■ Mrs Coral Evans attended on behalf of the Carving Group. The Scout Camp had required to have some unsafe oak removed from the camp and had offered a large piece to the Carving Group to use. Mrs Evans hoped that it could possibly be used for the carving of a village sign.

The suggestion was agreed in principle providing that a place could be found for it to be sited whilst being worked on. This would be an agenda item for the next meeting of the Parish Council.

A resident had suggested that an autumn litter pick be arranged. A provisional date of 9 November was set.

■ It was noted that there had been no further action on the vandalism to the multi-purpose sports area.

CC Mrs Sue Rawlins reported that the main issue at the County Council was the proposed closure of libraries within the county.

DC Stuart Curtis stated that he had been appointed Chair of the West Lindsey District Council Planning Committee, with District Councillor Ian Fleetwood as Vice Chair.

DC Curtis also informed members that broadband would shortly be installed in several village halls within Lincolnshire, including Sudbrooke.

65) Reports on matters outstanding =

- a) Sports Day 22nd September 2013 report: The Sports Day had been a great success and thanks were extended to Mr Mike Halliday for organising the event on behalf of the Parish Council.
- **b) Sudbrooke Christmas tree switch on:** A similar event as in previous years was planned.
- c) Closure of Welton Library: Suggestion of funding from mobile service in Sudbrooke to be diverted to static service in Welton - confirmation had been received from LCC that an average of 12 residents were using the mobile library on a regular basis when it visited Sudbrooke.

Members agreed unanimously that as the mobile library service was a valuable asset to the village and was to continue to visit Sudbrooke that funding for the service should remain for that purpose and not be diverted to Welton.

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Brief report of meeting held on November 7, 2013

■ **A158 closure:** Concern was expressed about the recent road closure caused by the gas leak on the A158. The resulting traffic chaos being a frustrating experience for residents and drivers. The road was closed without putting into place any diversion notices which led to two-way traffic down Church Lane, Sudbrooke, with heavy goods vehicles and buses negotiating the single track road with few passing places.

The Parish Council agreed to contact the Head of Highways and the Police Commissioner and enquire why a scheme devised several years ago was not put into practice for a one way system to operate along Church Lane in this eventuality.

- **Wood Carving:** The Parish Council have agreed that the carving group can store/work on a large piece of oak on the grassed area fronting the village hall. It is hoped that the piece of oak from Sudbrooke Park will eventually be a village sign.
- **Broadband:** The Village Hall will shortly be having broadband installed.
- Vandalism to the millennium stone lighting: It is hoped that a claim can be made to the insurance company to replace wiring to the millennium stone lights, following the wanton vandalism to them. It is doubtful whether they will be illuminating the stone when the Christmas tree lights are switched on though.
- Cutting back of trees in the village: Some Councillors had a meeting with the Highways Officers at which time the Councillors offered to cut back/trim several trees growing in verges within the village. The Highways Department were however, reluctant to allow Councillors to do this.

NEW VILLAGE SIGN

We are working on carving a new village sign, although it will not be started until next spring as we are just finishing off the posts for the other side of the Jubilee garden.

The sign will probably take two years for us to carve - all I can say at the moment is that it will be approximately three metres tall and a 'Y' shape.

Hopefully if we can raise the funds it will have a a piece of stainless steel across the gap with SUDBROOKE etched out of it and the wood will be carved after all the wood carvers have agreed a design.

The wood has kindly been donated by the scout camp after an old oak tree was partially brought down in bad weather and then deemed to be unsafe due to the

activities on the site. As for the location of the sign, the Parish Council would like the Sudbrooke residents to have their say (more about that in a later issue).

We have been given permission to have the trunk put on the verge in the village hall car park near the hedge and the scouts are kindly going to deliver it for us later in the year.

If any residents would like to be involved in the carving they can contact me on 01522 750031. We will continue to carve on Monday mornings from 10am until 12.

The carving group would welcome new members to help with the project and I will teach them all I know.

