VICAR'S LETTER

On the 22^{nd} May, after the 10.30 Service, the Rural Dean will be Authorising Chris and Eleanor Clarke as Authorised Lay Ministers to serve in the Parish and the Benefice. This formal recognition of their ministry is the culmination of a long period of training. I hope as many folk as possible will be able to attend this brief ceremony (about 10 - 15 Minutes) to welcome them into this new ministry.

As I write, the sun is out and Spring has sprung, with blossom and flowers adding colour to the natural world. A common theme of praise and thanksgiving is the beauty of the natural world and grandeur of the universe.

An example is a prayer written by the American minister, theologian and pioneer of social justice Walter Rauschenbusch (1861-1918), which gratefully acknowledges the wonder of all God has made and asks for help never to overlook such simple but special blessings:

"O God, I thank you for this universe; or its vastness and its riches, and for the variety of life which teems within it and of which I am a part. I praise you for the sky and the winds, for the clouds and for the constellation of the heavens. I praise you for seas and rivers, for mountains and trees, and the grass beneath my feet. I thank you for the senses which enable me to see the splendour of the morning, to hear the song of the birds, and to enjoy the scents of springtime. Open my heart, I pray, to all this joy and beauty, and save me from being so burdened by care or blinded by greed that I fail to notice when even the thorn bushes are aflame with your glory. Amen."

There is nothing new about the object of this prayer, with St. Francis of Assisi writing in the 13th century his "Canticle of the Creatures" - a quote from which is engraved in the stonework at St. Hugh's, Langworth. This Canticle was used as framework for Christine Valters Paintner's "Water, Wind, Earth &

Fire" (subtitled "The Christian Practice of Praying with the Elements") published in 2010. Another devotional book that treats of this theme of the Natural World is the late John O'Donohue's "The Four Elements – Reflections on Nature" republished in 2010.

The prayer above reflects our praise and thankfulness for the beauty all around us here in the Lincolnshire countryside.

Easter this year fell just one day short of the latest day that it can be in the Spring. The 25th April is the latest day possible – the date of Easter being determined by the Paschal full moon, which can occur as early as March 21 (as explained in the Book of Common Prayer) . Easter has fallen on April 25 only three times during the last three centuries : 1734, 1886, and 1943. It will not occur on April 25 again until 2038.

124 PARISHIONERS ITEMS

A report was made that the dyke fronting the millennium stone was requiring leaf clearance. Cllrs Bernard Bartram and Martin Dickie offered to undertake this work to allow the water to drain freely.

The poor condition of the road on Manor Drive and fronting the shop was discussed. The Clerk would again bring this to the attention of the Highways Department.

125 POLICE MATTERS

PC Donnah Thompson reported that Sudbrooke had been relatively quiet during the last month. PC Thompson stressed that residents should report incidents of anti-social behaviour immediately, not a few days later.

126 DISTRICT COUNCILLORS REPORT

DC Stuart Curtis stated that West Lindsey was now recycling 50% of its waste.

127 NOTES OF MEETING HELD ON 3RD FEBRUARY 2011

These were signed as a correct record.

128 REPORTS ON MATTERS OUT-STANDING

- a) Gritting of estate roads during severe weather A letter from the Highways Department stressed that a previous reference by their staff to residents that the responsibility for gritting estate roads is the Parish Council's responsibility is not correct. It also stated that the Highways staff should confirm those routes which were included within its primary or secondary treatment schedules and emphasise that any other street would be unlikely to receive any attention.
- b) Suggestion by Scothern Parish Council to joint fund a contractor for gritting of highways during severe weather conditions – The Clerk reported that the Clerk to Scothern PC was seeking prices for consideration.
- c) Request for additional grit bins
 Six additional grit bins had been requested for the village and the locations were being assessed by the Highways Department.
- d) Neighbourhood Watch Signs replacement – A reply was awaited from Lincolnshire Police.
- e) Spring Litter Pick The date was

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agreed for 9th April. Cllr Bernard Bartram would arrange this.

f) Village Sign – Further to minute 114 a) of the meeting of the Parish Council held on 3rd February 2011 members discussed again the proposals for the village sign. Members opinions were not changed in that they could not justify the cost at the present time. It was noted that £500 had been precepted for the Wood Carving/ Community project for the next financial year and this amount could be the foundation of funding for the sign. It was re-iterated that a fund raising committee could be formed by residents if so wished.

