#### February 2014

Abridged notes of the monthly meeting of Sudbrooke Parish Council held on Thursday 6 February in Sudbrooke Village Hall. The full set of notes may be seen on the Parish website.

#### **COUNCILLORS PRESENT:**

Councillors B Waller (Chair), M Dickie, Miss R Dobbs, S Curtis, P Rignall, I Russell, Mrs L Etheridge, Mrs C Myers (Clerk), Mrs B Solly (Treasurer), PCSO Jackie Parker and six members of the public.

#### **APOLOGIES:**

Councillor Peter Heath, County Councillor S Rawlins.

#### —— 111) Parishoners items ——

- A proposed planning application for a property on Church Lane was outlined to the meeting. At this point Councillor Bob Waller declared an interest as a resident of Church Lane. Discussion ensued with interest and it was agreed that it be an agenda item for the next meeting of the Parish Council.
- Concern was expressed about the increase in dog fouling on Holme Drive. Notices would continue to be displayed discouraging dog fouling, along with articles in **Sudbrooke News**.
- A blockage in the beck was reported on West Drive. This would be reported to the IDB.
- The Sudbrooke sign on Wragby Road had been damaged. This would be reported to LCC Highways.

#### ———— 112) Police matters —

A report was given as follows:

17/1/14 - A car was driven into a wall of a house on Northfield Avenue; there were no injuries but damage to the property and vehicle.

1/2/14 - A male was stopped for selling door to door without a licence.

2/2/14 - A laptop bag was taken from a porch on St Edward's Drive.

#### 113) District Councillor's report

■ DC Stuart Curtis reported that a judicial review was taking place with regards to the closure of libraries within the county.

DC Curtis also reported that the slurry sealing of paths to be carried out this year would be of a thicker layer which should last longer.

The Clerk had booked a place on the Community Engagement event.

#### ——— 119) Planning —————

■ a) Application - Park Farm, Sudbrooke 130787: Erection of permanent agricultural workers dwelling, garage and formation of private drive - resubmission 129869 Comments to be submitted as follows:

'Sudbrooke Parish Council have considered this application and whilst there were two objections by Councillors, the majority feel that there is an essential need for a dwelling for the use of the Farm Manager, although this application appears to be a large dwelling for such.'

If the application is granted it is suggested that conditions include (a) occupation shall only be permitted for use as an agricultural dwelling ancillary to Park Farm (b) Landscaping to the south (hedges and/or trees) and (c) No Permitted Development Rights.

- **b) Application 128675 Poachers Lane:** Councillor Bob Waller had attended the Planning meeting at WLDC when this application was deferred pending a site meeting by members of the WLDC Planning Committee.
- **a** c) Offer of Address at Parish Council meeting by WLDC Building Control Officer: It was agreed that a Building Control Officer be invited to the Annual Parish Meeting in April.

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#### 121) Correspondence and reports

**a)** Letter of complaint: Letter received from a resident and read out to the meeting. The resident objected to the production of a village sign and requested a Public Meeting be held to discuss it.

Members felt that this had been discussed in depth in the past and residents had been given opportunity to put suggestions forward.

It was agreed that an offer be made to the resident for him to meet with two members of the Parish Council and the Clerk in order for his issues of concern to be talked through affably.

- **b) Parish Council insurance schedule:** Deferred until next meeting of the Council.
- **c) Review of Polling Districts and Polling Places:** WLDC are currently reviewing the facilities for voting and to ensure that so far as is reasonable and practicable the polling places are accessible for disabled electors. It was noted that the Polling Station for Sudbrooke is the Village Hall. Voters could also opt for a postal vote if preferred.
- **d) Notice board outside Village Hall:** The Clerk brought to the Council's attention that the notice board outside the Village Hall was in need of some repair or may even need replacement. This would be agenda item for the next meeting of the Council.

### PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

#### Brief report of meeting held on March 6, 2014 —

■ **Proposed planning application:** The Parish Council had been advised that a resident on Church Lane was considering a planning application for a number of properties to be built on the garden of their dwelling.

It was agreed that a site meeting be arranged inviting a representative from WLDC Planning and LCC Highways.

**Carving Group:** The large piece of oak trunk from Sudbrooke Scout Camp had been transported to the Village Hall by Carl Wilkinson and Andy Carr and thanks extended to them for this community effort.

The trunk is now sited on the grass at the side of the car park where the Carving Group can work on it at their leisure and its progress viewed.

