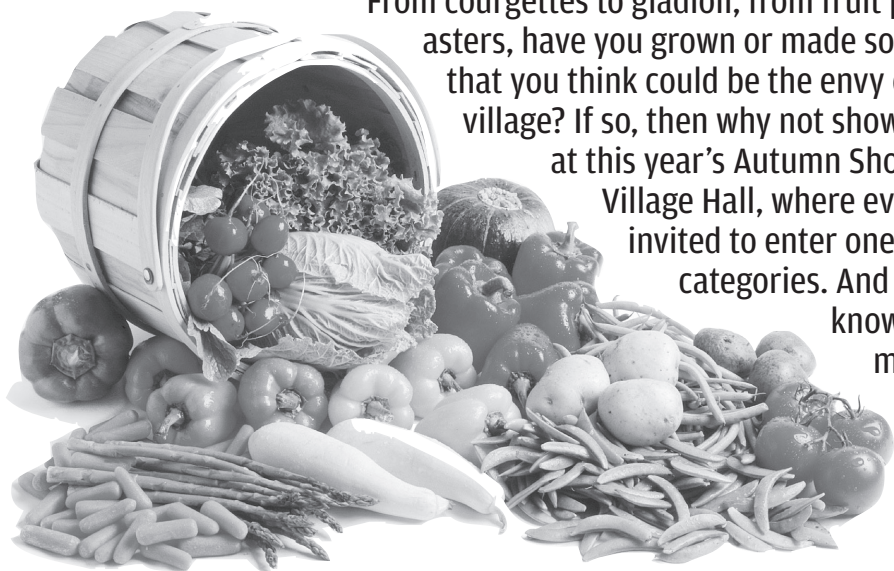

CENTRAL LINCS LOCAL PLAN

NEWS

The draft Local Plan for Central Lincolnshire (comprising the Districts of West Lindsey North Kesteven and the City of Lincoln) covering 2016 to 2036 will be submitted to all Parish Councils across West Lindsey in October for public consultation.

It is a planning policy document that will be used by the West Lindsey Planning Committee as a tool to deliver housing and economic growth and covers such things as potential sites for future housing,

healthcare, education, community facilities and transport infrastructure.

All local residents will have the chance to have their say particularly on future development in Sudbrooke. Any planning applications received prior to the adoption of the Local Plan, however, will have to be determined on their own merits through the normal planning process.

PARISH COUNCIL MINUTES

June 2014

Abridged notes of the monthly meeting of Sudbrooke Parish Council held on Thursday 5 June in Sudbrooke Village Hall. The full set of notes may be seen in Nettleham Library or on the Parish website.

COUNCILLORS PRESENT:

APOLOGIES:

16) Open forum for Parishioners items

- No items mentioned.

17) District Councillor's Report

- DC Stuart Curtis explained that the launch of the new Local Plan had taken place.

18) Police Matters

- May 5: An incident of drunken behaviour was reported in the area of both Northfield Avenue and Beresford Drive, this is being dealt with accordingly.
- May 10: There was an RTC near the junction of the Cherry Tree Café and Scothern Lane, three vehicles were involved but only minor injuries were sustained.
- May 12: A male was reported selling door to door in the Broad Dale Close area this is being dealt with.
- June 3: An ornament was stolen from the front garden of a property in Chestnut Close, this is being dealt with.

19) Notes of Meeting held on May 15, 2014

- Amendment: Minute 11 - iv) Market Rasen on 5th June add Gainsborough on July 3, 2014. The notes were then proposed as a true account by Councillor Martin Dickie, seconded by Councillor Paul Rignall.

20) Reports on Matters Outstanding

- a) Review of Standing Orders: These were currently being reviewed and would be available for Councillors to consider for adoption in due course.
- b) Tennis Court marking - quotations: The Clerk had received quotations for line marking in the sums of £250.00 and £300.00.
- c) Purchase of tennis net: Quotations had been received in the sum of £380.00 for a complete net/posts and £85 for the net only.
- d) Purchase of box for tennis net: Only one quotation received in the sum of £240.00.
- e) Pressure washing of courts: One quotation received to date in the sum of £300.00. The Clerk would seek further prices for this work.

20) Reports on Matters Outstanding continued

Discussion took place with reference to items b, c, and d above of which the Clerk had sought prices from different suppliers.

District Councillor Stuart Curtis offered to contribute £750 from the District Councillor Initiative Fund, the remaining costs would be taken from the Sports field Account.