129 SPORTSFIELD, SCOTHERN LANE – EXTENSION OF LEASE

Mr Paul Truelove had agreed to extend the lease on the sports field for a further 12 months. It would thereafter be reviewed annually.

130 FLOOD DEFENCE EQUIPMENT FOR VILLAGE

250 aqua sacs had been purchased with the flood defence grant of £250 from West Lindsey District Council. These would be stored locally and any resident requiring use in the event of a flood situation should contact any member of the Parish Council.

131 REVIEW OF RISK ASSESS-

MENT – This item was deferred to the next meeting of the Parish Council.

132 PLANNING

a) Applications:-

i.Sudbrooke House, Church Lane – 126852 – Existing storage shed linked to Sudbrooke House to be converted into grannie flat/holiday let unit - No objections.

NB Councillor Bernard Bartram declared an interested in this item as living in close proximity.

ii.Church Cottage, Church Lane – 126899 – No objections subject to the use of matching brickwork (Langworth brick) with adjoining cottage and church, including slates. Provision also for surface water drainage and turning access for double garage.

iii.Wragby Road, Sudbrooke –
126872 – 2 dwellings – No objections subject to the following conditions agreed by neighbours being taken into account on determination of the application:-

- No first floor windows in the western elevation of Plot 2
- All materials to match those of existing cottages to the west (Langworth brick)
- To provide turning area within curtilage of Plot 2 to enable vehicles to leave in forward gear Existing hedgerow along eastern and southern boundaries to be retained.
- **b) Permission -** El Arenal, West Drive 126797 extension and alterations

c) TPO - Reduction of two lime trees - The Lodge, Wragby Road - Cllr Ian Russell had been asked to view the lime trees and was in agreement to the work required. Cllr Russell stated that in the row of lime trees only two 2 were covered by TPO's. The Landowner had no objections to

the remainder being covered by a TPO and the Clerk was asked to contact WLDC to instigate this.

134 SUDBROOKE NEWS

Mr Brian Gardner was unable to continue as distributor of the magazines and thanks were extended to him. Councillor Mrs Lyn Etheridge agreed to take over.

135 CHAIRMAN'S COMMENTS - None

Document from WLDC Planning Development Management Team Leader explaining the significant changes to the structure of the planning service but also the interpretation of existing planning policy. This had been copied to all Councillors.



1 MINUTES OF MEETING HELD ON 1ST APRIL 2010

These had been circulated and were signed as a correct record.

2 CHAIRMAN'S REPORT – Sent by Councillor Miss R Dobbs

Ladies and Gentlemen; Members of the Parish Council

The Parish Council meet on the first Thursday of the month with the exception of August but your very dedicated Parish Councillors also voluntarily give their time for the Sudbrooke community on matters such as checking on road problems, planting Spring bulbs, detailed consideration of planning applications referred by the District Council, helping in frequent litter picks, environmental issues such as Tree Preservation Orders, planting trees etc.

We are very pleased to welcome the Public at our regular meetings. In addition our local County Councillor Sue Rawlins is often in attendance to update us on various issues and District Councillor Stuart Curtis who is also a member of the Parish Council. PC Donnah Thompson is the Police Repre-

sentative and regularly reports on various matters during the month which have occurred in the Parish.

It was unfortunate that the Ceremony of the lighting of the Christmas tree and its celebrations had to be cancelled due to the bad weather. It is pleasing to see that the Parish Council have achieved the lighting of the Millennium Stone.

The Sudbrooke News continues to flourish thanks to the work of The Editor, Nick Truscott and contributions are always most welcome.

The staff supporting the Parish Council, Chris Myers, as Clerk to the Parish Council, and Bridget Solly, as Treasurer, continue to produce efficient service and we are fortunate that they have been with the Parish Council for some years giving very reliable and valuable continuity.