The additional six carved posts are now ready for siting to continue the line from the current posts around the corner of Holme Drive. Councillor Paul Rignall has made metal protective caps for each post.

- **Allotment provision in parish:** This item was discussed following its mention in **Sudbrooke News**. However, it was re-itereated that all landowners in the area had been approached with the hope of leasing some land for allotments, but none had been forthcoming in either Sudbrooke or Scothern.
- Emergency planning for parish: This was reviewed and noted that although the emergency services has its own emergency plan in place, the Parish Council do have a supply of aquasacs in the event of a flood/water leak situation, the use of the Village Hall as an emergency shelter, and the Parish Clerk has a list of approximately 100 email addresses of residents to notify/update of an event/situation (Any resident wishing to be added please contact Chris Myers on myerspc94@gmail.com).
- Future meetings: Invitation to residents Annual Parish Meeting - April 3, 2014 7pm: A representative from the West Lindsey Local Authority Building Control will be giving a presentation about building regulations covering the following:
- What is building control?
- What needs permission?
- How do I apply?
- What will it cost?
- How can it protect me?
- Where can I get more help?

Residents very welcome to attend to have any queries answered. There will also be light refreshments. The Parish Council meeting will follow at 8pm.


He discussed various items and valued items brought by members.

Can we have an update on the current activities in the woods off Holme Drive?

At the time the land was sold, I remember a significant turnout at a council meeting at the Village Hall to discuss what options would be done to save public access to the wooded areas.

Since then, nothing. Can the parish council also give an update of the progress of the Sudbrooke Woods Footpaths Committee in securing access to the woods?

I read with interest in the December minutes that members of the Parish Council have met with the landowner to understand his plans for Sudbrooke Park, but what these plans are have not been communicated.

While I appreciate they may be in the early

stages of development, I would suggest that the residents of the village would have an interest.

In the meantime, the amount of tree felling and vegetation clearance has been significant, with the foundations of a number of old buildings being exposed.

I assume that this level of clearance is in line with the TPO Area Felling licence application requested by the landowner at the June 2013 Council meeting?

I re-iterate the voice of many back at the Parish Council meeting in April 2012 that the woods around the village are an integral part of our community and, as such, we should continue to monitor the situation.

#### THERE IS NO QUICK FIX —

It's amazing how in a relatively short period of time, technology has moved on. I used to use a paper road map to get around and find my way on long journeys; now I have a satnay, the voice of which, with great authority, tells me when to turn right and left, and when I make a mistakes, tells me in no uncertain turns that it needs to re-calculate my route! These things can be both irritating and wonderfully helpful.

A couple of years ago I was in the Lake District, had gone off on my own for a while and was later due to meet some friends in another part of the Lakes. I programmed my satnav - I don't know if this happens on other versions, but mine gives me an option of three routes - the fastest, the shortest and the ecological route. I chose the shortest. I don't know why, I rarely do this because timewise it usually takes longer.

Anyway, I set out. The road was fine to start with, but as I took this turn and that, following the insistent voice, the road became narrower and narrower. I suppose I should have turned back, used my head and realised that maybe this wasn't the best

option, but pigheadedly I carried on, down tracks with grass growing down the middle.

Then I came to a closed five-barred gate, on which was a notice that said 'DO NOT FOLLOW YOUR SATNAV'! Clearly I was not the only one that had blindly followed the voice!

There was nowhere to turn around and it took half a mile of backing down the road to find somewhere to turn the car round... embarrassed and hoping that no-one had witnessed this debacle!!

We are still in the season of Lent. Lent teaches us that there are no short cuts and no quick fixes in our walk with God. In Lent we remember that Jesus was led into the desert by the Holy Spirit, and was there for 40 days and nights. He suffered hardship and testing, but He was led there for a purpose - He was being formed and tested ready for three years of challenging ministry that would end with the suffering of Holy Week and the victory of Easter.

If this was necessary for the Son of God, how necessary is it for all of us to come aside and let God do His work of transformation in us. There is no quick fix - God calls us aside and we will always be a work in progress!

# **CRABBIES GRAND NATIONAL**

The big race

#### THE GREATEST

■ I can't let April go by without featuring the world's greatest sporting event, the Grand National, at Aintree.

They say the Melbourne Cup is the race that stops a nation; well, the Grand National fires up our nation into a betting frenzy, cajoling the once-a-year punters into their local bookies, with the hope that this year may be their year, that the horse they have picked out might actually win the big one.