In view of the time involved in enabling the courts to be in a playable condition Councillor Martin Dickie proposed, Councillor Paul Rignall seconded, that following the grant from District Councillor Stuart Curtis surplus costs be paid from the sports field account and the Clerk be authorised to obtain the most suitable price and, if possible, that she and the Chair instigate the works prior to the next meeting. Members would be kept updated of works.

■ f) Grass cutting - report/update: A resident had reported problems with the condition of the cutting of the grass in Courtfield Close. The Clerk had referred this to Veolia, the Parish Councils grass cutting contractors.

It was felt that the most recent cutting of the grass had been improved.

21) Goalposts on Village Hall Playing Field

■ The Playing Field Inspector had reported that following attendance at a recent playing field inspection training course, the type of goalposts on Sudbrooke's playing field were now not recommended due to the age, weight and the possibility of them falling on to a user.

Consideration was given to having them fixed permanently into the ground, but this would mean them taking up part of the running track for the sports events. It was also not yet possible to have them permanently fixed onto the new sports field as this was not in the ownership of the Parish Council.

In view of the above it was felt that there was no alternative other than to scrap the posts. The Clerk was asked to arrange the removal.

A cost for new lighter weight goalposts had been sought in the sum of £1536.00. It was felt that lighter weight posts would be purchased in the future when there was more certainty of the Parish Council owning the new sports field. In the meantime, the Clerk was asked to arrange a semi-circle be lined out in the multi-purpose sports area at the same time as the tennis court lining, so that it may be used for kick about football. It was hoped that a goal mouth could be marked on the boards.

22) Street Light - Courtfield Close

■ The street light on the roundabout in Courtfield Close was being shielded by growth from trees. The Clerk had reported this to the Highways Department who were investigating the cutting back of the trees.

a) Works by Play Equipment Inspector: Mr Peter Malone had treated all the benches in the village which amounted to £9.50 per bench. He had also offered to undertake six hours work generally tidying up on the playing field, removal of algae from matting/cleaning of waste bins/ washing of signage/ trim back ivy and branches from some trees. Members welcomed this and unanimously agreed to the work being carried out.

It was presumed that this was lost in the post and the Treasurer was asked to re-issue the payment.

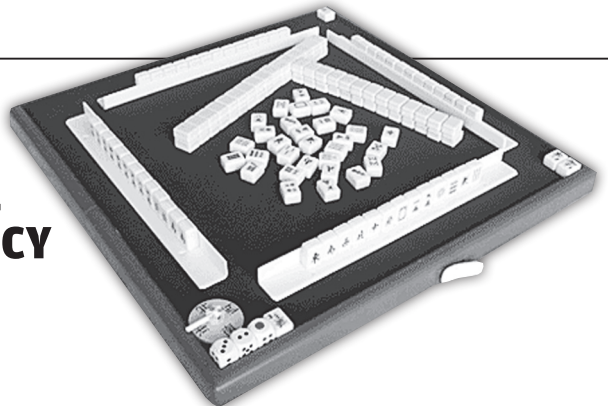

SEPTEMBER WALK

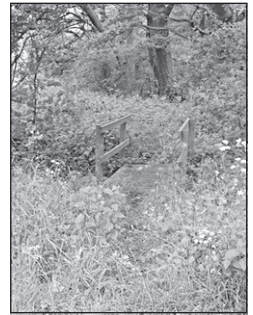
■ A seven-mile circular walk from Wragby passing through Thistle Storr and Great West woods.

THIS TIME NEXT YEAR

■ Scothern made it to the second round, but unfortunately did not quite make it to the final round, so something to aim for next year. Read the judges comments...

A) Overall appearance and condition –

Absence of litter, unauthorised/unsightly refuse, absence of graffiti/vandalism, dumps on verges, condition of roads and paths (**max 25 points**)
Sudbrooke is a mixture of housing and woodland. Remains of the Sudbrooke Holme hall can be found amid the trees making it unsafe to walk through in some places.

Warning signs advise people to keep out of these areas. The Scouts use part of the woods for their camp and there are plenty of tracks between the trees. There are also public footpaths through the trees which are accessible and unrestricted by overhanging greenery. Part of the land within the village comprises farm premises.

There are litter bins and dog bins throughout the village. Despite this there was litter lying in the Northfield playing field and children's play area (see section B and C) and one item of litter was seen in the stream as well as the Village Hall (see section C) and cigarette stubs in one of the bus shelters (see section C).

Some graffiti was noticed in one of the bus shelters. No vandalism was noted. However, at one point a large quantity of grass cuttings had been dumped on the roadside.