3 CLERK'S REPORT

My work as the Parish Clerk continues to be busy trying to keep on top of new legislation and the increased responsibilities which are being put on Parish Councils. However I continue to enjoy my work and have an excellent team of Councillors who work tirelessly for the village. The residents of Sudbrooke should be proud of them! The Parish Council has passed comment on 20 planning applications from within the parish since last April. Bridget, the Treasurer, and myself continue to work closely together in order to keep the Parish Councils' administration and the accounts in good order.

4 TREASURERS REPORT -Sent by Mrs B Solly Financial report to year ended 31st March 2011.

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The precept for the year came in on the 1st of April at £16,000. Expenditure for the year was circa £22,800 including monies spent on lighting the Millennium stone, grass cutting, insurance renewals, painting the Sudbrooke Gates and the Sudbrooke News. Income for the year was circa £22,200 which included the precept, grants for flood defences, monies paid by the County Council towards grass cutting and advertising revenue for the Sudbrooke News.

5 REPORTS BY DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

During the last year I have been Vice-Chairman of West Lindsey Planning Committee. I am also one of the representatives of West Lindsey on the Joint Strategic Planning Committee along with representative members from North Kesteven and City of Lincoln Councils responsible for preparing LDF planning policies for up to the year 2026.

The Government target figure of recycling half of our waste materials by 2020 has been achieved 9 years ahead of schedule.

Although the District Council will have to find over 2.5M over the next couple of years following Government spending cuts no services run by West Lindsey are to be scrapped and no redundancies are expected.

West Lindsey is also considering increasing its CCTV monitoring from 72 hours to 150 hours and saving £50,000 at the same time.

£50,000 at the same time. Under the District Council Initiative Fund I have this year sanctioned grants to Sudbrooke and Scothern Pre-School Groups, Senior Section Girl Guides, Scothern Scouts, LIVES and Sudbrooke Carving Group.

6 LOCAL ORGANISATIONS REPORTS

a)Village Hall – Sent by Miss R Dobbs, read by Mrs G Rignall

I think everyone will agree that here we have one of the best and most practical village halls in Lincolnshire in a perfect setting; one of which we the community should be proud.

I am proud of the very professional and enthusiastic team that helps to run this Village Hall, trustees and the representatives of the various organisations; it is very strong committee. We meet every six weeks and it is rare for an apology to come in for a meeting. We depend so much on the success of the Village Hall from each and every one of the Committee. It is wrong to point to anyone in particular but particular thanks must go to the Bar Manager, Paul Rignall, his wife Gill, the Secretary of the Committee, Hugh Thomson, Treasurer, Stuart Curtis and his wife who take the bookings. Most of the remainder of us help when required with the maintenance and other matters that occur from day to day; giving voluntary help as and when necessary for the good of our village community.

This year has seen new chairs arrive for the Bramham lounge, the decoration of the toilets, new flooring in the toilets, upgrading of the bar area which includes a new glass washer, repairs to the front porch, replacement of roof flashing, and general maintenance. It is hoped that in the fairly near future that the kitchen will be refurbished.

Bookings have steadily arrived and one successful feature has been the

New Year's Eve event which has been well attended thanks to the work of Paul and Gill Rignall.

I thank Sudbrooke and the wider community for their continued support and my Committee for their hard work and dedication in the success of this Village Hall.

b) Gardening Club - Sent by Mr Mike Halliday

In the year to 31st March 2011, we held 8 meetings. 3 of the meetings were held in the village hall.

The spring and autumn shows were open to all residents of Sudbrooke and we were pleased to see exhibits from people who were not gardening club members.

Stephen Lovell gave a very interesting talk with slides at the October meeting but our speaker for March fell ill at the last moment so the meeting was cancelled.

In July we had a trip to Rennishaw Hall in Derbyshire. The weather was per-

fect and we all enjoyed a tour of the hall and gardens. The staff at Rennishaw Hall were extremely pleasant and helpful.

Other meetings were held at member's homes.