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The Danwood Lincoln Santa Fun Run and Walk, organised by the Rotary Club of Lincoln Colonia, is an approximate 3k fun run set around the historic Bailgate area of Lincoln.

Around 2,000 entrants dressed in their Santa suits will set off at around 11.30am from Lincoln Castle, and two laps of the course later will finish back in the Castle to be awarded their medals.

The Santas will be supporting seven local charities, and with an emphasis on trying to

raise at least £20.13 each, the organisers will be hoping to beat last year's record-breaking total of £63.162.

The run is a great spectacle of red with Santas of all ages running and walking around the iconic Lincoln Cathedral, all having terrific fun in support of some very deserving charities including: Alzheimers Society, St. Barnabas Hospice, British Heart Foundation (Lincoln), Samaritans (Lincoln), Lincs & Notts Air Ambulance, Candles and other local Rotary charities.

SPORT AND PE

■ There has been much speculation in the press regarding the recently-launched Primary Sports Premium.

As part of this initiative, the department for education has invested an additional £300 million funding to primary schools over the next two years. This money has been given directly to schools to spend on developing the quality of physical education and sports provision. Ofsted have been asked to increase their monitoring of PE as a result of this increased funding.

At Ellison Boulters CE Academy, there is a well-established and thriving sports programme so this money is being used to further enhance the quality and range of experiences pupils receive.

Already this year, specialist sports coaches have been brought into the school to work alongside teachers to develop skills and expertise in the specific areas of tag rugby, netball and gymnastics. This is ensuring that our pupils are getting quality teaching in PE lessons and that teachers are continually being trained with innovative ideas for the exciting delivery of sport in schools.

This will also ensure that the provision for PE and sport continues to be of an exceptionally high quality long after the funding expires.

Teachers are closely observing these specialist coaches and have planned sessions alongside them to develop effective

progression for both staff and pupils in these key sports areas. Miss Mumby (Year 6 teacher) said: "I feel much more confident about teaching tag rugby now and the children are showing some high level skills!"

This training will be furthered through a comprehensive programme of in-school support and training courses covering a wide range of areas including hockey, dance and athletics. All children have been given a fitness log and encouraged to increase their

participation levels and record their progress.

Early indications show a sharp increase in physical activity and parents are noticing a change in behaviour for some pupils.

Pupils at Ellison Boulters are already reaping the benefits of this outstanding provision and were crowned winners at a recent tag rugby tournament. The Year 5 and 6 pupils had a fantastic morning at Cherry Willingham Community School, beating seven other schools to secure the title and qualify for regional finals

in the new year. This tournament is one of a wide range of sporting opportunities planned for pupils this year including an athletics event,

volleyball, competitive football fixtures, a swimming gala and multi-skills events.

As part of the Olympic legacy, a group of older children are being trained as Young Sports Leaders. They will develop the skills and expertise to increase physical activity on the playground and introduce new games

and equipment. This is a great opportunity for students to develop leadership skills and make a difference to others.

Younger children at Ellison Boulters also took part in an all inclusive multi-skills event. Key Stage One experienced activities such as Goal Ball, which involves a ball with a bell inside, as used in the Paralympics. One teacher said: "Everyone was fully active for the whole session and developed their fundamental skills for sports."

The school also listens carefully to children's preferences and after a dance teacher worked with pupils on 'Street Dance', they were very vocal in their appreciation and expressed their

enthusiasm. The school noted this and now the dance teacher provides a regular after-school club, which is fully subscribed.

Another highlight of the term was taking 25 pupils to The Priory LSST School to meet Matthew Pincent and listen to him talk and answer questions. A big thank you goes to Mr Yarwood for arranging this opportunity for our children.

It is an exciting time for primary school sport and all children are being encouraged to take part in more sport and competitions.

At Ellison Boulters, we are delighted to be using this funding to further encourage pupils to become healthier and more active both at school and within the community.

