money through fundraising and grants. Increasingly this is becoming hard work, because inevitable, costs are rising.

So, we are wondering: What is the interest in



their village to contribute? I would be interested in your views. Perhaps it might help if I say at this point that the local church receives no funding (apart from applications for repair grants via Heritage Lottery

Funds or Church Repair Societies) from the Church of England to maintain its buildings.

Sudbrooke family involved in an intriguing new venture as their club, North Lindum Hawks, forms an eye-opening alliance with Football League side Sheffield Wednesday

THE Nicholls clan have been part of the North Lindum Hawks Football Club for a number of years now, with secretarial duties performed by Rachel, while husband Gareth manages a couple of the junior teams, and the future of the club has become so much more exciting...

JUNIOR football in Lincoln is about to take an exciting turn with the announcement of a partnership between North Lindum Hawks JFC and Sheffield Wednesday FC.

This partnership will see the two clubs establishing a Player Development Centre in Lincoln at the home of North Lindum Hawks -Ravendale Sports Ground.



The centre will be open to boys

and girls from the age of five up to the age of 17, and will focus on football development, learning to play 'the Wednesday way'. They will work with former professional footballers, goalkeepers and experienced coaches provided by Sheffield Wednesday.

This exciting project will enable children from across Lincolnshire to develop their footballing skills on a weekly basis within the development centre, and to play football at grassroots level with North Lindum Hawks.

There will be the chance for them to visit and play football at the Sheffield Wednesday training facilities in Hillsborough, and to progress to the Owls' Academy Elite squads.

The clubs will be holding open trials for children and young people of all abilities at Ravendale on June 25 and 26. I read your May issue and noticed the article about the black dog that has been roaming about. In the article it said to ring the police, however, it might be worth noting that the police will not come out to a dog even when it is on the public highway.

The black dog has been running around Scothern and the surrounding fields, although I must admit I haven't seen it for a while.

It caused a couple of cars to slow down on the main road from Nettleham into Scothern where I live, so I phoned the police who told me that they don't attend any dog even if it is on the public highway.

They told me to ring the dog warden and gave me a number which turned out to be the switchboard for West Lindsey District Council:

they told me they do not have a dog warden, but if I caught the dog, which wasn't possible, they would find a place I could take it to.

The WLDC told me to ring the RSPCA, which I did. They don't come out to stray dogs, although I could catch it and take it to a centre, but I should ring the police as they had a duty to come out to a dog roaming on a public highway.

So I rang the police back and they stuck to the same story that even if the dog was on the road they did not attend stray dog incidences.

The police operator said ring the dog warden - I said I had, and then ring the RSPCA. I said I already had. I just wondered if anyone in Sudbrooke had more luck if they reported the dog to the police. I couldn't believe that no one took responsibility for stray dogs anymore.

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# ALEC C. CARROTTE ON PERSONAL HEROES - WHO IS YOUR HERO?

ALTHOUGH used in a particular context (love and romance), most of us will remember the words of the Enrique Iglesias song "I can be your hero, I will stand by you forever".

What is a hero? If we look in the Collins Dictionary we see it described as two things:-

Firstly, it is defined as an individual of exceptional courage who may possess superior qualities in a given field (eg) soldier, OR a hero can be an exemplar, someone who sets the standard for others to follow. If we adopt the second definition, then a hero can be someone you can admire and use as a model for your own way of living. However, choosing a hero is more difficult than at first appears and begs several key questions:

Firstly, do we feel that we need a hero on whom to model our way of being, or are we happy with ourselves and the way we are?

Secondly, do we need different heroes for different times in our life?

Thirdly, what is our criteria for choosing a hero we can respect?

In terms of addressing the first two questions, it can be argued that we do indeed need a succession of heroes in negotiating life's hurdles (eg) a parent, later a teacher, later a friend, later perhaps our partner. This then leaves the third question regarding choosing a hero who can act as a role model, someone whom we can respect. Does the answer lie in choosing a sports star, a

politician, an employer, a friend, or a 'celebrity' who will act as an exemplar for you to model your life upon? Will the above people stand by you forever?

Thus we can see from the above list that we may collect a whole series of heroes throughout our lives, but is there one that particularly stands out as having the most influence on your own way of being?

Perhaps a quotation from the author Arthur

Gordon might help to clarify the position:-

"A hero is someone who is to be cherished, not so much for what they have achieved in their own lives, but for what they have accomplished in mine, for how they have inspired me to grow and to change and to become more of what I was created to be".

Perhaps this hero may appear in a most unlikely place and might not even be aware of the impact that they are having on your life. Perhaps this is the way it should be.

Finally, what qualities do you seek in your hero? Only the individual person can decide the criteria for the adoption of a role model, some of which might include:

- Non-judgementalism (no criticism)
- Acceptance of you as you are (total love)
- Freedom to choose and make own mistakes
- Allowing you to move at your own pace
- Treat and respect you as a unique being
- Demonstrate boundaries
- Display openness and honesty with you always
- Respects your views even if disagrees with you
- Honesty (congruence of thought and deed)
- Being there for you, but not creating an unhealthy dependency

■ Allows you freedom to make your own mistakes without judging you

■ Non-quitter

Does this person exist in your life (or near enough)? If so, you are very lucky!



Shingles, also known as herpes zoster, is a painful skin rash caused by the reactivation of the chickenpox virus (varicella-zoster virus) in people who have previously had chickenpox.

Who can have the shingles vaccination? Between September 2015 and September 2016, the shingles vaccine is offered routinely as part of the NHS vaccination programme for people aged 70, 78 or 79.

You become eligible for the vaccine on the first day of September 2015 after you've turned 70, 78 or 79 and remain so until the last day of August 2016.

Please contact the surgery to book an appointment with the practice nurse if you are eligible for the shingles vaccination.