It has come to our notice in the last couple of weeks that there has been a spate of anti-social behaviour taking place in and around the village. Do you know where your child is this evening and what they are doing? What is happening in the village is not a simple case of 'knock and run', which perhaps some of you did when you were young. Often when part of a group we would dare each other to knock on a door and run off. Usually, it was a light tap on the door and running for your life before you got caught. In these cases three or four youths are hammering on windows at one time and then standing and jeering when the person comes to the window to see what on earth is happening. These youths are obviously local as they are only targeting elderly and vulnerable persons' houses that are unable to chase after them. Please make sure that your child understands that this activity is not 'fun' and is frightening and very distressing for the people concerned. It is also very important that you report things immediately. We can't deal with the problems, especially anti-social behaviour, if we don't know who's causing them! We cannot find out who is causing them if we aren't called when those responsible are still at the scene. Please, please ring us straight away on **0300 111 0300** when the offenders are still present. Then we can hopefully find out who they are and deal with them appropriately.

Please report all incidents of anti-social behaviour, however petty. This helps us build a picture of what is happening the village. If twenty minor incidents are reported, this is obviously more of a problem than just one incident being reported and therefore more attention will be paid to the village.

BB guns have been reported being used in the woods around Sudbrooke Park. It is an offence to fire an air weapon beyond the boundary of any premises without the consent from the persons whose land you are firing over or into. Commit this offence and you could face a fine of up to £1,000. To purchase a BB gun you must be 18 years or over. 14 -17 years olds must be supervised at all times by an adult. A BB gun must not be in any public place (such as Sudbrooke Woods) unless in transit when it must be unloaded and placed in a carrier type bag. Guns must not be concealed on your person. It is illegal to carry a BB gun, any air weapon or imitation firearm in a public place. It is a serious offence to kill or injure any bird or protected animal with a BB gun or air gun unless you are a person authorised under the Wildlife and Countryside Act. All

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wild birds, their nests and eggs are protected.

A moment of stupidity or carelessness could cause injury either to you or another person. Please bear in mind that if the Police are called to persons having a weapon in a public place it will be treated as a 'real weapon' and an armed response team will attend.

Quad bikes and off road motorbikes are being used in Sudbrooke Woods again. This is private property and the landowner does not want off-road biking taking place. If you ride your motorcycle/quad bike on private land without the owners consent you can be prosecuted. The road into the woods from West Drive and through the gates off the A158 is classed as a 'public place' as is all the 'public right of way footpaths' throughout the woods. All motorcycles/ quads need to be insured, have a registration plate and m.o.t when used in public places, whether they are being ridden or pushed. With no insurance they can be seized. We are fortunate to live in an area with lots of green space but many of these areas have attracted groups riding motorbikes/quads illegally. Sometimes people, particularly parents, are not aware that it is illegal to ride un-registered off-road motorcycles, mini motos or quad bikes except on private land with written permission from the land owner. Riders will be prosecuted, fined, or the vehicle seized and possibly crushed.

- Illegal motorcycling/quad-biking can kill.
- It can be expensive in fines.
- Your motorbike/quad can be confiscated.

We have received evidence of scam letters/emails from persons abroad stating that you could become a beneficiary of funds held in places such as Hong Kong, Nigeria or Africa. Please do not be deceived by these letters. It will result in you having to send funds across to these countries for the money to be 'released', which in the ends does not happen and you are out of pocket to the tune of hundreds of pounds. Either put them straight into bin or bring them here to the police station and we will dispose of them appropriately.

- have, within five years prior to being elected, been convicted in the UK of an offence and have had a prison sentence (whether suspended or not) for a period of over three months without the option of a fine.

GARDENING NEWS

Hello welcome to Gardening News. At the time of writing the weather is hot but a gentle breeze is making it very comfortable for working in. Last month I mentioned the winter casualties amongst the plants. That situation is not as bad as feared, as only the Hebe and the Eucalyptus have died, and the Leycesteria and the tall Stipa grass have survived and are showing signs of new growth. One of the plants in flower is the Chanomeles in the front garden. This is a glorious sight with its bright red flowers which really stand out. This usually has a long flowering time. The bad news is that the ever resilient Mares Tail, a dreadful weed is showing itself again. I have resorted to using a flame gun –I will keep you informed as to whether this is successful or not.