Roads throughout the residential area were in good condition, including the unadopted roads. Elsewhere the unadopted roads were passable. Some of the footpaths are divided into pedestrian path and cycle track. Paths in the main residential area were in good condition, apart from that leading to the Northfield park (see section B). Housing within the woods is not afforded footpaths. (15/25).

B) Green Spaces – Provision for wildlife (such as bird boxes/feeders, bat boxes and wild flowers) and general appearance of trees, ponds, streams, dykes, verges, parks, playing fields,

nature areas, hedges, footpaths, stiles, field gates, signposting, childrens' play areas and public green amenities (**max 20 points**)

There was an absence of bird boxes in public spaces and in private gardens, although the judges acknowledge that these are generally found in the rear gardens of domestic premises.

Ducks roamed on the grass verges and were not intimidated by the presence of humans. The Jubilee Garden has been sown with wild flower seeds among the shrubs and according to the application form this area is strimmed 'later in the season'. Unfortunately when the judges arrived (beginning of July) the whole area had been mown between the shrubs.

There was little evidence of species diversity, but it is noted that this is a relatively new scheme and an ongoing work-in-progress.

The Millennium Stone is proudly positioned in a grassed area beside the Scothern Road. The grass was neatly trimmed. An information panel outlined the history of this erratic. A Jubilee Park notice board displayed a map of the village together with photographs.

A 'Green Man' carving stood in the grassed area of the Millennium Stone and further carvings were situated beside the 'wild flower' area. These had all been created by members of the Sudbrooke Wood Carving Group, a recent initiative backed by the Parish Council.

See also the Sudbrooke Oak in the grounds of the Village Hall (section C). Benches and a bin are sited in the vicinity of the Millennium Stone.

A stream or drain passes through the village. In some places its banks have been cut and the water can be seen running freely but further on it becomes choked with grass, but only one item of litter was observed. Verges were generally trim with odd exceptions in the residential areas. There is no information on who is responsible for cutting verges.

Most of the hedges marked field boundaries and had been cut earlier in the year. A small triangular green beside houses within the wood provided a very pleasant area surrounded with neatly clipped hawthorn hedging.

A public footpath leading from the Scothern road into the residential area was in good condition. However, the path/cycle path leading to the Northfield Park was overhung with nettles and hawthorn.

The grass within the play area had recently been cut. Inside the children's play area there are a bench and litter bin. The bin is surrounded by nettles and some litter was lying on the ground. The self-closing gate to this area did not close properly. The play equipment was in a good condition. Nettles also grew on the perimeter of the surrounding grassed area and when some boys lost their ball in the bushes they resorted to beating the vegetation in an attempt to retrieve it. An area of the surrounding grass had been used for a recent barbecue and litter was left in situ.

The village sign upon entering from the Scothern end was obscured by overhanging branches and the sign itself was damaged and in need of cleaning (16/20).

C) Public Premises – Community Centres, community buildings, schools, road signs, notice boards, advertisements, directional signs, bus stops and shelters, school yards, public seats, telephone boxes, gardens and allotments, public halls, sports facilities and car parks. Cleanliness of public toilets (**max 25 points**)

The Village Hall is situated on the outskirts of the village with its own car park and playing field. The Sudbrooke Oak (a tree from the scout camp which had to be felled for safety reasons) is being worked on by the village wood carving group and is a work in progress.

An information board gives an explanation of this work. The car park is in a good condition. There is a row of bins lined up on the edge of the car park and these were overflowing on the day of judging, with loose litter lying on the ground.

A notice board is fixed to the wall of the Village Hall. All posters were visible (including a Best Kept Village Competition poster) but one was out-of-date.

Posters advertised family activities. More notices could be seen inside the building. A map shows the Sudbrooke Footpath Walks outside the Hall. A tennis court lies beside the Hall, but this had no net and the boardings round the perimeter were in need of repair. Its hard surface was in good condition (See the notes regarding the Parish Council meeting below).

The Hall's grassed playing fields were neatly cut with the field marked out for the Sports Day which had taken place prior to the judges' visit. There were a couple of items of litter on the field. The children's play equipment was in good condition. The gates were open to this area, but there is a sign stating no dogs beyond that point and there was no sign of dog fouling. A bench outside the play area looks inwards.

There is a raised flower bed to the rear of the hall and there had been an attempt to weed this, the arisings having been discarded on the ground. Weeds grew along the building at this point. A bench, bin and dog bin are situated on the roadside upon entering the village. There is no school in Sudbrooke.

