

171) District Councillor's Report =

■ DC Curtis reported that The Central Lincs Planning Committee have proposed a number of potential changes to the draft Local Plan following the previous public consultation. A final version of the draft Plan will be agreed at its meeting on March 14, 2016. Final public consultation is then scheduled for April - May.

———— 172) Reports on Matters Outstanding —

■ A) Footpath 816/817 – laying of woodchips: No replies had been received from the landowners to drop some woodchips on Main Drive prior to laying on FP 816/817. It was therefore considered that they could be delivered to the open space in Northfield Park.

There had been one representation during the consultation by a landowner where no objections were made to the notion of undertaking a Neighbourhood Plan. WLDC encouraged the community to consult with landowners throughout the process as per regulations. A copy of the letter had been passed to the Neighbourhood Plan Committee.

A report had been submitted from the Committee as follows: 'The meeting on January 26 had focused on producing a questionnaire based on a sample provided by Luke Brown and with reference to Scothern's example as well as Sudbrooke Parish Plan.

'The next meetings will be February 16 and 23. A drop-in consultation for residents will be arranged for March 11 between 3 and 7pm in the Village Hall. This would be important for residents as it is aimed at deciding the future of the village through the Neighbourhood Plan.'

THREE-TIME World Champion sailor and Rio 2016 medal hope, Giles Scott, helped recognise the achievements of rising

Sudbrooke powerboat racer, Jonathan Brewer, as he presented him with his prestigious RYA Youth

Champion Award.

Jonathan, 14, received his North West award alongside the other 10 regional winners at the RYA Suzuki Dinghy Show at London's Alexandra Palace on Saturday 5 March. Although he lives in the village, Jonathan was selected as the RYA North West Youth Champion as he races with the Lancashire Powerboat Racing Club, based in St Helens.

The RYA Youth Champion Awards recognise the outstanding achievement and performance of young people across the range of activities the RYA represents, including sailing, windsurfing and powerboating.

Last year, the Priory Academy LSST schoolboy secured a silver medal at the UIM European Championships in Nottingham, the highest ranking British competitor of the weekend, plus two British Championship silver medals. He started the season strongly and following a tough winter training schedule, managed a podium finish in every British Powerboat GP event.

Jonathan said: "I'm really honoured. These awards attract a high standard of competitor from several sports. To have even been nominated is fantastic, but to have actually won is awesome. Last year was a fantastic season and I'm really chuffed to receive this award. I couldn't have done that

without the support of all the Jelf Racing Team and our sponsors, Peters & May Racing, YourprintPartner.co.uk and Castlemaine Accountancy, as well as my family and friends.

"I'm already looking forward to the 2016 season and hopefully I can bring more trophies back to the team."

Jonathan was nominated for the RYA Youth Champion Awards by RYA's North West Regional

Committee. He comes from a powerboat racing family with his grandparents starting to race in 1982 and dad, Jason, taking up the sport in 1989. Jason is now one of the main organisers of the sport in the country. Jonathan joined the family tradition in 2012 and has completed three full seasons.

Jason said: "Jonathan is analytical about things and certain to be a long-term racer. He is also very academic and his school is very supportive."

British Sailing Team star Scott took time out of his Olympic preparations to honour the latest RYA Youth Champions. Giles said: "The RYA Youth programmes are the building blocks for the future and have helped all of us get where we are today.

"Recognising the talent who have excelled at a young age is vital and helps to energise the sport. I hope to see these youngsters go on to achieve a great deal in our sport."


The term finished for all sections with another one of our Gang Shows. Open to parents and family, the evening started with a couple of congs. followed by a

SPEAKER EVENING ON HOW TO GROW FABULOUS SWEET PEAS

Our speaker, Mr Chris Priestley, inherited his love of growing and showing these beautiful flowers from his father, who was a former Vice-President of the National Sweet Pea Society. Both his parents have Spencer varieties named after them - Mary and George Priestley.

Chris gave a very informative illustrated talk on the history of this "Queen of all Annuals", beginning with the arrival of the first seeds in this country in 1699, when seeds were sent by a Franciscan Monk on the island of Sicily to a schoolteacher in Colchester.

Useful information was shared on all aspects of growing our own Sweet Pea seedlings, including links to recommended sites for purchasing the best seed.

A surprise quiz was set by our speaker, who had brought along a selection of his own Spencer seedlings, and these were won by a guest from Nettleham.

RARE SPECIES FOUND IN SUDBROOKE WOODS

ZOOLOGISTS across the country have spoken of their excitement at the discovery of the Giant English Wombat in Sudbrooke Woods.

The rare marsupial, an ancestor of the more famililar Australian-based animal – introduced to the county back in the early 1800s following a voyage Down Under by famous Lincolnshire explorer Matthew Flinders – was thought to have become extinct in the early 20th century, but two were spotted by a resident in woodland near Main Drive and she managed to get these exclusive shots of the animal, below.

"I was walking my dogs through the woods one morning, when something caught my eye near one of the ponds," explained villager May Dittup. "I took a look and saw this strange animal having a drink, so I whipped my camera out - I always have it with me as I enjoy taking pictures of the flowers in the woods - and just managed to take a snap, before it shot off into the undergrowth.

"I thought that was that, but then I spotted another one near the old Walled Garden and managed to get one before it too bolted. I often walk through the woods and see the odd deer and grass snake, but never have I seen anything like this before."

Flinders brought several of the animals back with him from the other side of the world and they breeded and prospered in the 19th century, but their numbers dwindled after they were hit by the fulaprel virus and the last known sighting was in the 1920s.