The greenhouse is now bursting with plants of all sizes from seedlings to plants now ready to be planted out. I do get a lot of pleasure from seeing a plant grow from seed to maturity, full of flower or food. Not all my plants are grown from seed, I also buy plug plants and grow them on.

In my younger days I worked in a Parks Department. At the end of the summer season we would take up the Geraniums and take cuttings and these would spend all winter in the greenhouses growing on ready for the next summer. These days plants like geraniums which are required in large quantities will be grown from seed at the end of winter. To walk into a large greenhouse and see the thousands of plants of uniform size and height is amazing. My own geraniums are bought as plug plants each year which is an economical and time saving method.

The first vegetables are now ready to plant out. Onion sets which have been growing in modular trays will be the first. I also grow potatoes in bags which can then be placed in the border or on the patio. The two fruit trees are full of blossom which is very promising - no frosts please.

Several people have mentioned that their Camellias are suffering, and think that the leaf fall and small dry buds are due to the hard winter, but is probably due to a lack of sufficient watering throughout the last summer when the new buds were forming. They will need to be given a good watering now and throughout the coming summer. I have to admit that our Camellia has suffered the same fate this year and I must take more care of it during the summer months. The rockery is improving and showing colour with eight different plants in flower, including some dainty tulips only three inches tall. There is still so much work to be done, this is a really busy time of the year in the garden, so after my break for lunch more work awaits, so farewell for this month.

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

I too, with many kids my age back in the late fifties, used to live not far from Gillingham station and engine sheds, in Kent, on the main line from the London termini to the Kent coast, Dover and Folkestone. We too, would gather at the level crossing with the footbridge alongside with our "I spy " books, and the highlight of the week was at the weekend, a West Country streamlined loco with a large golden arrow nameplate on the front would roar through with a rake of Pullman cars to the Boat train terminal at Folkestone!, and we could also get right next to the loco depot in an alley that ran behind a row of houses. We used to get more loco numbers there, watching the old steam tank and tender engines being re-fuelled and turned on the turntable.

Sadly, it all went when the Kent Coast line was electrified, the loco depot is now an Electricity Board office and depot, the electric trains all look the same (10 or 12 cars long!). Tests have been done in the past with white lines for three stumps marked down to the start of the protected area. One of the reasons why it was not successful was that it was felt that it gave extra help to the bowler. Furthermore, shorter guide lines on the popping crease are sometimes used in the Southern Hemisphere but reports confirmed that it does not stop batsmen marking their own guard with either their bats or their feet. The white lines can very quickly be eroded by the scuffing of the batsmen's feet and, also, many batsmen tap the ground with their bat as part of a ritual or routine. Adding quide lines would probably not alter this practice.

For those reasons, it was agreed that an additional line should not be added to the creases.

Thank you to you and to Mr Barnes for your enquiry and I hope that this gives you both some reasons behind the current Laws.

GP Changes

We are pleased to announce that Dr Philip Williams who is currently one of our GP Registrars will being staying with the practice as a Partner from August 2011 to replace Dr Ian Lacy who retires at the end of June. Dr Lacy will continue to work some sessions for the practice each year so will still be around. He has recently been elected onto the board of our local shadow GP consortium so will spend most of his time in this new role.

Phone Number Changes

The practice is currently in the process of having a new telephone system installed which is due to 'go live' on 10th May 2011. The new system will improve the telephone access for the patients at our Cherry Willingham surgery as we shall move to one single number which covers both sites. This number will be available all day from 8:00am until 6:30pm. The number will be 01522 751717. The prescription ordering line at Cherry Willingham will also change to 01522 754649. We expect that the changeover will go smoothly to plan but would ask that patients bear with us for the first few days.

If you would be interested in using this service you will need to register for online access by coming into the practice and bringing a form of photo ID (passport or driving licence). After two working days you can collect your unique username and PIN for this service. 