There are two bus shelters beside the Wragby road. One has a bench inside and time tables on the wall. As mentioned in section A, there was graffiti inside this shelter. Cigarette stubs were scattered on the ground despite a 'no smoking' sign, though it was noted that West Lindsey District Council cleaned the shelters on Mondays, the day following the judges' visit. The second bus shelter had no bench inside.

The Parish Council notice board stands near to the first bus shelter. All the notices were neatly set out although one was out-of-date and displayed the agenda for their next meeting, held two days prior to the judges' visit. It was noted that item 1 – Open Forum for parishioners ... item 7 b) Tennis court upgrading.

A telephone box (card only) and a bench stand beside the notice board.

Several post boxes were noted in the village. A good interpretation panel outlines the history of the gates to the drive of the former Sudbrooke Holme hall and a smaller plaque on the wall beside the gates also refers to this (19/25).

D) Premises - Collective appearance of private gardens, hedges, fences and walls (**max 15 points**)

The majority of private gardens were neat and cared for, with only a couple of exceptions. There were a number of houses for sale but all their gardens were tidy as were premises where building work was being carried out (14/15).

E) Religious buildings and memorials -

Condition of churchyards, cemeteries, chapel surrounds, war memorials and their notice boards if in public ownership (**max 15 points**)
The church had two notice boards, both relating to the church itself.

There is a new bench on the south side of the church and two other benches on the north side. The churchyard was well-tended.

There is no war memorial mentioned on the application form and none seen by the judges. It could be that there is one within the church (14/15).

F) Business Premises - Collective appearance of business property including inns, farms and farmyards, workshops, post office, shops and caravan sites. (**max 20 points**)

There is one shop within the village; the area around this was tidy. There is a garage with a neat frontage. Of the two farm premises within the village, one was very unkempt (16/20).

G) Overall community effort - Evidence of community spirit and activity and initiative in the care of the parish and its environment. (**max 15 points**)

Sudbrooke is a Neighbourhood Watch Area. The parishioners are obviously proud of their heritage as shown by the panel giving the history of Sudbrooke Holme, the Millennium Stone and

the Sudbrooke oak. The wood carving group is very commendable.

The Village Hall is used for a variety of activities and a 'Best Kept Front Garden Competition' is being run this year.

Spring bulbs provide colourful displays in the Spring and at Christmas a Christmas tree is sited near to the Millennium Stone.

The village has Spring and Autumn 'Litter Picks' using equipment provided by the District Council.

There is good interaction between the Parish Council and the residents as shown by the Parish Council agenda (see section C above) and the creation of the Wood Carving Group (14/15).

Total score: 108/135

Final comments:

The application, notes and clear map of the area were particularly helpful to the judges.

Perhaps it would be useful for the designated wild flower area in the Jubilee Garden to be flanked with a fence or perhaps more wood carvings to identify its boundaries to avoid its being mown during what should be its flowering season.

An information panel showing which plants are present would stimulate interest.

WHAT ARE WE DOING HERE?

■ I guess that for many of you reading this, you are feeling that summer is coming to an end, the children are about to go back to school and hopefully are reflecting on some great weather, some fun and, if you were fortunate, some time away from the normal pace of life.

This summer seems to have been one of calms and storms, in all sorts of ways. The summer sunshine has been interrupted by stormy weather. I had a very eventful journey back from Nottingham last Friday, trying to find my way back in a storm that flooded the roads causing flash floods and it was impossible to drive through three or four feet of water that drains just could not clear fast enough. The answer - stop and wait!

However, some have suffered far more serious storms than a longer than expected journey. Whilst most of us bathe in freedom and plenty, some in the world have been living in the storm of war, persecution and in fear of their lives. The situation in the Middle East is horrifying. It seems to me that evil has broken out. At some point, enormous courage will be needed from the leadership of these nations to do something different and create a path for peace. Meanwhile in Western Africa we are reminded of the

poverty of those who are fighting the deadly disease, Ebola and discovering that trying to stop it in its tracks needs far more resource than they could possibly have imagined.

I was pondering all these events when I again came across the account of Elijah in the Old Testament. Elijah, a prophet - they weren't popular people - he had prophesied three years of famine and it came; he faced off the prophets of Mount Carmel - that upset Jezebel who vowed to have him killed.

Elijah fled to the mountain in fear of his life. He went there to meet with God, who sent earthquake, wind and fire - but God didn't speak to him in those storms, in the end came a still small voice - a voice that asked him a very simple question: 'What are you doing here Elijah?'