The bookmakers were laughing all the way to the bank 12 months ago as the unfancied

Auroras Encore landed the spoils at a huge 66-1 and propelled the little-known jockey Ryan Mania into the glare of the media spotlight.

As former jockey Mick Fitzgerald told me recently, there is no greater accolade in the sport than winning the Grand National.

He achieved the feat on Rough Quest in 1996 and he said: "Winning the National means more than Gold Cups, Champion Chases, Champion Hurdles. A lot of people don't know about the Cheltenham Festival, but everyone knows the National - and if you win it, you're

forever known as Grand National-winning jockey... and that stays with you forever."

He wouldn't be drawn on who he thought might win this year - the race is on Saturday, 6 April - insisting it was one of the most wide-open races ever, and his advice was to pick out three or four to increase your chances as literally anything could win.

Neptunes Collonges was a 33-1 winner in 2012, while Mon Mome was a 100-1 shock victor in 2009 and Silver Birch was 33s in 2007, which really does suggest that anything can reign supreme over the four and a half

miles of the gruelling Aintree stamina-sapping contest.

Ironically, the first-ever winner of the National in 1839 was a horse called Lottery and that sums up the contest perfectly.

Who should I back this year, I hear some of you cry? Despite there being some excellent horses at the head of the market, you may as well take your pin and stick it in the field of 40 or choose a name that stands out, such as Shakalakaboomboom or Monbeg Dude.

#### **TIDAL BAY**

Is one of the truly class horses in the field, but would be the first 13-year-old to win since 1923 and the first top-weight since the legendary Red Rum. He is, though, rated 7lb lower than he would be in a normal race and was a fast-finishing third in the Welsh National and also plugged on well to take second in the Irish Hennessy. Chances.

Current best price: 16-1

#### **LONG RUN**

Cheltenham Gold Cup winner in 2011 and twice a King George victor, but looked on the slide before winning a small race at Kelso in February. Has undoubted class, but his trainer, Nicky Henderson, has never won this race and only two horses in history have won both the Gold Cup and National. On the plus side, his amateur jockey has a great record over the National fences.

#### **TEAFORTHREE**

Rebecca Curtis' 10-year-old was well fancied last year before running a great race to finish third and although was only eighth in the Gold Cup, is said to be in tip-top shape, Has won over four miles and you can't say that about many in the field.

Has won half of his 22 races over fences and is a real cross-country specialist, who has won seven times at Cheltenham. Loves a marathon trip and got round in his own time

#### **GODSMEJUDGE**

Powered away to win the Scottish National over 4m1f last year, but been disappointing of late, pulled up in his last two runs, although they were shorter trips. This will be more to his liking though.

#### **GARDEN SECURITY**

■ Spring is finally making an appearance; the daffs are out and the nights are getting lighter, you will probably be starting out in the garden so now is a good time to look at the security of your gardening tools and particularly your shed.

Hopefully these tips may help:

- Position sheds so that a clear view is given from any adjoining pathways or roads.
- ◆ In order that they cannot be easily broken, have wired glass placed in any shed windows. Laminated glass is also a deterrent, as it takes longer to break through the glass.
- Screen shed or outbuilding windows, so that goods and equipment cannot be seen from the outside.
- Consider placing a shed alarm inside your shed or having a shed bar fitted. These are available from Police Headquarters at a reduced rate.
- ◆ Paint your lawnmower or equipment random colours such as pink or orange. This devalues the items for resale.
- Post code ALL belongings even if they are not of high value. If we need to return items, it tells us where they have been stolen from

and helps us to locate a criminal's activity to a particular site.

◆ Mark your property with UV pens or permanent marker pens. UV pens will make an invisible (to the naked eye) mark to your equipment, which will not detract from future value. You simply write your postcode in full and add your house number or name after the postcode. If you decide to sell the item at a later stage, you can issue a receipt for the payment of the goods.

A permanent marker will deter thieves further as they know that they cannot sell the goods with your postcode on the equipment. Suspicion is raised if a mark has been crossed through or tampered with.

 Consider placing your items on Immobilise database (www.immobilise.com).
 This is a secure site to record all your serial numbers.

When an item is stolen, all the Police Forces will be able to see the item and if found return it to you. (No items can be seen till your flag it up as stolen or lost).

- ◆ Finally if you have been a victim of crime report it on tel: 101 and let us be aware.