WOMEN'S HEALTH AND FITNESS

■ It's safe to say that the majority of people I train are women and it's also safe to say that the majority of women don't really feel comfortable about weight-training.

They think they are going to end up looking like one of those woman body builders you sometimes see on television – all bulging muscles. So they concentrate instead on cardio-vascular work – running, indoor cycling, cross-trainer, etc.

BUT IT'S NOT TRUE!!!!

In order to get muscles like that, you need lots of testosterone and women don't naturally produce lots of testosterone (they produce a little bit, but not a lot).

So what female body builders do is take artificial testosterone supplements (anabolic steroids) and other drugs to get their bodies looking the way they want them to look. Personally I can't think of anything worse.

But if you do weight training WITHOUT testosterone supplements, the look you get

Your body becomes lean and toned - you get muscle rather than fat, but it's not the pumped-up testosterone produced muscle - you look like a proper female.

But the real reason why weight training is so good for women (as well as men) is to do with metabolism.

The higher your metabolism, the more your body burns off the calories instead of them turning into fat. Doing any exercise makes your metabolism speed up, but the important thing is what happens after the exercise is over.

If you have a high amount of lean body mass (a posh word for muscle), your body has to speed up its metabolism just to deal with it.

Muscle stretches and contracts, it needs a blood supply, it generates heat - and all of this burns calories.

If you have fat instead of muscle, it just sits there on the body and does nothing.

So to all those women who are thinking about making a New Year's Resolution to lose a bit of weight - start doing some weight training.



I noted from the November **Sudbrooke News** that the parish council was potentially looking to take ownership or responsibility for the woods/old hall garden. I am

concerned that they should be aware of the potential costs associated with this.

Some of the footpaths have protruding metalwork from old fences, posing trip hazards; and many of the trees are at risk of falling on walkers due to neglect over recent years. Insurance would be needed as any claims for injuries sustained could be significant.

I understand why planning permissions might want to be given to 'low density' developments, but these properties cannot be afforded by most locals.

Would it be possible instead to consider farm cottages, with agricultural covenants? This maintains a supply of suitable accommodation for farm workers, and no-one can make excessive profits from the development.

LATEST UPATE =

■ British summertime has now officially finished, which signals the start of dark nights and cold weather.

We need to be vigilant in the care of our neighbours especially those who are more vulnerable - just popping in from time to time can be enough; keeping our eyes open to whether papers are still stuck in the letterbox, or the curtains are shut when they are normally open; small things like this can often save a life. Another option is to join the nominated neighbour scheme. It is not just the vulnerable that need to take care in these darker nights.

Here are our top tips for your safety:

- If you are leaving your house unattended make sure you fit timer switches so that it looks occupied, draw curtains and blinds so your items are not in view of windows.
- Leave a radio on, this will also help to keep pets calm.
- Use a door chain so that you can see who is there before opening the door fully.
- ▶ It is also a good idea to have a good light outside your main entrance. This way you can see who is outside from the window don't be worried about leaving people at the door while you go to another window if you cannot see.
- If it is a workman who wants to come into your home always ask for identification. If you are not sure ask for a number to ring to check their identity before letting them in.
- Distraction burglary isn't common, but we all need to be aware of it. This is where criminals call at a house posing as officials or

asking for help with something such as a lost pet or a glass of water or pretending to be from an official company.

They then make up a story to get inside to steal whatever they can find. Some work alone, but often they work in groups of two or more - usually one person will knock at the door with a convincing excuse that seems genuine or urgent. The talker will persuade the victim to let them in and will keep you occupied whilst another will sneak in and search the house to steal cash and valuables, they can be men, women or children and smartly or casually dressed.

If you suspect a bogus caller do not hesitate to call 999, don't let them in and don't get into conversation with them.

If you are using a bicycle or motorbike ALWAYS wear high-visibility clothing. Hi-viz waistcoats cost very little and could save your life.

Park your car in a well lit area and remove all valuables and SATNAV holder marks.