But this incredible find has caused a huge stir amongst scientists and leading UK marsupial expert Avril Fewl from Southampton University, who confirmed what sort of animals they were, said: "They were introduced to the Lincolnshire countryside and remained there until - we thought - their demise around 1923, when most of them contracted the fulaprel virus.

"But these sightings, the first for over 90 years, are astonishing, and I just wonder how many more are out there."

He had a large family with grandparents and six children of school age. He had little capital and had to hold down a full time outside job to support the family

On buying the shop ALL of the family chipped in and took turns to work in the shop. He, his wife and the grandmother worked long unpaid hours behind the counter and after school the teenage children took their turn as well often

doing homework in slack times behind the counter. There was no cash to pay other staff. As for stocking the shop he told me he found the way to fill up the shelves was to treat it as the family larder. Anything nearing sell-by dates got used up feeding his family.

That way he had plenty of goods on show which tempted folks to come into the shop to buy. Gradually he was able to broaden the goods on offer. It worked!! Now he has a thriving family business which is a great asset to the village and already has three children at university who still find time to help out in the shop. Mother and grandmother still work there.

There are no wages, no National Insurance stamps to pay for the family and they all take a pride in the family business.

If only we could find such a family to fill the bill and save our Village Shop.

I don't know what has gone so wrong with it, but attempts to get it up and running again with a skeleton staff have failed miserably, despite the gallant efforts of the two young female shop assistants who have been unable to persuade the owner to invest more personal time, effort and capital in the shop.

They have been put in the shop one after another and given an almost impossible task to which they each gave their very best - I see no chance of success despite their attempts to bring it back to life.

WHAT IS WRONG WITH THE WAY THE SHOP IS BEING RUN?

You can't have a shop where it closes every day at odd times because the sole assistant has to pop down to Langworth to deliver half-adozen newspapers in their private car.

Sorry to say this to those loyal customers, but it just is not profitable and is to the detriment of the shop business - so, no deliveries unless, or until, the business is up and running again.

And sorry to state the obvious, but an assistant with outside personal demands on their time such as small children to collect or drop off at school cannot possibly give their full time to

running the shop, especially when they live over three miles away from the shop.

It is also ridiculous for these same assistants to have to fetch and carry newspapers and items for sale in the shop in their own private cars, These should be delivered to the shop by others

It is a classic "chicken and egg" syndrome here. Because of sell-by dates, the owners are afraid to overstock items unless they can manage to sell them promptly, but unless goods are on show you can't sell them and all perishable goods have sell-by dates.

So people lose faith and stop coming to buy things that they have not found in stock previously.

I don't know what the solution is, but someone with more knowledge of the convenience shop trade must know. Let's hope that some such person comes forward... and soon!

One thing is certain - if a new owner can be found they will need all our local support by way of immediate custom and encouragement.

So please everyone make certain to support the hop and purhase items, however little, but make it regular and encourage all family and friends to do so as well

■ This has been an unusual week - through my letterbox this week popped a letter from the Archbishops of Canterbury and York. A joint letter asking all Parish Priests to encourage their congregations and communities to pray for our nation in the week leading upto Pentecost on May 15, 2016.

They write this:

'At the heart of our prayers will be the words that Jesus Christ himself taught us - 'Thy Kingdom Come, thy will be done.'

It is impossible to overstate the lifetransforming power of the Lord's prayer. It is a prayer that is reassuring enough to be on the lips of the dying and yet dangerous enough to be banned in cinemas. It is famous enough to be spoken each day by billions in hundreds of languages and yet intimate enough to draw us ever closer into friendship with Jesus Christ.

It is simple enough to be memorised by small children and yet profound enough to sustain a whole lifetime of prayer. When we pray it with sincerity and with joy, there is no imagining the new ways in which God can use us to His glory'.




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■ THE Club (SCC) is looking for new members, both playing and non-playing, for the coming season which begins in April.

ALEC C. CARROTTE ON DE-CLUTTERING

AS we enter the annual season of trendy words,

AN OPEN LETTER —

■ Lincolnshire GPs are aware that some patients are finding it increasingly difficult to get the appointments and services that they need from us, and feel you should be made aware of some of the reasons this is happening.

Demand for general practice appointments has doubled in a decade. GP surgeries provide six appointments per year per patients on average, compared to three appointments per year a decade ago. UK general practice provides over one million appointments per day. Bureaucracy has also increased, with ever more regulation from NHS England, Clinical Commissioning Groups, and the Care Quality Commission.

Increasing workload, increasing bureaucracy, and reduced funding to provide services, has caused low morale of general practice staff, doctors, nurses and administrators alike. GPs are concerned about patient safety, as they can no longer cope with the increased workload with reduced workforce. As a consequence, doctors are retiring early, or leaving the profession to

work in other roles or other countries. There are currently over 40 GP vacancies in Lincolnshire.

Despite the government's target that 50 per cent of doctors should be GPs, fewer junior doctors are coming into general practice training. Of thirty places on the Lincolnshire GP training scheme, only six have been filled.

GPs and surgeries want to provide patients with the best services that they can, and we are disappointed that the current climate does not allow us to do so.

Please accept our apologies for this and support us in our efforts to make general practice stronger and sustainable for the future.

We would like your help to improve this situation. Please contact your Practice's Patient Participation Group (PPG) to get more facts and figures. Please write to your MP to insist that they address this crisis in general practice. Your PPG will be able to tell you how to lobby your MP.