That's a very simple, but profound question that all of us of whatever faith or none, need to ask ourselves sometimes - what are we doing here?

The answer to it may uncover the real desires of our hearts, it may help us to uncover our motivations, and who knows it may help us to hold back from some of the things we know are wrong.

Whether we are in the middle of storm or sunshine, whatever its cause, stopping, listening and answering that question is a good strategy for life.

LATEST NEWS

■ We have received several notifications from patients relating to 'phone calls from individuals purporting to have connections with the surgery and asking for answers to medically related queries.

Please be reassured the doctors and staff will always introduce themselves and explain the reason we are calling and if you are in any doubt as to the authenticity of the caller, we would prefer that you decline to disclose information and call the surgery telephone number to confirm any details.

Reminder to patients to ensure that all polio diphtheria and tetanus vaccinations are up to date - even if only travelling to Europe - please ask at reception if not sure about your immunity.

Dr Maiella Apudo has been working with our team for several months recently as our GP Registrar. She has now completed her GP training at Welton and starts a new job with a local practice shortly and we all wish her the very best.

We are now joined by Dr Adeel Hussain, who is embarking on his GP training and later this month Dr Saritha Dasari returns to Welton to complete her GP training and we extend a warm welcome to both doctors and hope that they will be very happy working with us.

We are keen to promote our smoking cessation services - please ask at reception if you wish to take advantage of this - appointments are available at various times including Monday evenings.

FLU JABS

'Flu vaccines are expected in the practice in the middle of September and appointments will be available as soon as they arrive.

In addition we are holding a Saturday morning drop-in session on Saturday 27 September 9am - 11.30am. If you are in the "at risk" group please come in as early as possible to maximise the benefit - if unsure, check with reception staff. If you normally have the vaccination please don't wait to be invited!

This year children aged 2-4 years old are included in the "at risk" group - the rationale being that younger children spread the infection quickly and by treating them this helps to prevent the spread. Children are given a nasal spray, not an injection.

If you have not yet signed up for on line ordering of prescriptions, please do so as soon as possible.

Those using the original system of ordering prescriptions via the website will not be able to use this after September 30 - the latest system gives each person a password and enables them to go directly to their own record and select the authorised repeats to order and the system is a lot safer and slicker to use. Forms to sign up for this are available on the Practice website or from reception or dispensary.

Last month 21.5 hrs of appointments were booked and not kept - 42 doctors and 58 nursing. Please let us know if you are not able to use your appointment so that others can do so.

FLU VACCINATIONS

■ It's that time of year again when the practice once again start to plan the flu

Influenza is a virus causing a lung or respiratory infection.

While for most people it is only an unpleasant illness that should pass in about a week, it can cause serious complications, particularly in young children and older adults.

Getting a flu vaccination is the most effective way to stop you catching flu and passing it on to others.

Vaccination is available for patients who fit one of the criteria listed below:

- Pregnant (at any stage of the pregnancy)
- Children aged 2, 3 or 4 years of age (the vaccination is delivered via nasal spray rather than injection)
- A Carer (If you are the main carer for an elderly or disabled person, their well-being could be placed at risk should you fall ill)
- Aged 65 years or over
- Aged 6 months and over and suffer from any of the following conditions:
 - ▶ Chronic respiratory disease
 - ▶ Chronic heart disease
 - ▶ Chronic kidney disease
 - ▶ Chronic liver disease
 - ▶ Chronic neurological disease
 - ▶ Diabetes
 - ▶ Immunosuppression

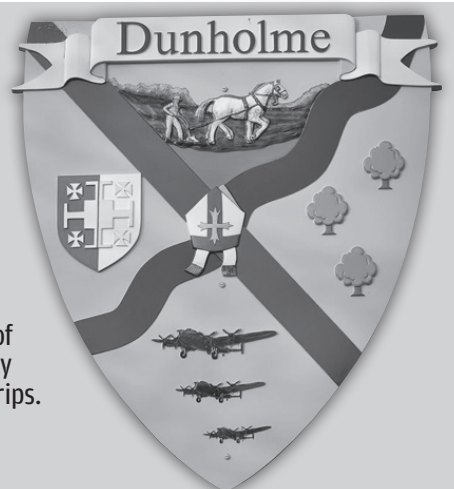
Our meetings in September are the 2nd, 16th and 30th. We meet in the Dunholme Village hall commencing at 2.15pm.
